Early local election voting begins April 18

Early voting for the local May 5 elections will begin April 18 and continue through May 1. The election will fill vacancies on a number of local governing boards.

Blackwell candidate forum

On Thursday, April 19, 2001, Blackwell Parent-Teacher Organization is hosting a Candidate Forum at 7 pm in the old gym at Blackwell School. All candidates for the Blackwell Consolidated Independent School District school board have been invited to participate, and all voters in the Blackwell Consolidated Independent School taxing district are urged to attend. A moderator will ask questions that each candidate will have a chance to answer. A reception will follow the Forum, and voters will have an opportunity to talk to candidates individually.

Three positions on the BCISD school board are to be filled. Nine community members have filed for these positions: Martha Ashton, Paul Gothard, Bruce Holland, Dale Keiner, Grady Ragland, Shane Robertson, Charlie Roland Jr. (incumbent), James Sanderson, and Jamie Walker (incumbent). The election is May 5, 2001; voting will be at Blackwell School. Come meet the candidates and hear why they want to be on your school board.

Three candidates will vie for two - 3 year terms on the Bronte Independent School District Board of Trustees.

RLISD board election canceled

The Robert Lee ISD Board of Trustees held a special meeting on Wednesday, April 4, at 8:30 pm. The board voted to cancel the regular trustee election that had been called for May 5.

The cancellation is made possible by changes to the Texas Election Code a few years ago. The code provides that if all candidates in an election are unopposed, the jurisdiction may cancel the election and declare the candidates to be duly elected.

The Robert Lee board had two at-large positions that were up for election. There were only two candidates who had applied for a place on the ballot. They are Darrel Pitcock, an incumbent and currently president of the board; and Bill Burns. Mark Riley had originally signed up as a candidate, but withdrew his name by the withdrawal deadline of March 30.

Darrel Pitcock and Bill Burns were declared duly elected and will be officially installed after the May 5 election date.

A second item on Wednesday's agenda was the consideration of calling a special election to fill the two vacancies created by the resigna-tions of trustees Ray Aldridge and Harvey Wojtek. After discussion, the board decided not to call a special election. The major reason mentioned was the short timeline. The legal deadline for calling a special election is 30 days before the election date, which is May 5. By law, prospective candidates would have only a 5-day window of time to apply

Home lawn care

Site evaluation: Evaluate your lawn for high spots, low spots, and ruts made from equipment because these areas will most likely cause scalping. Take the time to level out the lawn surface with the addition of soil. To reduce rutting, lift the sod with a sharp spade and place topsoil underneath, then replace sod and keep that area moist for several days to a week to encourage a healthy root system redeveloping. Is your lawn smooth enough to mow with a reel mower? Is it smooth enough to mow at the optimal mowing height for your grass variety without continual scalping damage? Scalping will most certainly put the grass at a disadvantage and eventually lead to the decline of the lawn's quality.

Selecting the right mowing height: It is essential that you mow your particular grass variety at or near the optimal mowing height because this will keep that grass the healthiest and most dense (highest number of shoots per unit area). Higher density means more soil surface shading, which severely restricts the germination of many annual grassy and broadleaf weeds. Maintaining a dense and healthy turf is the best weed control. Selecting the right mowing height also means selecting the right mower for the job. Do not put money into a high density Bermuda grass or zoysia grass hybrid variety and expect to mow it at 3 inches with a rotary mower and expect a high quality lawn. Many of the varieties available today require mowing height at or below 1 inch, which cannot be done effectively with a rotary mower. Some general mowing height requirements of common grass species are given below in variety, the range of mowing height and the optimal mowing height. Buffalo grass has a range of 2-4.5 inches and optimal height of 2.5 inches; Common Bermuda grass has a range of 1-2.5 inches and optimal height of 1.5; Hybrid Bermuda grass has a range of 0.75 to 2 inches and optimal height of 0.75 inches; St. Augustine

grass has a range of 2.5 to 4 inches and optimal height of 2.5 inches.

How often do I mow?: This question deserves an "it depends" answer. You will have to play it by ear for every different season, weather, nutrient availability change, etc...The best rule to follow is NEVER TAKE MORE THAN 1/3 OF THE LEAF BLADE OFF AT ANY ONE TIME. If you have piles of clippings left after each mowing then you are mowing too infrequently. For a good example, consider a farmer's hay field, they go out there and remove close to 80% of the leaf surface of those grass plants and subsequently the grass left after the hay is baled turns a golden tan color. This happens because the grass plants are not capable of recovering from that amount of stress for quite a while. The small amount of leaf surface left is not enough to maintain the physiological activities (photosynthesis) for plant energy. Grass plants have a "growing point" where all of the leaves originate - and that growing point is near the soil surface when the grass is mowed frequently. When people let their lawns get really "hairy" that growing point begins to elevate from the soil surface and when the mower does finally come through the growing point may be cut and removed with the rest of the clippings - this results in that plant's death. Frequent mowing, never removing more than 1/3 of the grass blade ensures that the growing point will stay near the soil surface and the turf will stay healthier and denser. Blade sharpening: Maintaining a sharp mower blade, whether rotary or reel, is essential in maintaining turf health. A smooth, clean cut not only looks better for the lawn, but it also does much less damage to the grass plant. When you have a dull mower blade - you are "thrashing" or "beating" the tops of the grass blades off. This leaves a ragged top which becomes straw colored. This gives a lawn a "tannish" hue and leaves the grass wide open for insect and disease encroachment. These

ragged tops are prime points of entry for many fungal pathogens (turf disease causers) and small turf insects.


Be sure to have your mower blade checked and sharpened frequently - at least once a year. You can adequately sharpen a rotary mower blade with a good bench grinder and a tub of cold water. Here are a few steps to take when sharpening. First of all - wear safety glasses when grinding. Try to keep the original angle on the mower blade by making smooth, quick swipes across the grinding wheel. Dip the blade in cold water after every few swipes across the grinding wheel so you don't lose "temper" in the steel. If you see blue in the blade where you are grinding - that means that the temper is lost in that area and that steel is now very soft - there will most likely be a chip there next time you check your blade. Be very careful with the sharpening process and use the cold water judiciously. After you are finished grinding the blade angle, test to see if the blade is properly balanced. Place the blade on a thin pole through the center hole of the blade. If it wants to fall to one side - that side is heavier. You will need to grind off some more steel on the heavy side to balance the blade. You don't need to grind more of the angle down - just grind a little steel off the back side or a corner of the blade. When you have the blade properly balanced - take a file and file off the burrs left behind by the grinder.

If you don't feel comfortable with grinding your own blades, check around for a service in your area that will do it for a few bucks.

Kid's Pre-K Program

Senator Robert Duncan (R-Lubbock) filed legislation that would give school districts the option of making public prekindergarten classes available to all children. Under current law, disadvantaged children who meet certain criteria may receive a half-day of free prekindergarten classes. This bill expands the program to give all Texas children the opportunity for a public school, prekindergarten education on a tuition basis.


"The long-term benefit is that we get more kids into the structure of learning at an early age," said Senator Duncan. The bill provides that the fee structure only cover actual costs of operation. "This bill will not cost taxpayers any additional funds." Senate Bill 596, known as the Kid's Pre-K Program, will be optional for school districts across the state of Texas. Senator Duncan says, "It's not our intention to force this on districts that don't have a need, but it will be a great benefit for those districts that do want to provide this option." Parents, whose children currently receive a half-day of free Pre-K, will have the option of full-day Pre-K for their children if they pay for the additional half-day. Parents not eligible for free tuition under the current program must pay for services.

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For those planning an Easter Egg Hunt, the best and the safest place to start is in the supermarket. Most people ordinarily open cartons to check eggs before they buy them, but it helps to make the inspection a careful one.

Make sure all the eggs are clean and free of cracks. If cracked eggs are accidentally purchased, throw them away. Cracks allow microorganisms such as Salmonella to enter and contaminate the eggs.

Cooking eggs thoroughly will kill Salmonella, but raw or undercooked eggs can transmit this bacterium, notorious for causing food-borne illness. Those highly susceptible to such illnesses are the very young, the elderly, pregnant women and people with weak immune systems.

Eggs should be refrigerated in their cartons. Although many refrigerators have egg slots on the doors, they are not the best place to put eggs because the temperature may fluctuate as the door is opened. Store eggs in a section of the refrigerator where the temperature is constant.

For a safer Easter Egg Hunt follow these steps when preparing eggs:


*Keep eggs refrigerated until you are ready to prepare them. Do not let them sit at room temperature for more than two hours before or after cooking.

*Eggs should be hard boiled - until the yolks and whites are firm. Do not stack eggs on top of each other in the pot. This could cause uneven cooking. Put eggs in cold tap water and bring them to a rapid boil. The Food and Drug Administration recommends boiling eggs for at least seven minutes for safety reasons. Then, remove the eggs from the pot and cool under running water.

*Place the cooked eggs in the refrigerator until it's time to decorate them. Once they are decorated, put them back in the refrigerator until time for the hunt.

*Be sure eggs are hidden and gathered in a short period of time. Hard-boiled eggs are still perishable and should not be left at room temperature for more than two hours.

*Those eggs that are not eaten immediately after the hunt should be discarded. Eggs not used in the hunt can be stored in the refrigerator
