Jordan inducted into West **Texas Music Hall of Fame**

Long time country musician Troy Jordan has recently been inducted into the West Texas Music Hall of Fame. Jordan was presented the award by Mayor Garland Davis in a brief ceremony at the Robert Lee Rec Hall last Thursday night.

The list of vocalists honored by the Hall of Fame is an exclusive one. Such legendary talent as Lefty Frizzell, Ronnie Dunn, the Gatlin Brothers, Tommy Overstreet, Roy Orbison, Fess Parker, Ernest Tubb, Tanya Tucker, and Jeannie C. Riley have been named to the roll of honorees.

Jordan's credentials and biography, overviewed by Robert Lee Mayor Garland Davis at the time of the presentation, are extensive, to say the least. Troy Jordan was born on September 11, 1924, at Duke, Oklahoma (near Altus). He started playing the fiddle at about eight years of age.

In 1936, Troy and his brother, eight year old Lloyd, were playing dances in the

Muleshoe, Texas area. During this time, Troy also played with Uncle John Wills (father of Bob Wills), Billy Jack and Luke Wills on KICA at Clovis, NM every Saturday morning. He graduated from high school in 1942 and served in the army from 1943 to 1947. After the service, he played with the Cross B Boys from

1945 til 1945, and played with his own band from 1949 until 1955, backing such stars as Elvis Presley and Jerry Lee Lewis when they toured in West Texas.

In 1952, Troy was playing three radio shows every Saturday on KMID in Midland. In 1956 & 57, Jordan played with the Miller Brothers, the #2 rated dance band behind Hank Thompson's. During the oil boom, Troy was the front guy for a five piece band which played six matinees and seven nights a week.

In 1979 Jordan moved to Robert Lee. He now plays with Jr. Pelzel and the Country Showmen, plus once a month for Bill McAdoo's band

and twice a month for the Coke County Cavaliers.

After three quarters of a century of entertaining in the West Texas area, Troy Jordan is finally receiving the recognition he deserves for a lifetime of involvement in country music.

Dorothy used homecoming lists, old newspapers, the internet, libraries, and searching gravestones in cemeteries, etc. for names of veterans, and been available to do any job, big or small, to promote the committee's goals. With Martin Lee in charge, the foundation for the monument is almost finished. Royce Lee is coordinating the TV coverage of the dedication as well as assisting in all committee efforts. He is recording the progress of the building of the monument on film. The inscribing of names on the monument is right on schedule, according to Gary Shaffer. Dorthey Pruitt is seeing to all the details of the dedication and coordinating the committees who are responsible for the program, decorations, memorabilia displays, parking and publicity. Dorthey, Gary Shaffer, and Loretha Knight appeared on a KLST-TV program with Pat Attebury to spark interest in the monument and to invite the viewers to come to the dedication. Bronte's Country Christmas To Be Held






Longhorns shut out Yellowjackets for area championship

Bronte had seventeen first downs, 192 yards rushing, 114 yards passing, 5-33 punts, 1-0 fumbles, and 8-70 penalties. Menard had nine first downs, 189 yards rushing, 32 yards passing, 2-30 punts, 3-3 fumbles, and 4-38 penalties.





Stopping winter weeds and grasses

Most annual winter grasses and weeds that plague lawns in late winter and early spring are ready to germinate now. The best way to stop them in the lawn is to apply a preemergence herbicide promptly, before their seeds germinate.

One of the worst pest plants that needs to be targeted now is henbit -- a common lawn invader that brightens up the lawn with blue, but seldom-appreciated blossoms in late winter and early spring. Winter grasses, including winter rye, also germinate now. Most of our most beautiful spring wildflowers also sprout in the fall and need to be targeted now if they are considered to be "weeds" in a well manicured lawn.

Premergence herbicides are chemicals that kill weed seedlings as they germinate. They are ineffective against weeds and grasses once they grow beyond the seedling stage. Apply a preemergent herbicide as a uniform, broadcast treatment to problem areas of the lawn. At least 1/2 inch of water--irrigation or rainis needed after application to move the herbicide into the soil where it is activated.

Labeled preemergence herbicides for lawns include XL, Betasan, Balan and Princep. All of these materials

will do a reasonably good job of stopping winter weeds and grasses if applied accurately and in time.

All of there herbicides are available in granular formulations while Betasan, Princep and other preemergence herbicides labeled for lawn use also are formulated for spray application. Most home gardeners can do a more accurate job by using a granuformulation lar and broadcasting it as they would fertilizer. Spray application of a preemergence herbicide should be attempted only if you have a sprayer that is capable of applying a uniform, blanket spray. The sprayer also must be accurately calibrated.

Read and follow herbicide label directions carefully. Under application can result in no weed control while over application may risk damage to the lawn.


Remember that preemergence herbicides cannot distinguish "good seed" from "bad seed." Do not use them in a lawn or garden where herbicide breakdown varies. Balan deteriorates rapidly and seed can be planted within two months after application, while XL deteriorates slowly and can prevent seed germination as long as a year after application.

Teach children pet safety

As your toddler begins to explore new territory, make sure the "Do not disturb" sign is posted close to home - next to the family pet.

"Teach young children how to interact with pets," said Dr. Jan Drutz at Texas Children's Hospital in Houston. "Show them how to touch and hold your pet and when to leave it alone."

Children must learn that

pets are living creatures, capable of feeling and inflicting pain. Families with small children should avoid exotic species, breeds that tend to be aggressive or pets that are kept in cages or open cases.

"Your first priority should be to maintain a safe environment for your child," said Drutz. "That may mean taking special precautions with your pet or postponing the purchase of a pet until your child is older."



D. T. Wrinkle personal diary

June 14, 1944

The start of the bombardment on Saipan.

From "D" Day until the island was secured we bombarded. We bombarded Tenion while taking Saipan.

June 18, 1944

Task force 58 went out to meet the Jap fleet, but couldn't overtake them in their flight back to their home land.

Three hundred of their carrier planes were going to attack, but our planes destroyed all but a few planes and we got the rest.

July 4, 1944 We loaded ammo.

July 20, 1944

We bombarded Guam, in the Guam invasion.

July 21, 1944 We fired in the invasion of Tenion, the invasion started

that day. August 8, 1944

We proceeded to Aneweatk for supplies and a 18 day rest. August 29, 1944

We got under way with a fast task force headed for West Pacific.

September 3, 1944

We joined another task force in which there were fifteen carriers and seven battle ships.

September 9, 1944

Two cruisers and four destroyers left the task force on a mission to sink some small ships in the harbor of Undieraia. We sank thirteen and left others burning.

This small group of ships was the first to reach the Philippines since the war began.

We fired the first salvo that hit the island.

We returned to our task force after completing the mission.

September 10, 1944

Still sailing around the Philippines. Our Air Force is bombing up to the Central Philippines.

September 12, 1944 We were attacked by two

small Japanese bombers. One dropped his bomb, which was meant for a carrier, but missed and was shot

We dropped anchor in the part of a recently taken island. There was still a few Jap snipers on the island.

This island is in the polve aroup

October 1, 1944

We are still in the harbor in the Philippine Islands.

We have taken on ammo here so far.

October 2, 1944

This task force left the harbor in the Polve Islands, the following day about 5 pm.

We dropped anchor in a harbor in the Carolinas Hiatus. October 3, 1944

At 4 am a storm hit, while we were anchored in the Carolinas. The ship started drifting and we had to get under way. The sea is pretty rough now.

There are swells about 15 feet high at this time, and it is getting rougher.

October 4, 1944 The storm is over, but the sea is still very rough. We are headed for some ports at this time. We returned to the Carolinas Island and anchored.

October 6, 1944 We stayed on shore all

night. October 7, 1944

We got underway at 5:30 am. I don't know our destination, just two destroyers and an air craft carrier, one in the group with us.

October 8, 1944 We joined our old task force, took on fuel at sea and continued on to make a strike

at the coast of the Japs homeland. October 9, 1944

We are still proceeding in a

straight course to Japan.

Tonight at 6 pm we are within six hundred miles of Japan. The carriers will launch their planes for a strike tomorrow.

October 10, 1944

Our carriers launched their planes at five am to make their raids on the Japs.

At eight they had sunk one heavy cruiser and attacked more ships at this time.

At 10:00 am the light cruiser Mobil and Santa Fe left on mission to sink two cargo

fuel and headed for Formosa. We will make our next strike.

Our carriers launched their planes at 6:15 am to make the attack.

We are two hundred and thirty miles off China Coast, at this time abut one hundred and twenty miles from Japan. Formosa is between the two.

Our planes have found many good targets at Formosa.

The population of this island is about six thousand.

Mostly Chinese; at one time this task force has been within ninety miles of Japan.

October 12, 1944 At 7 pm we were attacked by Jap planes. The attack

lasted all night. There were several planes

shot out of the sky.

All of our ships came through, without any major damage.

Two destroyers were hit by our air craft.

October 13, 1944

Our planes took off to make another attack on the island of Formosa.

Friday night we were attacked by Jap planes. The heavy cruiser Coniberry was hit by torpedo.

She is being towed now, her engine room was hit. October 14, 1944

This same night we had a torpedo launched at us, at two thousand yards, but it missed. We drove the planes away

down. There were about twenty four planes attacking the other task force, but our planes shot them down. October 18, 1944

We have joined our old task force

We have been in a small group of ships escorting the Houston and Coniberry until they were out of reach of the Japs.

We also took on survivors from the Houston and took on fuel.

October 20, 1944

We are still at sea, sailing around the Philippines, just standing by in case the Japs fleet come out.

October 20, 1944

About 3 pm the small carrier Princeton got a bomb hit in her gas storage tanks and immediately caught on fire. She was burning furiously at three o'clock that evening.

The commanding officer at the time, of carriers, ask for some ships to help fight the fire.

Our ship asked for permission to go put out the fire. We got permission and we went along side the carrier, started fighting the fire. While along side, we had a sub contact and an air raid, so we had to pull away. The raid lasted about one evening. After that we returned to the carrier to fight fire.

We had just pulled along side ship and her ammunition magazine blew up. The explosion killed 305 men on the ship and wounded 250, which I was one of them. The ship was full of holes, but still stayed afloat.

All of our power was knocked out. The Jap fleet started out and we-----

At this time D. T. Wrinkle was hit and spent time on hospital ship. At a later date he was moved to a hospital in the Philippines. He was born on February 26, 1925 and died on March 2, 1982.

Wrinkle would have been the next volunteer to go over on the ship, when it blew up. At this particular time 500 men were buried at sea.



T/Sgt. James David Vaughn - Army Air Corps

James David Vaughn

James David Vaughn was born January 13, 1924 to Homer and Edith Vaughn at Bronte Texas. He graduated from Bronte High School and worked on the family farm.

James enlisted in the Army Air Force in 1942 during World War II. During his training period he met and married Evelyn Bobo in 1943.

James served in the South Pacific and China Theater of Operations. This Theater consisted of the Burma Straits and Himalayas Mountains- referred to as "the Hump".

The "Hump" was a sky road 525 miles long that was flown by the Air Transport 'Command, carrying cargo to China from India.

James, the crew and their B24 were shot down twice, but were able to return to their base-camp each time.

Information from James was limited due to censuring of his mail.

State War Dept. notified his wife, Evelyn, of his missing in action on December 18, 1944. His remains were never recovered.

October 11, 1944 This task force left the area from which we were launching our planes.

Went back to the refueling area for more fuel.

The same day we took on

October 16, 1944

We were attacked again. The Houston was hit again by Japs, torpedo planes.

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

SSI rolls expected to remain steady

The number of Supplemental Security Income (SSI) recipients declined from its 1996 level of 2.3 percent to 2.2 percent in 1997, according to the latest data just released. It is projected to remain fairly level at roughly 2.2 percent of the United States population through 2022, according to a report released by the Social Security Administration.

The 1998 Supplemental Security Income (SSI) Report noted that in January 1998, 6.2 million people received an average monthly SSI payment of \$335. The report also indicated that growth in SSI program outlays during the next 25 years is projected to remain relatively modest.

The SSI program is a nationwide federal assistance program administered by SSA that guarantees a minimum level of income for needy aged, blind or disabled individuals.

Congress requires the Commissioner of Social Security to annually report to the President and the Congress on the status of the SSI program. The report provides projections of program participation and costs through the next 25 years.



Strategies offered for transitioning to at-home parenting

Many of today's women enjoy educational and career opportunities unknown to previous generations. When marriage and family enter the picture, today's mothers are fortunate to have a wide array of choices, including the increasingly popular option to forego or cut back on paid employment to care and nurture their children.

Many of today's families are finding that having a mother at home is more affordable than they may have been led to believe. Parents wanting increased family time are closely examining the financial and intangible costs of having both parents employed on a full-time basis outside the home. Those families are aware of the growing body of evidence about the needs of all children for generous amounts of their parents' time.

At-home mothers embrace a life enriched with numerous rewards and challenges. However, the transition can be dizzying. Over the years, Mothers At Home, the nation's oldest and one of the largest nonprofit support organizations for at-home mothers, has collected the following strategies from mothers across the country for easing the transition.

time for the Allow transition to take place.

Once you give birth physically, you must also struggle with an emotional birth as you come to terms with the new realities in your life. Overnight, motherhood can thrust you into an entirely different world, so beware of making hasty judgments about your new life as a mother. As your priorities and lifestyle are rearranged, recognize the opportunity for change and new beginnings. Find time for yourself and your marriage. Leisure is not a luxury. Top performance requires balancing work and play, activity and rest. Pursue an outside activity, such as a class or hobby. Plan dates with your spouse on a regular basis. Something as simple as taking a walk or going on a picnic can bring new perspectives. Seek the support of family and friends To help overcome isolation and shore up self-esteem, join or start a mothers support group or play group. Read supportive books and publications. Have a good friend with whom you can Ad share a concern, a laugh or

advice. It is often helpful to have a mothering mentor as well as to be a mothering mentor - sometimes it really takes another mother to understand.

Set realistic goals.

Set daily, weekly or monthly goals for yourself. Unrealistic or out-dated expectations can be a source of stress. Set personal and family priorities carefully. Flexibility is key. Learn to break chores or projects into pieces that can be completed in the little bits of time available to you. Make good use of concentrated blocks of time, such as when baby is napping, to do something that you are unable to do when your child is present.

Evaluate your definition of success.

Motherhood challenges. Assess your success by judging how well you have confirmed your child's sense of unique and valuable identity, or how well you have communicated that he or she is an integral and essential part of your family.

Refute the negative stereotypes and the superwoman myth.

The perception of mothers effortlessly balancing challenging and fulfilling careers with a complete and rewarding family life often belies the reality of day-to-day life. Refute the superwoman image. Realize that there are trade-offs to all work/family decisions, and make decisions based on personal and family priorities.

Advocate for your role as a mother and for your child.

Be proud of your work as an at-home mother. What job could be more important than taking care of the next generation?

Write the media or your legislator when the work of athome mothers is ignored, negatively portrayed or inaccurately presented. Advocate for family-friendly work practices, such as flexible work hours, part-time work, job sharing, homebased work, and job-protected parental leave.

Celebrate your days. Make time for and find inspiration. Celebrate the challenges and triumphs of being a mother at home. Look for ways to enjoy the little things and the fleeting moments that make up your davs.

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

Funds to assist Medicare recipients largely unused

"A lot of people with disabilities or who are 65 or older are missing out on substantial savings," says Marcia C. Rachofsky, a Texas Legal Services Center staff attorney. Part of Rachofsky's job to get the word out about several little used programs for Medicare recipients. Indeed, some people haven't even applied for Medicare fearing that they won't be able to pay the premiums, she says.

Ýet "QMB, SLMB and QI-1 will pay the monthly Medicare premium for people who are eligible," Rachofsky says. "And QMB goes even further. It pays the deductibles and co-payments too." An additional program which pays a smaller portion is QI-2.

So why aren't people using these programs? "In large measure," Rachofsky says, "they don't know about them. Or they don't know who to call or even how to ask about them." This, in part, is due to complicated the nomenclature: QMB meaning Qualified Medicare Beneficiary, SLMB meaning Specified Low Income Medicare Beneficiary, and QI meaning Qualified Individual. "We're hoping our outreach will fix this.

Rachofsky's plan is to blanket the state with pamphlets, posters, placemats and stadium cups publicizing the savings that

The number for the regional office serving your county is 915-690-2322. Rachofsky also points out that "the application process has been

simplified. The form is short and callers can have it sent to them at home. No affidavits or proof of income or resources is required with the completed application, and it can be mailed back in."


What is more, the value of the applicant's homestead is never counted when resources are totaled. The value of one car is usually not included either. "It's pretty easy for a person to find out if he or she is eligible," Rachofsky concludes, "and it would certainly be worthwhile to do that. After all, the savings can add up to over \$500 a year."


