First ever Street Affair in RL promises a family fun outing



Sales Tax proposition to be on Robert Lee ballot

The Economic Development Sales Tax proposition will be on the Robert Lee City ballot for early voting beginning October 22, 2001. The regular polls will be open Tuesday, November 6. Voting will take place in the Coke County Courthouse from 7:00 am to 7:00 pm. The opportunity to vote in any election is especially relative in these times.

The ballot for the city economic development sales tax will be in two parts. Part 4A will be a short description of how funds are to be used. Part 4A funds can be used for manufacturing and industrial development which will create jobs in this area. There will be a corporation of five members of the community who will allocate the funds. These members will be trained to maximize the spending of the income. The 4A 1/2 cent proposition will be shown first on the ballet.

The ballot will also contain a description of economic development sales tax Part 4B. Part 4B 1/2 cent proposition provides cities with revenues to improve the quality of life of the town and residents. The description is very long and covers most of the possible expenditures. A seven-member citizen corporation will be trained to allocate these funds. There will be at least one public hearing on the proposed projects.

There are more than 400 cities in Texas currently using the economic development sales tax to upgrade and promote their cities. The sales tax is paid by tourists, temporary residents, travelers, people who live in the area and shop in Robert Lee as well as permanent residents.

The economic development sales tax passage will show that Robert Lee is willing to support itself. A family with an income of \$35,000 will pay approximately \$25 a year toward economic development. That's two trips to MacDonalds. Robert Lee citizens have been paying economic development sales tax in San Angelo, Bronte, Abilene, Colorado City and 400 plus other places throughout the state.


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Coke County Library news

Texas Parks and Wildlife Department 2001-2002 general deer harvest recommendations

Landowners and hunters are reminded that the general deer hunting season in Coke County will open Saturday, November 3, 2001 and continue through January 6, 2002. The legal bag limit in Coke County is 5 deer, no more than 2 bucks. No special permits are required for harvesting antlerless deer, however, both bucks and antlerless deer must be properly tagged with an appropriate tag from a valid hunting license. There will be a special late general antlerless and spike deer season which runs from Jan. 7, 2002 and runs through Jan. 20, 2002. Bag limit restricted to antlerless and spike deer only.

Deer populations vary from area to area and even from ranch to ranch. The either sex regulation allows landowners and hunters the flexibility to harvest antlerless deer on his/her property in order to keep deer numbers in balance with available food supply. It does not automatically mean that a heavy antierless deer harvest is needed. The recommended harvest rates for both bucks and antierless deer, provided by the department, should be used only as a general guideline for harvesting deer. If more intense management is desired, we suggest that landmanagers survey their own properties. This will allow for a more accurate representation of deer numbers on their ranch. Please note that in most cases the department recommends more antlerless deer to be harvested than bucks.

The recommended guideline for harvesting antierless deer throughout most of Coke County is 1 antierless deer per 250 acres. The recommended harvest rate on bucks is 1 per 300 acres.

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Walk across Texas

Approximately 55 percent of the U.S. population is overweight or obese. Maintaining a normal weight requires a balance between calories taken in and used for energy. Previous generations ate a lot more calories, but they worked a lot harder. They walked many places whereas today we drive even short distances. Instead of working in the fields, we sit at our computers. On our way home, we stop for fast food and spend an average of three or more hours watching television in the evening.

Too many calories and too much sitting are strongly linked to weight gain. A recent study found that our children are gaining weight too for the same reasons. Overweight parents tend to have overweight children. Overweight people are more likely to have high blood pressure, diabetes, some types of cancer, and joint problems related to arthritis.

Can this trend be reversed? The answer is yes, but if you have tried to lose weight and increase your activity level, you know changing is not easy. Eating high caloric foods and sitting in front of the television is much easier.

Changing eating and activity patterns requires effort and planning. Spend time learning about whether or not you need to lose weight and if you can safely begin an activity program. Learn about your options. Just because you have tried before and not been successful does not mean you cannot be successful this time.

Losing weight and increasing activity does not mean you have to suffer or spend a lot of money for special foods, pills, books, or equipment. People who went from an average weight of 210 to an average of 145 pounds and maintained their loss for an average of 5 1/2 years attributed their success to controlling calorie intake, limiting portion sizes, eating five meals each day, never skipping meals, eating out no more than three times each week with only one of those times at a fast food restaurant, and using up about 2,700 calories a week in physical activity beyond that required for daily activities like gardening or housecleaning. A majority of these 629 successful losers in the National Weight Control Registry said they had been overweight since childhood or had a family history of obesity.

Getting started is hard. Programs claiming quick weight loss with little or no effort end up helping remove little more than your dollars.



AN ORDINANCE PROHIBIT-

ING THE SALE AND DISCHARGE OF FIREWORKS WITHIN THE CITY LIMITS OF THE CITY OF BRONTE, REPEALING ALL ORDINANCES IN CONFLICT HEREWITH, AND DECLARED AN EMERGENCY.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF BRONTE, TEXAS:

SECTION 1: The term "fire-works" shall mean and include any firecracker, torpedo, sky-rocket, Roman candle, sparkler, or other similar combustible explosive device used for audio or visual effect. SECTION 2: No person, firm, company, corporation or association shall cast, throw or fire any combustible fireworks of any kind in the city limits of the City of Bronte, Texas.

SECTION 3: It shall be unlawful for any person to offer for sale, or to receive compensation for transferring or selling fireworks of any description

within the City Limits of Bronte, Texas.

SECTION 6: Any person who shall violate any of the provisions of this ordinance shall be subject to a fine of not more than Five Hundred Dollars (\$500.00) for each and every violation hereof.

SECTION 9: In view of the fact that this ordinance is necessary for the immediate protection and preservation of the public health, safety and general welfare, it becomes necessary that this ordinance shall be in full force immediately upon its passage and publication of the caption of this ordinance in the Observer/Enterprise according to law.

Among the dozens of special activities scheduled for Lone Star Legacy Weekend are:

-Bicycle and foot races

-Fishing and surfing contests

-Crafts and folkways demonstrations

-Live folk, bluegrass and cowboy concerts

-Halloween hayrides and other events

-Guided tours of nature trails, park facilities and hatcheries

-Native American storytelling, dancing and arrowhead making

-Seminars on how to camp, waterfowl-calling, native plants and water quality

-Living history demonstrations by Buffalo soldiers and other frontier troops, cowboy cooks, the Texas Camel Corps and Mexican vaqueros

"Lone Star Legacy Weekend is our chance to roll out the red carpet and welcome everyone to come celebrate our fantastic system of facilities with free entry all weekend," said Andrew Sansom, TPW executive director. "My belief is that they will find places worth supporting. The goal of Lone Star Legacy is for every site to have an operating endowment that will grow through the years, so that eventually interest income will be significant to help sustain our parks and other sites through lean budget years or bad weather."

Although no entrance fees will be charged at TPW sites Oct. 20-21, donations will be accepted at participating facilities. Overnight camping and other fees, such as admission to the Texas State Railroad. will still apply. 
RLVFD news


