Next week will be the 64th edition of the Coke County Junior Livestock Show, held at the Sterling Lindsey Memorial Exhibition Building in Robert Lee. This years show will feature animals in the Market Lamb, Market Goat, Market Swine and Market Steer shows, but more importantly, more than 65 youth exhibitors from around the county.

The county stock show offers the youth of Coke County an opportunity to exhibit their livestock projects which they have worked with for more than 11 months, in many cases. Besides being a worthwhile educational activity for our youth in teaching them responsibility, working with others and numerous life skills, it is an important economic endeavor when you consider the animals purchased from county producers, feed purchased locally and the premium sale monies that come in from county and oth-






The '64 Study Club news



Student financial aid available

January is when students and their families should begin filling out the free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA). The FAFSA may be submitted to the Department of Education (ED) no earlier than Jan 1, 2005. However, families should begin collecting the information they will need to complete the form as soon as possible. Records you will need include:

- *2004 federal tax forms,
- *W-2 forms
- *investment records,
- *bank statements, and
- *small business records

By completing and submitting a FAFSA, you supply the information that financial aid offices and programs use to determine your need for financial aid. Each school will offer you a financial aid package based on your level of need to help pay for costs

associated with attending school. These packages could consist of grants, scholarships, federal work study, and/or student loans.

Even if you have not made a decision about which school you will choose to attend, it is very important that you complete the FAFSA as early as possible, and make sure that the information is sent to all schools you are considering. The various award packages that the schools' financial aid offices prepare for you can help you decide which school is best for you. The FAFSA is available from your high school guidance counselor, college financial aid office, and online at http://fafsa.ed.gov.

Exercise - Getting Ready for 2005 &

Making Your Resolutions Work All Year Long - New Year's resolutions are like bad Christmas presents. They look pretty all wrapped up in a box but, when you open them, you know you'll be making a trip to the mall for an exchange. It's easy to get excited about a shiny new year, a clean slate for you to finally lose that weight or get over that Ben & Jerry's obsession. But, many of us find our resolution to be healthier fading come February. Use these tips to make your resolutions work all year long.

Tips for Reaching Your Goals

1. Make specific goals.
Resolving to exercise is great but isn't it difficult to actually follow through? Instead of vague goals of weight loss, decide exactly what you want to accomplish and why.
Have a reason for making you started this in the first pla Write down why you're doing and how it makes you feel early you're getting. Staying in moment will help you actual enjoy exercise without worry about the numbers on a scale.

your resolutions. Determine how much weight you want to lose and a deadline for losing it. Or why not have a resolution that is a bit more functional, like a strong back for picking up your kids or a healthy diet so you have energy all day long?

2. Educate yourself. You've decided you want to lose weight this year. Now what? Now you have to figure out how to do it. No, you don't need to go get a masters in exercise physiology, but you do need to get the skinny on how it's done. Educating yourself means you know exactly what it takes to reach your goals. Use the Internet, the library, the bookstore, whatever you can to help you make solid decisions about your health.

3. Make a plan. Now you have to figure out exactly how you're going to attain your goal. If it's weight loss, make a specific plan for how you'll do it. What kind of cardio will you do? How often? Where will you do it? And what about your weight training program? Where will you do it? What exercises will you do? Figure out how you'll put everything together into a program that works.

4. Prepare Yourself. Now that you've figured out what you want to do, you gotta get ready to actually do it. This may mean hitting the sporting goods store for some gear, heading out to the local gym for a membership or buying some exercise videos. Get everything you need and, more importantly, prepare yourself each day for your workout. Pack the bag for the gym the night before or lay out your clothes for an early morning jog.

Write down why you're doing it and how it makes you feel each day, rather than the results you're getting. Staying in the moment will help you actually enjoy exercise without worrying



The voting period for the lamb referendum will begin January 31, 2005, and end February 28, 2005.

The U.S. Department of Agriculture's (USDA) Agricultural Marketing Service (AMS) also announced the final referendum rules under the Lamb Promotion, Research and Information Order, more commonly known as the American Lamb Board or Lamb Checkoff Program.

The referendum will be conducted at USDA's county Farm Service Agency (FSA) offices. To be eligible to participate, you must provide documentation, such as a sales receipt, that shows that you were engaged in the production, feeding or slaughtering of lambs during calendar year 2004.

The Lamb Checkoff Program is authorized by the Commodity Promotion, Research and Information Act of 1996. This program provides for assessments on the sale of lamb and lamb products and for an industry board to carry out promotion, research and information programs designed to increase the demand for lamb and lamb products. For the program to continue, it must be approved by a majority of voters who also represent a majority of the volume voting in the referendum.

The following are some common questions and answers about the referendum and the Lamb Checkoff Program.

Why are we having this referendum? - The Order provides that a referendum be conducted within 3 years after the program is launched to determine if the Lamb Checkoff Program should continue. The "delayed" referendum is designed to allow contributors to see programs funded with contributors' assessments and determine if the checkoff is working for them. For the program to continue, it must be approved by a majority of those persons voting who also represent a majority of the volume of lamb produced, fed or slaughtered. Both, the number of persons voting and the volume of lambs voted, must be a majority in favor of the Lamb Checkoff in order for it to continue. If the continuation of the Lamb Checkoff is not approved in the referendum, USDA will begin the process of terminating the program. The referendum vote does not affect the assess-

ment rate.

Who can vote in the referendum? - Anyone who was or is a lamb (sheep) producer, feeder or first handler or authorized representative engaged in the production, feeding, or slaughter of lambs during the 2004 calendar year is eligible to vote in the referendum. Anyone voting must provide documentation that they were engaged in the production, feeding, or slaughtering of lambs during 2004. Voting in the referendum is voluntary.

You will complete a ballot voting "yes" if you wish to continue the Lamb Checkoff, or "no" if you do not wish to continue the Lamb Checkoff. You will also vote your volume, either as a producer, feeder or first handler.

Volume Voting for Producers and Seedstock Producers - Producers and seedstock producers will vote the total number of domestic lambs owned and produced during the 2004 calendar year.

Volume Voting for Feeders - Feeders will vote the total number of lambs owned and fed to slaughter weight during the 2004 calendar year.

Volume Voting for First Handlers - First handlers will vote the total number of lambs slaughtered during the 2004 calendar year.

Voting Multiple Volumes - If you are: a producer and a feeder; a producer and a first handler; a feeder and a first handler; af feeder and a first handler; if you engage in all three, and you operate under a single organizational/legal structure, then you can vote the number of animals owned at each stage of production. Even if you vote more that one volume amount, you will still have only one "yes" or "no" vote, as a single organization, on continuing the Lamb Checkoff.

When will the results of this referendum be available? - Results will likely be announced about 60 days after the voting period ends by the USDA.

Will I receive my request for refund? - Refund requests from the American Lamb Board have been less than 5 percent of the total annual collections. These requests will be honored by the Board regardless of the outcome of this referendum. The Board will initiate payment of refund requests, or pay a pro rata share, within 90 days after the results of the referendum are announced. If continuation of the program is approved, future refund requests will not be included in the program.

What are the goals of the Lamb Checkoff Program?

The Lamb Checkoff Program is designed to expand market share of American Lamb and foster an opportunity for prosperity for all its contributors by:
• Increasing demand by getting people to ask for American

Lamb year-round.
• Branding American Lamb as the preferred choice in the marketplace.

• Differentiating American Lamb from competitors with "10,000 Miles Fresher" and "American Lamb from

American Land" advertising campaigns.

Minimizing volatility of seasonal product sales through targeted promotions.

• Promoting to encourage use of the whole lamb – using all cuts.

• Leveraging and expanding American Lamb Board resources through cooperative relationships with marketing partners.

United Methodist Women celebrate 135 Years of Mission

Submitted by Ava Davis The United Methodist Women, a one million member organization around the globe, is celebrating 135 years in mission from 1869 to 2004.

During the early years of the churches of Robert Lee and Coke County, there were many hardships. In 1919, there was an epidemic of flu. Transportation was mostly by horseback or buggies. The women had very little conveniences. Along with working at home, raising their children and helping their husbands, the women strived to build up membership in the church. They helped with Sunday School, worked with the youth and the Missionary Society, which was doing well in Robert Lee.

In 1926, the Womens Missionary Society was making 106 visits to the sick, sending out bouquets and meals, having 2 Bible Studies a month and one mission study a month. The Womens Missionary Society had done splendid work. New things had been placed in the parsonage as well as a new floor. They were busy raising money to repaint the church building.

On Sept. 2, 1940 at 3:00 pm the women of the Robert Lee Methodist Church met in the Church Auditorium. The purpose of the meeting was to organize the Women's Society of Christian Service.

At a meeting held May 1, 1973, Mrs. O.W. Newell explained why the WSCS was changing the name to United Methodist Women. The church had reorganized in 1968. The Evangelical United Brethren Church and the Methodist Church had joined to establish the United Methodist Church. At this time, the purpose of the UMW was stated: "The organized unit of United Methodist Women shall be a community of women whose purpose is to know God and to experience freedom as whole persons through Jesus Christ to develop a creative, supportive fellowship; and to expand concepts of mission through participation in the global ministries of the church."


Every year, here in Robert Lee, the UMW has hosted the Senior Reception in the Fellowship Hall after Baccalaureate. This was started by Mildred Simpson when her daughter, Carolyn, was a senior. It has been a tradition for about 49 years.

After a quilt top was found in the old jail museum, the UMW voted to have it quilted as a sign of showing honor to the women who had created it. Around 30 of the women that were members of the WSCS has embroidered their names on it. The quilt was hung in the foyer of the

church. There is also a scrapbook on the Quilting Women. The pastor, Steve Rowe and the church invited descendants of the women for a dedication day on Nov. 2,

This year the UMW voted to compile a cookbook for the church. It was a churchwide project with Deone Roe doing artwork for the cover and division sheets. The committee who put together the book consisted of Mary Bessent, Jeanette Jacobs, Marilyn White, and Joan

Tree, Shrub & Vine Care

Now is the time to get those woody ornamentals planted. Summer comes quickly in Texas with its blistering hot weather that puts a strain on a new plant's developing root system. The earlier you get them planted the more time they have to settle in and start to establish a root system before the onset of hot weather. If you want to plant any bare rooted trees, shrubs and vines, these especially need to get in as soon as possible. Water them in well at planting and give them a little extra attention this coming summer....they'll still be just babies!

Before purchasing plants do some research as to what are the best adapted varieties for your area. These plants are long-term investments, and will impact your home's beauty and value for years to Your County come. Extension Office can assist you with recommendations of adapted plants.

Late winter is prime pruning season for deciduous trees and shrubs, except those that bloom in spring. Wait until after they bloom to prune the spring bloomers. Evergreen trees and shrubs can be trimmed now also. Young trees need proper training in order to develop a strong structure and to reduce the chances of a tragic loss in a windstorm years later.

Read up on how to prune before heading outside with the saw or loppers. Too many plants are butchered each year by well meaning, but uninformed, gardeners. Prune with a purpose, not because there's nothing else to do in the winter. Use sharp tools and make cuts

close and clean for rapid healing. The most rapid wound healing occurs in spring and early summer. Learn the proper form for the species you are pruning.

Crapemyrtles are the queen of our southern blooming ornamentals. They bloom for several months of our summer heat and offer an amazing array of bloom color, plant sizes, and trunk bark color. However, they also top the list of improperly pruned shrubs and trees. Before heading out to prune your crapes, check out the how-to and how-not-to of crape pruning. Unless you are correcting a problem or removing suckers from the base, they really don't need to be pruned.

Spring flowering woody ornamentals such as azalea, quince, forsythia, spirea, redbud, dogwood, deciduous magnolia and fringe tree should be pruned after they bloom in the spring. Pruning in late winter removes flower buds and reduces the bloomin' spring show!

Hydrangeas, which flower in between seasons are best pruned after the flowers fade in mid-summer.

When pruning shrubs, first prune out any dead or damaged branches; then thin out by removing about one-third of the canes or stems at ground level, removing the oldest canes only. shape the rest of the plant, but do not cut everything back to the same height. This helps to maintain a natural appearance.

When trimming hedges, keep the base as wide or wider than the top. Leaves only grow where there is light, so a "top-heavy" hedge will soon begin to thin out in the lower shaded areas.
