Coke County Food Closet set to open Feb. 4

The Coke County Food Closet will open this coming Thursday, Feb. 4, from 2:00 pm until 4:00 pm in the fellowship hall of the First United Methodist Church of Robert Lee. Rev. Jim Reeves, pastor of the church, stressed that this effort is sponsored and supported by the recently organized Coke County ministerial alliance and is a non-denominational, ecumenical effort of the churches of the county and not simply a ministry of the Methodist Church. The food closet will have only non-perishable food items and will not have meats, milk, vegetables, or other such

The food closet will be available only to families residing in Coke County, and participants

City of Robert Lee promotes water conservation

The City of Robert Lee has developed a water conservation plan to address concerns regarding the drought conditions which currently exist in the West Texas area and are expected to continue throughout the summer of 2000.

Every citizen is strongly encouraged to voluntarily support and participate in the plan. Educational materials relative to water conservation from state and local sources will be made available to all water users; and, articles relevant to the drought will be published in the local newspaper as conditions warrant.

The goal of the conservation program is to continue to produce an adequate and acceptable supply of water for the City of Robert Lee and its immediate vicinity at an acceptable cost to the consumer.

The plan places some constraints on outside watering during the peak water use and recovery periods of the day. Outside watering will be restricted between the hours of 10:00 am to 6:00 pm which is peak usage time; and, 10:00 pm to 6:00 am which is the system recovery time.

The City will review and evaluate water use during the drought period for consideration of other adjustments.

The Water Conservation Plan is available at City Hall.

will be asked to sign in and provide an address within the county. Initially, families will be allowed one visit per month, and only one sack of food items. According to Rev. Area Agency on Aging honors local volunteers

The Area Agency on Aging (AAA) will acknowledge the selfness service of Bronte and Robert Lee citizens at a Recognition Banquet on January 26 at the Cactus Hotel in San Angelo. Through various programs administered by the agency, these volunteers have provided nearly 100,000 hours of service to our community. The hours include providing information to seniors, mentoring at risk youth, providing homemaker services to the nomebound and ensuring that 178,500 meals were provided last year through senior centers. If these hours were paid at the minimum wage rate of \$5.15 an hour, it would represent in excess of \$500,000 of services provided to our area. Not to confuse the issue, their service is priceless; their impact is great.

The AAA manages numerous volunteer programs utilizing seniors. As the longevity revolution has yielded another 30 years of productive living, seniors are utilizing this time in productive, proactive means. The AAA has recognized this trend and taps this accumulated knowledge through various programs such as Nursing Home Ombudsmen, Friend and Family Visitor, Foster Grand Parent and the Senior Companion Program. ventures of the agency include the Regional Advisory council and Title III vendors. The volunteers spend considerable personal time gaining skills necessary to be an effective advocate for people in the Concho Valley. IRS expands service at the start of tax filing season

Now that tax time is here, the Internal Revenue Service has extended its office hours throughout Texas to make getting tax help more convenient.

The IRS San Angelo office at 33 East Twohig, Room 101, will be open on Tuesdays and Thursdays from 7 am - 5:30 pm through April 13.


IRS employees will answer questions and provide tax forms and publications. They will also prepare Forms 1040, 1040A, and 1040EZ, with Schedules A, B (interest only), R, and the Earned Income Tax Credit. For people who need to prepare tax forms or schedules other than those, the agency will ask people to set up an appointment to ensure that there is adequate time and staffing to fill out the return.

Texans who come to a Taxpayer Assistance Center for tax return preparation are asked to bring original Forms W-2 or 1099 issued by their employers and valid social security cards for each person who will be listed on the return

In addition to the expanded office hours, the IRS also is available by telephone, 24 hours a day, seven days a week by calling 1-800-829-1040.

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
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

Garden Planning

Whether you are a seasoned gardener or this is your first year to grow vegetables. take time now - before you order your seed and supplies to plan your garden in your mind and on paper.

By sketching out your garden and deciding what crops you want to plant, you will avoid the tendency to order more seed than you need. Most gardeners are happier and more successful with a small garden than a large one. You can grow a lot of vegetables in a 10 foot x 20 foot or 20 foot x 40 foot garden. But as the size of the garden gets much larger so does the amount of time required to keep it cultivated and well cared for.

Be sure there is adequate sunlight. Most garden crops require a minimum of 6 hours of full sun per day. Providing some late afternoon shade can be beneficial, particularly as the seasons warm into June and July.

Another important consideration is to allow adequate room for each crop. With good growing conditions, tomatoes will outgrow their cages, vining crops like cucumbers and melons will take over walkways between rows. One way to help eliminate this problem without sacrificing production is to plant early maturing crops like onions, lettuce, beets, radishes be-tween rows of later maturing, warm season crops like tomatoes and vining crops we mentioned earlier. Once the early crops have been harvested you can allow this extra space to become part of your walkways.

Also, be sure to practice good crop rotation. That means not planting the same crop or related crops in the same place year after year. This will help reduce disease and insect problems during the growing season. putting things down on paper before you get started even those who garden in the smallest of spaces can implement a good rotation plan. Varieties

For your primary choices be sure to pick from the All-Texas Selections. These are workhorse varieties that have been tried and proven to grow well in all parts of Texas. It is okay, and downright fun, to experiment with a few new and interesting varieties that you may find in a seed catalog. Just do not let them become your mainstays until proven or you may be disappointed.

Timing

Choosing when to plant your garden crops is the next most crucial step: plant too early and you risk freeze damage, plant too late and your plants will have the opposite problem-hotter, dryer weather and increased insect pressure. There are a few exceptions to this rule. Southern peas and okra actually prefer

hotter weather and are great choices to replace cool season crops in late spring. A list of planting date suggestions are available in the County Extension office.

Other Considerations

This is also, as we have said many times before, a good time to have a soil test done so you will know exactly what elements you need to add to your garden. The County Extension office has soil test bags and instructions for you to use to send your samples into the soil lab. The small cost of this test is well worth it in terms of increased production and enjoyment from your

If you have not already done so, now is the perfect time to add organic matter to your garden. Most gardens cannot produce enough compost to meet their needs. However, there are good sources of bulk compost available in most areas of the state. Be sure to select compost that has a clean, earthy smell. Foul smelling material is not really "compost" because it has not fully decomposed. Avoid purchasing this "almost compost" or set it aside for use later in the season.

A handout on Planning Your Garden is available in the

Coke County Extension office. This guide shows design plans, planting dates and a list of All-Texas Varieties for your garden.

Twelve rules for raising delinquent children

6. Let him read any printed matter he can get his hands on. Be careful that the silverware and drinking glasses are sterilized, but let his mind feast on garbage.

7. Quarrel frequently in the presence of your child. In this way, he will not be too shocked when the home is broken up later.

8. Give a child all the spending money he wants. Never let him earn his own. Why should he have things as tough as you had them?

9. Satisfy his every craving for food, drink and comfort. See that every sensual desire is gratified. Denial may lead to harmful frustration.

10. Take his part against neighbors, teachers and policemen. They are all prejudiced against your child.

11. When he gets into real trouble, apologize for yourself by saying, "I never could do anything with him."

12. Prepare for a life of grief. You will be apt to have
