Community members meet to try to save Bronte pool
A group of Bronte residents lines. Also, the bid outlines and taxpayers met Thursday that some work must be done evening at the local swimming pool to review the status of the pool's deteriorated condition and gain information concerning plans to renovate the facility. No county officials were on hand, but copies of documents and other records were reviewed to reveal the following status:

1. Pool renovation project was officially begun April 22 2002, when the county filed paperwork for a $\$ 50,000$ grant from the Texas Recreation and Parks entity. Guidelines of the grant indicated completion was to be accomplished within 3 years, and the action plan called for the submission of 501c3 (non-profit corporation) status. This grant has since been extended, and now expires August 15, 2005
2. Consultant engineer was hired Julý 26, 2004, and original contract called for work to be completed no later than May 15, 2005. Engineer's preliminary report was filed September, 2004; bids were to be received in October. Low bid received in 2004 was around $\$ 254,000$.
3. The consultant engineer received bids based on a design with a zero-entry end, which would allow small children, handicapped individuals, and others to enjoy very shallow water play. At 9 feet, the deep end is not deep enough to conform to require ments for a diving board, so the design includes bringing the depth up to 5 feet to be used for water sports such as volleyball and basketball. A slide could be used at this end. Pool circulation, filtration, and chemical systems would be removed and replaced with new systems, eliminating the old "gutter" system and bringing the systems into compliance. This work appears to account for the most expensive part of the renovation as the old plumbing and systems must be tunneled out and replaced. Bid did not include renovation of bath houses, restrooms, and concession stand, nor did it address electrical service by others such as demolishing and disposing of certain existing items; hauling caliche/gravel materials; installing handicapped parking; and other issues.
4. Funding status as of June 15,2005 , was as follows: Texas Parks \& Wildlife Grant $\$ 50,000$; Matching Coke County Funds $\$ 50,000$; Bronte Economic Development Board $\$ 59,068$; Concho Valley RC\&D Grant $\$ 500$; Fundraiser and donations $\$ 24,564$; for a total of \$184,132.
After consideration of the above information, meeting attendees discussed various concerns. Plan of action was outlined as follows

Recommend to the Commissioner's Court to use the local Coke County Foundation as the representative 501c3 non-profit corporation for the Bronte Pool Project. Purpose is two-fold: 1) Allows more broadlybased fundraising/grant application entity with local, organized oversight and 2) Allows for community project input and a more cohesive management strategy. STATUS: OPEN - awaiting County decision with several attending Commissioner's Court July 11.
2. Motions were made to elect President of community group. STATUS: TABLED awaiting decision by County to use Coke County Foundation.
3. Community members want pricing for optional plans, including building a new pool "from scratch." STATUS: PENDING - Local commercial pool contractors have volunteered to meet with community members this week to educate concerning options.
4. Fundraising efforts will continue with lemonade stand/donut sales planned for July 2. STATUS: CLOSED event netted over \$1,500.
5. Grant application work will consider additional avenues. STATUS: PENDING - in progress.


RL Vision Planning Session! Approximately fifty Robert Lee city leaders met Tuesday, June 28, 2005, at the Big Rec Hall to identify the strong points of the community. 6. Long-term: Maintenance concerns for the new systems (once in place) were addressed. STATUS: OPEN
Consensus of the attendees at last week's meeting indicated one agenda, and that was to make every effort to keep the Bronte swimming pool a viable aspect of summertime recreation for the community, both young and old alike. Weekly progress is expected.
With less than 60 days left before the pool is closed forever by the "powers-that-be", it will take a focused, collaborative effort between all citizens to make this project a reality.

## nutrition tips

Summertime, and the living is easy - that is, until you notice the havoc all that fun in the sun has wrought on your body. Fortunately, summer also brings an abundance of tasty and nutritious foods, including berries, loaded with antioxidants; tomatoes; sweet bell peppers, a good vitamin C source; and pro-tein-filled grilled fish and burgers. And by simply choosing the right ones to add to your daily diet, you can help prevent or alleviate the following common hotweather woes:
Dry Or Damaged Skin
What causes it
sweat more in the summer, so skin is less supple; plus, saltwater and chlorine have a drying effect. Sunburns and bug bites are also saboteurs
of healthy skin
What to eat: Help hea weathered skin with foods like raspberries, blueberries, and strawberries, which are rich in antioxidants and vita $\min$ C. Protein, in the form of lean meats, beans, nuts and seeds, is also key. Keep dry ness at bay by drinking lots of water. It is recommended that women drink 92 ounces ( $8-10$ cups) of water in the summer and men 125 ounces to prevent dehydration Since calcium can also be lost through sweating, it's a good idea to replace it by eat ing low-fat dairy products like skim milk, yogurt and cottage cheese
Parched Hair
What causes
Overexposure to sun, saltwa ter and chlorine.
What to eat: Toss some burgers or shrimp kabobs on the grill, or make a threebean salad or other protein rich meal because hair consists of protein fibers called keratin. Eating foods rich in vitamin B-5, found in yogur and California avocados vitamin B-8, in liver and cooked eggs; folic acid, in fortified cereals and beans; calcium in milk and yogurt and zinc, in meat and fish can reduce hair loss and replace dull hair with shiny hair. These nutrients also play a role in maintaining healthy skin.
Muscle Cramps
What causes them:
Too many games of beach volleyball or other outdoor exercise. Muscle cramps result from overexertion and dehydration. When you don't have enough fluid in your system, it leads to an electrolyte imbalance that causes your muscles to cramp up. Sodium, calcium, and potassium are the main electrolytes lost through sweating during exercise.
What to eat: Replenish electrolytes with a sports drink that contains them and drink water. Potassium - rich foods include bananas, raisins, potatoes, and spinach.

## Eye Damage

What causes it: Bright sunlight can damage the macula, the part of the eye where vision is most acute
What to eat: The retina is actually made up of vitamin A. Thus, foods rich in this vitamin - along with beta-carotene, selenium and Vitamins C and E - are beneficial to the eyes. Good sources are dark green vegetables like kale,

What causes them: Sun exposure can trigger cold sores in people who are prone to them.
What to eat: Thé amino acid L-lysine inhibits the ability of the herpes virus, which causes cold sores to replicate itself; taking Llysine tablets while you have a cold sore may speed healing. Experiment to determine the lowest effective dose for you. A deficiency in B vitamins and riboflavin can make you susceptible to cold sores. It is recommended to eat fortified cereals and bread or taking a B-complex vitamin.

Iron chlorosis, insects
can damage lawn
Is Your Lawn Turning Yellow? It Could Be "Iron Chlorosis"! Are the new leaves of your lawn grass turning yellow? If you look even closer, are the veins on these new leaves remaining green? It could be that your grass is suffering from iron chlorosis. Iron chlorosis occurs on sites during wet and cool conditions, on compacted sites, in soils with extreme pH levels (high or low), as well as with soils having excessive phosphorus levels.

Foliar applications of iron sulfate at the recommended labeled rates usually will provide a quick recovery. Unfortunately, these are very short-lived and repeat applications may be needed. Soil applied iron products may or may not provide a response due to the fact that this iron supplement could be tied up in the soil. For the best results, use a chelated iron (plant available) formulation These may be more expensive, but will provide a long er lasting effect to your iron deficient turf. Examples of the chelating agents used today include EDDHA, HEDTA, EDTA, and DPTA Chelating agents of EDDHA, DPTA, and HEDTA are most effective for alkaline soils. For less alkaline and slightly acid soils, EDTA would be effective. Other chelates for iron can be found in many of the natural organic fertilizers and composts. Always read the analysis on the label to find if iron ( Fe ) exists and what formulation it is in.
In addition to proper application of iron products to your lawn, always remember to avoid getting these products on sidewalks, patios, driveways, etc. Many of these products will leave stains that are difficult, if not impossible, to remove.
Chinch Bugs-Have You Found Them In Your Lawn? Chinch bugs, although a very small insect pest, can infest a lawn in great numbers and cause serious damage if not controlled. St. Augustine grass is the primary victim, but chinch bugs have been known to affect other lawn grasses such as zoysia grass, centipede grass, and Bermuda grass.
These sap-sucking insects seem to prefer hot and dry areas of your lawn and may be a lawn problem from late spring through fall. The adults will be $1 / 6$ to $1 / 5$ of an inch long with black bodies and white wings--each wing having a triangular black mark. Each life cycle lasts 7 to 8 weeks and there can be up to 5 generations per year in Texas. Damage to St. Augustine begins with
expanding, irregular patches of yellow-stunted grass that may become 'dead grass' if the population of feeding chinch bugs is above the 'threshold level'
To know if chinch bugs are the critters causing damage to your lawn, hammer an empty coffee can (open at both ends) one-inch into the soil beneath stunted areas and add water. The chinch bugs should float to the top. Another method is to spray water mixed with a small amount of liquid dishwashing detergent onto the infected sites--the chinch bugs (and some other insects as well) should come to the top of the canopy. The best method is to just get on your hands and knees and search into the canopy of the lawn. To locate them, search sites that immediately border the infected areas. Once you have determined that chinch bugs are the culprits, use an insecticide for control and always remember to 'read the label and follow label directions for application'. Remember, diazinon and chlorpyrifos are no longer available--insecticides containing bifenthrin, cyfluthrin, or permethrin seem to work well.
White Grubs - It's Time To Watch Out For These Pests! Have you ever had areas in your lawn that die and turn straw-colored? Can these areas be lifted by hand or be rolled up from the ground like a carpet? If so, your lawn may have been damaged by white grubs.

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White grubs have to be one of the scariest-looking creatures that you will find-they remind me of small alien creatures that you would see in the movies. While the beetle stage of their life cycle feed on ornamental plants, the larval stage "that develops from the eggs laid in the soil is what causes the lawn damage. Larva is also referred to as the "white grub" stage of the May or June beetles. These root-feeding "grubs" are creamy-white and C-shaped with three pairs of legs, and their damage normally occurs during the summer and fall time period. They feed on grass root systems, and damaged areas begin as weakened or dying grass in irregular shapes. Eventually, if the population and damage is severe, these areas in your lawn will die. To locate these 'alien creatures', dig into the infected sites with a spade or shovel to a depth of at least 4 inches. Finding white grubs in numbers of 3 to 5 per square foot suggests insecticide treatment is needed. Products of choice are


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
