Wilbern and his wife of 54 years, Charlotte, reside on their ranch 13 miles west of Robert Lee. They have 5 children and 12 grandchildren. They own and operate over 3500 acres and raise crossbred cattle and Rambouillet sheep.

Coke County land is known for the invasion of prickly pear, mesquite and redberry juniper. Wilbern's property is no exception. Wilbern continues to pursue an active brush management program in cooperation with Coke County SWCD and the USDA-NRCS.

As needed over the years, pastures have been rootplowed or treedozed. Wilbern knows his range and its capabilities, stocks his land accordingly, and grazes in a way to preserve the better grasses. Wilbern has proven even through a drought, pastures can be managed and still produce quality forage.

The lifeblood of any West Texas operation is water, Wilbern has persistently worked to provide good, well-distributed livestock water by building surface tanks, water storage facilities, troughs and pipelines.

Not only has he led by example, but Wilbern has been active in county-wide conservation efforts. A lamp made from mesquite was presented to Wilbern in 2002 for his 28 1/2 years of service on the Coke County District Board where he served as Chairman for 12 of those years. Wilbern was impressed that mesquite CAN be beautiful!!! Wilbern is often referred to as "dependable Wilbern" because of his willingness to help with award presentations, judge posters, attend West Texas Association meetings, called meetings and field days even when he had other obligations. He strongly believes in the importance of educating our young people to conserve our natural resources and looks for opportunities to help them learn. Wilbern once said, "There is no greater calling than being a steward of the soil and leaving the land in better condition than you found it." Wilbern Millican truly demonstrates the conservation ethic and the Coke County district is honored to recognize him for his efforts and achievements.


Patterson

Coke County benefits from Homeland Security grants

R.C. was third in his family of eight children. He was preceded in death by his parents, four brothers, one sister and 1 nephew.



The same study reports that "spelling improved the more kids read." Spelling improvement cannot happen while watching television. Readingfor-fun can help without even trying.

Marine PFC Cody Blaylock Former Bronte youth now soldier in Fallujah By Sterry Butcher

(The following is a story published in a Marfa, Presidio County, Texas newspaper)

Bobby Blaylock misses his boy.

Bobby's only son Cody is with the Second Battalion, First Marines stationed in Fallujah, Iraq, one of the war's most fiercely embattled hotspots.

"We try to put it in the backs of our minds and keep the day as normal as possible," Bobby said. "Not hardly a minute goes by to where your mind wanders back to what he's doing."

Cody is a 2003 graduate of Marfa High School and he joined the Marines shortly after school let out. He's been trained as a corpsman's assistant, his dad said, and he's learned how to storm buildings after being dropped by a helicopter. He was sent briefly to Kuwait, and from there to Fallujah, where he arrived on March 19. Bobby's last correspondence from his son was written two days later, on March 21.

"I'm doing fine," Cody wrote his dad and his stepmother, Melissa Blaylock. "I'm just sitting outside of our hootch watching the sunset here in Iraq. The sunsets here are just as pretty as they are in West Texas."

April is half over, and the Associated Press has called it the deadliest month of the war thus far. At least 87 U.S. soldiers have died in the Iraq conflict in the last two weeks, others are missing and a rash of civilian kidnapping has accompanied the surge of fighting in Fallujah. About 880 Iraqis have died in Fallujah this month, the AP reported, 600 of them civilians.

Back in March, Cody had a firsthand experience that fore-

was up for the job.

"It sends chills up and down your back," he said. "He was four foot from death right there. It's scary that the others didn't see it. He saw it because of his raising in West Texas, watching the ground for rattlesnakes. I've been teaching him that for a long time, looking for the something that is out of place. That training at home has paid off in unfamiliar territories."

Cody was initially told his tour of Iraq would be eight months. Bobby thinks now it might be more like a year. He's grateful for all the folks who've told the Blaylocks that they're praying for service men and women. Prayer helps, he said. Television helps.

Bobby can't resist scanning the TV news on Fallujah and he looks for Cody whenever Marines are pictured. A couple people have reported to Bobby that they've seen flashes of Cody on TV. Cody's a skinny guy who wears glasses - a lot of Marines look like his son, Bobby says. That fact provides him a little comfort.

"Seeing them is seeing him also," Bobby said. "They're all brothers. We're concerned about all of them. They are his brothers, so they are a part of our family, also."

Bobby envisions giving Cody a big hug the next time he sees his son. He wonders constantly what his boy - who probably rightfully should be called a man - is doing from moment to moment.

"Was Cody with the group that found the bodies that might be the missing Americans?" Bobby asked. "Was Cody with the group that attacked that mosque?"

The worry is something he grapples with every day. Bobby's a big believer in prayer and positive thinking, and he's proud of his son's service in the Marines, but the reality of war means that darker thoughts do creep in to the edges of his days.

"There are not any words that can express it," Bobby said. "You want them here with you. You don't know what's in store for you, and no parent wants to see their child go before them. But he's doing what he wants to do, protecting people here. As long as we don't have a car drive up, we know he's safe."

A few weeks ago, in Fallujah, Cody reflected on his unfamiliar what's left of my sense of humor. Sometimes that's all I have left. It's strange." he wrote. "Over a year ago, I'd never have thought I'd be here. The same places we were watching on TV during breakfast. Maybe some other kid is doing the same thing now about us."

"Yup, this is the life right here," he joked in his letter. "Living' out of a seabag, eatin" MREs and dipping imported Copenhagen. Just keeping









diet blunders

You're eating less and exercising more. Why won't that scale budge? Even when you feel like you're doing everything right, there are certain behaviors that can still get in the way. Are you guilty of any of these habits?

1. Skipping Breakfast -Running late for work again? Before you bolt out the door on nothing but a cup of coffee, be aware that skipping breakfast can be bad news for weight loss. Chances are, you're going to feel hungry later, and that may be when you have less access to healthy food and are more likely to reach for a doughnut.

Antidote: Keep something on hand that you can eat on Reading - Chase Harris; the run, such as fruit, yogurt or fat-free cereal bars. 2. Feasting on Family Favorites - When your kids or spouse have a favorite family meal, it's hard to ban it from your menu list. Family favorites, such as lasagna, are often high in fat and calories. Antidote: Treat yourself to a

smaller serving of the main meal and a large serving of vegetables or salad. It's also a good idea to try to find a lower-fat version of the family favorite.

3. Social Overeating -Eating whatever you wanted at a restaurant was okay in the days when people ate out only a few times a year. But these days we eat out every week, if not every day.

Antidote: Search the menu for meals cooked using lowfat methods, such as grilling or stir-frying, and ask for sauces and dressings on the side. That way you can control how much you have.

4. Not Counting Nibbles -A few potato chips while you clean house. Just a sliver of cake while you cook dinner. When we snack, we tend to be standing up or have our attention focused on another task. This can lead to thinking the calories "don't count." Unfortunately, they do.

Antidote: Set ground rules, such as "I don't eat in the car or while I'm watching television." And always, always keep track of everything you eat during the day. Knowing soon is an extremely common diet blunder. A healthy rate of weight loss is up to two pounds a week. But many people aim for more than that, then feel like failures and give up when they don't reach that unrealistically high goal.

Antidote: Make "slow and steady" your diet mantra. If you really don't believe that one to two pounds amounts to much weight loss, lift two pounds of butter the next time you're at the supermarket. You'll realize how well you're doing.





Secretary 12 members of the RLVFD and 1 visitor met on June 7th for the monthly business meeting. President Lew Millegan presided. The minutes and treasury report were accepted as read.

Dispatcher Bud Thompson gave the monthly report. 1 regular business meeting, 1 Fire Safety Electric Demonstration, 2 training classes, 107 hours of activities, 2 fire calls, both were in the county, with 32 man hours, 4 1/2 truck hours, and 40 truck miles one way.

May 3rd was a false alarm. 13 members of the department scoured the countryside looking for the fire. It turned out to be a burn off at the gas plant.

May 26th, the sheriff's office was unable to contact anyone at the Bronte or Blackwell Fire Department, and asked for volunteers from Robert Lee to assist with a MVA off Hwy. 70. 3 firemen went in their personal vehicles for traffic control.

Chief Rick Drennan reported that the Canyon Texas Fire Department received new equipment and gave their servicable equipment to the Quail Valley Fire Department to distribute to anyone needing it. Robert Lee received 500 feet of soft line hose.

Matt Millegan, former fireman, who is now in the Navy stationed in Virginia, donated his 16 foot fold-a-boat. It will be put on truck 3. It is a collapsible boat with oars and can be used

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for water rescue.

The reflective numbers came in, so anyone wanting the 9-1-1 reflectable addresses can contact any fireman.

The group discussed the new building and hope construction will begin this month.

The fire department needs daytime volunteers. Anyone interested in becoming a volunteer fireman can attend classes to become a Certified Fireman. We also have a program for young adults. Cadets ages 16 to 18, with parents consent, receive Fire and Rescue training.

Visitors are always welcome at the meetings and training classes are held each Monday at 7 pm at the fire station.

Value of Pell Grant has declined

The largest federal grant program, the Pell Grant, was established in 1972 and designed to be the foundation for student financial aid packaging. However, the buying power of the Pell grant, which is reserved for the neediest of students, has steadily declined over the past 30 years. A Pell grant award used to cover the majority of a student's tuition expenses. In the mid-1970's, the average Pell Grant award covered about 50 percent of "fixed cost" (tuition and fees plus room and board) at public four-year universities. In the 2002-2003 Award Year the average Pell Grant of \$2,421 covered just 25 percent of these costs.

While the average Pell grant rose by \$123 in 2002-2003, the total cost (tuition, room and board, books and supplies, transportation, and personal expenses) at four-year universities rose by \$755 in the U.S.

The buying power of the Pell Grant has also declined. In 2002-2003, the average Pell grant covered just 18 percent of the average total cost (tuition, fees, room, board, books, supplies, transportation, and personal expenses) of one year of attendance at a public university.



Summer Lawn **Care Tips**

Increase Mowing Height -There is a correlation between the cutting height and the total amount of root mass. The taller you allow your turfgrass to grow, the more volume there is to the root system. Therefore, you should increase your mowing height by several inches during the hot summer months to encourage the development of the root system.

Water Smart - Water, either too much or too little, will hurt the health of your turfgrass. Over watering is not normally a problem this time of year - it occurs more commonly in the spring during periods of high rainfall (often homeowners make it worse by failing to turn off their sprinkler systems.) Lack of sufficient moisture is a more common problem in the summertime. It is best to water just before your lawn starts to wilt. In the early stages of wilt, grass leaves take on a dull, purplish cast and begin to roll. Also, if you walk across a lawn that is starting to wilt, you will leave tracks.

Learn to recognize these signs and apply water on a timely basis. If possible, water during the early morning hours. Watering later in the day wastes water due to higher evaporation rates. Watering in the evening encourages disease development and should be avoided.

Aerate Your Soil - all plants, including turfgrass, need oxygen to survive. If the soil is compacted through years of traffic, the plant roots cannot get oxygen in sufficient quantities to continue healthy growth. Next to proper watering, aeration is probably the most important thing you can do to improve your lawn right now. Water and fertilizer that is applied to a highly compacted lawn will simply run off down the street into a storm drain on its way to the gulf of Mexico. Most rental companies have machines that you can rent to do this job or you can hire a contractor. **Compost-Yes!** Fertilizer-No! - Do not apply any synthetic fertilizer during the hot summer months. Lawns that are highly fertilized going into fall and winter are likely to suffer damage from cold weather. Instead, wait until September and apply one of the winterized fertilizers that contains a slow release form of nitrogen in a 1-2-2 ratio. You can go ahead and apply a 2 or 3 inch layer of compost now. If you notice iron chlorosis (yellow leaves) on your St. Augustine turf, apply iron sulfate or an iron chelate according to the label

directions. **Being Water Smart Indoors**

Single family residential indoor water use in the U.S. is an average of 69 gallons per person per day. This need 2.2 gallons per minute. average can be cut to 45 gallons just by installing water efficient fixtures and reducing leaks as outlined below. Changing water-wasting habits can save even more water.

Toilets: Standard toilets manufactured before 1980 usually require 5 to 7 gallons per flush (gpf) and toilets sold during the 80's use 3.5 gpf. If you replace a 3.5 or 5 gpf toilet with a 1.6 gpf toilet, you can save about 9,740 using it! to 17,300 gallons per year. Water can be conserved in the larger-use toilets by installing displacement devices such as a plastic bottle or gag (do not use a brick - it can crumble and damage the fixture.)

Showers: Currently available water efficient showerheads work much better than early models produced in the good 1.5 gallon per minute models available. Installing a water efficient showerhead

is the single most effective conservation step that can be taken inside the home.

Sinks: Installing faucet aerators on lavatory and kitchen sinks can save up to one-half the amount of water used by sinks without aerators. The flow rate of bathroom faucets does not need to be as high as kitchen faucets. Bathroom faucets need only 1 to 1.5 gallons per minute and kitchen faucets generally

Washing Machines: When buying a washer, look for one that has adjustable or automatically adjusting water levels for different load sizes and, ideally, one that is a high efficiency washer.

Change Water Wasting Habits

In the bathroom - Don't use your toilet as a trash can for paper and facial tissues! At the sink, don't let the water run when you aren't

In the shower, take shorter showers and take a shower instead of a bath. Showers with water efficient showerheads often use less water than a bath.

In the kitchen - Don't leave the water running when you go away from the sink! If you let the water run at full volume for only two minutes 1980's and there are even each day you will waste 1,600 gallons of water each year, even if you have a water efficient faucet.

When washing dishes only run the dishwasher with a full load. Dry scrape dishes instead of rinsing them and do not pre-rinse dishes if you are using the dishwasher. When washing dishes by hand, fill a basin or the sink with soapy water instead of letting the water run continuously. Soak pans rather than scrubbing them while the water is running. Fill the other basin with rinse water or at least run the water at minimum volume during rinsing.

In the laundry room: Wash only full loads! If you must wash partial loads, match the load setting with the amount of laundry to be washed. Around the House

Pipes: Insulate hot water pipes where possible to avoid wasting water while waiting for it to "run hot." Pipe insulation is inexpensive, and easy to install.

Plants: Don't over-water your houseplants. More plants die from over-watering than from drying out. Collect rainwater or recycle water from fish tanks to water your plants.

Don't Wait to Fix Leaks!

Leaks can account for 10 percent or more of the water bill and waste both water and energy, if the source is a hot water faucet. In the average household, water lost through leakage is 9.5 gallons per person per day. For example, a toilet with a silent leak of

one cut of water a minute (a mere dribble) wastes about 2,700 gallons of water a month.

Toilet Leaks: approximately 25% of all toilets leak. To determine if the toilet is leaking, remove the tank lid after the tank has stopped filling. You may be able to see a leak or hear water running. If not, you may still have a "silent leak." To test for a silent leak, mix a few drops of food coloring or place a dye capsule or tablet into the water in the toilet tank. DO NOT flush the toj-Wait for about ten let. minutes, and if the dye appears in the toilet bowl, the toilet has a silent leak. The most common causes of toilet leaks are: worn or improperly seated flappers, worn/broken ballcocks (try replacing washers and tightening screws first), leaking refill valves, broken or improperly adjusted lift chains and handle rods, or poorly sized replacement parts.

Faucet Leaks: Faucet leaks are usually caused by worn washers or "O" rings (for a washerless faucet), which are inexpensive and can be replaced with a screwdriver and an adjustable wrench. If that doesn't work, you may need to replace the entire stem assembly. Note the faucet brand and take the original part with you to a home improvement center.



Natural gas leaks can be dangerous. Signs of a leak can include:

- A distinctive odor (like rotten eggs).
- Dead vegetation surrounded by a green, growing area.
- A hissing or roaring sound.

If you suspect a natural gas leak, your first concern should be your safety and the safety of the people around you.

- Immediately walk away from the area.
- Call 911or the local fire and police department.
- Obtain the phone number of the affected pipeline operator from the nearest posted sign and immediately call the corresponding operator. For TXU Gas, call 1-800-817-8090. For TXU Fuel, call collect (214) 969-7221.
