Quail prospects termed "outstanding" By Joan Davis

Outstanding seems to be the way the upcoming quail season is projected for the 2004-2005 opener. Opening statewide across Texas on Saturday, Oct. 30, quail season remains through Sunday, Feb. 27, 2005. Bag limit is 15 birds. Game Warden Jim Allen, our best wildlife info source, has seen the birds in large numbers across the county. Surveys of any means are hard to come by due to the excellent ground coverage. Water and food, such as grasshoppers, are plentiful. He stated that the coveys include a good many small birds, indicating second or even third hatches.



Forest Service offers windbreak trees

Seedlings for conservation windbreaks are now available for order through the Coke County Soil and Water Conservation District (SWCD). Landowners in Coke County are encouraged to purchase the one-year-old seedlings before preferred stock is sold out.

Available species for Coke County include afghan pine, redcedar, italian stone pine, arborvitae, aromatic (skunkbush) sumac, black cherry, catalpa, desert willow, fourwinged saltbush, green ash, hackberry, honeylocust, lacebark elm, nanking cherry, osage orange, redbud, russian olive, sandcherry, sand plum, sawtooth oak, shumard oak, and smooth sumac. The hardwoods are sold in multiples of 50 seedlings per species. They are very inexpensive and can be divided among your neighbors.

Wildlife packets for habitat establishment also are available. Each of the four wildlife packets contain 100 bare-root trees and shrubs which cater specifically to the habitat needs of quail and pheasant, deer, turkey or squirrel.

Orders will be taken through January 31, 2005, and will be delivered on February 10, 2005.



Forsan answered with a 30-yard pass-play for 6, but failed to convert. That left the score knotted at 34-34.

A see-saw battle continued through most of the 4th quarter. Neither team could seem to sustain a drive until the Horns moved the ball downfield to the 1. Saunders carried the ball in for 6, and Coalson added the extra point. The Buffs scrambled to score again, but the Longhorn defense held. Forsan stopped the clock with their remaining timeouts in an effort to keep time on the clock should they regain the ball. However, the time gained allowed Saunders a breather before his 18-yard scamper for the Horns' final score. Coalson converted to make the final score 48-34.

Forsan which was moved from Class AA to Class A in last spring's redistricting, is now 0-3 in district play and 0-7 for the year. Bronte has a district record of 2-1 and a season record of 3-4.

NOTICE TO TAXPAYER

Pursuant to Texas Transportation Code Chapter 258, the Commissioners Court of Coke County, Texas intends to consider the adoption of an official county road map.

This past summer I had the opportunity to attend the South Texas Buckskin Brigade. The Brigade was held at the Chaparrosa Ranch south of La Pryor, Texas. The Texas Brigades is a wildlife education and leadership development program.

I enjoyed this camp so much that I am trying to qualify to go back as an assistant. One of the activities is to write an article for a newspaper. So I want to tell you about the Texas Brigade Program, and a little about my experiences of attending.

There are four different Brigades; Feathered Forces, Bass Brigade, Bobwhite Brigade and the one I attended Buckskin Brigade. The Texas Brigades motto is "Tell me, and I forget. Show me, I remember. Involve me, I understand." Involvement is exactly what we experienced. We were involved with plant identification, habitat evaluation, team building and leadership training, firearm safety, photography, media training and extensive study of the whitetail deer.

The days were long but very rewarding. We started early each day and we learned many things. The cadets are assigned to "Herds" I was in the Brow Tines Herd. We learned to march and sing cadences. My favorite things that I learned were antler scoring basics, aging deer with the






ORDINANCE #374 AN ORDINANCE

PROHIBITING UNREASONABLY LOUD UNNECESSARY AND NOISES AND PROVIDING PENALTIES FOR THIS **ORDINANCE INCLUDING** A FINE.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE **CITY OF BRONTE:**

SECTION 2. It shall be unlawful and a public nuisance for any person, facility, association, corporation, or other entity to create or allow Unreasonably Loud and Unneccessary Noise inside the City Limits of Bronte and to include up to one-half mile outside the City Limits of Bronte. This includes but is not limited to creating any unreasonably loud, disturbing or unnecessary noise of such a character, intensity or duration as to be detrimental to the repose, life or health of ordinary reasonable people, including but not limited to the following specific noises:

(a) The playing of any radio, television, phonograph, musical instrument or other sound producing machine in such a

manner or with such an unreasonable volume as to disturb quiet, comfort or repose of ordinary responsible people; and

(b) The use of any stationary internal combustion engine, air compressor equipment, dynamic braking device, "jake-brake", motor vehicle, or other power device, which is not equipped with an adequate muffler in constant operation and properly maintained to prevent any unnecessary noise, and no such muffler or exhaust system shall be modified or used with a cutoff, bypass, or similar device. Section 3. Persons found in violation of this ordinance, and found guilty by a Judge of the Municipal Court, will be guilty of a Class "C" Misdemeanor, and be fined not more than violations which may be fined not more than \$2000.00. Each day such violation continues, or , be permitted to continue, shall be a separate offense.

Section 5. The Ordinance shall become effective as of the 22nd day of October, 2004. This Ordinance will supersede any and all previous Ordinances of the City of Bronte regarding unreasonably loud and unnecessary noise.


Game Wrapup. By Joan Davis

Dove season in the Central Zone, which includes Coke County, will remain open . through Sunday, October 31. Following a lull during the cooler weather, after enjoying the best shooting in many years, good numbers of larger birds may be moving in for an active finish.


Archery season also remains open for whitetail deer and turkey through Sunday, Oct. 31. Although both seem to be plentiful and active, game may not be as visual, due to heavy foliage, high weeds and grasses.

Javelina shooting will stretch until Feb. 27, 2005 with a 2 per season bag limit.

No closed season and no bag limit exists for hogs. Up to recent years, Coke County has not had great numbers of the wild hogs. Much of Texas is being over-run with them; they are a curse and a nuisance to all. In some areas farmers and ranchers allow hunters to harvest as many as possible. They root up crops and trample the rest. East Texans are waging a losing battle - the wild hogs attack domestic animals and ruin gardens and yards. They multiply so rapidly; it's next to impossible to keep them in check. Ground feeders and fences have become victims, too. Use caution if you are invited to go wild hog hunting. Get in a blind, a pickup bed, or a tree to shoot. A wounded hog is dangerous.


The Sorosis Club members were told that the weight
