

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Fire Prevention week

The Coke-Sterling County Farm Bureau joins our County Judge, the National Fire Protection Association (NFPA), Firefighters, and others in promoting fire prevention and safety week during Fire Prevention Week, October 8-14, 2000. This week commemorates the Great Chicago Fire of 1871, which killed more than 250 persons, left 100,000 homeless, and destroyed more than 17,400 buildings.

Too few people develop and regularly practice a home fire escape plan. That's why NFPA is sponsoring a threeyear public safety campaign called, "Fire Drills: The Great Escape!" Started in 1998, "The Great Escape" encourages home fire escape planning and practice, ensuring that people know what to do in a home fire and can escape safety. Now entering its third and final year, the campaign has already proved to be a great success. To date, NFPA has documented 58 lives saved as a direct result of family participation.

Smoke and poisonous gases are the leading causes of death in fires, and can kill a person long before flames will. Underestimating the power of fire and the time it takes to escape a home fire put people at severe risk of fire death and injury. In the best case, you only have just one or two minutes to escape a typical home fire safely. Home fire escape planning and practice are critical to life safety because they ensure that everyone knows how to use those minutes wisely and escape unharmed.

Developing and practic home fire escape plan at least twice a year are critical to escaping a real fire safely. A complete home escape plan includes working smoke alarms, everyone in the household knowing two ways

out of each room, having an outside location where everyone will meet upon exiting, memorizing the local fire department's emergency telephone number.

The Coke-Sterling County Farm Bureau promotes public awareness of fire safety and encourages everyone to plan and practice "Fire Drills; The Great Escape!"

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



Once is not enough

Women can survive breast cancer and lead productive, happy lives. But early detection is critical. Early detection through screening is the key to more treatment options and a dramatic increase in survival rates, and a diagnosis often does not mean removal of the breast. If cancer is found before it spreads to other parts of the body, a person has a greater chance of successful treatment and getting well.

Early detection practices are part of a good health routine that includes a mammogram and clinical breast examination. So getting a mammogram only once is not enough. The American Cancer Society (ACS) recommends that women get a mammogram and clinical breast exam every year beginning at age 40. ACS, at 1-800-ACS-2345, offers free information about all types of cancer, including breast cancer.

Women who need help paying for yearly mammograms can find low cost services in almost every community. Medicare helps pay the cost of an annual mammogram for women age 40 and older with Medicare Part B. The Texas Department of Health (TDH) and local health care agencies across the Lone Star State offer breast exams and mammograms at no cost

to women age 50 to 64 with limited incomes. For more information on this program or the name of the closest clinic, call 1-800-422-2956. Also, during October, National Breast Cancer Awareness Month, many organizations offer mammography services at low cost.

This year, 11,500 sisters, daughters, mothers and wives in Texas will be diagnosed with breast cancer. A total of 2,600 women will not live to see the new year because of this disease. Breast cancer is one of the most commonly diagnosed cancers among American women and the second leading cause of cancer deaths.

To get the Once is Not Enough message out, Texas Lt. Governor Rick Perry and others celebrated the Year 2000 Wreath Project and Tell-A-Friend at the State Capitol on Fri., Oct. 6. The day was proclaimed Breast Cancer Awareness Day by Governor George W. Bush, and similar events took place at county courthouses and city halls across the state. A large wreath made by survivors of breast cancer was placed on the steps of the State Capitol to mark the event.

The Tell-A-Friend Campaign, sponsored by the American Cancer Society, helps spread the word about the importance of early detection by enlisting volunteers to contact friends and encourage them to get a clinical breast examination and mammogram - something all women should discuss with their doctors.

African American women should pay particular attention to the Once Is Not Enough early detection message. African American women have higher death rates for breast cancer than women of other

races. Many experts believe this is due to cancer being found at a later stage of development. "Our goal is to open the doors to African American women and all women," said Clare Wolf, TDH Breast and Cervical Cancer Control Program," and make sure early detection is part of their lifestyle."

Older women of all ethnic backgrounds should also pay special attention to the early detection message. Most breast cancer occurs in women between ages 50 and 70

Breast cancer starts as a tiny growth of abnormal cells inside the body. In time, and if not treated early, this growth can spread. It may grow as a lump inside the breast and it can spread to other parts of the body. Finding cancer late means there is less chance of successful treatment.

Drought causing death for many Texas trees

With hardwood trees throughout dropping leaves, it looks like Fall has come early.

It's not a change of season, but another symptom of the drought, says a Texas Agricultural Extension Service forestry specialist.

"It's kind of like the tree shuts down its 'branch offices' to conserve resources," said Dr. Eric Taylor, Extension forestry specialist based in East Texas.

Some of the trees now dropping leaves are already dead. Others may recover next spring. As deep soil moisture is depleted, roots unable to reach the water die.

As a rule, if the tree has lost leaves early at least twice in the last three years, then it's probably already dead. If this is the first year that it has lost its leaves, there is a good chance it will recover next spring.

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Cut down on telemarketing calls

Tired of annoying telemarketing calls that interrupt you at home?

There are some things you should know that might help cut down on the number of telephone solicitations you receive.

There is certain information telemarketers must provide you - their name, the purpose of the call, the identity of the business on whose behalf they are calling and the telephone number at which the caller or the business can be reached.

You should obtain the name of the solicitor and the purpose of the call before providing any information to the caller. Most legitimate telemarketers will provide you with an address and phone number to contact them if you have questions.

Some telemarketing is done with an automatic dialing/announcing device (ADAD), which provides a recorded message. The machine must disconnect from your line within five seconds after termination of the call. If the device cannot disconnect within five seconds, a live operator must introduce the call and receive the consent of the customer before beginning the message. Any recorded ADAD solicitation message must be shorter than 30 seconds or be able to recognize a customer's answering machine and terminate the call within 30 seconds.

Be very cautious about leaving your name and telephone number on the message portion of an automated solicitation call. If could lead to "cramming," having unauthorized services billed to your

If you have Caller ID, you may be able to identify telemarketing calls and avoid answering. Telemarketers are prohibited from blocking their names and phone numbers from Caller ID devices.

Remember, telephone solicitors cannot call a residence before 9 a.m. or after 9 p.m. on weekdays and Saturdays,

Pet talk

If your dog Spot gets a spot on his lung, he's probably not

Cancer in animals - especially dogs - is as common as cancer in humans, says a Texas A&M University veterinarian who specializes in treating and diagnosing the disease. Dr. Claudia Barton has done extensive research in animal cancer and says the disease seems to surface as often in the animal world as it does among humans.

But unlike people, certain animals seem to have much higher incidence rates of cancer. Dogs are at the top of the list, followed by cats. Their chances of getting cancer are higher than humans contracting the disease, she says.

But humans have a much higher cancer rate than horses or cows, while cancer in birds is rare.

"We do know that certain species of animals seem to get cancer more than others. Why this happens, we just don't know," Barton explains.

"Dogs, for instance, have higher rates of skin cancer, breast cancer and bone can-


cer, and also leukemia. Humans have more lung cancer, which we attribute to smoking, and more gastrointestinal cancers, which are probably related to diet.

"But by using dogs as models and learning from them, we can apply some of what we know about cancer to humans," Barton adds.

Barton says the incidence of cancer in dogs is higher than it was 25 or 30 years ago because animals are living longer. It is not uncommon, she says, to see 18-year-old

dogs and 21-year-old cats.

"The longer an animal lives, you see the diseases of aging just like you see in people," she explains. "You see more cancer, more heart disease and kidney trouble in animals just as you might see in older people.



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
