


Bronte watering schedule reminder

Watering is permitted at anytime if it is by means of a handheld hose, faucet filled bucket or watering can of five (5) gallons or less, or drip irrigation. Soaker hoses are not considered to be "drip irrigation".

Use of water to fill pools, wash down structures or sidewalks or wash any motor vehicle is prohibited.





2002 Pecan nut casebearer spray

From observation made throughout the Concho Valley, it appears that control sprays should be applied May 15th through May 21st.

The adult pecan nut casebearer is a gray moth about 1/3 inch long. These moths fly at night and spend the day in concealment. The casebearer moth deposits from 50 to 150 eggs on the tips of developing nutlets. These eggs are barely visible by the naked eye and are greenish white when first laid.

The first generation larva hatch in four to five days and migrate below to feed on buds. Nut penetration follows a day or two after this outside activity. This is the critical state of control. When young worms are working over a cluster of pecans, they deposit waste material in pellets around the entrance holes. When this frass is observed, control becomes difficult. Chemical sprays will not penetrate the nut to kill the burrowing worms. Complete clusters can be destroyed by one developing casebearer larva. All indications are that a light to moderate population of casebearers are present this year.

Pecan nut casebearer pheremone traps began catching adult moths as early as April 22, Traps catches have 2002. peaked around the 8th - 10th of May in area orchards. Individual observations and egg counts are still recommended as the best means of timing application and to keep informed of the need for a second spray, 10 days following the first. Most growers are reporting light trap catches.

Many pecan trees have a surprisingly large nut sets following the drought and heavy crop last year. These trees might best spend their energy on developing a healthy canopy of leaves. Therefore, spraying these trees for pecan nut casebearer and saving all the pecans might be counter-productive to the overall tree health.

good leaf production and filled Vegetative shoots on nuts. bearing trees should grow 6 to 12 inches annually. Ones making more than 12 inches of shoot growth are receiving too much nitrogen. Apply nitrogen fertilizer beginning in early spring before pecan buds begin to break. Two or three applications may be necessary to obtain the needed growth especially if you are limited on water availability.

Suggested control measures for homeowners for pecan nut casebearer include Malathion using two and a half teaspoons 50% liquid per gallon of water or Confirm T&O at 1/2 to 1 teaspoons 50% wettable powder per gallon of water. For additional information on pecan trees, contact the Coke County Cooperative Extension office.

Programs available

The following two free programs are now available to qualified residents of Coke County. Weatherization Program

The Weatherization Program, under direction of the Tom Green County Community Action Council, will assist lowincome persons, particularly those who are Elderly and Handicapped, improve their home energy efficiency and lower utility costs by protecting the interior of the house from external extremes of temperature. Improvements are intended to conserve energy, and are not for rehabilitation, renovation, or beautification.

A Pre-assessment of the home is done, everything, is entered into the Easy for Texas Audit and that determines what will be done to your home to save the most energy. Weatherization techniques include: insulation (attic, if roof does not leak), caulking, weather-stripping, thresholds, window glass, windows, doors, glazing, water heater blanket, insulation for hot water pipes, gaskets for

The Weatherization Program does not assist with electrical, plumbing, roofing, add-on additions or storm doors.

Assistance Program (CEAP)

The Tom Green County Community Action Council has now received funds from the Texas Department of Housing and Community Affairs for the CEAP Program. This Program is handled by the Tom Green County Community Action Council in a ten (10) county area, which includes Coke, Concho, Crockett, Irion, Kimble, Menard, Reagan, Schleicher, Sterling, and Sutton Counties. The goal of the CEAP Program is to make the Client more selfsufficient so that they will be able to pay their own utilities.

In order to qualify for the Program the Client's total annual gross income must be less than 125% of the current Federal Poverty Income Guidelines, with at least one U.S. Citizen or Legally-admitted Resident Alien. Households with Elderly, Handicapped and Children under the age of six (6) years with a Fuel Consumption of at least fifteen (15%) percent of their income will be given first priority.

The Tom Green County Community Action Council has an Outreach Worker that goes to each County one or two times per month. The Robert Lee ISD Board of Trustees held a special meeting on Thursday, May 9 at 6:30 pm in the High School library. The major reason for the meeting was to consider the hiring of a high school principal for the 2002-2003 school year.

The board voted to employ Robert Fryar for the position based on the recommendation of the campus sitebased/principal search committee. Mr. Fryar comes to Robert Lee from Sweetwater ISD where he served as assistant principal of both Sweetwater High School and Sweetwater Middle School, Brady High School, and Carlsbad New Mexico High School. He also was an assistant football coach for Angelo State University, worked

Adopt-A-Map program

Texas Land Commissioner David Dewhurst has sent to the Coke County Abstract Company and Robert Lee State Bank fullsized color commemorative copies of a 1904 Coke County map that the local businesses "adopted" through Dewhurst's successful Adopt-A-Map program.

The abstract company and bank donated funds in order for the original map to be professionally conserved and preserved for future generations.

The map is a manuscript map - meaning it's the original handdrawn artwork - showing the land grants in Coke County. J. W. Morris drew it at the General Land Office in November 1904.

The map was cleaned, mended and re-backed by professional paper conservators during a year-long process. Since its arrival back at the Texas General Land Office, it has been scanned and encapsulated in acid-free Mylar. Within months, the map's image will be placed on the Land Web Office's site at www.glo.state.tx.us in the Archives and Records Section. The precious original is permanently housed at the Land

Office headquarters in Austin. Dewhurst initiated the Adopt-A-Map program - a public/private partnership - in 2000 in order to preserve Texas' thousands of historical maps housed at the Land Office. The project is the first time a Texas Land Commissioner has embarked upon such an

aggressive preservation program. More than \$200,000 has been donated by businesses, civic and historical organizations, local governments and individuals since the program began.

Dewhurst said the idea for the Adopt-A-Map program grew out of a love of Texas and the realization that the clock was ticking down for some of the state's most important historical documents, especially about 500 maps in need of professional conservation. "When I took office in January 1999, I was amazed by the wealth of Texas history in the Land Office. As the very first agency established in the Republic of Texas, the Land Office archives stretch way back into time. These important documents and maps are the basis for all land ownership in Texas from the earliest days when Texas was a Spanish colony, through its time as a part of Mexico, on to the Texas Republic and continuing today. There are 35 million historical documents, including more than 20,000 maps, sketches and surveying field notes of the state, the old land districts, counties and cities.

"When I saw the precarious condition of many of our old maps and documents, I knew we had to do something," Dewhurst said. "They were battered by constant use, poor storage conditions in the old days, weather conditions in the old Land Office building - where open windows in the 1800s allowed humidity, dust and heat to take their toll - and wellmeaning but improper repair techniques in the past. We were in danger of losing our own history!

"So, consistent with my privatization efforts at the Land Office, we launched the Adopt-A-Map program," Dewhurst said. "We are asking businesses, individuals and community organizations to donate funds for the restoration of these maps. Once they are conserved, the Land Office will scan them and place them on the Internet for

easier access by the public. This will allow us to 'retire' the valuable originals from the copy machine.

Dewhurst noted that donations to Adopt-A-Map are tax deductible and that donors of \$500 or more will receive fullsized color copies to the maps they adopt following restoration. Under the Texas Natural Resources Code, the Land Office may accept donations from the public to conserve the maps.

Dewhurst personally made the first contribution to the Adopt-A-Map program.

"Our history connects us to our future, and preserving this link will keep history flowing from past to present to future," Dewhurst said.

Whoa! Not so fast. Sure, we have had some warm weather lately with the temperatures in the 90's, but it's still too early to leaf spray mesquite and prickly pear. Even with the Brush Busters individual plant treatment which has become so popular the last couple of years, the ground is still too cold and the plants are not fully developed to obtain adequate control of mesquite and prickly pear. I have been getting several calls on controlling brush species now that the mesquites have put out early, but we must not forget that all important "window of opportunity" that can make or break a brush control project. For leaf spraying, whether by hand or plane, that window starts once all of the mesquite leaves have turned a dark green, and the soil temperature is at least 75 degrees at a foot to 18 inches deep - anytime before that and you're wasting money - if your interested in killing mesquite that is. Even though mesquites

put on leaves earlier this year, they have not matured enough and the ground is still way too cold.

Now is also the worst time to treat prickly pear with herbicides, because the plants are moving carbohydrates upward to produce new pads and flowers. Herbicides applied too early won't be carried down the plant into the root system, a necessary step for good pear control.

The best time to treat pear aerially is in late summer until fall when the pads are mature and the fruit is a dark red. Pear can be treated by hand with some success but the optimum time to get more "bang for your buck" is still in late summer and fall.

If you have time between feeding livestock and praying for rain, now is a great time for treating small regrowth cedar with the Brush Busters leaf or soil spot spray methods. These treatments can be used year round, but are most effective when we receive rain two to three weeks following treatment.

So, if you are after mesquite and prickly pear, better wait until the time is right or you may well be throwing good money out the window, and I'm sure it won't be the window of opportunity either.

If you wait until the time is right, using the Brush Busters treatment for pear and mesquite can obtain excellent results. We have had several demonstration plots around this area the last several years and have obtained almost complete control of small mesquite, cedar and pear.

That might not have impressed her, she said, if he had not further said, "Ethel, if you will pattern after Miss Edith and grow up into a fine young lady like her, I will sometime name a post office Ethel." Ethel didn't tell anyone of this ambition of hers, shadowing Miss Edith to see how she stood, walked and talked. She thought Edith's dignified, snowy haired parents must

Texas Civil War monument dedicated

The Texas Historical Commission (THC) dedicated a monument to Texas soldiers who fought in the Civil War battle of Raymond,

Mississippi at a May 4 ceremony in that community. The monument commemorates 7th Texas Infantry soldiers who participated in the May 12, 1863 battle of Raymond under Col. Hiram B. Granbury. The battle was part of the Union army's larger efforts to capture the strategic port city of Vicksburg on the Mississippi River, where the THC rededicated a restored monument to Texas soldiers in 2001. The Battle of Raymond, in which 22 Texans died, 73 were wounded and an additional 63 were missing in action, is considered a precursor to the siege of Vicksburg.

"The Battle of Raymond is a fine example of the courage and determination exhibited by Texas troops under fire," said THC Executive Director Larry Oaks.

Safety belt enforcement campaign

Police called it a "miracle of safety technology" that 17year-old Lindsay Canright of Austin is alive today after a devastating car orash.

About a year ago, after school had let out for the summer, Lindsay was driving down the freeway with two of her best friends in the car. Out of nowhere an SUV swerved in front of her. She turned the wheel sharply to avoid hitting it and consequently spun off the road and crashed.

The front and rear windshields of her car were The car was smashed. totaled. But because everyone in the car was buckled up, the only injuries Lindsay or her friends sustained were minor bruises from the airbags deploying.

Unfortunately, serious car crashes like Lindsay's are all too common in Texas. In fact, the Lone Star State leads the nation in traffic fatalities. That's why TxDOT and the Texas Department of Public Safety recently launched a special statewide safety belt public education and enforcement campaign called "Click It or Ticket."

From May 20 through June 2, DPS and local law enforcement officers will participate in a statewide crackdown on drivers and passengers who fail to buckle up or buckle up children.

Reminders carrying the "Click It or Ticket" message will be delivered via television and radio announcements and on billboards around the state during May.

Lindsay sums up her experience. "The simple, easy task of buckling a safety belt saved my life and the lives of my two best friends."

"When safety belt use in Texas reaches 85 percent, we estimate that each year 241 lives will be saved and 5,275 nonfatal injuries will be prevented," said Dr. Jeffrey Runge, NHTSA administrator. "The state could also save an estimated \$392 million dollars in associated societal costs."

Transportation officials hope to increase the safety belt usage rate by nine percent, raising it from 76 pering yourself in a crash isn't enough, law enforcement will give you another reason to buckle up: a citation that can cost you from \$25 to \$200, plus court costs," said DPS Lt. Colonel Frankie Waller.

42-2tc ORDINANCE # 348 AN ORDINANCE PERTAINING TO JUNKED VEHICLES;

DEFINING TERMS; DECLARING JUNKED VEHICLES A PUBLIC NUISANCE; PROVIDING FOR

NOTICE TO ABATE SUCH PUBLIC NUISANCE; PROVIDING FOR A HEARING; PROVIDING

FOR THE DISPOSAL OF JUNKED VEHICLES; PROVIDING A PENALTY; AND

ESTABLISHING AN EFFECTIVE DATE.

WHEREAS, the City Council of Bronte, Texas declares intent to define and eliminate junk vehicles and disabled vehicles as a public nuisance to enhance the safety and well-being of the citizens; NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF BRONTE, TEXAS: **A. JUNKED VEHICLES AS**

PUBLIC NUISANCE SECTION 1. DEFINITIONS.

Junk Vehicle. A vehicle that is self-propelled and:

(1) does not have lawfully attached to it:

(A) an unexpired license plate; or
 (B) a valid motor vehicle inspection certificate; and

(2) is:

(A) wrecked, dismantled or partially dismantled, or discarded; or

(B) inoperable and has remained inoperable for more than:

(i) 72 consecutive hours, if the vehicle is on public property; or

(ii) 30 consecutive days, if the vehicle is on private property.

SECTION 8. AUTHORITY TO ENFORCE.

The Ordinance Enforcement Officer or his agent may enter private property for the purposes specified in this ordinance to examine a vehicle or vehicle part, obtain information as to the identity of the vehicle, and remove or cause the removal of a vehicle or vehicle part that constitutes a nuisance. An appropriate court in the City of Bronte or Coke County may issue orders necessary to enforce the procedures and be fined not more than \$500 except for health violations which may be fined not more than \$2000. Each day such violation continues, or be permitted to continue, shall be a separate offense.

F. EFFECTIVE DATE.

The Ordinance shall become effective as of the 20th of May, 2002. This Ordinance will supersede any and all previous Ordinances of the City of Bronte regarding junked, wrecked, and dismantled vehicles. PASSED AND APPROVED THIS 9TH DAY OF MAY, 2002.

ORDINANCE NO. 349 AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY

OF BRONTE, TEXAS, DEFINING PUBLIC NUISANCES ON REAL PROPERTY, AND PROVIDING REMEDIES AND PENALTIES FOR PUBLIC NUISANCES.

WHEREAS, The City Council of Bronte, Texas declare intent to define and eliminate public nuisances to enhance the safety and wellbeing of its Citizens;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF BRONTE, TEXAS: A. NUISANCE ON REAL

PROPERTY SECTION 1. NUISANCE ON PRIVATE PROPERTY DEFINED. For the purposes of this ordinance, the term "nuisance" is defined to mean any condition or use of premises or of building exteriors which is detrimental to the property of others or which causes or tends to cause substantial diminution in the value of other property in the neighborhood in which such premises is located. A nuisance is a condition or thing to be or act, or omission that either:

(a) Injures or endangers the comfort, health, or safety of others; or

(b) Offends decency; or

(c) Is offensive to the senses; or (d) Unlawfully interferes with, obstructs or tends to obstruct or renders dangerous for its intended use any public or private street, highway, sidewalk, stream, creek, waterway, ditch, or drainage; or

(e) In any way unreasonably renders other persons insecure in life or the use of property; or

(f) Essentially interferes with the comfortable enjoyment of life and property, or tends to depreciate the value of the property of others. B. WEEDS, ETC.

SECTION 1. MAXIMUM GROWTH It shall be unlawful for any person, firm, corporation, partnership, association of persons, owner, agent, occupant or anyone having supervision, possession or control of any lot, tract, parcel of land or portion thereof, occupied or unoccupied, improved or unimproved, within the corporate limits of the City to suffer or permit vegetation other than cultivated crops or vegetation maintained for landscaping purposes to grow to a height greater than twelve (12) inches on any lot, tract, parcel

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of land or portion thereof within the corporate limits of the City which is adjacent to any public street or road extending back from said street or road a reasonable distance as determined under the circumstances, but in any circumstance not less than twenty five (25) feet or within one hundred (100) feet of any lot, tract, parcel of land or portion thereof that is occupied by a residence or business within the corporate limits of the City.

D. FINE.

Persons found in violation of this ordinance, and found guilty by a judge of the Municipal Court, will be guilty of a Class "C" Misdemeanor, and be fined not more than \$500 except for health violations which may be fined not more than \$2000. Each day such violation continues,

or be permitted to continue, shall be a separate offense. The Ordinance will supersede any and all previous Ordinances of the

City of Bronte regarding public nuisances on real property and providing remedies and penalties for public nuisances. PASSED. APPROVED AND

PUBLIC NOTICE OF APPLICATION TO ESTABLISH RATES

Pursuant to Section 104.103 of the Texas Utilities Code, TXU Lone Star Pipeline (TXU LSP), a division of TXU Gas Company, hereby gives notice of intent to establish a supplemental firm transportation rate and an interruptible transportation rate designed to recover the costs of constructing and operating a 76.5-mile, 24-inch pipeline extending from the Bridgeport area in Wise County to the junction of Lines W and W7 in Denton County and then in an easterly direction to the junction of Lines D 17-9 and D9 in Collin County, hereinafter called the "Northside Project." The supplemental firm rate and interruptible rate are proposed to be charged upon the initiation of service on the Northside Project. The proposed supplemental firm rate constitutes a major change and will result in an annual increase in the revenues of TXU LSP of approximately \$9.8 million. These revenues will represent an 8% increase in the total revenues of TXU LSP.

The proposed supplemental firm transportation rate will be applicable to all firm transportation customers contracting for capacity on the Northside Project. The only current customer directly affected by the supplemental firm transportation rate will be TXU Gas Distribution. No other customer has agreed to contract for firm capacity on the Northside Project. The supplemental firm rate may, however, indirectly affect all residential and commercial customers served by TXU Gas Distribution in the state of Texas. The supplemental firm rate will be assessed to TXU Gas Distribution for its contracted capacity on the Northside Project in addition to the city gate rate approved in the Railroad Commission of Texas (Commission) Gas Utilities Docket (GUD) No. 8976. The supplemental firm rate may then be passed on to TXU Gas Distribution's residential and commercial customers. If any other transportation customers contract for firm capacity on the Northside Project, those customers may also pay the supplemental firm transportation rate in addition to any other applicable rates charged such customers.

TXU LSP also proposes an interruptible transportation rate for the use of the Northside Project. To the extent that shippers other than firm transportation customers use the Northside Project, they will be charged this interruptible rate. TXU LSP proposes to reduce the proposed supplemental firm transportation rate charged to firm customers on the Northside Project through an annual revenue crediting mechanism based on revenues from the interruptible rate approved in this proceeding. Construction of the Northside Project is estimated to be completed in approximately 23 months after approval of this rate application. The proposed supplemental firm rate and interruptible rate will be effective on June 4, 2002, but will not be charged until the initiation of service on the Northside Project and will be charged for an initial seven year period. TXU LSP further proposes to reconcile the projected capital costs with those actually incurred and to adjust the supplemental firm transportation rate and interruptible transportation rate accordingly. A Statement of Intent to make such change has been filed with the Commission in GUD Docket No. 9292 and is available for inspection at the Commission's office at 1701 North Congress, Austin, Texas, and at the offices of TXU LSP at 301 South Harwood, Dallas, Texas. Copies of the Statement of Intent have also been sent to the appropriate city official of each incorporated city served by TXU Gas Distribution. Any affected person may file written comments or a protest concerning the proposed changes in the rates with the Docket Services Section of the Office of General Counsel, Railroad Commission of Texas, P.O. Box 12967, Austin, Texas 78711-2967, at any time on or before June 17, 2002.
