Total of 522 votes cast in Tuesday's primary election

A total of 387 Democratic voters and 135 Republican voters cast their ballots in Tuesday's primary election where only one local office was decided. Coke County Constable Precinct 1 Kenneth Rasco, 200 votes, defeated challenger Drake Arthur, 46 votes, to retain his seat. Constable, Precinct 2, Russell Johnson was unopposed in his bid for reelection and received 106 votes.

Nancy Firebaugh Arthur received 284 votes in her bid for county attorney. Sheriff Rick Styles received 341 votes to retain his office while Tax Assessor-Collector D. Kristeen Roe received 325 in her bid for re-election.

Paul Burns will remain as the Democratic nominee to retain his seat Commissioner, Precinct 1, with 111 votes. Gaylon Pitcock will join Burns as the Democratic nominee for Commissioners Court as Commissioner, Precinct 3, after receiving 74 votes.

Patti Ivey, 281 votes, will remain the Democratic County Chairman and Kathy Pentecost, 85 votes, will remain the Republican County Chairman.

against Proposition 1 which stated, "Shall student initiated prayer be allowed at school sporting events?" In Coke County, 128 votes were cast for the Proposition with only 2 against this nonbinding resolution. Coke County voters joined with other Texans to overwhelmingly send the message that Texas voters approve of student-led prayer.

Coke County Democrats gave the nod in the Presidential Nominee race to Al Gore with 154 votes over Bill Bradley with 105 and Lyndon H. LaRouche with 14. County Republicans were loyal to our Governor in his quest for the Republican presidential nomination by awarding George W. Bush with 119 votes. Alan Keyes received 11 votes and John McCain received 5 votes.

LIGHTHOUSE **MOVEMENT** begins in Robert Lee





West Texas and Panhandle ripe for wildfires

Extremely dry vegetation coupled with high, gusty winds and low humidities will combine to create a situation that is ripe for disaster. High winds and low humidities could contribute to major wildfires in our region over the next few days if people get careless with fire outdoors, a Texas Forest Service fire behavior analyst warns.

"Intense burning and rapid rates of wildfire spread will be likely during the dangerous weather conditions that are expected to prevail throughout the region over the next several days," says Tom Spencer, fire risk assessment coordinator with the Texas Forest Service in Huntsville. "It will take everyone's cooperation to prevent even larger and more dangerous fires than occurred over the past week."

Fire information available from the Texas Interagency Coordination Center at its website: http://ticc.fws.gov reveals that late last week, a major blaze threatened the town of Channing in Hartley County. Local firefighters bolstered by single-engine air tankers temporarily staged in Amarillo and a larger air tanker ordered up from Arkansas by the Texas Forest Service finally contained the blaze at 20,000 acres. burned 16,000 acres in Carson County last Tuesday, and a fire in Ochiltree County scorched 3,600 acres before firefighters corralled its spread. Also last week, firefighters saved several homes from a 750-acre fire in Sherman County and saved an additional half dozen homes and a golf course clubhouse from a small fire in the suburbs of Amarillo. State and local firefighters continued their efforts Monday to contain a 1,000-acre blaze that started the previous day in Val Verde County. Firefighters estimated the fire was only 50 percent contained as of early Monday Firefighters in morning. Shackelford County also battled a wildfire near Moran on Sunday. Several local volunteer fire departments responded to a 150-acre blaze between Tennyson and Orient last week.

Wildfires like the recent Hartley County fire could happen almost anywhere in West Texas, said Spencer. The fire risk assessment coordinator noted that the wildfire risk is greatest in the area west of a line from Del Rio to San Angelo to Abilene to Childress. Residents and visitors in these areas need to be particularly mindful of the extreme danger of wildfires and take all possible actions to avoid accidental fires.

Report Child Abuse

The law requires any person who believes that a child is being abused, neglected, or exploited to report the circumstances to the Texas Department of Protective and Regulatory Services Abuse Hotline. A person making a report is immune from civil or criminal liability, and the name of the person making the report is kept confidential. Any person suspecting abuse and not reporting it can be held liable for a Class B misdemeanor.

Time frames for investigating reports are based on severity of allegations.

Child Protective Services staff consider the following factors in determining whether the situation involves substantial risk of harm to a child:

- O Extent and severity of the injury
- O Location of the injury on the child's body
- The child's age
- O The child's physical condition, psychological state, and level of maturity and development
- The child's capacity for self protection
- Frequency and duration of the same behavior or similar incidents
- O Previous history of abuse or neglect
- O How the injury occurred or was inflicted.
