Bronte Pool Fund to receive \$5000 from **Town & Country**

Town & Country Stores will present a check for \$5000 to the Bronte swimming pool fund on Friday, November 21, at 2:30 pm at the Bronte swimming pool location. The check presentation will be made by Patty Rush, Regional Director of Operations for Town & Country. Receiving the donation will be Fran Crumpler, a representative of "Friends of the Pool," a local Bronte organization which has rallied around the need for repairs and new equipment for the local swimming pool. The original pool was first constructed in 1950.

The Friends of the Pool group received a \$50,000 grant from the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department with the stipulation that local citizens would match the amount. Numerous events have been undertaken in Bronte during the past year to raise the needed funds, including a talent show, garage sales, bake sales, contributions from ex-students and a special fundraising effort by the Bronte Elementary students called "Pennies for the Pool." The students, pre-kindergarten through sixth grade, raised \$1000 in pennies, nickels

The board attended a Legislative Update in the Distance Learning Lab.


Principals' reports included enrollment figures and student activities.





Turkey for the Holidays

Thawing Safely

In the refrigerator -

*Thaw the turkey in its original wrap on a tray placed in the bottom section of the refrigerator.

*Allow about 24 hours of defrost time for every 5 pounds of turkey. Example: a 20 pound turkey will take 4 to 5 days to thaw.

*Do not thaw on the counter. Thawing at room temperature

on the turkey can grow rapidly when the outside portion of the bird begins to thaw. These bac-

teria can multiply to dangerously high levels producing toxins that

cooking may not destroy. In cold weather -

*Thawing in cold water is safe too. Submerge the bird in its wrapper in a deep sink of cold water and change the water every 30 minutes to keep it cold.

*Allow 30 minutes per pound to defrost a turkey in cold water. Do not use warm or hot water. Microwave Thawing

*Microwave thawing is another Make sure your option. microwave oven is large enough to hold the turkey especially if the oven has a rotating tray.

*Check manufacturer's instructions for the size turkey that will fit into your oven.

*Caution: Microwave defrosting is irregular, creating hot spots, which may encourage bacterial growth. Cook the turkey immediately after defrosting. Do not store in the refrigerator for cooking later.

Stuffing Safely

*Never stuff the turkey in advance in an effort to save time. *Once you have decided on a

stuffing recipe, mix ingredients quickly and lightly stuff the washed cavity just before placing the bird in the oven.

*Allow 1/2 to 3/4 cup stuffing per pound of turkey.

*Stuffing needs room to expand during cooking, do not over-stuff.

Stuffing must be cooked to a minimum temperature of 165 degrees F to be safe.

*Stuffing should be removed from the cavity of the bird to a separate dish before carving the turkey.

*Store leftover stuffing in the refrigerator and use within 1 to 2

Cooking Turkey Safely

*Decide how much turkey you will need before you shop. Buy one pound per person or 1 1/2 pounds per person if you have hearty eaters or want ample leftovers.

*Buy and use a meat thermometer. Dark meat takes longer to increases the risk of bacteria cook so always insert the thermometer in the thickest part of *At room temperature, bacteria the turkey thigh. It will register 180 degrees F when the turkey is

*Stuff just before roasting or cook stuffing separate from the

*Allow the cooked turkey to sit for at least 20 minutes before carving. During this time juices will be redistributed and the turkey will be easier to carve.

*After the meal, cover and store leftovers in the refrigerator as soon as possible.

*Remember the safest margin is 2 hours from the time you take the bird out of the oven.

*Leftover turkey will keep in the refrigerator for 3 to 4 days. Storing Leftovers

*Plan ahead, clean out the refrigerator and make room for leftovers several days before the

holiday feast.

*Leftovers should be stored in the refrigerator within 2 hours after cooking is completed. Why just 2 hours? Because bacteria that cause food poisoning can multiply to undesirable levels on perishable foods left at room temperature for longer than that.

*Large quantities should be divided into smaller portions and stored in several shallow containers. Food in small amounts will chill faster keeping it safer and fresher.

*If a large amount of turkey is left, consider freezing some for later use. Do not wait until the turkey has been in the refrigerator for 4 days to freeze it. Freezing will not improve the quality of the turkey. If the turkey is frozen while it is fresh the quality will be better upon defrosting.


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Types of Livestock Supplement and Timing of Supplemental Feeding

As cattle producers, we all have known to use protein supplements to improve performance of cattle grazing drought dormant or frost-killed pastures. Protein supplements, by improving digestibility and forage intake, are efficient in maintaining cattle performance on lower quality pasture.

When pastures become short or the quality is very poor, energy supplementation can complement protein supplementation, but the efficiency of response is much lower. Grain and molasses (starch supplements) are most efficient when consumed at less than 0.25% of the animal's weight, while the fiber supplements, hulls, wheat midds, etc. appear to be utilized more efficiently than the grains where moderate to large amounts are needed (0.25-0.75 percent of body weight.)

Now comes the question of energy supplementation relative to calving. Is it better to feed a thin cow before calving or following calving? Extensive studies have shown that cows need to be in good body condition (scores of 5.5 to 7) to be able to breed back quickly and maintain a good calving record. Cows in poor body condition (3 and 4) are always slow to breed back, if at all, will not milk well and have weaker calves with increased health problems. These body condition scores are a visual apraisal of the cows condition and can be easily determined with a little practice. If you would like assistance in determining your cattle body condition score, I would be glad to assist you.

In dry, low quality conditions during the winter, it is extremely important to maintain your livestock's condition before they begin to lose weight. Besides hurting your weaning weights on the present calf with lower milking rates, body condition of cattle now can have a tremendous effect on how soon they will breed back, if at all, and how large a calf they will wean next year. Your decisions on supplemental feeding this winter can have either positive or devastating effects on your operation for the next 14-18 months. Trying to play catch-up after calving or cows begin to lose weight, is next to impossible economically, if not biologically. It's like the old commercial, "You can either pay a little now or pay a lot later."

In supplementing your livestock, it is important to remember that protein can be stored by animals, therefore protein supplements can be fed only two or three times a week. On the other hand, if energy is the limiting factor, livestock cannot store energy, therefore it must be supplemented every day. Also, if available forage is of poor quality, there is a misconception that cattle will just eat more, but in reality, if quality of grass is poor and low in digestibility, it takes longer for the rumen to digest the forage, forcing the animal to actually eat less per day, compounding the problem of low nutrient intake.

When buying supplemental feed, determine the cost by actual pounds of protein and nutrients found in the feed. Sometimes the so called "bargain cubes" if figured on pounds of actual protein, are not really a bargain at all. Feeds containing some source of non-nitrogen protein (usually urea) are not totally utilized by the animal. If you are buying feed containing this unnatural protein source and they only utilize about 75-80% of the protein, your 20% feed is only furnishing about 15-16%. To get the needed amounts of protein in the animal, you must actually feed more of this type of feed, increasing the cost.

One other item to be considered is the amount of money spent on maintaining your herds. If conditions are bad enough that you are having to supplement nearly the entire supply of nutrients for cattle, don't get caught in the trap of going through the winter and owing the bank for livestock and feed store for feed. There are always some animals that could be culled for some reason -- sell these animals and use that money to buy feed for the rest.

Sheriff Styles discusses what to do if your horse is stolen

Coke County Sheriff Rick Styles recently attended a Horse Theft Awareness and Prevention program co-sponsored by the Sheriff's Association of Texas, Texas and Southwestern Cattle Raisers' Association, and the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. The information presented at this program dealt with the fact that a large number of horses and horse related items are stolen annually across the state and nation. Unfortunately, Coke County is not exempt from horse thieves. Some of the information presented during the program is listed below:

Quick action and persistent legwork are crucial to recovering a stolen horse. The actions you take in the first 24 hours after a horse is stolen can mean the difference between recovery and loss. Longtime persistence can also pay off, as horses have been reunited with their owners even years after the theft.

To improve your chances of recovering a stolen horse, act quickly to report and spread the word about the theft.

Report the theft

Begin recovery efforts by reporting the theft to the law enforcement agency with primary jurisdiction in your area. Important papers need to be gathered to help identify the horse and prove ownership:

*Receipt of purchase, bill of sale and/or canceled check; breed registration papers illustrating brands, marks, and scars;

*Brand and other identification certificates;

*Health certificate, Coggins test, and veterinarian receipts;

*At least four good color photographs of the horse, showing brand, marks, and scars.

Photos should include both sides, front and rear views. These should be updated yearly to include the horse's summer and winter appearance.

Although you may be able to report the crime to more than one agency, only one set of statistics on each crime reported is sent to the National Crime Information Center. Reports to other agencies are supplemental, but consider following up with any agencies whose jurisdiction may overlap.

Texas Livestock Inspection Program

Texas is one of several states and certain Canadian provinces with livestock inspection programs that include horses. Texas legislation has given investigation and inspection authority to the Texas and Southwestern Cattle Raisers Association (TSCRA). TSCRA brand inspectors are the most likely people to spot a missing horse, if it is reported missing and has been identified properly. TSCRA is also the designated contact with the International Livestock Identification Association. So, contact TSCRA immediately.

Breed associations

If the horse is registered, alert the registry that it has been stolen. Associations like to know about issues affecting their membership. Also, an innocent buyer may look for registration information or papers on your missing horse.

Livestock auctions and horse sales

The U.S. Department of Agricultural Packers and Stockyards Administration has three regional offices, one of which will have an auction list for your area. If more than one auction is held in your area daily, try to attend all of them.

At the auctions be sure to check the parking lot sales. Look in all trailers and holding pens. Sometimes horses show up in the auction yard seconds before the actual sale begins. Unfortunately, fictitious papers can be flashed hurriedly and sometimes no one challenges their authenticity. Professional thieves know how to bypass auctions and work through people who may not know they are buying stolen goods.

Other tips

If you have other horses that are not permanently identified, consider selecting some method of permanent ID. Consider installing a security system if your property has none. Thieves may be tempted to return to "easy" marks.

If you locate your horse, keep it under surveillance and stay as far away as possible. Never trespass. Call the law enforcement agency assigned to your case and let it handle the recovery.

It is also a good idea to identify your saddles and tack. The replacement value on most horseowner's tack and saddles can amount to \$10,000 or more.

Sheriff Styles also added that it is very helpful if you take the time to write down the license

plate numbers and VIN numbers of your vehicles and trailers. If you suffer a loss, this is the first question that law enforcement will ask.
