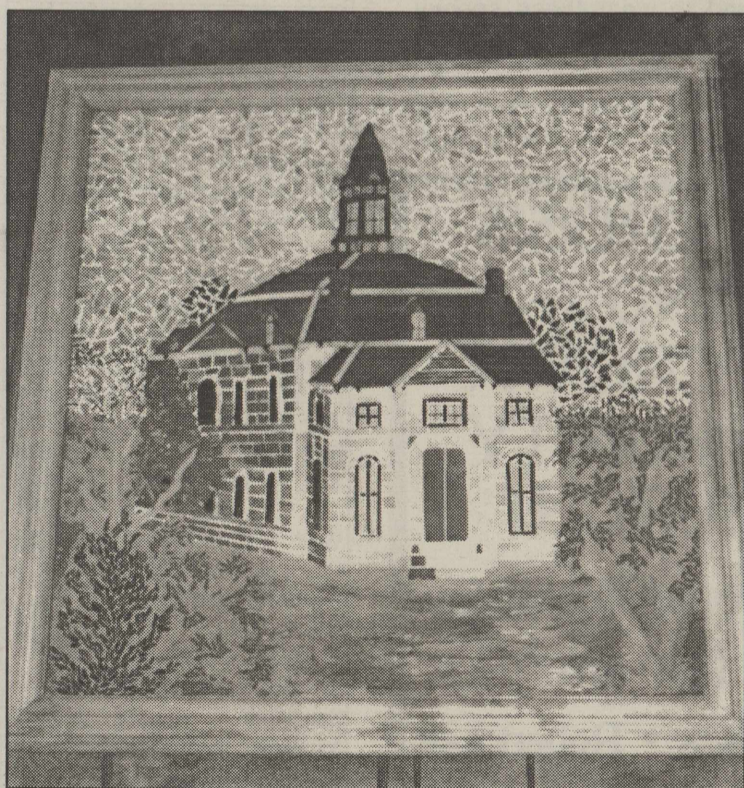

It also teaches girls important safety and communication skills and can help improve their self-esteem.

All of the money raised in this program stays within the council's jurisdiction, which

covers a large amount of West Texas including Coke County. The funds help troops purchase supplies, finance trips and outings, and purchase badges and other awards. The council uses the profit to provide girls with activities, train adult volunteers, and maintain the local facilities.

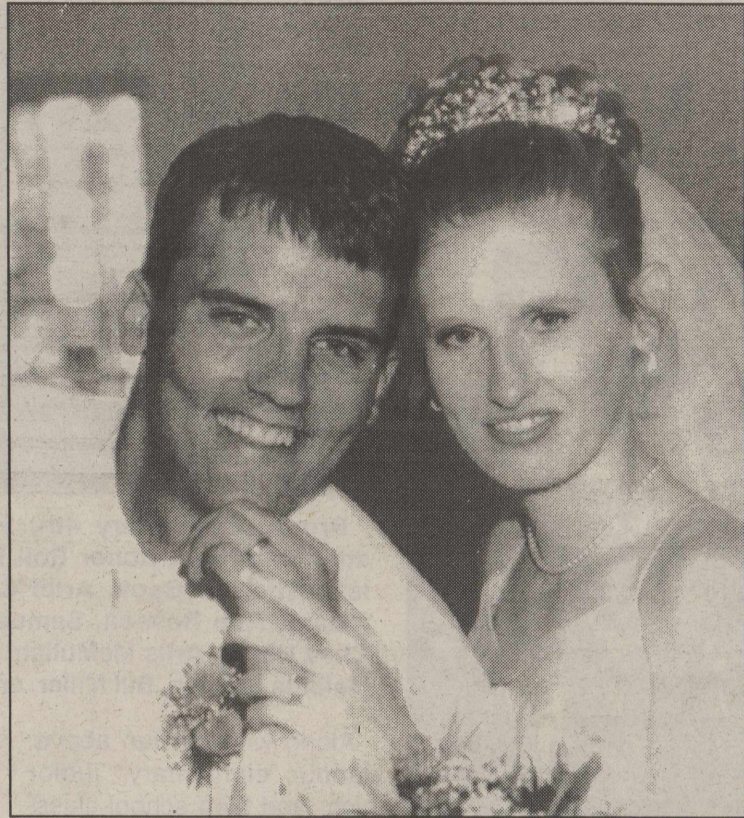

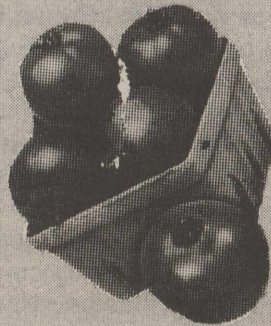

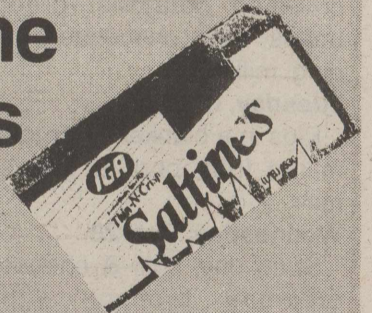

Horns post victory over Eden

The Longhorns started district play Friday with an impressive 19-8 victory over the Sterling City Eagles. The Longhorn defense held the Eagles to nine first downs and 185 total yards, while the Bronte offense gained 321 yards, including 272 yards rushing and 17 first downs.

After a scoreless first quarter, Bronte opened up the scoring 29 seconds into the second quarter on a touch-down pass from Cody Lee to Garrett Fiveash that covered 46 yards. Fiveash kicked the PAT for a 7-0 Longhorn lead, a lead that held until half-time. With 1:56 left in the third quarter, the Eagles took the lead 8-7. On the ensuing drive Bronte marched down the field and reclaimed the lead 13-8. The rest of the game the Longhorn defense dominated and the Longhorns tacked on one more score on a Jesse Rodriguez run, to make the final score 19-8.

The Longhorns will play Roby here on Friday night at 7:30.

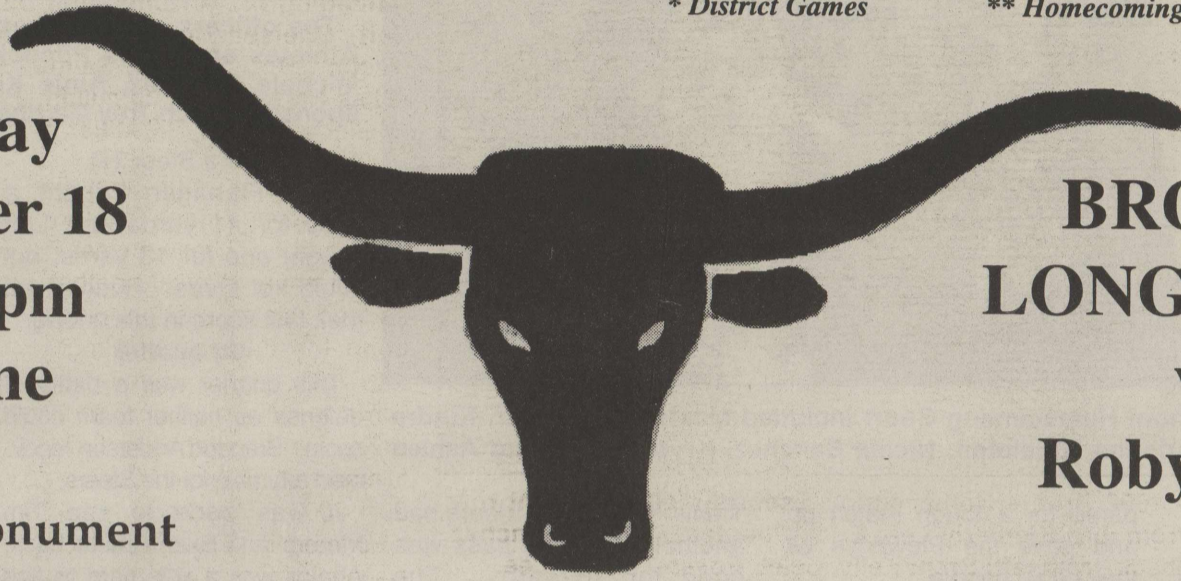

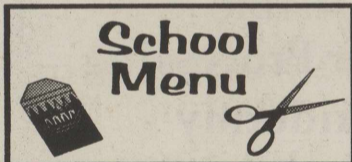
On their next possession the Dogies again drove the ball down the field, but Roscoe

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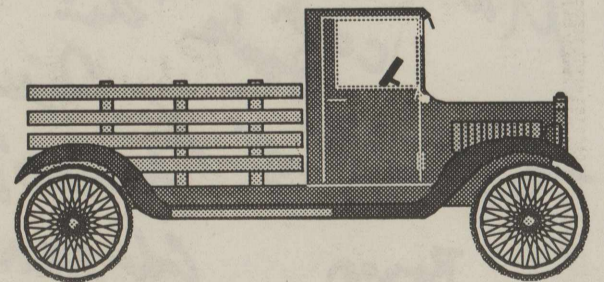

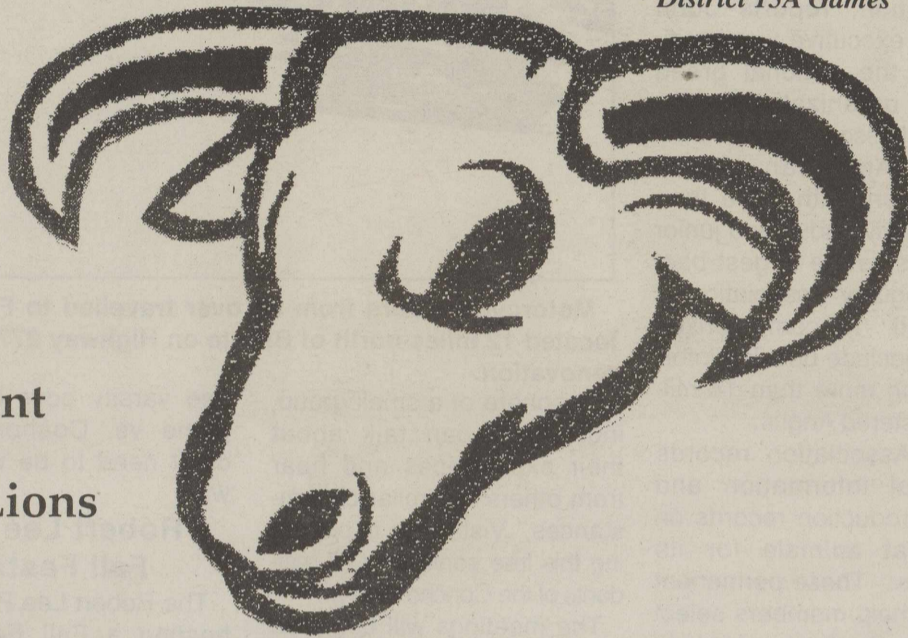

Jacobs joins Angus Association

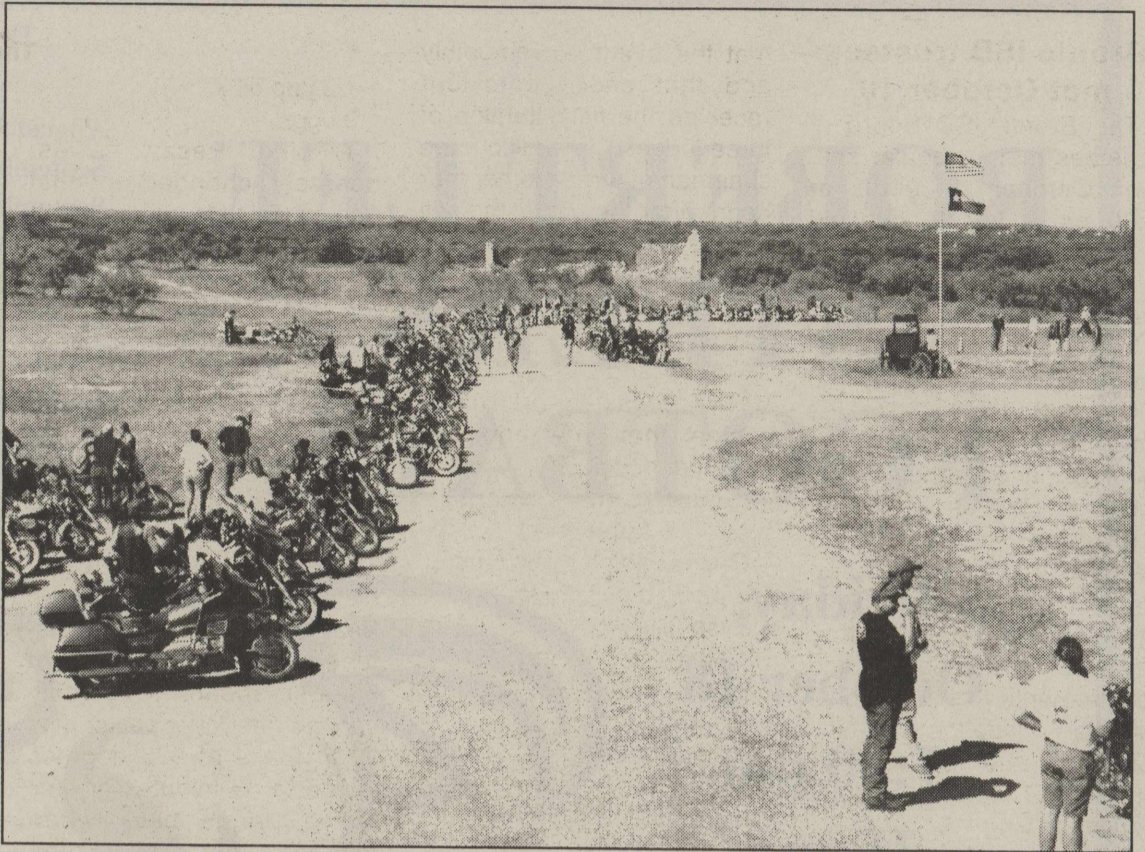

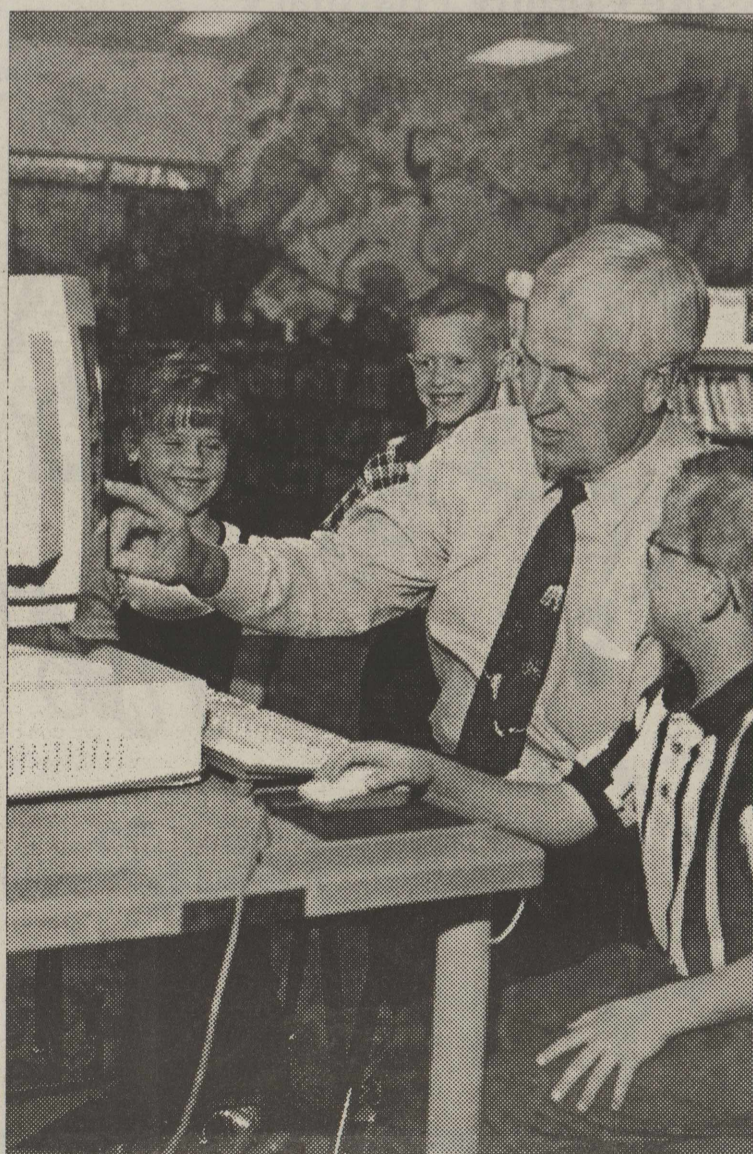

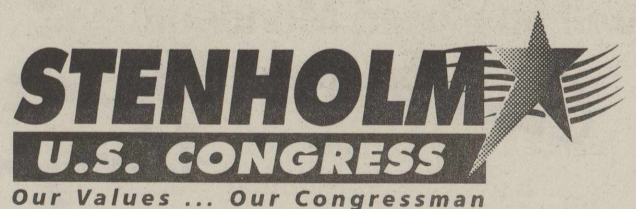

Sour Cream, Blueberry, Apple Pie

One single crust pie crust.

3/4 cup brown sugar

2 tsp. cinnamon

1/4 tsp. salt

2 tbsp. flour

1 cup sour cream

1 egg-beaten

1/2 tsp. lemon juice

1 large Granny Smith apple-peeled and thinly sliced

1 cup blueberries

Place crust in 9" pie pan. In mixing bowl, combine brown sugar, cinnamon, salt and flour. Then stir in sour cream, egg, vanilla and lemon juice. Add apples and toss to coat. Add blueberries and gently fold all ingredients. Pour mixture into pie crust and bake 15 minutes at 400 degrees - then reduce temperature to 350 degrees and continue to bake for 30 minutes. Top with crumb topping (recipe below) and bake 20 minutes at 400 degrees. Crumb Topping: 1/3 cup sugar, 1/3 cup flour/ 1 tsp. cinnamon, 1/2 stick softened butter. Use pastry blender to mix all ingredients.

In the Quick and Easy category, Cissy Torres won with the following recipe.

Chocolate Praline Layer Cake

1 and 1/2 cups butter or margarine

1/2 cup whipping cream

1 cup brown sugar, packed

1/4 cup coarsely chopped pecans

1 (18.25 oz.) package pudding-included devil's food cake mix

1 and 1/4 cups water

1/3 cup oil

3 eggs

Topping: Pecan halves, coarsely chopped-optional and chocolate syrup-optional.

Directions: Preheat oven to 325 degrees. Combine butter, whipping cream and brown sugar in a small heavy saucepan. Cook over low heat just until butter is melted, stirring occasionally. Pour into two 8 or 9 inch round cake pans and sprinkle evenly with chopped pecans.

Combine cake mix, water, oil and eggs in large bowl. Beat at low speed until moistened. Beat 2 minutes at highest speed. Carefully spoon batter over pecan mixture. Bake at 325 degrees for 35 to 45 minutes or until cake springs back when touched lightly in center. Cool 5 minutes. Remove from pans. Cool completely.

To assemble cake, place one layer on serving plate, praline side up. Spread with 1/2 topping. Top with second layer, praline side up. Spread top with remaining topping. Garnish with coarsely chopped pecan halves, then drizzle with chocolate syrup. Store in refrigerator. Makes 12 servings.

Topping: 1 and 3/4 cups whipping cream; 1/4 cup powdered sugar; 1/4 tsp. vanilla. Beat whipping cream in small bowl until soft peaks form. Blend in powdered sugar and vanilla. Beat until stiff peaks form.

The Sugar Free category was won by Beth Prather and her good friend's Millionaire Pie recipe.

Millionaire Pie

(Low cal, sugar free)

8 oz. Lite cream cheese (room temperature)

1/4 cup skim milk

1 large can crushed pineapple in its own juice, undrained
1 large box vanilla instant pudding, fat free and sugar free

2 cups chopped pecans

12 oz. Lite Cool Whip or Free Cool Whip

2 small Graham cracker pie crusts

Mix cream cheese and milk with electric mixer until smooth. Stir in pineapple and pudding. Continue to mix until all ingredients are evenly distributed. Add pecans and stir to mix. Add Cool Whip and fold in only enough to mix. Pour into crust. Refrigerate for several hours or overnight before serving. (This recipe can be fat free and sugar free by using fat free cream cheese. Free Cool Whip, eliminate the pecans and served as a pudding.)

The miscellaneous category in the Dessert Cook-off was won by the grand prize winner, Therese Emert with the following recipe.

Surprise Cookies

1/2 cup sugar

3 tbs. shortening (butter flavored Crisco)

1 egg

1/4 lb. dates - pitted and chopped

1/2 cup white chocolate chips

1 cup grated coconut

Cream sugar, shortening and egg. Add dates, white chocolate chips and coconut; stir well. Drop by teaspoonful, 2 inches apart, on cookie sheets lined with parchment

paper. Place in oven at 350 degrees. Bake for 12 minutes (depending on your oven). Watch the color and remove cookies from the oven when they are golden brown. Do no over-bake. Remove cookies from cookie sheet when cool to racks.

The Cake from Scratch category in the cook-off was won by JoNell Blair with a recipe she had from her high school home economics cooking class. She still has the recipe cards with her winning cake on it.

Ellen's Cake

1 stick margarine-softened

1/2 cup shortening

2 cups sugar

5 egg yolks

2 cups flour

1 tsp. soda

1 cup buttermilk

1 tsp. vanilla

1 small can of coconut

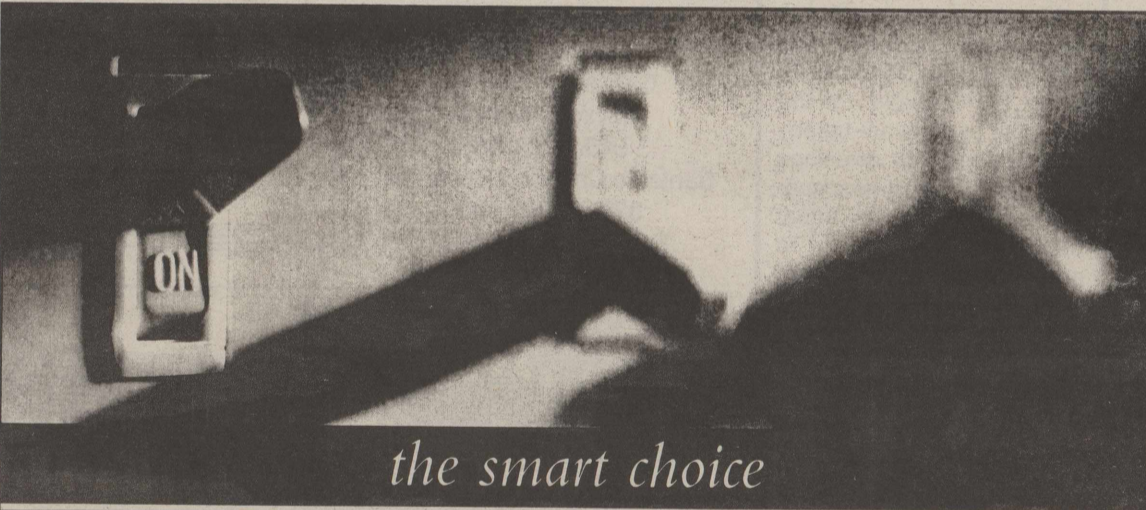
1 cup chopped pecans

5 egg whites beaten to stiff peaks

Cream margarine, shortening, and sugar. Add yolks one at a time, beating well after each. Add flour and soda alternately with buttermilk. Add vanilla. Fold in egg whites. Add coconut and pecans. Bake at 350 degrees in three layers for 25 minutes. Can also be baked in 13x9x2 pan.

Ellen's Cake Frosting: 1 large package cream cheese; 1 stick margarine; 1 box powdered sugar; 1 tsp. vanilla; chopped pecans.

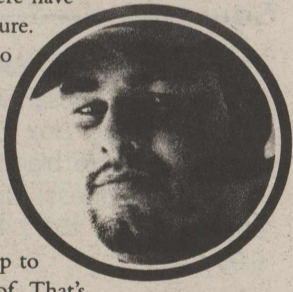
Cream together cream cheese and margarine. Add sifted powdered sugar and vanilla. Frost cooled cake and sprinkle with pecans.

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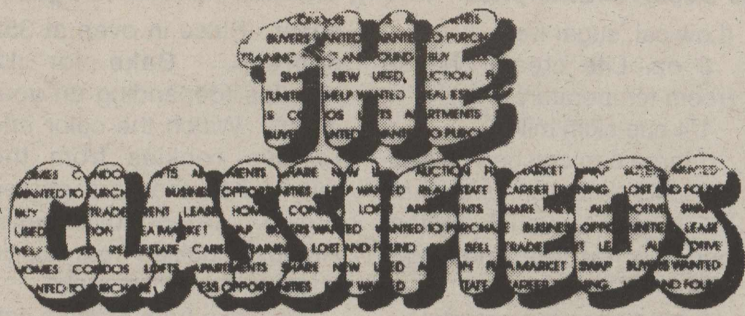

ORDINANCE #357 Setting water rates for the City of Bronte.

SECTION 4. That the rates or charges for the services furnished by the Waterworks System shall be as follows:

A minimum charge of \$15.50 shall be charged with the maximum allowance of 3,000 gallons; the next 9,000 gallons shall be \$1.50 per thousand gallons; the next 13,000 gallons shall be \$1.75 per thousand; and all over 25,000 shall be \$2.00 per thousand gallons.

Residential customers outside the City Limits receiving water shall pay 1-3/4 times the minimum charge with a maximum allowance of 3,000 gallons; the next 9,000 gallons shall be \$1.50 per thousand gallons; the next 13,000 gallons shall be \$1.75 per thousand; and all over 25,000 gallons shall be \$2.00 per thousand gallons. All service charge amounts shall also be charged at a rate of 1-3/4 times the amounts charged inside the City Limits.

Section 4 becomes effective as of the November 20, 2002, billing.

SECTION 11: A \$25.00 charge will be assessed as a service fee for each occurrence requiring personnel to approach the residence or business unit to disconnect water service, whether or not services are actually terminated. Such fee shall include the charges for disconnection and hereinafter known as the "disconnect fee". The past due amount and disconnect fee must be paid before the City will reconnect services.

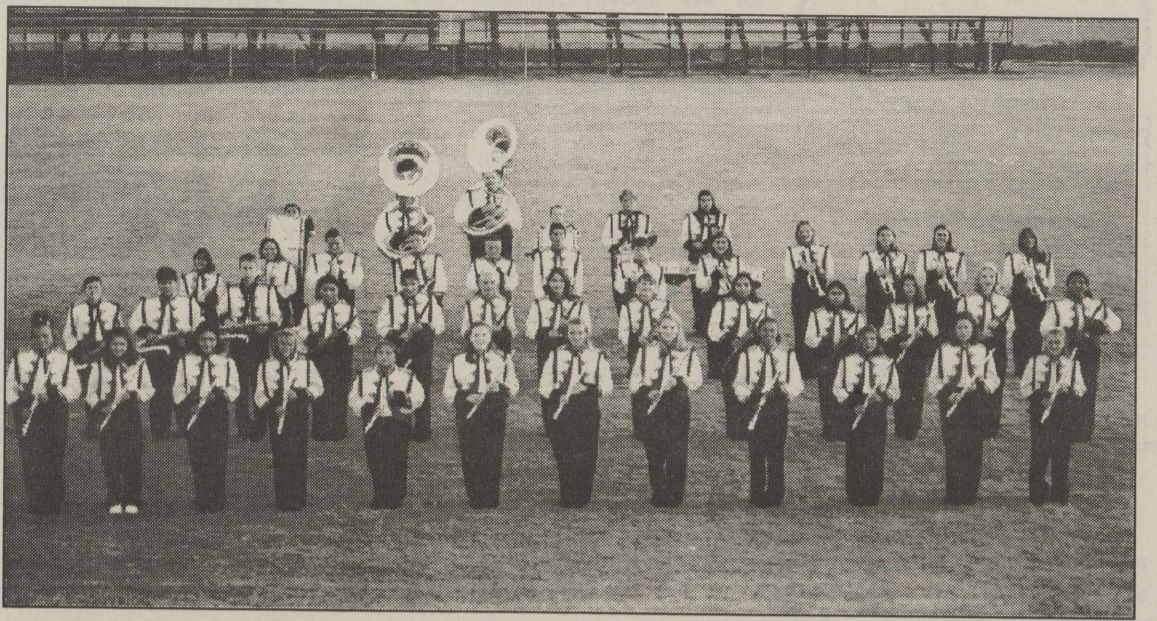
