ACT provides the following tips on how you can strengthen your writing skills and prepare for college and beyond.

*Read and write frequently. According to Dale Allender, of the National Council of Teachers of English, students should read as much as they can from a variety of sources, including all types of fiction, poetry, news stories, plays, business writing, magazine features and essays. "Students should read as much as they can to experience different styles of writing," he says.

*Practice writing in different formats and in as many real situations as possible. Instead of just writing for school assignments, Allender recommends that students write letters to the editor, or letters to a company requesting information or commenting on a product or service. Writing e-mails is good practice, as long as you realize that writing for school and business is usually more formal than an email to a friend.







Degrees take longer than expected

According to a report by the U.S. Department of Education, the average student no longer completes a bachelor's degree in four years. In fact, only 37% of students finish a bachelor's degree in four years, and only a quarter of students seeking associate degrees earn them in the expected two years.

Students who begin college private four-year at institutions are the most likely to graduate in four years or less, with 52 percent of private-college students finishing within four years. Only 24 percent of publiccollege students typically finish in four years.

The study also found that women were more likely than men to finish a bachelor's degree on schedule, with 61 percent of women and 39 percent of men graduating in four years or less.

The characteristics of students who were most

likely to graduate with a B.A. or B.S. within four years fit a commonly held perception of what a college student looks like - he or she receives good academic preparation in high school, enters college immediately after high school, and enrolls in college full-time.

School and stuttering

Stuttering: Straight Talk for Teachers, a new 20 minute videotape from The Stuttering Foundation is now available at the Coke County Library in Robert Lee. This video helps teachers and parents understand how stuttering can affect children of all ages in the classroom.

When teachers hear a child stutter, the immediate reaction is one of concern mixed with a host of urgent questions:

*Should they call on the student in class, or will that only make it worse?

*How should they handle teasing by other students?

*What should they do about reading aloud in class?

"Parents will want a copy to give to their child's teacher," says Jane Fraser, president of The Stuttering Foundation.

The highlight of the video is the children who discuss their experiences in the classroom and share what

was helpful for them.

"Even when I knew the answer, I wouldn't raise my hand because I was worried about what others might thing," says Umberto, 14. He added that giving a classroom presentation on stuttering to the entire class has made him feel more at ease.

"At the beginning of the school year, was embarrassed to read aloud in front of my teacher and friends because of my stuttering," says Kate. She worked with her teacher to make a plan about how she could practice first at home and then individually with her teacher.


Martin offers a different perspective. "I feel confident and even though I might mess up when I talk, I'm not ashamed. I still want the

teacher to call on me even though I might be having a bad day."

Noted speech-language pathologists Bill Murphy, M.A., of Purdue University, and Kristin Chmela, M.A., of Fluency Therapy and Consulting Services in Barrington, III., present practical strategies teachers can use immediately to help children feel more comfortable talking in the classroom.

"The courage and honesty of the children sharing their experiences will help teachers find solutions for the children in their class," says Lisa Scott Trautman, Ph. D., assistant professor at The Florida State University and co-producer of the videotape.

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




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hands literally rinses germs away. Be sure to use soap and running water to best wash germs off the hands. Teach children to say their ABCs while washing so that they keep their hands under the faucet long enough.

2. Don't share cups. Using paper cups can be helpful to avoid spreading germs. Having a dispenser of small cups in the bathroom and/or kitchen can help kids to make it a habit.

3. Use paper tissue. It is best to blow the nose on paper tissue and throw it away. It is important to keep the nose gently blown to rid you body of mucous; but throwing the tissue away immediately is also important, because it is a source of cold virus that can be spread by leaving it on a bedside table, coffee table, counter, etc. away. If you have to sneeze cover your mouth with your hands, be sure to wash hands afterward.

8. Ventilate. Open windows when the weather permits because germs may remain stagnant in air. Also, keep the air moist to avoid nose irritation (a humidifier can be used).

9. Wipe up germs. Germs may rest on surfaces (up to 3 hours) that are touched a lot, such as door knobs, handrails, light switches, telephones, remote controls, and counter tops. Use a disinfectant to wipe them clean as often as possible.

10. Don't smoke or allow smoking. Smoking can irritate the nose and lungs and drastically increase children's susceptibility to colds. It's best to make your environment a smoke-free one.

Program deadline fast approaching

The FSA Office reminds area farmers and ranchers to make an appointment to sign up for the Direct and Counter-Cyclical Program (DCP). The deadline to apply for DCP is April 1, 2003. This date is outlined in legislation and no extensions or exceptions will be made.

The new farm legislation is complex in nature. Maximizing benefits received from these programs will require producers to organize and plan ahead before visiting our offices.

The sign-up for DCP is averaging at least one hour per farm. Producers are encouraged to avoid procrastinating and come in as soon as possible to make application.

Our office is processing applications as soon as possible so payments can be issued to producers as soon after sign-up as possible.



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

Marching bands, decorative floats, and horses' decorated in silver - mounted saddles will take to the streets of downtown San Angelo on Friday, February 21 at 10 am. The 71st Annual San Angelo Stock Show and Rodeo Parade will have a new route and a western, rodeo, or pioneer theme. Over 130 entries are expected.

The new parade route includes historic Block One Concho Street. on Beginning at Irving and Concho, the parade proceeds east to Oakes, turning left on Oakes to Twohig, left on Twohig to Chadbourne, right on Chadbourne to College Street, left on College to Irving, left on Irving to Beauregard, right on Beauregard to Randolph, and then turning left on Randolph to River Drive.

SA Stock Show & **Rodeo update**

These contests are created to help young agriculturalists select and evaluate livestock, wool and mohair, wildlife, plants and horses. Plaques are awarded to the high scoring teams and individuals.

Quarter Horses take to the competition arena on February 15 and 16, beginning each day at 8 am. Three separate shows will be held during the two-day event. Approximately 800 entries are expected. Kermit Wendland, general manager, explained, "that our shows are growing each year and the stock show continues to be a very competitive event, drawing excellent horsemen and horses from several states."

Beginning in 2003, a new quarter horse show circuit has been created for San Angelo. The Silver Spur Circuit will combine points earned during the annual stock show with points earned at new shows to be held in the Spur Arena. Championship awards will be presented during the 2004 Stock Show and Rodeo.


ASU 'College Days'
