#### City Council Reviews Need for Firetruck

The Robert Lee City Council in a regular meeting on Monday, July 10 agreed that the City should assist the Robert Lee Volunteer Fire Department with the purchase of a new "city pumper" fire truck.

An application for a grant to assist with the funding of the truck will be pursued. Another potential source of revenue for the truck purchase considered by the Council will be a conventional loan to be repaid by a water-use surcharge. The actual amount of this funding process will depend upon the amount of the grant application and the success of its being awarded.

The truck under consideration will be a 2000 Ferrara Commercial Pumper with a

1000 gallon water tank and a 1250 gpm mounted pump.

The truck will meet the National Fire Protection Agency pumping standards and the Texas Insurance Services Office requirements.

This effort should provide substantial fire fighting support as-well-as helping to maintain a reasonable rate for fire insurance protection.





#### **Boykin Celebrates** 80th Birthday





Ben said the country was in better shape than two years ago when he and Dawn celebrated their 55th wedding anniversary there.



Bobby and Jeffie Roberts of Robert Lee toured NOVA SCOTIA and PRINCE ED-WARD ISLAND with Grand Chapter of Texas, Order of the Eastern Star's Worthy Grand Matron - Betty Friend and her husband, Jack of New Braunfels, Worthy Grand Patron - H. Lee Stallings and his wife, Pat of Houston and 32 other Eastern Stars from all parts of Texas. There were three tour guides with us all the time, with three Canadian guides at various locations.

Bobby and Jeffie drove to Fort Worth where cousins, James and Blanche Harmon were their host and hostess, who drove them to Dallas-Ft. Worth Airport early morning June 28, 2000, to meet the group. The group then flew to Toronto, Canada, went through Customs, then boarded a large plane to Halifax, Nova Scotia, where Stan, our bus driver, met us to drive us to The Sheraton - Halifax.

Thursday, June 29, we took the Marine Drive of Nova Scotia, known for its "Kodak moments". We made frequent stops on our drive along the coast toward Baddeck. We stopped at Liscombe Lodge for a scenic lunch, before continuing to a restored. working sawmill near Sherbrooke. We drove across the Canso Causeway to enter Cape Breton Island. Canso Causeway was opened in 1955 and is the deepest causeway in the world at 217 feet. Upon arrival in Baddeck, we checked into the Telegraph House, for three nights stay and toured from that point and returned each night. The Telegraph House was built in 1861, is owned and operated by the fourth and fifth generation of the Dunlop family. It was the office of the first Trans-Oceanic Cable Company, some of the first telegraph messages in North America were sent from the office in the "Telegraph House". The Alexander Graham Bell's - Bell Room No. 1 is preserved in much the same style and charm as it was when staving there in the late 1880's. Our Worthy Grand Patron, Martin Lee and his wife, Pat were honored by having this room for three nights. They were to a disadvantage on July 1, as Canada Day celebrations kept them awake most of the night.

Friday, June 30, we traveled to Fortress Louisbourg, the most ambitious restoration project ever undertaken in Canada. The original fortress was constructed by the French between 1720 and

1745, and was the focal point of the struggle between the French and English until it was destroyed in 1760. The men and women were in period costume, our group, also, experienced the firing of the canon. The Fortress is located on the shoreline of the Atlantic Ocean, the weather was windy, rainy, foggy, and cold (58 degrees). The group had coffee in Syndey, then visited the Alexander Graham Bell Museum and ate Lobster Dinner at the Bell Buoy Restaurant. This was Grading Day for the schools (the last day of school) in Baddeck. Their school terms are from about September 4 to June 30 each year.

We spent two nights in Charlottetown at the beautiful Inn on Great George Street, overlooking the Northumberland Straight. We walked and shopped on the Wharf, then ate our evening meal at Peake Quay Restaurant on the Wharf

Monday, July 3, our local tour guide for the day was 23 year old, Carolyn. We toured the St. Dunstan's Basilica (Cathedral - church) across the street from our hotel (Inn on Great George), and then walked to the Province House for a guided tour. Driving through the beautiful countryside, we saw many fields of potatoes and native grass being baled, also, dairies with

dairy cattle. The soil is bright

red-orange because of the iron content in the soil. We had lunch in the Tea Room at Prince Edward Island Preserve Company and watched them make and can the preserves. We continued our tour of the beautiful island and stopped to walk on Cavendish Beach for a short time. Then on to "Green Gables Farmhouse" the setting for Lucy Maud Montgomery's series about the life of a little girl -Anne Shirley of Green Gables. We saw the grave of L. M. Montgomery which is always covered with flowers. We had a Lobster Dinner on Prince Edward Island at the World Famous Fisherman's Wharf-Lobster Suppers with a 60 foot salad bar. Back to our hotel - Inn on Great George Street in Charlottetown - for the night.

Tuesday, July 4, Independence Day in the United States, we celebrated with our U. S. flags on our name tags and readings by our guides. We left the Island - P.E.I., by way of the 9 mile long bridge -Confederation Bridge - which was built in three years by a workforce of 6000 men and women and was completed in We entered the province of New Brunswick, Canada. Drove on to Halifax. ate at the Fisherman's Warehouse on the Harbor, checked into the Sheraton, dressed in our formals, tuxedos, and drove to Truro, Nova Scotia, to attend the Eastern Star Grand Chapter Session of Nova Scotia and Prince Edward Island. Five more Texas Eastern Star members drove to Nova Scotia to attend the Session.

Wednesday, July 5, a local tour guide, Ryan, who teaches History at a local High School and a native of Halifax, conducted our sightseeing for the day. He told us about the sinking of the Titanic in 1912. The bodies that were discovered were buried in the Halifax cemetary beside the railroad track. The railroad is why they were buried in Halifax. This cemetery became very popular after the movie - Titanic - was filmed. We visited the cemetery. There were 2200 people on the Titanic and only 705 survived. He told us of the Explosion in Halifax Harbor 1917 that leveled most of the city two ships ran together - one was loaded with ammunition and black powder. On to

Peggy's Cove, the Lighthouse, and DeBarth Memorial. These are in a quaint little fishing village which stands on solid rock and is a picturesque scene that attracts thousands of artists every year. An Egypt Air airplane crashed in the Atlantic Ocean just off Peggy's Cove in 1998 and many times the television showed all the people anxiously awaiting on the rocks beside the Lighthouse on Peggy's Cove. Back in Halifax, we visited Citadel Hill which gives a spectacular view of the harbor. Citadel Hill is a Fort with a wall and mote around it. The Fort was used during the wars and still has a Guard at the entrance. We walked with our local guide through a beautiful garden of flowers and trees (a small version of the Butchart Gardens on Victoria Island, Canada) where the Queens of England and Princess Diana often visited. We ate our evening meal at the Five Fishermen Restaurant, then walked to the Metro Center to attend the Nova Scotia International Tattoo. This worldclass extravaganza is one of the largest indoor shows in the world, featuring hundreds of international military and civilian performers...bagpipes and drums, marching bands, comedy, singing, dancing, gymnastics, history, displays, and much more. The United States was represented very well with bands, singers, etc. A three hour show with excitement, music and beauty.


Thursday, July 6, we all departed Halifax on three separate flights, we, Bobby and Jeffie, were with the group that flew to Boston then to DFW where James and Blanche Harmon met us. On to Robert Lee July 7.

The temperature averaged

55 to 80 degrees. The population of Halifax, Nova Scotia (Capitol of Nova Scotia) was 320,000, Province of Nova Scotia was 900,000, Prince Edward Island was 127,000. The main industry for all was fishing -(lobster, crab, clams, scallops, tuna, haddock, halibut, Atlantic salmon, oysters, shrimp) and mussel farming. Prince Edward Island was noted for their potatoes. dairies and dairy cattle. Average rainfall is 36 inches, highest elevation is White Hill 1750 ft., trees do not grow very tall because the island is surrounded by the ocean (salt waters), salt being in the air keeps them from growing. There are many varieties of trees - pine, spruce, birch, red oak, red maple, and many others that make beautiful fall foliage. Regardless, the trees were a beautiful green and the Lupine flowers in colors of blue-violet, pink and white grow along the highways. Lupines are in the flower family with our bluebonnets. The bluejay is the state bird, Lady Slipper the flower, and the red maple the tree. In Canada, the metric system is used for highway speeds and distances. The maximum speed on major highways is usually 90km/h or 55 mph. The temperature is reported in Celsius Scale (centigrade), 12 centigrade would be (12 + 12 + 32 = 56 degrees). The people are very friendly and the crime rate extremely low.

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





Summer Lawn
Care Tips
Increase Mowing Height

There is a correlation between the cutting height and the total amount of root mass. The taller you allow your turfgrass to grow, the more volume there is to the root mass. The taller you allow your turfgrass to grow, the more volume there is to the root system. Therefore, you should increase your mowing height by several inches during the hot summer months to encourage the development of the root system.

Water Smart Water, either too much or too little, will hurt the health of your turfgrass. Over watering is not normally a problem this time of year-it occurs more commonly in the spring during periods of high rainfall (often homeowners make it worse by failing to turn off their sprinkler systems). Lack of sufficient moisture is a more common problem in the summertime. It is best to water just before your lawn starts to wilt. In the early stages of wilt, grass leaves take on a dull, purplish cast and begin to roll. Also, if you walk across a lawn that is starting to wilt, you will leave tracks.

Learn to recognize these signs and apply water on a timely basis. If possible, water during the early morning hours. Watering later in the day wastes water due to higher evaporation rates. Watering in the evening encourages disease development and should be avoided.

Aerate Your Soil

All plants, including turfgrass, need oxygen to survive. If the soil is compacted through years of traffic the plant roots cannot get oxygen in sufficient quantities to continue healthy growth. Next to proper watering, aeration is probably the most important thing you can do to improve your lawn right now. Water and fertilizer that is applied to a highly compacted lawn will simply run off down the street into a storm drain on its way to the Gulf of Mexico. Most rental companies have machines that you can rent to do this job or you can hire a contractor.

Compost-Yes. Fertilizer-No

Do not apply any synthetic fertilizer during the hot summer months. Lawns that are highly fertilized going into fall and winter are likely to suffer damage from cold weather. Instead, wait until September and apply one of the winterizer fertilizers that contains a slow release form of nitrogen in a 1-2-2 ratio. You can go ahead and apply a 2 or 3 inch layer of compost now. If you notice iron chlorosis (yellow leaves) on your St. Augustine turf apply iron sulfate or an iron chelate according to the label directions.

Participating students meet with academic advisers to discuss majors and to select courses. Student counselors are available to assist with class scheduling. By the time new students complete Preview ASU, they will have their fall semester class schedules.

"Preview ASU guides students through what to expect at ASU and assists them in registering for their first classes," Mears said. "Over the years we have found that this helps reduce anxiety not only for students but also for their parents as their children begin new phases of their lives."

In addition to reviewing facilities, courses and student activities, students will be able to tour the campus and meet with representatives of student organizations, academic advisors and the counseling staff.

#### Trauma Care

Trauma can occur anywhere, at any time. To help prevent death or disability, critical trauma victims must reach definitive care within a short period of time, often called the "golden hour". A set of resources include informed citizens, communications systems, pre-hospital care providers, and multidisciplinary trauma teams in emergency departments. With the inclusion of public information, prevention activities, and rehabilitation, this coordination of resources is called trauma system. Studies have shown that coordination of the emergency medical resources available in an area can result in a major decrease in preventable trauma deaths.

The Texas Legislature required that trauma care resources be made available to every citizen. The Omnibus Rural Health Care Rescue Act, passed in 1989, directed the Bureau of Emergency Management of the Texas Department of Health to develop and implement a statewide emergency medical services and trauma care system. The Texas Board of Health adopted rules for implementation of the trauma system in January 1992. These rules divided the state into twentytwo regions called Trauma Service Areas and provided for the formation of a Regional Advisory Council in each region to develop and implement a regional Trauma System Plan. System development activities around the state have clearly demonstrated on-going positive support for this project. A Regional Advisory Council (RAC) has been established in each TAS (Trauma Service Area) and since January 2000, each RAC has an approved regional Trauma System Plan.

Trauma Service Area K is the Concho Valley Regional Advisory Council. The RAC meets monthly in San Angelo. Meetings are hosted by Shannon Hospital and San Angelo Community Medical Center. The RAC consists of fourteen counties and is one of the largest RAC's in the state. Among those fourteen counties there are nine hospitals and seventeen EMS agencies. The RAC's purpose is to improve trauma care in the Concho Valley. The RAC's board of directors is one representative from each hospital and EMS service that is in compliance with state regulations. The executive board is composed of a Chair, Vice-Chair, Secretary, and Treasurer. Since the RAC's recognition by the state, it has provided hospital and prehospital trauma classes for nurses, doctors, and EMS personnel. The RAC has received grants from the Tobacco Settlement Endowment, Texas Department of Health Bureau of Emergency Management System Account (formerly Senate Bill 102), and 911 funds. The grant money has made it possible to hold these classes out in the rural areas. The RAC is also involved in public injury prevention programs through out the Concho Valley in public locations and in the school

districts.

Once again, trauma can occur anywhere, at any time. Victims must reach definitive care within a short period of time, the "golden hour". Each hospital and each EMS agency that meet state regulations that are based in one of the fourteen counties in the Concho Valley is involved with the RAC. Please support your local hospital and EMS agency, for they provide a service that is very much needed in your area. When you see injury prevention programs sponsored by the RAC, support them. Send your employees to the programs. If you need injury prevention programs, get in touch with the RAC to help find a program that meet your

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
