Lake Spence nets big gains from recent thunderstorms

Early last Thursday morning
Coke County was blessed
with more than just a good
general rain. Although total
amounts ranged from between a half and one inch, the
greatest benefit may be the
large amounts of rain that
didn't fall on the county.

The same weather system dumped up to five inches of, rainfall on the Lake Spence watershed. The City of Snyder received as much as 5.25 inches, Colorado City 4.3 inches, Lake Thomas 4.5 inches, and in Big Spring amounts ranged up to 5 inches.


Some of us can still remember Robert Lee Mayor Robert Vaughan (now deceased) stating that "a good 2-inch rain falling in the right place would fill up our lake". Mayor Vaughan didn't live to see it, but at least some of his prediction finally came true. What he nor anyone else could foresee at the time was the lake falling to 10% of capacity due to the extended drought, a situation that has created a critical water shortage for the cities of Robert Lee, San An-


gelo, Snyder, Midland, and Odessa.

With the lake falling to this level, there's no telling what it would have taken to fill it up. However, with the runoff from these downpours, we have at least bought some time in the battle to maintain our water supply.

Colorado River Municipal Water District (CRMWD) General Manager John Grant has estimated that Lake Spence could rise as much as ten to twelve feet from this runoff. The total runoff could add up to as much as 40,000 acre feet of water, which would increase Spence's numbers from 10% to over 20% of capacity.

An added benefit to the influx of water is the reduction in the salinity level. Before the runoff, Spence's chloride level stood at around 1300 ppm (parts per million). The chloride level of the water entering the reservoir now is somewhere between 100 and 200 ppm. Mix the two together and you end up with a chloride level we have all learned to live with in west Texas.





Local election ballots finalized

Coke County voters will go to the polls May 6 to fill vacancies on a number of local governing boards. Wednesday, March 22, at 5 pm was the last opportunity to file for a place on the ballot.

Seven candidates will vie for three - 3 year terms on the Bronte Independent School District Board of Trustees. Incumbents Wayne Coalson, Jeff Schoenfield and Bobby Frazee will be challenged by Paul Williams, Connie Tounget, Doug Hoyt, and Joe Sefcik. Terry Charles is unopposed in his bid for reelection for the one - 1 year



seat.

Four people have filed for the three - 3 year openings on the Robert Lee Independent School District Board of Trustees. They include Wes Washam, Brian Hamrick, Ray Aldridge and Fredda McCabe.

Both the cities of Robert Lee and Bronte will be electing a new mayor and members of their councils. Robert Lee has two council positions open. Bonita Copeland and Beth Prather have filed for these seats and Garland Davis has filed to retain the office of mayor. Council members Donnie Devoll and Frank Casey did not file for re-

Residents of the City of Bronte are reminded that all garbage containers are to have tight fitting lids to prevent the garbage from being scattered by animals. Garbage is defined in the City's Ordinance #274 as all glass, tin cans, paper boxes, waste materials and refuse from kitchens discarded by residential and/or commercial locations in and about the

It is a health hazard and an eyesore to allow garbage to be scattered within the City. Residents and business owners are encouraged to make every effort to help keep garbage and trash contained especially during this time of high winds.

The City has also received several complaints regarding dogs running loose and being a nuisance. Residents are reminded to keep their dogs confined on their property at all times.

bag limit is four per license year for all seasons combined. You must add the \$5 turkey stamp if you failed to get it on your current hunting license.

If you take that gobbler, immediately cut out the month and date of the kill and where it was taken. Attach securely to any part of the bird and it must remain til its final destination for processing. The beard must remain on the breast. Make sure of your target since hens may also sport beards. Hunting hours are the same as deer and non migratory game birds, one-half hour before sunrise to onehalf hour after sunset. The law prevents hunting roosting

turkeys ever. The Rio Grande turkeys present in our area are really handsome birds and their eyesight and cautious, wily ways make them a real challenge. Not many hunting thrills match the sight of a big, strutting Tom. Decoys often will draw your gobbler in range of your rifle or shotgun and may distract him from looking directly at you. Wear camo or paint your face, along with a practiced call, will increase your chances. The box call, used for many years, is still a big favorite but some of the new mouth calls have the added advantage of having your hands free to fire

quicker. The flocks that you saw during the fall may have moved to another roost since water and feed is scarcer with the extended drought. If you don't spot birds or hear any answering calls, try another area. Don't spend the whole first weekend waiting. Biologists say ample turkeys are still out there.

Don't be too quick to shoot.

sounds in thick brush or cedars. A few years ago, a hunter on a lease in west Coke County was injured when another hunter shot at him. Wearing black clothing and a pair of high black boots, with red striped hunting socks turned down over the tops, he was on a small knoll, squatting, watching a flat below when a careless, excited hunter took him for a gobbler. Thankfully, the shooter wasn't as accurate as some.

The Euterpean Club meets


The Euterpean Club met March 16 in the Blackwell Methodist Church at 3:30 in the afternoon.

Gypsy McMullin, president called the meeting to order and welcomed the guests. Regular business was postponed until the next meeting.



In all, Celebrations were held at 21 college and university campuses around the state. National Merit Scholars, prospective valedictorians, Academic Decathlon participants, those who have made perfect scores on the Texas Assessment of Academic Skills exam, scholarship recipients, plus many other ninth through twelfth grade students who have achieved academic recognition were those who were honored.



Atwater launches debut CD

Veterans Memorial Building shimmered with the glitz of show biz, stood quiet for a heart-tugging thank-you, but mostly boomed to hard-driving music last weekend as Brentwood resident Kevin Atwater used it as ground zero for his launch into the world of country music.

Atwater and his Ironhorse Band treated a roomful of friends, family and supporters to a sumptuous meal first, then delivered a crisp performance of his debut CD "17th and Austin."

"I didn't know how much support I had in the community," a grateful Atwater said this week. "It's very uplifting when you know the community is behind you like this."

The evening saw a progression of people important to Atwater appear on stage with him. There was his wife Kelly, who sang back-up vocals on a few songs; his brother Gary, who flew out from Oklahoma to play drums for him; Ken Hocter, a fellow member of Atwater's rock 'n' roll alter ego with the band "Xpress;" and local businessman Roger Moore, who financed Atwater's debut album.

Students participate in Ag Field Day

Students were able to see many of the products that are obtained from the farming and ranching industry, some readily apparent such as breakfast cereal, and some not so easily recognizable, such as shaving cream.



A Portrait of Its People and Their Raw and Wondrous Land by Mike Cochran and John Lumpkin with a foreword by John T. Montford. Mike Cochran is a native of Stamford and a columnist for the Fort Worth Star-Telegram. Bronte, Robert Lee, and Tennyson are mentioned in the book. More information on Coke County would have made the book more interesting.

"West" Texas according to the authors begins in Fort Worth, slides down to Del Rio through Brownwood and Brady, north to Wichita Falls, up through the Panhandle and out to El Paso and back south to Presidio. In pointing out what West Texas is, Cochran sates that it's a South Plains duster; a blizzard on I-40 by Amarillo; monument to a mule; a jackrabbit statue in Odessa and so on. It is also, he states, "the wonder of sheepdogs on a rock-strewn ranch near Robert Lee." He quotes a West Texas legislator who once said, "Don't waste a good man by sending him to Austin... Send me; I'm already ruined."

Bronte and Tennyson are lined with the literary trail which always catches the eye of reporters and writers, although it leaves too much of the beauty and history out.

The book is, as stated by one reviewer "The only coffee-table book anybody will actually read." It is readable, and the photography is very good. A regional book can cover only the highlights. It makes one realize also how much has been left out.

Breast Cancer semipostal stamp sales campaign runs April 22 - May 19

Like all good things, sales of the 40 cent breast cancer semipostal stamp will come to an end July 29, 2000 - the end of the maximum two-year sales period set up by law.

The Postal Service is planning a grand finale - one last big push to raise sorely needed funds for breast cancer research. The promotion hopes to sell out the entire print run of 280 million stamps. That would bring the total raised for research to \$20 million. We're at \$11.3 so farwith less than \$10 million to go.
