County-Wide Beer Election Called for July 31st The County Commissioners Court at a regular session of their court Monday, July 14, called a countywide local option election to be held Thurs. July 31, two weeks from yesterday. This election will determine whether or not the sale of beer, containing alcohol, not exceeding 4 per cent by weight, shall be sold in Callahan county.

The petition presented to the court was signed by more than 10 percent of the qualified voters of the county taking the votes for governor at the last general election as a basis for determining the qualified voters of Callahan county.

The election is county-wide the date is Thursday. July 31st. Beer is sold at only two places

in the county-Baird and Putnam.


