Filing ends, ballot set in local May elections

Filing for a place on the ballot for local elections to be held in May ended Monday, March 7, 2005.

Robert Lee ISD will need to elect three trustees. The 3 year term of Mark Riley is expiring, as are the two 3 year unexpired terms with 2 years remaining currently held by Tom Sawyer, Jr., and Tod Reed. Irma Torres filed for the 3 year term available. Tod Reed, appointed to the Board to fill a vacancy, filed for one of the unexpired terms. No candidate has filed for the remaining unexpired term. Potential write-in candidates may still file a declaration of their candidacy through 5 pm Monday, March 14, 2005. Tuesday, March 15, is the last day a candidate may withdraw from the election. Due to spring break, write-ins and withdrawals will be available in the RLISD Superintendent's office from 8 am to 12 noon and 1 pm to 3:30

Bronte ISD will elect two 3 year trustees. These offices are currently held by Kendall Gibbs and Scott Frasier. Scott Frasier and Kendall Gibbs have filed for re-election. Paul Williams, Shane Kelton, and Quinda Feil-Duncan filed to have their names added to the ballot.

West Coke County Hospital District will also need to elect two trustees for 2 year terms. These offices are currently held by Doug Wilkes and Judy Williams. Judy Williams, Mary Bessent and Dessie Kendall have filed applications.

Two 2 year terms currently held by Doris Sims and Alonzo Robbins are expiring in the East Coke County Hospital District. The incumbents have filed for re-election.

The City of Bronte will be conducting an election for City Council positions for two (2) full-term and one (1) one-year due to a vacancy. Those members terms expiring are Gerald Sandusky and Elton Moore. Both gentlemen have filed for re-election. Candidates may still file for the one-year unexpired term until April 6, 2005. 15 members of the fire department met on March 7th for the monthly business meeting. The minutes and treasury reports were accepted as read. Dispatcher Bud Thompson gave the monthly report. 1 regular meeting, 1 training class, Skywarn class, 38 hours of activities, 4 fire department calls (2 county and 2 city) for 29 1/2 man hours, 5 truck hours, 26 miles one way for the trucks as well as personal vehicles, 2 MVA's, 1 smoke in building, 1 shed fire. Other activities were 2 Skywarn alerts, and pumper truck took Stomper from the fire station to the high school for the fire drill and pep rally.

Chief Rick Drennan discussed having a 6 hour class regarding Weapons of Mass Destruction put on by Homeland Security. There are other classes available through Homeland Security which they plan to look into.

The fire department and the Sheriff's department have had to check out several smoke reports this month. It would save time and gas money if the ranchers called in before they do their controlled burns. The group dis-

cussed the February fire calls and repairs needed and those already done on the trucks.

The fire department needs volunteers. Anyone interested in becoming a volunteer fireman needs to contact any fireman or call Bud Thompson at 453-4423.

We also have a program for young adults. Cadets ages 16 to 18, with parents consent, receive Fire and Rescue training.

Visitors are always welcome at the meetings and training classes held at the fire station.

2nd Annual Texas Mesquite Show coming to San Angelo

The Texas Mesquite Art Festival is returning to San Angelo April 15-17, and promises to bring the best mesquite artisans.

Roger Ellison, San Angelo Festival Director, said over 50 juried artists from around the state will gather at Fort Concho for a three-day celebration of the exquisite and attractive mesquite.

"Besides seeing the absolute best of mesquite, visitors will enjoy one of the largest gatherings of mesquite artisans," Ellison said.

The festival, like mesquite wood itself, has come a long way since the first Fest which was held in Fredericksburg, Texas in 1992, and is still going strong today.

Visitors will be treated to collections of sculpted woods from the world's absolute finest mesquite craftsmen. Items range from large furniture items such as beds, dressers and chairs made entirely from mesquite, to unique craft and gift items such as beautiful turned lamps, delicate scroll work, handsome pen and pencil sets, unique Christmas tree ornaments, sturdy gun stocks, sculpted vases, and dimensionalized artwork, all carefully crafted of mesquite.

Once viewed as a nuisance, mesquite has become the darling of architects and retailers. Mesquite's growing appeal comes in part from the high profile offered by the Texas Mesquite Association and both festivals, according to Ellison. Articles praising mesquite's quality and value have appeared in such magazines as "Texas Highways," "Veranda," and "Fine Woodworking."

"Architects now vie to install mesquite accents in upscale homes," Ellison said. Mantles, doors, flooring, art items, dining sets, tables, and other furniture are increasing requested in mesquite.

An important purpose of the show is the continued development of craftsmen for genera-







AEP Texas North Company, 1401 South State Highway 70, Blackwell, Texas 79506-3109, which operates the Oak Creek Power Station, a steam electric power generation facility, has applied to the Texas Commission on Environmental Quality (TCEQ) for a renewal of TPDES Permit No. WQ0000997000, which authorizes the discharge of once-through cooling water at a daily maximum flow not to exceed 60,000,000 gallons per day via Outfall 001; low volume wastewater on an intermittent and flow variable basis via Outfall 002; the disposal of zeolite softener regeneration wastewater, boiler cleaning waste, filter backwash and metal cleaning waste via evaporation; and filter backwash via irrigation over 6.52 acres. This application was submitted to the TCEQ on February 20, 2004.

The facility is located adjacent to Oak Creek Reservoir, approximately ten miles north of the City of Bronte, Coke County, Texas. The effluent is discharged to Oak Creek Reservoir; thence to Oak Creek; thence to Colorado River Below E.V. Spence Reservoir, in Segment No. 1426 of the Colorado River Basin. The unclassified receiving waters have high aquatic life use for Oak Creek Reservoir and no significant aquatic life use for Oak Creek. The designated uses for Segment No. 1426 are high aquatic life use, contact recreation, and public water supply.

The TCEQ executive director has completed the technical review of the application and prepared a draft permit. The draft permit, if approved, would establish the conditions under which the facility must operate. The executive director has made a preliminary decision that this permit, if issued, meets all statutory and regulatory requirements. The permit application, executive director's preliminary decision (as contained in the technical summary and/or fact sheet), and draft permit are available for viewing and copying at the Coke County Library, 706 Austin Street, Robert Lee, Texas.

PUBLIC COMMENT / PUBLIC MEETING. You may submit public comments or request a public meeting about this application. The purpose of a public meeting is to provide the opportunity to submit written or oral comment or to ask questions about the application. Generally, the TCEQ will hold a public meeting if the executive director determines that there is a significant degree of public interest in the application or if requested by a local legislator. A public meeting is not a contested case hearing.

Written public comments and requests for a public meeting should be submitted to the Office of the Chief Clerk, MC 105, TCEQ, P.O. Box 13087, Austin, TX 78711-3087 within 30 days of the date of newspaper publication of this notice.

OPPORTUNITY FOR A CONTESTED CASE HEARING. After the deadline for public comments, the executive director will consider the comments and prepare a response to all relevant and material, or significant public comments. The response to comments, along with the executive director's decision on the application, will be mailed to everyone who submitted public comments or who requested to be on a mailing list for this application. If comments are received, the mailing will also provide instructions for requesting a contested case hearing or reconsideration of the executive director's decision. A contested case hearing is a legal proceeding similar to a civil trial in a state district court.

A contested case hearing will only be granted based on disputed issues of fact that are relevant and material to the Commission's decision on the application. Further, the Commission will only grant a hearing on issues at were raised during the public comment period and not withdrawn. Issues that are not raised in public comments may not be considered during a hearing. The TCEQ may act on this application to renew a permit without providing an opportunity for a contested case hearing if certain criteria are met.

EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR ACTION. The executive director may issue final approval of the application unless a timely contested case hearing request or a timely request for reconsideration is filed. If a timely hearing request or request for reconsideration is filed, the executive director will not issue final approval of the permit and will forward the application and requests to the TCEQ Commissioners for their consideration at a scheduled Commission meeting.

MAILING LISTS. In addition to submitting public comments, you may ask to be placed on a mailing list to receive future public notices mailed by the Office of the Chief Clerk. You may request to be added to: (1) the mailing list for this specific application; (2) the permanent mailing list for a specific applicant name and permit number; and/or (3) the permanent mailing list for a specific county. Clearly specify which mailing list(s) to which you wish to be added and send your request to the TCEQ Office of the Chief Clerk at the address above. Unless you otherwise specify, you will be included only on the mailing list for this specific application.



We Need To Tackle the Social Security Challenge Now

America's Social Security system is headed for trouble, two trains rumbling toward a collision. One train rumbles on tracks laid down by financial promises made when this New Deal-era program was established. The second travels on a path set by long-term demographic trends. To avoid the wreck, we need to change the courses of the trains, and the time to do it is long before the conductors on these trains can see each other.

Without significant changes, the question is not whether this accident will happen,

but when. The demographic trends pushing us toward disaster are simple: birthrates are going down while people are living longer. This was not a problem in 1935 when President Franklin D. Roosevelt founded the Social Security program. With an average life expectancy of 64, only 54 percent of workers were expected to live long enough to collect their checks. Today, the U.S. Census reports the average life expectancy is 77.2 years and increasing. Department of Health and Human Services reports that by 2050, American men will live an average of 79.7 years and women will live even longer.

These trends will be amplified when 76 million Baby Boomers hit retirement age. Born between 1946 and 1964, they will begin retiring in 2008, and threaten to swamp the Social Security system.

For many years, there was no problem with Social Security, because the abundance of workers paid far more into the program than it provided to retirees. The excess money was placed in something called the "Social Security Trust Fund."

Unfortunately, by law, the Trust Fund is required to save the excess payments in U.S. Treasury bonds which

"IOUs" from taxpayers. The money itself has been spent. This means the minute the Social Security system takes less in from workers than it pays to retirees, it will have to draw on those bonds, which will have to be made good by taxpayers. This shortfall is predicted to begin as early as 2018.

Inaction is out of the question. According to the Heritage Foundation, if Congress does nothing to reform the system, Social Security will need general fund infusions to make up the difference in tax revenues and benefit payments amounting to \$72 billion in 2020, \$275 billion in 2030, \$429 billion in 2050 and \$719 billion in 2070. The long-term projections of Social Security's financial health will continue to worsen because, with each passing year, a surplus year passes and a deficit year is added in the calculation.

Compounding this problem was the fact that changes in Social Security also weakened the financial health of the system. Originally, initial benefits at the time of retirement were linked to inflation, but in the 1970s they were pegged to the rise in wages, which tend to go up faster than prices. are, for lack of a better word, Coupled with demography
