Lady Longhorns advance to state playoffs at San Marcos

The 2000 Bronte Lady Longhorns volleyball team continues the championship tradition begun so many years ago with a trip to the UIL Class 1A State Tournament today (Friday). The Lady Longhorns have competed at the State Tournament eleven previous times - bringing home the Championship five of those times, with their last appearance and championship in 1991.

The Lady Horns face Round Top-Carmine in a semi-final match at 9:45 am in Strahan Coliseum on the campus of Southwest Texas State in San Marcos. With a win against Round Top-Carmine, the Longhorns would play in the final at 10 am Saturday morning.


The Lady Horns began this year's road to State with the District Championship and a season record of 24-7 before heading into the playoffs. They won Bi-District with a win over Grandfalls and the Area Championship with a win over Marfa.

The next hurdle they faced was Fort Elliott in the semi-fi-

nal round at the Regional Tournament held at Monterey High School in Lubbock. The Lady Horns won in three games 8-15, 15-13 and 15-11. Individual statistics for the game included: Britni Adams -2 kills, 1 assist; Kala Arrott - 13 kills, 5 blocks, 6 digs; Chrissie Counts- 1 assist, 1 dig; Brooke McCutchen - 1 assist, 1 dig; Tessie McMullan - 1 assist, 1 dig; Natasha Reed - 3 kills, 7 digs; Jade Richards - 6 assists, 3 digs, 1 ace; Cara Sefcik - 2 kills, 4 digs; Lacy Schoenfield - 2 kills, 15 assists; Stormy White - 3 kills, 1 dig; and Lauren Williams - 6 kills, 1 assist, 4 blocks, and 2 digs. The Ladies' season record now stood at 28-7 heading into the finals against their own District runner-up Water Valley.

The Lady Horns met the Lady Wildcats in the finals and won the Regional Championship in two games, 15-1 and 15-7. Individual statistics included: Britni Adams - 2 kills; Kala Arrott - 5 kills, 7 digs; Chrissie Counts -





Ambulance Service Crisis

The East Coke County (Bronte) EMS recently invited me to a meeting regarding problems facing their service. They have two major problems. One being the lack of people willing to be certified and having the time to serve. The other problem is the additional paper work put on these already stressed volunteers from the state. Mayor Lee and I have been communicating with the state and several other regional people regarding this. I would encourage you, if you have close relations with your elected officials, please talk to them or drop them a note regarding this situation. The problem of obtaining volunteers can only be handled by you.

East and West Coke County EMS are currently covering runs for each other. There are going to be times when one or the other cannot get a crew. There are also times when the other one is already on a run and the other must cover. Both of the services are working well with each other at this time. They realize they have to have each other to protect you. You must also realize that when the crew comes from Robert Lee it will take a little longer than your accustomed 3-4 minutes for someone to be at your door. The same thing applies to the Robert Lee residents. Just be assured when the EMS do get there that knowledgeable, caring people are taking care of you. They are your friends and neighbors and they care for you and yours. Why else would they be there? They certainly aren't being paid big bucks or any bucks for that matter. When you say "Thanks we appreciate you" that's their pay.

We think taxes are high now. If the time comes when we have to have a paid ambulance service, that is when you will see what high taxes are. Coke County can't afford this. Please step up to the plate and help now.

West Coke County EMS is going to be offering an EMT and ECA course starting in December. Mary Bessent attended the meeting and offered to coordinate a class and whatever else she could to help with the situation at Bronte. Anyone over the age of 18 may attend the course. Continuing education hours are also available for current volunteers.

If you can't attend classes and serve, encourage an employee or friend to attend. Support your service by allowing your employees to help during the day as a last resort. Offer to do paperwork, maintain the ambulance (check oil, fill gas, etc.), clean, take care of volunteers, children while they make the run. You may not be able to take care of the patient, but you might be able to drive the ambulance. Just offer your support and help where you can.

We who manage the

County, Cities, Schools, and Care Centers must wake up and encourage our employees to help with this. We know that just because they work for one of these taxing entities, they can't always go on runs during the day, but there are times when they can. We know that not everyone is capable of serving in this manner, but some are. If you are one of those who can please help.

Support your EMS Service (East and West) - They support you.

TEC is the statewide organization for 79 electric cooperatives operating in Texas and serving more than 1.4 million meters in 245 Texas counties.



Local judge attends seminar



RL Elementary participates in voting project

Robert Lee Elementary students looked forward to election day as they participated in a special project designed to help them learn more about the electoral process. The project included Pre-K through eighth grade, and began on September 5th with a visit from the Coke County Voter Registrar.

Students learned about the process of registering to vote, as well as several examples of single votes that changed history. Some of the dates studied included:

1776 - The new government of the United States chose the English language over German by a margin of one vote.

1880 - One vote elected Thomas Jefferson President. 1845 - Texas became the

1845 - Texas became the 28th state in the Union due to one vote.

1923 - One vote made Adolph Hitler head of the Nazi party.

The students were given an opportunity to learn about the process of elections with a "hands on" experiment. The school was divided into four Election Precincts, and each student filled out voter registration applications. These applications were processed by the voter registrar's office and voter registration cards and poll lists were provided.

The Coke County Elections Administrator provided ballots for each precinct that included most of the actual national, statewide and local races for the fourth through eighth grade classes. A simpler Presidential ballot was provided for Pre-K through third grades. The seventh grade





class provided Precinct Judges to work each of the polling places, in the same manner as actual polling places.

On November 6th, the day before the Presidential election, the students held their own election. They presented their voter registration cards, signed a roster and were verified on the poll lists by the election judges before being allowed to vote. After the polls closed, twelve members of the eighth grade class learned the process of ballot counting, tabulating the totals for each precinct. The totals were then posted at the school so the students could compare their election returns

to the results of the November 7th Election.

The project was designed to help students better understand the responsibility that comes with citizenship. By participating in a very realistic experience, it is hoped that the students will remember that one vote can make a difference in the outcome of any election. By voting they can have a voice in every level of government, help make decisions that affect everyone's lives, and truly be a part of history.







How to handle a turkey so it's safe to eat

Follow these food safety guidelines.

*Thaw frozen turkey in the refrigerator or cold water.

*Keep thawed or fresh turkey in a refrigerator.

*Prevent juices from dripping onto other foods in the refrigerator by placing wrapped turkey on a tray.

*Thawed turkey may be kept in a refrigerator up to four days before cooking

*Roast fresh turkey as soon as possible, but no later than the "use by" date on the package.

*Place raw poultry on nonporous surfaces; these are easy to clean. Avoid wooden cutting boards.

*Use paper towels, not cloth, to dry off turkey and wipe up juices.

*Stuff turkey just before roasting, not the night before. *Wash hands, work surfaces
