

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



"Feral hogs have been in West Texas for decades in some areas, but their range is rapidly expanding for several reasons. We plan to see how others are handling hogs to see if there is a possible balance of good and bad for West Texas ranchers, because it looks like they're here to stay."

After a 1 pm start, the program will be kicked off by Roy Walston explaining the Trans-Pecos Feral Hog Survey and the ramifications of its results.

Other topics and presenters include: "Feral Hog Biology", Rick Taylor, Texas Parks and Wildlife Department biologist, Uvalde; "Coping With Feral Hogs", Hoppy Turman, Texas Wildlife Services regional director, Fort Stockton, "Impact On Feral Hogs To Wildlife And Livestock", Cearley and "Feral Hog Disease Transmissions", Dr. Thurman Fancher, D.V.M., Texas Animal Health Commission, Lampasas.

The day will conclude with a 4:30-5 pm panel discussion featuring the program's speakers.



by Ava Lou Davis Listed below are some more stories and letters concerning some of the original "quilting women" of the Robert Lee United Methodist Church.

After I wrote about Hattie Day, several asked if she had a daughter. Wilson Bryan told me she had a daughter, and she married a Denman. Jamie Boren confirmed that information. Hattie had a daughter named Lorene, and she married Jimmy Denman.

Martha Iva Vestal was born August 15, 1901 in Robert Lee, Texas. Her parents were Stephen and Fannie Parker.

Iva Parker met Delbert Lee Vestal and later they married April 14, 1925 in Tom Green County, Texas. They repeated their marriage vows before a Justice of the Peace in San Angelo.

Iva and Delbert had one

daughter, Joan Elaine, born The Observer/Enterprise Friday, October 17, 2003 Page 9 January 19, 1934.

Delbert Vestal had a blacksmith shop for several years in Robert Lee. Iva Vestal was active in church activities in the Methodist Church. She was a member of the WSCS (UMW) for 50 years. She was a Sunday School teacher in the Primary Department for seven years. She was also chairman of the Food Committee several years.

Delbert, Iva, and Joan moved to Ballinger, Texas April 1945.

Iva was active in quilting with her friends. She served in the Methodist Churches of Robert Lee and Ballinger.

Odessa Thetford was the wife of J.T. Thetford. They lived in the Edith community. Odessa and J.T. operated the Edith Store on Hwy. 158. Their store was close to the Pecan Baptist Church. As I remember it was on a hill, and when you drove up in front of the store, there was a curved driveway.

I remember Odessa came to Sunday School and church at the Methodist Church in Robert Lee.

I am not sure how many children they had. I know they had two sons. Odessa was a beautiful woman and always had a smile on her

I remember stopping at their store several times. It was a treat to see J.T. and Odessa, they were such a friendly couple. Theirs was the only store on the highway that far out, besides the Sanco store.

J.T.'s family came to Coke County in 1920 and settled on the A.C. Gardner place between Robert Lee and Sterling City. J.T.'s father bought the old Edith Store from Jim Sparks. It also had the Edith Post Office inside.

Kids that attended grade school at Green Mountain rode the bus. They had to change buses at the Edith Store and Post Office when Odessa and J.T. operated it.

J.T. had one brother, Walter W. (Bud) and four sisters, Ollie Mae, Opal, Christine, and Virginia. According to Elmer Hurley, a nephew, Odessa's maiden name was Harmon, and she was from Graceland, Texas.

I always thought Odessa was one of the prettiest ladies I had ever seen, and she had a beautiful disposition to go with it.

Odessa passed away a few years ago and is buried in the Paint Creek Cemetery. The family asked me to sing a solo at her funeral. I was honored to do it for her.

After I talked with you I started checking through my pictures and family history records and found some information about our Granny Lizzie who was a very loving and caring "Grandmother" to all of the Hester grandchildren. The following is the information that I found:

Phoebe Elizabeth (Lizzie) Perry Davis Hester - I couldn't find her birth date. She was married to a Mr. Davis, who passed away, and had two children, Brian and Dora Davis. Dora was 8 years old when she and my grandfather married on November 5, 1922. She had lived in New Mexico prior to coming to Robert Lee. I loved to go to Granny Lizzie's when I was small, because she always let me help her with the cooking and cleaning, making a fun game of it. LAP program sign-up

Coke and Sterling Counties have been approved for the LAP program. Both counties qualified for years 2001 and 2002. However, a producer is only eligible for payment in one year. In determining which year to sign up for, a producer would want to use the year in which he/she had the most livestock.

The starting date to begin a livestock count in Coke County is May 1st of either year and the ending date is November 26th, of either year used. In Sterling County the beginning and ending dates are May 1st through November 25th.

Because LAP payments will be factored, no payments will be issued until after sign up has ended and Washington has determined the factor...The final date to sign up for the program is October 24th. There will be no latefiled applications allowed since all signup information will be forwarded to Washington as soon as sign up ends for the factor calculation.

Time is running out for this sign up. Less than 20 producers from Coke County and Sterling have signed up for LAP. Producers need to make an appointment today and get this done. Don't wait until the last minute and then forget to signup.

Profit on beef cattle

How many beef producers would turn down a chance to increase the profit on their calves by investing two minutes of their time? If you are not castrating your calves at an early age and implanting them, you are losing money.

Numerous studies from leading universities for more than 20 years still point out that there is a definite advantage to castrating bull calves at an early age and using some form of growth implant. Recent studies by Oklahoma State shows that early castrated calves that have been implanted will gain about one-tenth of a pound a day more than intact bull calves. This doesn't sound like much, but figure it over the next 7-8 months you own that calf and you get from 20-30 pounds more per calf. With the cost of implant at about one dollar and castration cost just in a little labor, you can't afford not to perform these acts. There is no "wonder implant" and they all have one claim or another, but either Ralgro, Synovex C or other calfhood implants will give the same desired results.

In a study by Oklahoma State on several ranches, they have completed trials with calves that were castrated at 2-3 months of age, one group that was castrated and implanted and the last group left as intact bull calves. Weaning weights showed the castrated and implanted steers weaned at 474 pounds; the intact bulls weaned at 460 pounds and the castrated but not implanted weaned at 454. Even though the intact males weaned slightly higher than the castrated calves, castration at weaning of these bull calves caused a significant reduction in gain following weaning as compared to the other two groups.

Studies have also shown that the stress on early castration (at 2-3 months of age) is much less than castrating or even banding at weaning. Bulls that are castrated or banded at weaning had decreased daily gain for the first 50 days after castration while the early castrated calves began to gain more efficiently following weaning.

The bottom line is that if you can go ahead and castrate your calves and implant them at an early age when you need to be vaccinating them anyway, you will not only reduce stress of late castration but greatly increase their daily gain.

Researcher eyes composite vs. Suffolk rams

The term "composite" has been a buzzword in the cattle business for some time now. Many sheep producers don't realize there are composite breeds in the sheep world too.

Dr. Dan Waldron, Texas Agricultural Experiment Station research geneticist, said a composite breed is a carefully planned crossing of two or more different purebreds done to enhance specific desirable traits. Subsequent offspring from these animals are interbred to produce a composite breed. This subsequent crossbreeding is the major difference between a composite and a crossbred animal. The Santa Gertrudis and Beefmaster cattle breeds are composites. to measure growth rate on

"black-baldie" is considered a crossbred.

Thanks to Waldron, the Texas A&M University Research and Extension Center at San Angelo is now beginning work with a composite terminal sire breed to be crossed with native Rambouillet ewes. His aim is to see how the composites compare with Suffolk rams, the sire of choice for most West Texas ranch crossbreeding programs.

"Many West Texas range sheep operations routinely use Suffolk rams as a terminal sires on their Rambouillet ewe flocks." said Waldron. "Their aim is to produce superior market lambs with the added benefit of hybrid vigor. A terminal cross is one where all the lambs are sold. None are kept for breeding purposes. Hybrid vigor occurs when two significantly different breeds are crossed. This cross usually results in an animal that is more vigorous and grows faster than the average of its purebred parents. Since all the lambs resulting from a terminal cross are sold at a young age, wool production is not a concern. Lamb survival, growth rate and carcass composition are the moneymaking traits the rancher

Waldron said that West Texas producers have traditionally thought of the Suffolk as the breed of choice to cross with Rambouillet eyes for market lamb production. But, he's always been curious about how a good composite sire breed would compare under West Texas range conditions. Over the next two years he plans to find out.

"In 1980 the USDA's meat animal research center at Clay Center, Nebraska began developing a composite terminal sire breed," he said. "This composite was developed from Columbia rams bred to Hampshire x Suffolk ewes. The flock has been closed for several years meaning no outside animals have been introduced. This flock has been intensely selected and bred for growth rate and carcass quality, the prime traits of a good terminal sire.

"The Suffolk rams we're comparing the composites with came from area producers who have supplied rams to many ranches across the region for years.

"We have a group of uniform Rambouillet ewes on our range station near Barnhart. Four composite rams will be bred to half of that group of ewes. The other half will be bred to Suffolk bucks. This project has just started with the bucks being put with the ewes in October. The lambs will be born in March and April of 2004. We will wean those lambs in the summer, feed them all, measure their growth rate and finally slaughter them and measure their carcass traits.

"The most important factors in this study are: 1.) The number of lambs produced. Is lamb survival greater in one breed than in the other? 2.) The number of lambs weaned. Both lambs produced and weaned will be important to the producer's bottom line because he can't market what he doesn't have. 3.) Carcass traits; we'll follow these lambs through the feedlot The popular Hereford x Angus or through slaughter to test their





carcass quality. Again, the bottom line says that the better quality animals will bring the producer the most money.

"We plan to follow this project through two lambing seasons. It should be interesting to see how

the composites stack up against our native Suffolks. breeds have been used here in the past with mixed results. To date, producers have always returned to their tried and true Suffolks. I'm excited to see how

these newcomers will fare on our harsh range conditions. If they do well, the term 'composite' may become as common in the sheep industry as it has in the cattle business.



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
