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## Two escape from

juvenile facility
Two young men, ages 16 and 17 , escaped from the Coke County Juvenile Justice Center at approximately 9:20 pm Sunday evening, April 16.
The juveniles were cleaning in a secured area and escaped through a door that hadn't shut properly. The pair climbed a section of fence without razor wire and were free of the facility. They crossed Highway 277 and entered Jerry Wilkins' pasture.
They continued traveling across country before hiding in a barn. They were captured by Wackenhut personnel at $12: 30 \mathrm{pm}$ Monday in the Billingsly barn on Humble Road.
The sixteen year old was returned to CCJJC pending a decision by juvenile authorities. The seventeen year old was taken to Tom Green County Jail where felony escape charges were filed.
Taking part in the search were officers from the Coke County Sheriff's Department, Department of Parks and Wildlife, Texas Department of Public Safety, and Tom Green County Sheriff's Department. These officers were assisted by Wackenhut personnel.

## Parents Alert: V- <br> Chip helps protect kids from violent TV shows <br> By The Federal Communications Commission

"V for Victory" was once a popular slogan. Now "V for Vchip" may herald another vic-tory-a victory to help parents protect their children from vio lent and sexually suggestive TV shows.

The $V$-chip is a device built into television sets that allows parents to block shows they do not want their children to to see. The V-chip works in conjunction with the voluntary ratings system designed by the television industry. The first V-chip equipped TV sets are in stores now

FCC Commissioner Gloria Tristani, chair of the Commission's V-chip Task Force, noted that children spend about 28 hours a week spend about 28 hours a week
watching TV, more time each watching TV, more time each
year than they spend in the year than
"Much of what they are watching is violent. By the time they complete elementary school, children have witnessed about 8,000 murders and 100,000 acts of violence."

She noted that no parent can possibly know what's on TV all the time and, in many cases, children are in single parent households or households where both parents work.
"These parents want and deserve the ability to protect their children as much as parents who are able to closely monitor their children's viewing habits," she said.

The V-chip will give parents a modern tool to help raise their children in the modern world. Under the voluntary industry rating system, parents will be able to receive the information they need in order to determine whether an upcoming program contains sex, violence, offensive language or suggestive dialogue.

Commissioner Tristani warned that the V-chip will not relieve parents of the responsibility of determining what their children watch on TV, but will help them to fulfill that responsibility.

Television programmers "encode" programming so that the television rating information can be "read" by a V-chip equipped TV set. "The V-Chip is essentially a remote control device with a longer range. It allows parents to 'turn off' programs while

they are at work, at a PTA become reality. meeting, or at a movie."
Children are unable to un block programming because only the parent knows the "PIN" number needed to pro gram the TV set.
Some critics have said that the V-chip is too complicated for parents to use. However, many who have used the Vchip found it to be no more difficult than programming a VCR. In addition, "parents will do things for their children that they won't do for themselves," Tristani said. "I may not take the time to learn to program my VCR to record a movie, but l'll take the time to earn to program the V-chip to protect my children from obectionable material,"

Consumers can also purchase a stand-alone box with $V$-chip capabilities that can be attached to an older television set that does not have the $V$ chip built-in.
"As parents begin using the V-chip, I am hopeful that they will come to value it as an effective and easy-to-use tool or blocking programming that hey deem harmful to their children," Tristani said

Easy Gardening....
Mulching
Mulching your garden shows you really care about your plants. A mulch is any substance spread on the ground to protect plant roots from heat, cold or drought or to keep fruit clean.
Mulching is a long established horticultural practice. Farmers know that shallow cultivation of the soil's surface after a rain slows the rate of water loss from the soil. The shallow layer of dry surface soil acts as a mulch.
Mulches can be classified as inorganic or organic. Inorganic mulches include plastic, rocks, rock ships and other non-plant materials; whereas, organic mulches in clude straw, compost, sawdust and similar materials. Plastic is the only inorganic mulch used in vegetable gardens.
A thin layer of mulch on the soil surface (especially in sloping gardens) reduces the washing away of soil particles by rushing water. Also, mulches prevent raindrops from splashing on the soil surface. Saving soil moisture is an important use of mulch in Texas. A mulch layer on the soil surface allows the soil to soak up more water. Mulch also reduces the rate of water loss from the soil. A 3 -inch layer of mulch on the soil surface dries much faster than the soil below it. Thus it prevents water from moving into the air.
Mulches modify soil temperature in home gardens. Applied in late fall, winter mulch insulates plant roots, crowns and stems of winter crops from extremely low temperatures. Proper mulching in summer months keeps the soil cooler. Soil covered by black or clear plastic or dark organic mulch in early spring warms faster than bare soil. This allows earlier planting of warm-season crops
Use light-colored paper such as newspaper in summer to keep the soil cooler. Organic mulches such as compost and sawdust also keep soil below the mulch layer cooler in summer. Dark soil warms much faster than light-colored soil.
Organic mulches enrich the soil as they decay and provide
a better environment for plant growth. Soils high in organic matter are easier to till and better suited to vegetable gardening. Adding organic material makes soils more crumbly, especially clay soils that pack and crust.
Mulches help plants by gradually increasing soil fertility. An organic mulch such as straw or newspaper can be turned under the soil at the end of the season. This helps build the soil's organic matter content. Turn the mulch under as soon as the gardening season is over so it breaks down before the garden is replanted.

Most mulches also provide excellent weed control Mulches do not prevent weed seeds from sprouting. However, weed seedling emergence is blocked by a mulch layer thick enough to exclude light. A 3 -inch layer of mulch on the soil surface keeps most annual weed seedlings from coming through. Weeds that break through are removed more easily from mulched soil Hard-to-control weeds such as nutgrass and johnsongrass may come through the mulch layer but can be pulled more easily or covered by fluffing the mulch with a fork.
A well-mulched garden can yield 50 percent more than an unmulched garden the same size. Space rows closer as there is little or no need to cultivate the soil. Plant food is more available in cooler soil, and the extra soil moisture increases plant growth and yields. You will harvest more fruit because of less fruit rot. Fruit does not touch the soil. and soil is not splashed up on the fruit. This is true for tomato fruits that rot easily when resting on the soil surface. Potatoes can be mulched heavily as the vines grow. This causes tubers to grow. in and under the mulch layer. These potatoes are less susceptible to soil rot easier to harvest and less likely to be bruised during harvest.
Garden mulching reduces maintenance. A good mulch layer eliminates the need for weeding, and mulched vegetables are cleaner at harves time. Fruits of tomato, melon and squash plants never touch the soil.

Many materials are available for mulching a garden. Some examples are: compost, straw, gin trash and sawdust. Compost is generally the best mulching material for the home garden. It is usually free of weed seeds and is inexpensive. Prepare compost from materials present in your yard. It is not necessary to purchase expensive materials purchase ex
Straw is short lived and coarse textured. More straw is needed for the same effect as compost or lawn clippings. Generally, less of the finertextured materials is required to provide a 3 -inch layer of mulch after settling, compost, however, usually requires only about 4 inches to provide a 3 -inch mulch layer.
Gin trash is commonly available in Texas. It is risky to use, however, without knowing its source and prior treatment Make sure that the farmer did not use arsenicals on the cotton. Arsenicals are long-lived chemicals that can be present in gin trash for several months or years. Also, gin trash may contain weed seeds and dis eases. Compost gin trash before applying it to your garden to make it safer and easier to use. The heat generated by composting kills most weed seeds and most disease organisms that infect plants.
Sawdust is commonly available especially in East Texas. If well managed, it can be a good mulch. It can result in a temporary, but sharp, decrease in soil nitrogen. Add a small amount of garden fertilizer to the soil after applying sawdust directly to a garden Even better, add nitrogen to sawdust, then compost it before spreading it on your garden.
Plastic is an effective mulch if used properly. Use black plastic in the spring and early summer to warm the soil Black plastic keeps light from the soil and prevents weeds from growing. Clear plastic warms the soil, but weeds can grow beneath the plastic. $A$ disadvantage of plastic is tha disadvantage of plastic is that it cannot be turned into the soil at the end of the season.
When selecting materials, consider these factors:

Cost of the material. Do not spend money on mulching material when suitable materials are available at little or no cost.
The crop you plan to mulch. Never use material from the crop that is to be protected For example, do not use potato vines from the spring crop to mulch fall potatoes for the possibility of disease is increased.
When the mulch is to be used. Select a light-colored mulch during the summer and early fall to reflect heat. Use a dark-colored mulch in early spring to help warm the soil to permit earlier planting and hasten early growth.
When using mulches spread on freshly cultivated, weed-free soil before plants are large enough to interfere. Apply organic mulch thick enough to leave a 3-inch layer after settling. Four inches of fine materials like compost should be adequate Remember that coarser materials, such as straw, settle and may require 6 inches or more initially. If you use newspaper, place three layers on each side of the row. Add more mulch during the season if you are working with organic materials. The mulch settles and gradually rots during the growing season where it
meets the moist soil surface. Adding additional layers as sures continuous weed control, a clean resting place for the fruits or your labor and creates a pleasing appearance all season long.

Gifts of organ, tissues provide a new chance at life Dallas orthopedic surgeon Phil Berry has viewed life and death issues from both sides of the medical chart. In private practice since 1971, Dr. Berry was a key player in establishwas a key player in establishAmbulance Service. He is a Ambulance Service. He is a
former president of the Dallas County Medical Society, the Texas Orthopedic Association and the Texas Medical Association.
But in 1986, Phil Berry, patient, faced a devastating diagnosis.
"I was told I had three weeks to live," Dr. Berry said.
He had contracted hepatitis B while operating on a patient three years earlier, and now his liver was failing. Despite being in the medical profession and having contacts throughout the United States, Dr. Berry's name went on the national waiting list for an organ transplant, just like any other person.
"I was 49. I had three daughters, a wife, a wonderful life," he said. The time he spent waiting to see if he would receive a donated liver left him, he said, "with the most desperate, lonely feeling. It was not knowing that was difficult. Physicians are used to being in charge. But I did not have any control over $t h$ is
is sue
Then a young wife in Brazoria collapsed with a bleeding aneurysm. Her family carried out the wishes she had expressed to them to be an organ donor. "She gave me the gift of life,". Dr. Berry said, "and I will be eternally grateful to her and her family."
Other stories play out each day; some with less happy endings. And the list grows longer each year.
The United Network for Organ Sharing (UNOS), which maintains the U.S. organ transplant waiting list, has more than 68,000 people currently registered. In 1998, a total of 21,197 lifesaving transplants were performed; but at the same time 4,855 people died awaiting a transplant.
"Every 16 minutes, a new name is added to the UNOS waiting list; and every 24 hours, 13 people die because suitable organs are not available for transplantation," said Susan Ristine of the Texas Department of Health (TDH).
One person like the young woman in Brazoria can make a tremendous difference, helping as many as 50 others. "Up to 25 different organs and tissues can be donated, some tion to the liver, the heart, kidney, pancreas, lungs and intestines can provide new life for the sick. Tissue donations include the cornea, skin, heart valves, connective tissue, bone and bone marrow.
Any person potentially can be an organ donor. Those considering becoming a donor should know these facts.
The medical condition of a donor at time of death determines which organs and tissues can be given.
Once a person decides to become a donor, he or she should share that choice with family members.
A person 18 or older may sign a Uniform Donor Card. For people under 18, a parent or guardian must consent. A family member should witness the decision on the donor card.
A patient's death must be determined by doctors who are not involved in organ transplantation
"People considering becoming a donor need to realize that doctors will do all they can to save that person's life," Dr. Berry said. "Nothing is withheld in the treatment for a person who is a potential donor. A doctor's first ethical tenet is to do no harm. We try to save lives."
But as Dr. Berry points out, "Death does happen. I ask people 'Would you like to save someone else's life? Ultimately, that is the most precious gift you can give when you die'."
Currently Dr. Berry is the chair of a 13 -member Task Force, created by the 76th Texas Legislature, to examine current organ allocation in Texas. The group, which includes leaders of Texas' three organ procurement organizations, six transplant surgeons, three patient representatives and one non-voting member representing UNOS, is charged with developing and implementing an optimum organ allocation policy for the state.

Issues before the Task Force include patient survival rates, retransplantation rates, transportation issues, medical urgency, the efficiency of

each organ procurement region, waiting times at transplant centers, standardized listing criteria for transplant candidates and the need to encourage organ sharing within each region of the within
state.
Another bill from the 1999 legislative session, Senate Bill 673, created an Anatomical Gift Education Program to be funded by a $\$ 1$ voluntary check-off fee on Texas driver's license renewals. driver's will be used to educate runds will be used to educate residents about the laws gov-
erning anatomical gifts; the erning anatomical gifts; the procedures for becoming an organ, eye or tissue donor or recipient; and the benefits of such gifts. The Texas Department of Public Safety will collect the funds and TD will develop eductiond grams, with input from various grams, with input from various groups
Dr. Berry stays in touch with the family of the woman whose liver he received. "I tell them how appreciative my family and I are," he said. "They always reply that they are so glad that part of their daughter is still alive and dodaughter is still alive and do
ing things for other people."

Study helps fill gaps in child care It's a classic Catch-22 -and one that many parents in Texas face. You can't pay for child care if you don't have a job, and you can't get a job if you don't have child care. To make matters worse, some parents who can afford child care still don't have it because there are no openings in their area.

A landmark study released recently by the Texas Workforce Commission (TWC) could change all that. The study - which profiles the need for child care in every county - takes a more extensive look than ever before at child care across the state, according to TWC Chair Diane Rath.
Other studies have only looked at sample areas, whereas this one is based on responses from 90 percent of the regulated child care providers doing business in Texas at the time of the study. "This is the first time in recent


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history that a study of this magnitude has been conducted," Rath said. "It's practically a door-to-door census."
The study looks at the demand, affordability and availability of child care in each county and includes data on the trends in population, workforce and industry that are affecting child care. The data was gathered August 1998 through May 1999.

TWC and the state's local workforce development boards will use the data to better plan child care services and to support requests for more state and federal fundmore state and federal fund-
ing. The additional funding would be used to help more parents pay for quality child care, as well as to create more jobs and high-quality child care centers by training Texans who are interested in becoming providers. The data will also be useful to schools and churches as they plan to provide their own child care services for parents or help them find services elsewhere.
"Texans say child care is one of the biggest barriers to

April 21, 2000 Page 11 staying employed," Rath said. "We believe the data will help us align childcare services with what the workforce needs.
"Scientific research has confirmed that children must get quality care and attention in the first few years of their lives to develop their full potential for learning. As we help many parents find employment, we must also ensure that they find quality care for their children."
"We finally have a benchmark," said Nancy Hard, president of the Texas Association of Child Care Resources and Referral Agencies which conducted the study. "Now that we have a database for every county's child care needs, ,we'll be able to chart our progress as we develop more and better child care services."
As the state agency responsible for providing subsidized child care services, TWC spent $\$ 350$ million to serve nearly 105,000 children daily in fiscal year 1999. More than 55 percent of Texas's 4.1 million children are in child care in Texas
