

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

Steers play best game so far

May is a team that is not overall as strong as Bronte or Miles but is much stronger than Water Valley and Eden. Their offense is pretty solid, but the Steer defense shut them down to just 83 total yards. Stewart Millican had a great game at middle linebacker, and picked up a solid performance from Lewis Samaniego, Chase Rainwater, Curtis Bell, Cooper Riley, Charles Abalos, Adam Cates, Freddie Landeros and Beau Blair. The Tigers started this quarter with their backs to the wall. The ball was on the Tiger one yard line. On the first play the Tigers fumbled and Bohannon recovered for the Steers.

It was now 1st and goal for the Steers at the Tiger one yard line. On the first play, Samaniego drove across the goal line for a Steer touchdown. The run for two points failed.

The Steers kicked to the Tigers and they returned it to their own 49 yard line. The Tigers ran two plays and then went to the air and Stewart Millican intercepted for the Steers. The Steers had the ball at their own 42 yard line. Rainwater had runs of 13, 12 and 12 yards. Travis Pitcock caught a pass for 12 yards. Taylor Clendennen had runs of 6, 4, and 15 yards. Bret Bellew had a run for 4 yards and Eubanks completed a 3 yard touchdown pass to Brown. Rainwater ran for the 2 point extra point. The 2nd quarter ended at Steers 27 -Tigers 0

Domestic Violence Awareness Month

October is Domestic Violence Awareness Month. I
would like to take this opportunity to provide some basic
information on domestic violence and how victims can
protect themselves.

No one ever deserves to be hit or threatened. There is assistance available for people who want to escape from a dangerous or violent home.

Before you leave

Leaving an abusive home is potentially very dangerous. There are steps that you should take that may reduce the risk of harm. Of course, if

Legal form expresses wishes about guardianship

"People worry a lot as they age," says Sam Polk, an attorney for the Legal Hotline for Older Texans. "What will happen to them and their possessions? And they worry especially if there's a greedy relative in the picture."

Fortunately, those who confide such fears to Polk soon hear about a form called "Declaration of Guardian Before Need Arises." This form "lets you disqualify people you don't trust and keep them from making decisions about you, your property, your health care. It also lets you name the people you do want to put in charge in case the need ever arises," Polk says. "People breathe a lot easier after they sign this form and send it back to us."

Only recently, Polk points out, he helped thwart the guardianship efforts that a caller's son was making. "The woman called the hotline," Polk remembers, saying that she'd been in a hospital for six weeks with no medical complaint that warranted hospitalization. She was 87, Polk says, "really sharp and mentally fit.

"Meanwhile, her son was seeking guardianship. The woman told me he wanted to force her into a nursing home and sell her house. Another relative of hers also told me the son seemed to be more interested in his mom's money than her welfare.

"I told her that legally she was free to leave the hospital and I sent her one of the Legal Hotline for Older Texans' publications. It had information about the form. She shared it with an attorney the court had appointed to represent her. The attorney prepared the Designation of Guardian Before Need Arises form, and the woman signed it and the son backed off."

Oddly, Polk says, few people realize that such a form exists. There are even some lawyers unaware of it. Signing such a form, however, can ease a lot of fears.

The Legal Hotline for Older Texans provides free legal assistance to persons 60 and over through grants approved by the Texas Supreme Court and 'administered by the Texas Equal Access to Justice Foundation. Low income Texans who need information about the Designation of Guardianship Before Need Arises should call the Legal Hotline at 1-800-622-2520 toll-free.

you are in imminent danger, you should leave immediately.

If you are considering leaving an abusive home, you should find a safe place for you and your children to go when you leave. Options include a friend or family member's home or a battered women's shelter. Make sure that you keep change for a phone call or a calling card with you, as well as the phone number of the place you intend to go.

You should also find someone who is willing to lend you money should you need to leave quickly. If possible, you should set up your own checking account to allow you access to funds when you leave.

Find a safe place to keep copies of important documents such as insurance information, birth and marriage certificates, health records, social security cards, and financial records. In addition, you should leave a supply of extra clothes and medicine where you can access it in an emergency.

After you leave

Once you have left an abusive situation, there are steps you should take to protect yourself and your children. When you are at home, make sure that all of your doors and windows lock securely. You can request a security check from your local law enforcement agency. Inform your neighbors and landlord that your partner no longer lives with you and that they should call the police if they see him or her near your home.

You should request an unlisted/unpublished telephone number, and never call your partner from that phone. Get caller ID so that you can screen your telephone calls, and keep a log of any telephone calls that he or she makes to your home.

To help protect your children, devise a safety plan for when you are not with them. Inform their school or day care of who is allowed to pick them

At work, inform your security office or your managers about your situation. If possible have someone screen your phone calls and escort you to and from your car or the bus or subway.

Protection

Victims of domestic violence can also file for a protective order. If your spouse or partner violates the protective order, call the police immediately. Law enforcement agencies are notified of all protective orders filed in their jurisdiction. When they receive notification that someone has violated a protective order, they can arrest the person and file charges.

Financial assistance is avail-

able to victims of domestic violence. The Texas Crime Victims Compensation Program, which is administered by my office, can assist with medical and counseling bills that result from domestic violence. Victims can also receive compensation for loss of support and relocation.


Texas Exile, another program administered by my office, is also working to prevent further instances of domestic violence. It is against the law for a person who has been convicted of domestic violence to possess a gun. If a person who is subject to these prohibitions is caught with a weapon, under Texas Exile, he or she will face a tough sentence in federal prison with no possibility for parole.





Internet cattle marketing attracting more producers

Internet Web sites designed to buy and sell beef cattle could lead to a big change in the way livestock is marketed by producers, according to industry officials attending the recent Beef Cattle Short Course at Texas

Beef producers heard representatives from cattle Internet Web sites say the future of marketing cattle may be as simple as the click of a mouse, and more cattle buyers will be turning to e-commerce because of convenience and transportation savings.

iceberg as far as selling cattle through the Internet," said Dr. Ernie Davis, a beef economist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. "Already in the past few months, the volume of cattle being sold is 20,000 head per month. And we're continuing to see more and more being sold."

Short course participants learned about cattle marketing via the Internet and how ecommerce may reshape the way not only how cattle are sold, but how typical everyday farm and ranch supplies are purchased - some companies are forming alliances with major retailers to sell everything from office supplies to western wear.

Though the Internet is far from replacing the traditional auction barn, Davis said the Internet "acts like the old terminal markets," where producers used to transport cattle to central locations.

"Basically, what we're doing with the Internet is it acts like a big stockyard," he said. "All it does is bring the description of the cattle into where the buyers are, and the buyers buy the cattle. All of this is done without having to move the cattle. That saves on transportation costs, and the overall stress of the animals when transporting."

Jim Hartman, a partner with Internet site CowZone.com, said the firm first launched the Web site in 1999. Its cattleroundup.com site is a free cattle listing service for ranchers across the country.

"Our site is geared to people that want to buy and sell their cattle online period," "We don't Hartman said. charge any commission. This is strictly a service to the producer. When you go to the bottom of a listing, you'll see an e-mail listing and phone number. Once you've listed your cattle, and I'm a cattle person, I can read the description and visually imagine what that set of calves or whatever is listed there looks like. I can then pick up the phone and contact that seller that has listed those cattle.'

Transactions are between the buyer and the seller only, with the Web site serving as a large bulletin board of cattle

listings. With the growth of Internet cattle marketing, Davis said even traditional auction sale barns are coming on board. For now, though, internet cattle marketing is primarily limited to large truckloads of 100 head. Only about 6 percent of the ranches in Texas are big enough to access this market, he added.

"Right now, most of the systems set up on the Internet only accept truckload lots," Davis said. "They haven't made it easy for producers to co-mingle cattle to where they can sell them in those large truckload lots."

He noted 92 percent of the beef cattle farms and ranches in Texas have less than 100 head of cattle.

However, there are some producers who are marketing their cattle directly from the ranch through the Internet. Cattlesale.com, for example, includes a country cattle listing as part of their offering where buyers can place bids on everything from existing

breeding stock to bulls.

Overall, the Internet is simply another way for producers to market their cattle and an additional attempt to put more money in their pockets, Davis

"You're limiting the handling, the shipment of cattle and saving on transportation, not to mention saving on the stress and health of the animals," he said. "It's a win-win situation for most of the players there."


WASPs to hold reunion

An important part of American history will be revisited on October 6 & 7 in Sweetwater, Texas. The Women Air Force Service Pilots (WASPs) will be holding their biennial reunion at the location they trained, Avenger Field. On November 17, 1942, by the request of General HH. "Hap" Arnold, Jacqueline Cochran was named the director of the

Women's Flying Training Detachment. The project originated at Houston Municipal Airport, and was relocated to Sweetwater's Avenger Field on February 21, 1943. Of the over 25,000 applicants, only 1,830 were accepted. The WASP'S paid their own way to and from the training. They were not granted military status until 1977.

The reunion will give you an opportunity to visit first hand with some of the women who helped make history. These females, who are in their seventy's and eighty's have had lives that most people can only dream of. They flew planes in a time when women were not expected to do such things. They set a standard of excellence and showed that women were capable of doing anything.
