CRP Sign-Up ends May 30

A general CRP signup will begin May 5, 2003, and end May 30, 2003. This program is designed to remove environmentally sensitive land from agriculture production for a period of 10 to 15 years in return for an annual rental payment.

a permanent grass cover with FSA sharing up to 50% of the eligible cost. The land must have been planted in 4 of the 6 years 1996-2001. The land must also be physically and legally capable of being planted with an agriculture commodity. In the case of land that is currently enrolled in CRP and is expiring this fall and contains mesquite or other type trees or brush, the trees and brush MUST be removed prior to bidding the land into this CRP program.

Producers must keep the mesquite and other trees removed and maintain the species of grass for the lifetime of the contract on any acreage enrolled in CRP. Land being submitted must meet the Erodibility Index for predominant soils of an average of 8.0 or greater to be eligible. A person must have owned the land for at least 12 months before the close of signup in order to be eligible to bid. Producers will be required to bid as to what rental rate they are willing to receive. The bids are then submitted to Washington for ranking and final acceptance. The sign-up period is nearly over. Producers need to make an appointment and come in before it's too late. 




CC Red Hat Society meeting set

Protecting our drinking water sources

City of Bronte has a safe water supply. If our water is good, why do we need a special program to protect it? The reason is that the situation has been changing dramatically during recent decades. Our sources of water supply, both surface and ground water, are being endangered by new chemicals microbiological or contaminants.

Concurrently, our ability to detect contaminants has been improving. Modern science can now identify specific chemicals in terms of one part contaminant in one billion parts of water. One part per billion is equivalent to one kernel of corn in 12,500 bags of seed corn or in one second in 32 years. In case you think such small amounts can't be very significant, keep in mind that you can get sick from a single microscopic virus.

Although we currently know a great deal about the health impacts of drinking water contamination, many questions remain. Ongoing research will no doubt provide new information which will answer some old questions and generate some new ones. Meanwhile, we as City of Bronte citizens can take steps to reduce the risks to our health. Most of us would agree that a vaccination to prevent illness is well worth the time, expense, and inconvenience. Similarly, many communities are using protection methods to prevent drink-

ing water supply contamination. Communities have found that the less polluted their water is before it reaches the treatment plant, the less extensive - and expensive - the efforts needed to safeguard the public's health.

A Wellhead Protection Program is a program which prevents the pollution of the groundwater that serve as sources of drinking water. The management of land around a well site, such as City of Bronte water wells, is an example of wellhead protection. A wellhead protection program typically includes delineation of the protection area, identifying potential sources of contamination that may impact the delineated area, implementation measures to manage these sources, and planning for the future

Wellhead Protection helps safeguard community water supplies. It is a program which belongs to and is managed by the local community. Unquestionably, communities are the key stakeholders in wellhead protection. It is people living and working in communities who have the most to gain or lose from the quality of their drinking water.

The benefits to communities protecting their groundwater might be best understood by describing the costs of failing to protect the source of groundwater. Easily quantifiable costs of groundwater contamination include treatment, remediation, finding and establishing new supplies or providing bottled water, con-

sulting services and staff time, legal costs of litigating against responsible parties, and conducting public information campaigns as a result of public and media interest in groundwater pollution incidents.

Although seldom done, it is relatively easy to estimate the value of a drinking water supply abandoned due to contamination. Such costs can be high when the quantity of water rendered undrinkable is large or the supply of potential drinking water is small.

Senate passes water legislation

Sen. Robert Duncan, R-Lubbock, passed legislation through the Texas Senate recently that clarifies the process of groundwater permit applications and rule-making.

Senate Bill 738 prescribes a notice and hearing process for groundwater conservation districts, and it allows a district to use alternative dispute resolution procedures instead of going straight to court for permit challenges.

Currently, Chapter 36 of the Water Code does not adequately outline the notice and hearing procedure that groundwater conservation districts must follow. There are more than 90 groundwater districts in Texas, and each has its own interpretation of the notice and hearing process.

"Having a process set in law for groundwater permit application and rule-making is critical toward streamlining the application process for both the landowners who want to drill water wells and the groundwater conservation districts that govern those activities," Duncan said. "The current lack of procedure can make the application and rulemaking process a difficult and frustrating exercise that the Legislature should rectify."





Predator Awareness Workshop

The Texas Cooperative Extension Office has slated a "Predator Awareness Workshop" June 10 at the Concho County Show Barn in Paint Rock. Registration is at 8:30 am and program begins at 9.

Six Texas Department of Agriculture (TDA) continuing education units will be offered toward pesticide applicator license re-certification.

The program is sponsored by Extension, with assistance from the Sheep and Goat Predator Management Board, Texas Wildlife Damage Management Service (TWDMS), TDA, and the Texas Department of Health.

"Predation on livestock is a real problem throughout our area," said Michael Palmer, Concho County Extension Predators are agent. increasing and sheep producers who once were able to keep them in check are dwindling. Some semblance of control is probably the best we can hope for at this point. We need to know the various methods available to achieve an acceptable predator level that we can coexist with." Ken Cearley, Extension wildlife associate at San Angelo. will open the program with "Appreciating Predators?", a talk on understanding predators that will set the tone for the day. He will then conduct a lab practical on interpreting physical evidence of predation. Following a 10 am break, the program resumes with the biology of coyotes, feral hogs, foxes, and bobcats. The various sessions will be presented by a TWDMS representative or by video. The morning



will end with an 11:30 am presentation by Cearley called "Predator Control and Wildlife Management".

A lunch break is scheduled from noon until 1:15 pm. The program then resumes with Cearley explaining the status of the "Predators in the Classroom" project, a school curriculum series aimed at fourth through seventh graders.

Four 20-minute concurrent demonstrations on predator control alternatives are at 1:30. The session will cover lethal and non-lethal approaches.

The program's final segment features talks and speakers including: "Predators as Disease Vectors"; "Preventing Illicit Use of Pesticides in Predator Control Programs", (video); "Update on Sheep and Goat Predator Management Board", (Board Member TBA); and "Coyotes: A Matter of Perspective", (video). The program is set to

adjourn at 5 pm. Pre-registration by June 4th is \$5 per person. Registration after June 4th and at the door is \$10 per person. The fee includes a catered lunch and coffee and

cold drinks for the day. To pre-register and for further information contact the Concho County Extension Office at (325) 732-4304.



Young Masters scholarships

The Texas Commission on the Arts is now accepting applications for the second class of its Young Masters scholarship program. The scholarships will help promising young school-aged students in Texas to excel in the arts.

The Young Masters Program will provide exemplary art students in grades 8-12 with the financial help they need to pursue advanced study in the areas of visual arts, literature, music, theatre, dance and media arts.

The most talented young artists will receive the title of Young Master and will be granted scholarships of up to \$2,500 per year to further their studies in their chosen arts disciplines. Students are eligible to receive the scholarship for up to three years, but they must reapply annually. TCA expects to award approximately 40 scholarships for this class.

A budget indicating anticipated expenditures will also be required. Applicants must also provide evidence of their previous efforts in the arts by submitting a portfolio, a cassette tape, videotape, slides or some other representation of their creative work.
