#### **THC** announces grant recipients The Texas Historical Com-

mission (THC) recently awarded nearly \$30,000 in Heritage Tourism Partnership Grant funds to eight groups in West Central Texas for the promotion of the Texas Forts Trail Region.

The grants, a part of the THC's Texas Heritage Trails Program: A Regional Tourism Initiative, help communities fund products and projects that enhance the visitor experience to cultural and historic sites and events in the Texas Forts Trail Region.

Recipients were the Breckenridge Improvement Council, City of Breckenridge, Fort Chadbourne Foundation (Bronte), Friends of the Cross Plains Library, The Grace Museum (Abilene), Grady McWhiney Research Foundation (Abilene), Heart of Texas Historical Museum (Brady), and Young County.

"Communities, heritage organizations and tourism associations were eligible to receive up to \$5,000 of grant monies to be used for projects that promote this region as a heritage tourism destination," said Larry Oaks, THC executive director. "Projects could include such items as interpretive exhibits, events highlighting historic sites, brochures that take travelers off the beaten path or educational materials, to name a few."

The funded projects include a horseshoe pitching contest, a billboard promoting historic murals in Breckenridge, a video educating junior-high school students about Texas forts, a library wall mural, a video depicting life in rural Texas communities in the early 20th century, a newspaper telling the story of the Texas frontier, a brochure on Central Texas culture and a special event celebrating the 150th anniversary of Fort Belknap. All advertising projects will also promote the Texas Forts Trail Region, which is a requirement to obtain the funding. The Texas Heritage Trails Program increases tourism at cultural and heritage sites in regions across Texas and revitalizes local economies through regional marketing of these sites. Additionally, the program increases awareness of the importance of historic preservation to tourism and

Eva Horton, guest speaker for the evening, showed a film on "Rehab 2001" and said all money given went to the treatment centers.


This was the 31st annual telethon with a phone bank at lvey Motor Co., giving residents an opportunity to give.


#### **December busy** month for residents



#### Bronte Longhorns dominate Roby







#### **RLISD board adopts** retirement incentives

The Robert Lee ISD Board of Trustees held its regular monthly meeting on Thursday, January 25, at 6:30 pm in the High School Library. Among items approved was a retirement incentive program designed to reduce the districts payroll budget. Reduced student enrollment over the past few years has brought a resulting reduction in state funding earned by the district. The board and administration has been considering ways to reduce district expenditures. Supt. Weldon Koepf stated, "I proposed this retirement incentive program to the board as the least disruptive and divisive alternative to reducing payroll. If we had decided to simply lay off employees, there would have been hard feelings among the staff and members of the community. This way the employee makes the decision whether they want to leave or not. Many districts across the state have done this in recent years because of declining enrollments in some areas. We have an excellent staff and hate to lose any of them, but we had to do something to reduce expenses so that our surplus funds do not keep dwindling. Personnel salaries make up about 75% of our total budget. At the rate we are spending now, in a few years we would be bankrupt.'

The program is open to professional contracted employees who have taught 20 or more years. They can choose to take regular or early retirement and will receive incentive payments based on a formula which includes a percentage of their annual salary plus pay for years of service and unused sick leave days. Staff members will have until mid-March to decide if they want to participate in the program.

In other action, the board adopted a name for the new **Distance Learning Center that** was approved in December. The Center will be named the Suzie Wilson Distance Learning Center, as a memorial to the longtime Robert Lee teacher. The Center will be housed in the classroom where Mrs. Wilson taught. Trustees also approved a proposal to move voting in school board elections to the Coke County Courthouse in Robert Lee. County officials had offered to provide theelection location so that voters will not have to travel to several locations to vote for the various governmental entities.

In other routine matters, the board approved minutes of the previous meeting, financial reports and budget amendments. They also heard reports from Principals Janet Wallace and Lindsey Wallace and Superintendent Weldon Koepf. Trustees then went into closed session to discuss the superintendent's annual appraisal. After emerging into open session the meeting was adjourned.



### COUNTRY AGENTS? NEWS

#### Garden planning

Whether you are a seasoned gardener or this is your first year to grow vegetables, take time now - before you order your seed and supplies - to plan your garden in your mind and on paper.

By sketching out your garden and deciding what crops you want to plant, you will avoid the tendency to order more seed than you need. Most gardeners are happier and more successful with a small garden than a large one. You can grow a lot of vegetables in a 10 foot by 20 foot or 20 foot x 40 foot garden. But as the size of the garden gets much larger so does the amount of time required to keep it cultivated and well cared for.

Be sure there is adequate sun-light. Most garden crops require a minimum of 6 hours of full sun per day. Providing some late afternoon shade can be beneficial, particularly as the seasons warm into June and July.

Another important consideration is to allow adequate room for each crop. With good growing conditions, tomatoes will outgrow their cages, vining crops like cucumbers and melons will take over walkways between rows. One way to help eliminate this problem without sacrificing production is to plan early maturing crops like onions, lettuce, beets, radishes be-tween rows of later maturing, warm season crops like tomatoes and vining crops we mentioned earlier. Once the early crops have been harvested you can allow this extra space to become part of your walkways.

Also, be sure to practice good crop rotation. That crop or related crops in the same place year after year. This will help reduce disease and insect problems during the growing season. By putting things down on paper before you get started even those who garden in the. smallest of spaces can implement a good rotation plan.

Varieties

For your primary choices be sure to pick from the All-Texas Selections. These are workhorse varieties that have been tried and proven to grow well in all parts of Texas. It is okay, and downright fun, to experiment with a few new and interesting varieties that you may find in a seed catalog. Just do not let them become your mainstays until proven or you may be disappointed.


#### Timing

Choosing when to plant your garden crops is the next most crucial step: plant too early and you risk freeze dam-. age, plant too late and your plants will have the opposite problem-hotter, dryer weather and increased insect pressure. There are a few exceptions to this rule. Southern peas and okra actually prefer hotter weather and are great choices to replace cool season crops in late spring. A list of planting date suggestions are available in the County Extension office.

#### **Other Considerations**

This is also, as we have said many times before, a good time to have a soil test done so you will know exactly what elements you need to add to your garden. The County Extension office has soil test bags and instructions for you to use to send your samples into the soil lab. The small cost of this test is well worth it in terms of increased production and enjoyment from your garden.

If you have not already done so, now is the perfect time to add organic matter to your



smelling material is not really "compost" because it has not fully decomposed. Avoid purchasing this "almost compost" or set it aside for use later in the season.


A handout on Planning
