Bronte mandates water restrictions

At the July 13, 2000, Bronte City Council Meeting, a Drought Contingency Plan was adopted. The Texas Natural Resource Conservation Commission requires that all public water supply systems in Texas prepare a Drought Contingency Plan.

Contingency Plan. When full, the elevation of Oak Creek Lake is 2000 ft. The elevation of Oak Creek Lake on July 16, 2000, was 1979.57 ft. This elevation triggers Stage 3 (Severe Conditions) of the Drought Plan.



Fire Department Gains Aid

Robert Lee Volunteer Fire Department took advantage of equipment aid available from the Texas Forest Ser-

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
vice. The department acquired a free 2 1/2 ton flatbed truck, courtesy of the Federal **Excess Personal Property** (FEPP) equipment program administered by the agency. Under the FEPP program, equipment acquired through the military is transferred to qualifying fire departments at no cost.

Additional free equipment is available to rural fire departments, thanks to the Industrial Helping Hands program, through which companies and organizations donate used fire equipment for use by volunteer fire departments. Companies interested in donating industrial fire equipment should contact the TFS **Rural Fire Defense Section at** 409-639-8130 for more information.

Volunteer fire departments may save money through several other programs administered by the Texas Forest Service. A self-insurance vehicle liability insurance pool offers liability coverage for \$250 per vehicle, ambulances excluded. Fire departments can also purchase firefighter clothing, hand tools and water handling accessories at discount prices through the Fire Safe program. TFS regional fire coordinators located across the state now provide local training in wildland firefighting techniques and assist

fire departments with applications for equipment and financial assistance.

Grants Target Loss Prevention

Blackwell CISD has been awarded a grant of \$2,000.00 from the Texas Association of School Boards (TASB) Risk Management Fund to help implement local loss prevention, safety, or health initiatives. This is the second year that the school district has received the TASB Fund grant.

"Now in its third year, the grant program helps Fund members address the crucial issue of loss prevention in the workplace," said Edwin Thompson, TASB loss control manager. "The Fund is dedicated to partnering with member districts to save valuable resources by eliminating or reducing hazardous exposures and preventing losses in all risk management program areas. We want to do everything we can to help ed-ucate staff, provide for a healthier workforce, and prevent on-the-job injuries," he said.

The grants were awarded to 78 school districts, three collages, one education service center, one county appraisal district, and one education cooperative. Grants covered personal protective equipment, mechanical lifting devices, and fall protection equipment. Many focused on defensive driving, first-aid/CPR courses, blood borne pathogen kits, electrical safety, fire protection, and school security equipment. Other districts were awarded funds to develop wellness programs, schedule health screenings, create Wellness Days, develop supervisors training, and produce employee handbooks.

"Raising awareness and reducing injuries and losses is a win-win situation that saves valuable district resources and increases productivity. The grant program continues to be an integral part of the Fund's overall effort and commitment to help our members achieve their loss control objectives," "The re-Thompson said. sponse to this year's program was overwhelming, and the task of selecting from the record number of applicants was difficult because of the wealth of exceptional proposals. Grant applicants did a fantastic job analyzing their specific needs. We believe the grant program will have a positive effect on participating districts and education entities, and the Fund is dedicated to providing continued support of their loss prevention efforts," he said.

In fact, since it was first offered a year ago, more than 62,000 people have signed up for this convenient service offered jointly by Social Security and the Internal Revenue Service (IRS).

To take advantage of automatic withholding, complete IRS Form W-4V, Voluntary Withholding Request. Select the percentage of your monthly benefit you want withheld: 7, 15, 28 or 31 percent. Only these percentages can be used; amounts in dollars are not acceptable. After you've made your selection, sign and return the form to your local Social Security office either by mail or in person.

Each time you want to change or stop a withholding, complete a new Form W-4V and send it directly to Social

Prussic Acid Poisoning in Livestock

With the recent rain showers we have had followed by severe heat, this could lead to prussic acid poisoning of live-Certain pasture stock. grasses and forage, especially sudan and johnson grass are more prone to producing prussic acid. This usually occurs following frost on these plants, but in the conditions we are in now with the johnson grass stressed due to heat following a rapid growth spell, any showers we might get could trigger the production of prussic acid.

The most dangerous time to graze these plants is following a sudden change such as showers on drought stressed plants. Livestock should not be allowed to graze these plants for 10 days to 2 weeks. Following this lay off time, the prussic acid should be gone from the plant as it will turn to a gaseous state and precipitate.

If you have some johnson grass or other susceptible plant in your fields or pastures that has gone through this stress period, it is a good idea to hold off grazing for up to 2 weeks. When you do turn your livestock in these pastures, make sure they are relatively full when turned in and not hungry as they will go straight to the green plants.

quickly and can kill animals within minutes. In most cases, animals become infected within 10 minutes after eating toxic material and can die within 2-3 minutes.

Soil Test for Small Grains

Farmers should be thinking about soil testing your small grain fields in the next several weeks in preparation for sowing.

Soil tests performed now will have plenty of time to return early enough to apply recommended fertilizer rates and incorporate them into the soil.

Small grains that are grazed require more fertilizer than ungrazed grain because nutrients are removed by grazing. About 30 to 40 pounds of nitrogen are removed in forages grazed by stocker cattle for each 100 pounds of beef produced per acre.

This nitrogen must be replaced to provide adequate nutrition for grain production after livestock removal.

A general "rule of thumb" indicates that wheat requires about 2 pounds of nitrogen per bushel of grain produced. Therefore a 20 bushel yield will remove about 40 pounds of nitrogen per acre.

A lot of times, a correct soil test will make more money in fertilizer savings by knowing the exact amounts of nutrients needed, instead of a "shotgun application" where more nutrients are applied than actually needed.





Big Spring VA Celebrates 50th Anniversary

Fifty years ago on July 17, **Big Spring VA Medical Center** opened its doors to a new, state of the art medical center. Cary Brown, Chief Executive Officer, announced a "50th Anniversary" celebration will be scheduled July 25th, 3:00 p.m. in the lobby of the Outpatient Clinic.

In 1944, with the tide turning strongly in favor of Allies, the end of World War II became a firm probability instead of a hope. Thus, with the prospect of the greatest of wars ending, it was apparent that millions of veterans would be coming home, and a huge burden would be on the Veterans Administration to provide for their medical needs. More hospitals would be needed and quickly one of those, it was reported, would be for the West Texas region and into eastern New Mexico.

The October 1944 minutes of the Big Spring Chamber of **Commerce Board of Director's** meeting reflect a slight possibility of Big Spring procuring a Veteran's Hospital. Immediately, the city fathers traveled to Washington to pursue that dream. In July 1945, Big Spring was approved as the site for a new VA Hospital. The medical center was designed and constructed under the supervision of the Corps of Engineers for the Veterans Administration.

In January 1950, Dr. Lloyd Andrews arrived as the "superintendent" of the new Veteran's Administration Hospital. He announced the tentative opening date of the Page 11

Senior Workers Freed From Earnings Limits

Everyone likes to hear good news. And, as the manager of the Social Security office in San Angelo, I've been fortunate lately to share some good news with people who are between age 65 and 70.

According to a new law, people who are age 65 to 69 can continue to work and collect all of their Social Security benefits regardless of how much they earn. Under the previous law, benefits for workers age 65-69 were reduced \$1 for every \$3 they earned over the annual earnings limit (\$17,000 in 2000).

Although the law was signed April 7, it was effective January 1, 2000. This means that anyone who lost benefits between January and April should, by now, have received those benefits in a single payment. In June, they will begin receiving their regular monthly benefits.

Under the new law, if you turn 65 during 2000, your benefits will be reduced \$1 for every \$3 you earn over \$17,000 until the month you reach 65. Then, there's no reduction in your benefit amount no matter how much you earn. For workers age 62 to 64, the law requires that \$1 be withheld for every \$2 you earn over the annual earnings limit (\$10,080 in 2000).

If you're getting retirement benefits on your own earnings record and you continue to work, your benefit amount may increase because of your additional earnings. We'll review your earnings each year and notify you if your benefit amount increases.

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Flea, Tick Populations Concern for Pet Owners This Summer

Summer is approaching, and it's time for pet owners to prepare for flea and tick season, which could be worse this summer because of mild winter temperatures and spring moisture.

Dr. Pete Teel, an entomologist with the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station, said fleas and ticks thrive in warm, moist environments.

"Recent rainfall in some areas of Texas combined with high temperatures have given fleas and ticks an optimal environment for reproduction." Teel said.

Dr. Mike Merchant, a Texas Agricultural Extension Service entomologist in Dallas, said it's important to begin flea treatment as early as possible. A good place to start is with a flea comb and good bath for your pet. Soap acts as a light insecticide and reduces the need for stronger chemicals.

Helwig Named to Dean's List at SFA

The winner of Wednesday evening's event will kick off the evening on Saturday, September 9th at the River-Stage for the final night of the Cactus Jazz and Blues FestiFleas lay their eggs on an animal, as well as feed on its blood. Merchant said adult fleas and eggs can be controlled with medication from a veterinarian in the form of a pill or a chemical treatment applied to the back of the animal. Over-the-counter medications containing methoprene or pyriproxyfen are effective when applied before there is a major infestation.

Teel said having a fenced yard will prevent pets from being exposed to new flea and tick populations. Yards can also be treated with granulated insecticides.

"Bedding material in dog houses needs to be cleaned or disposed of," Teel said. "It's also important to treat any areas where pets loaf, such as the edge of the house."

Teel said simply keeping lawns mowed can decrease pest problems. Short grass does not provide as much shade and moisture for small insects like fleas and ticks. Rodents, which can spread fleas and ticks, are less likely to inhabit a yard with short grass.

Merchant said liquid sprays and a thorough cleaning can be used to control fleas indoors. Mop, vacuum and dust floors and furniture to remove flea eggs from your home. Always remember to dispose of vacuum bag contents after




