
Twenty-seven RLJH grads to be honored


The invocation will be given by Sarah Philley. Class Salutatorian-Katie Bessent will address the graduates, followed by Valedictorian Kelsy Duncan.



Sanco Homecoming cleanup slated


Members of the Sanco Village and Cemetery Associations met May 5, 2003 to plan for the 49th annual Sanco Homecoming which will be held June 8, 2003.

Bill Wrinkle, 65, went to be with his Lord and Savior on May 5, 2003 at Midland Memorial Hospital, Midland, Texas, following an illness diagnosed as Mesothelioma Lung Cancer.

Bill was born March 29, 1938 in Bronte, Texas, the son of Arthur Lee Wrinkle and Leotha Best Wrinkle.

He married Patricia Brock on May 18, 1958 in Midland and to this union one child was born, Kerry Brent Wrinkle. Bill is survived by his wife, Patricia, son Kerry Brent, and wife Phyllis, and grandchildren Kylie and Caleb Wrinkle, all of Rankin. Also surviving is one sister, Juanita White of Mansfield, Texas, and several nieces, nephews and cousins. Bill was preceded in death by his parents.

Following graduation from Bronte High School in 1957, he signed a letter of intent to play guard for the Texas Tech Red Raiders, being a much sought after ballplayer, he was offered a scholarship to every Southwest Conference College with the exception of one. Bill attended Odessa Junior College Trade School while employed by Neill's Plumbing and Heating in Midland. From there his career began with Texas Natural, later known as Union Texas Petroleum, Benedum Field, Midkiff, Texas that spanned some thirty-one years, with the exception of a two year stint with Uncle Sam in the U.S. Army, Artillery Division during the Berlin and Cuban Crisis - January 1961, Honorable Discharge as Specialist E5, February 1, 1963. Following retirement from Union Texas Petroleum when the company sold to Western Gas Resources, Inc. on November 1, 1991, Bill continued to work for the new owners as a IRD Mechanalysis Technician, until retirement on January 31, 1998. Work became his ballgame early in life and he

always enjoyed his job and the people he worked with. Another part of his career included agent for Germania Farm Mutual Insurance Association for the past twenty-five years.

Sports continued to be a part of his life as a coach in Little League and Pony League Baseball coaching the renowned "RANKIN GO TEAM" was one of the joys of his life. He was an avid fan of the Rankin Red Devils, always supporting the home team win or lose.

His church life was foremost in every way as was his family. Bill has been a member of First Baptist Church, Rankin, Texas, since 1967, where he served as a Deacon, Sunday School Teacher and Brotherhood President and on numerous committees of the local church. Bill was presently serving as a director of the Rankin Chamber of Commerce. Bill's grandchildren will always remember him as Grandpa, the guy that could almost always "FIX IT", if it was broken, a wonderful husband and friend to his wife and the greatest Dad, and father-in-law anyone could hope for.

Fire Marshall Bud Thompson would like to remind the local ranchers to call when they are planning a Controlled Burn. Call Bud Thompson at 453-4423, the Sheriff's office, or City Hall. Let someone know it is a controlled burn and do not burn when it is windy. It would only take a spark to start a rangeland fire. Due to the lack of rain and drying winds, fire conditions are extremely high.

COUNTRY AGENTS

Garden/landscape checklist

Vegetables: Check your tomato plants regularly for signs of aphids. These tiny insects feed on new, tender shoots and are often found at the tips of new tomato plant branches. Congregating in large masses, these insects can damage your plants if they are not sprayed with insecticidal soap as soon as you see them. This is also a good time to start watching for spider mites on your tomato plants. Leaf yellowing is an indicator of their presence. The oldest leaves on the plants, located nearest the ground, are usually the first to be attacked. When spider mites are present, you may also see tiny "webs" on the plants or black specks on the undersides of leaves. These pests should be sprayed right away when neem or insecticidal soap. You may need to re-treat infested plants several times as directed on the label to completely rid your plants of spider mites. It will be worth your effort to do so, however, as these tiny creatures can easily kill entire tomato plants in a relatively short amount of time.

Try not to wet the foliage of your cucumber, squash and melon plants when you water them. This will help to prevent the fungal diseases that so often attack the leaves of these plants. Spacing these plants the distances recommended on the seed packages will also help to prevent fungal diseases by allowing air to move among the plants, drying the morning dew and blowing away fungal spores. If fungal diseases like powdery mildew appear on the leaves of your plants, be sure to read the labels of the fungicides you are considering to make sure they may be used on food plants.

Trees, shrubs and vines: Make sure you have plenty of blooming shrubs in your land-scape. That way, you not only have flowers outside, but enough so that some branches can be cut and brought indoors for a floral show. Mock orange, (also known as philadelphus) is easily grown, producing masses of fragrant, white blossoms. It is capable of reaching 7 or 8 feet in height.

If the leaves on your crepe myrtles develop a soot-like covering on them, it usually means they are growing in an overly shady spot. Most crepe myrtles growing in full sun rarely develop a fungal disease, but those in the shade are often beset by them.

Do not worry if you see galls on the leaves or twigs of your trees. These ball-like structures are created by insects, but do little long-term damage to the trees they are formed on. If they really bother you, they can be picked off by hand, but most galls are nothing to spend time on.

If scale insects show up this time of year on your woody plants, avoid spraying them with dormant oil, as this may damage the plants. Instead, apply the lighter weight horticultural oil, reading all label directions before use. Depending on the concentration of scale insects, you may need to re-treat your plants to eliminate these pests.

Lawns: Preventing problems, rather than trying to fix them after they appear is really the key to a good-looking lawn. Keeping

your lawn healthy and thick will help it to choke out weeds and resist insects and diseases. If you did not feed your grass with a balanced fertilizer in April, now is the time to do so. Be sure to follow all label directions, as too much fertilizer can burn, rather than green-up your grass. This is also the time to establish a good watering pattern for your lawn. Deep, less frequent waterings will encourage your lawn to send roots deeper into the ground, increasing their drought and heat tolerance.

When weeds appear in your lawn, dig them out by hand as soon as you see them. If they get too far ahead of you and you feel you must spray them, try using Image if you have a Bermuda or St. Augustine lawn. This weed control product does not get rid of the weeds overnight, but it is very effective and easily applied with a pump-up sprayer. Completely read and follow all label directions prior to spraying.

Let your grass clippings fall back on your lawn as you mow, rather than bagging them and throwing them away. By letting them fall back onto your lawn, your clippings will actually help your lawn, rather than hurt it. Just be sure to cut your lawn on a regular basis so the clippings are not so large that they remain in piles all over your lawn. If these piles do appear, simply run back over them a second time with your mower so they are chopped up into smaller pieces, allowing them to sift through the grass toward the soil

Direct Deposit and Direct Payment Month

May is being observed nationally as Direct Deposit and Direct Payment Month. If you are like most people, you pay your bills by check. In fact you spend many hours each year writing checks, addressing envelopes, getting stamps, going to the Post Office and most importantly, remembering to get those checks in the mail soon enough in advance to avoid late fees. Direct Payment - occasionally called automatic payment or direct debit - is similar to Direct Deposit. Whereas Direct Deposit refers to electronically transferring your pay into your bank account, Direct Payment means electronically transferring your bill payments to the bank of the companies that send you bills. Direct Payment can be used for all types of payments, including mortgage, insurance, utilities, cable TV, car loans, credit cards and even quarterly tax payments.

To start the process, you simply complete a form with the company authorizing your financial institution to debit your account and transfer the money to the company you are paying. The authorization will ask for your account number and the routing number of your bank. The companies will continue to send you a statement each month showing the amount due and the date on which the payment will be deducted if you are paying a variable amount bill.

This is a very confidential way to pay your bills. Unlike checks,

which many people see, Direct Payments are confidential transactions. Just one or two people process a Direct Payment versus up to nine for checks. The company has no access to your account. It is a transaction from one financial institution (yours) to another (theirs). Direct Payment uses the same network as Direct Deposit. And it is easy to track because it shows up on your monthly bank statement.


In addition to your regular payroll, ask your employer to use Direct Deposit for expense checks, bonuses, and travel reimbursements. No matter what kind of payment you are


receiving, Direct Deposit is the fastest, easiest and safest way to get it. Also by using Direct Deposit for your paycheck or Social Security, your money is available when the bank opens on the day of deposit. This eliminates waiting to get your check at work or the Post Office.

With Direct Deposit, there is no need to worry about you pay while you are on vacation or out sick. Regardless of where you are, you can be sure that you paycheck is where you want it in your account at the bank. A recent survey showed that when people without Direct Deposit were out of the office, 25 percent

of those paychecks were left in the mail slot at work, 19 percent were left in the mailbox at home, 10 percent were left on the desk at work and five percent did not know where their pay would end up.

According to the Federal Reserve, ACH transactions (Direct Deposits and Direct Payments) save society money about \$1.62 per ACH transaction vs. a check. Using that figure, the 5.1 billion ACH transactions in 2000 saved the United States about \$8 billion. Worth a hill of beans

Are you making the most of beans? Beans aren't just delicious, they're a great source of protein (at-20 grams per cup). They help protect your digestive system from cancer, and they work in a multitude of dishes - from down-home American staples to international favorites.

Friendly fiber
One cup of beans boasts
10-14 grams of fiber, almost

half of the recommended 21-38 grams we should consume each day. Dietary fiber keeps your stomach full longer and prevents spikes in blood sugar. It then helps move food more efficiently through the digestive tract.

High-fiber beans defend your body from cancer and heart disease. Studies show that eating 1 cup of beans per day can lower cholesterol by 10 percent. Beans also are brimming with folate, a B vitamin that

Folate controls levels of homocysteine, an amino acid formed by the natural breakdown of proteins in the body. Researchers claim that high homocysteine levels are as bad as a smoking habit and perhaps more important to heart health than cholesterol. Folate works with vitamins B6 & B12 to form a "chemical broom" that sweeps homocysteine from the body. Bite for bite, blackeyed peas have about the same amount of folate (105 micrograms per half a cup) as cooked spinach (100 micrograms for the same amount). Only fortified cereals with 100 percent of the Daily Value have more (400 micrograms per 3/4

helps prevent cancer.

You can soak beans

If the beans are high quality and fresh (meaning they haven't been sitting in the market for eons), soaking isn't necessary. In fact, unsoaked beans cook up heartier and produce a richer, thicker broth. However, given the limited availability of high-quality, fresh beans, soaking often cuts cooking time by 30 minutes to a Soaking also removes 5-10 percent of the gas-producing sugars that cause digestive problems for some people. (Commercial enzyme products also may assist bean digestion.) Whether you soak or not, always rinse beans with water to remove any debris, and check for small stones.

For a fast soak, place beans in a saucepan and add water to cover by 2 inches. Bring to a boil, reduce heat and simmer 2 minutes. Remove from heat, cover and let stand 1 hour, or until beans double in size. Drain and discard soaking water. For an overnight method, cover beans with cool water and let stand in a cool place for 12-24 hours. Drain and discard soaking water. Or used canned

You may substitute canned beans for cooked in equal amounts. For one 15-ounce can, substitute 1 1/4 cups cooked beans. Since many canned varieties contain loads of salt, rinse beans with water before using them. Opt for reduced sodium or "no salt added" brands whenever possible.



Spring turkey season closes following successful run

The spring turkey season closed on Sunday, May 11, after a very successful 6-Now hunters (and families) will get a rest from Texas hunting seasons until the September 1 dove opener.

Coke County played host to a better-than-usual influx of shotgunners and helped

the sagging economy.

According to TPW Game Warden Jim Allen, the season was "outstanding"; plenty of gobblers were available and the birds were in great shape.

Indications were the toms were active and much of the breeding began 2 or 3 weeks before the season opened in early April. However, Allen observed that the current turkey hatch could be seriously impacted by the hot, dry weather we are now experiencing. Coupled with the resulting poor grass and weed seed crop, numbers may suffer in the coming year.

Is our drinking water safe?

(This article is the first in a series on drinking water and protection programs available to assure a safe, potable supply of drinking water for the City of Bronte area.)

The Texas Public Water Supply Regulatory Program has a proud legacy of public health protection that dates back to 1913. The dominant characteristic that has sustained the program through the decades has been the cooperative partnership with public water suppliers. Texas is a nationally recognized leader in surface water treatment, design and operational criteria, water system operator training and certification, and source water protection, just to name a few.

In 1974, the United States Congress enacted a far-reaching, program to ensure that our drinking water is as good as we think it is. This program is known as the Safe Drinking Water Act (SDWA). In 1986, Congress updated this program to set mandatory guidelines for regulating key contaminants, require the monitoring of unregulated contaminants, establish benchmarks for water treatment technologies, bolster enforcement, and promote protection of drinking water sources.

The majority of the sampling involves monitoring for lead, copper, pesticides, herbicides, and industrial chemicals as well as some naturally occurring inorganic chemicals. The SDWA's initial monitoring for the organic chemicals requires that one sample be collected each quarter (3 months) for four consecutive quarters. If there are no detections, then sampling may be

reduced to once per year. Sampling may be required from as many as eleven different groups of chemicals, each group requiring a separate sample.

The Public Drinking Water Section of the Texas Commission on Environmental Quality (TCEQ) administers the public drinking water system supervision program in Texas and has primary responsibility for the public water system aspects of the SDWA. The section executes program activities with a central office staff located in Austin, and with the cooperation of the sixteen regional offices throughout the state. A regional office in Dallas works with the City of Bronte and its drinking water program.

Sampling costs can be quite expensive. However, the United States Environmental Protection Agency now allows states to reduce monitoring costs for asbestos and organic chemicals by assessing the vulnerability of each public water supply source to contamination. The TCEQ conducts vulnerability assessments of all public water systems in the State of Texas. Based on the information obtained in the vulnerability assessment, TCEQ has the authority to grant waivers for a portion of chemical sampling. This program saves public water systems and TCEQ resources by reducing or eliminating unnecessary testing of your drinking water. Through the assessment process, TCEQ staff identify systems which need additional protection. In these areas, water utilities are encouraged to develop programs to protect the sources of their drinking water.

City of Bronte obtains its drinking water supply from groundwater, a reliable source of drinking water and the Utilities have a cap-


