Local election results posted

Local elections were held in Coke County Saturday, May 7, 2005.

West Coke County Hospital District will add two new members to the Board following this election. Dessie Kendall received 190 votes, with Mary Bessent joining her on the board with 161 votes. Incumbent Judy Williams received 84 votes.

In the Bronte Independent School District Board of Trustees election, incumbents Kendall Gibbs, 97, and Scott Frasier, 96, maintained their seats. Others receiving votes included Quinda Duncan, 71, Paul Williams, 50, and Shane Kelton, 33.

Jackie Walker, 91 votes, will join incumbents John Carver, 127, and Jason Treadaway, 119, on the Robert Lee City Council. Others receiving votes included Gary Payne, 60, and Brian Hamrick, 42.

Plan underway to rehab amphitheater

A plan that could bring hundreds to Robert Lee throughout the year is underway. A target date of July 4th has been set to initiate the Robert Lee amphitheater into the music realm.

The amphitheater that Lucile and Wilson Bryan built and filled with music and drama over the years has stood empty for several years except for the Easter Sunrise services and a few musical performances.

With the recent interest in blue grass, gospel, western, and Tejano music throughout the country, a group of Robert Lee musicians and interested people have formed an adjunct of the Pageant Association to rehabilitate the amphitheater and bring in performers.


A research trip to Austin by a music teacher and blue grass performer from San Angelo indicates that musicians from that area are looking for a venue in which to play their music and would be excited to come to the Robert Lee area to perform.

A research trip to Colorado City during a blue grass festival revealed that some ninety motor homes were parked there whose owners were in town specifically to attend the musical performances. Following the performances in Colorado City, many of the motor homes were going to the next blue grass performance in other towns.

A blue grass promoter at Colorado City expressed an enthusiastic interest in the Robert Lee amphitheater when the plans were explained.

Those who have attended the blue grass performance in Big Lake report that the crowds are large, congenial, and bring in funds to the city and the fire department which sponsors the events.







CSP signup continues through May 27

Signup for the 20 Texas watersheds selected for funding in 2005 continues through May 27, The Conservation 2005. Security Program (CSP) is the first conservation program to recognize farmers and ranchers for their high levels of environmental stewardship and to help producers maintain and further their conservation commitment.

"CSP is a whole new direction in the history of USDA conservation programs," said USDA-Natural Resources Conservation Service (NRCS) State Conservationist Dr. Larry D. Butler. "It represents the first time agricultural producers are being paid not just to fix a problem, but in recognition their ongoing stewardship."

The Upper Colorado Watershed in Coke, Nolan, Mitchell, Runnels and Sterling counties is one of the watersheds selected for CSP. Producers interested in participating will need to fill out a CSP selfassessment workbook and bring the completed workbook and needed documentation of conservation management activities to their local NRCS office. NRCS personnel will then determine if their operation meets the requirements for the program. CSP information and the selfassessment workbook are available at local NRCS Service Centers, or on the NRCS Web site at www.tx.nrcs.usda.gov /programs/csp.






