## Longtime community leader dies

Bob Wrinkle, owner and operator of Wrinkle Hardware in Robert Lee, succumbed to cancer and died at his home on Saturday, February 27, 2000. The death of the 58-year-old Wrinkle has hit both the communities of Robert Lee and Bronte pretty hard, as Bob grew up in Bronte and later moved to Robert Lee, and was well known throughout the Concho Valley.

He was a leader in the community, having served as an officer in the West Coke County Community Development for the past several years. He was the force behind the driving annual Hunter's Barbecue, which feeds approximately 1,000 hungry hunters on opening day of deer season each year. And, unlike other hunter barbecues, the one in Robert Lee is unique in that it is free. Bob handled all the responsibility of soliciting donations from area ranchers and putting on the annual barbecue.

One could go on and on about Bob's contributions to the community, but one of the local leaders possibly expressed it best when he stated that "Bob Wrinkle was one of the most accommodating guys he had ever known."

# Volunteer agencies receive donated computer equipment

Government agencies are uniting together to donate used computers to over 100 different communities and organizations throughout the state of Texas in order for them to achieve a higher standard of living for their residents.

Fort Chadbourne, Robert Lee VFD, and Bronte VFD received donated computers on Friday, February 25. This initiative is part of a national Partnership for Reinventing Government, Hassle-Free Community Initiative.

The statewide program will provide computer hardware to various non-profit and community based organizations especially in rural Texas. Allen Amos, Chairman of the Concho Valley RC&D Council, presented computers to the groups at the Bronte City Hall.

The Hassle-Free Community Initiative is a way for government agencies to improve the accessibility of various services for customers. This type of partnering reflects the new focus in cooperation between various government agencies, Resource Conservation and Development (RC&D) Councils and local non-profit groups in their areas.

Often rural areas are not able to take full advantage of government benefits because they lack the basic infrastructure to receive these services. Rural areas throughout the state now will be able to acquire information about educational programs, governmental services, and ultimately achieve a higher standard of living.

This is an initial donation to the various non-profit and community based organizations. It is anticipated that additional computer or other equipment will be available in the future. Interested groups and organizations should contact their local office of USDA




Robert Lee natives Meagan Hill and Jaclyn Waldrop received academic honors for the 1999 fall semester at Howard Payne University.


Hill, a biology major, was named to the president's list. She is the daughter of Billy and Cynthia Hill.





Stenholm announces art competition



Now is the time to fix deer lease

Another deer hunting season has come and gone. For those whose hunting lease fell short of expectations, taking action now may prevent repeat problems next fall.

"While the problems you experienced are still fresh on your mind and you're thinking about them, you may want to investigate ways to avoid similar trouble next season," says Judon Fambrough of the Real Estate Center at Texas A&M University. "Come next fall, you may have forgotten the details or even the entire problem. Ignoring the problem now will not make it go away next season."

Fambrough, an attorney, advises hunters and landowners to review his recently revised booklet, *The Texas Deer Lease*, for suggestions on avoiding misunderstandings common in lease agreements.

The guide examines all aspects of a deer lease including the duration of the lease term, hunting weapons, number of hunters and guests, lease price, and use of facilities

"This book not only is useful for deer hunters but can be helpful for landowners also," says Fambrough. "The landowner's liability to hunters is discussed, as well as ways to limit it. The guide even contains a copy of a liability release form."

Compliance with game laws, imparting "no trespass" notices, and resolving disputes are other topics included.

#### Rural Local **Broadcast Signal Act** passes committee by US Representative

Charles Stenholm On Wednesday, February 16, the House Agriculture Committee reported out the "Rural Local Broadcast Signal Act." This legislation would establish a loan guarantee program within Department of Agriculture, Rural Utility Service, to provide local broadcast television signals in unserved and underserved rural areas.

This bill passed the committee with broad support and actually compliments a law passed last year allowing satellite companies, for the first time ever, to retransmit a local network signal back into the same local market area.

As a result of that law, cable wireless providers are able to compete with local cable providers by offering the same service, giving customers greater access to network television stations. With increased competition, consumers benefit through lower prices, better service, and more choice in cable and

wireless television service.

EchoStar and Direct TV are the only satellite television providers in the U.S. and, unfortunately, they claim they do not have the capacity to provide local-into-local network signals for the nation's 210 television markets.

In fact, by the end of this year, EchoStar and Direct TV will offer service in only 30 of the largest television markets. These companies, incidentally, have no plans to expand beyond the top 30 markets anytime soon.

The legislation reported out of the Agriculture Committee earlier this week was introduced to help local-into-local network broadcast service to the other 180 television markets. The loan guarantee program will fund projects to provide local broadcast television signals into small and rural markets.

People living in rural areas deserve to have access to the benefits of local programming - local news, weather, sports, and most importantly emergency information service.

Since local television is one of our most vital safey information resources in times of

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
