Early voting in local elections ends Tuesday

Early voting in the two local upcoming elections ends Tuesday, September 6, 2005.

The elections, slated for Saturday, September 10, 2005, include an election for Bronte citizens to vote for or against the adoption of a tax freeze for persons who are disabled or who are 65 years of age or older; and an election for voters in Justice of the Peace, Precinct 2 (Commissioner Precincts 2 and 4) to determine whether beer and wine will continue being sold for off-premise consumption in this precinct.

Citizens may cast their early votes in the "tax freeze" election at City Hall, 114 S. Washington, in Bronte from 8 am to 12 noon and from 1 pm to 5 pm, Mondays through Fridays, between August 24 and September 6. Citizens may also vote at this location from 7 am to 7 pm on Saturday, September 10, in this election.

Two locations are available for early voting in the "beer/wine" election. Early ballots may be cast at the Clerk's office in the Courthouse in Robert Lee. This office is open Monday through Thursday, 8 am to 5 pm, and 8 am to 1 pm on Fridays. Early voting will also be held at the Coke County Annex in Bronte from 9

am to 1 pm Mondays through Fridays. Polling places on election day will include the Bronte Senior Building for Precinct 2 and Bronte City Hall for



Lake Stamford flooded area lake homes in August, leaving twenty-four permanent resident families at Veda's Camp homeless. The area received between fourteen and twenty inches of rain on the watershed that feeds into Lake Stamford. The lake is located between Haskell and Stamford in Haskell County.

FSA accepting applications for emergency loans

The Farm Service Agency (FSA) is now accepting applications for Emergency Farm Loans resulting from damages and losses caused by hail, high winds, and a tornado that occurred on May 31, 2005.

Sterling County and Coke

County have been designated as contiguous disaster counties. Farm Loan Manager, Roger W. Kalina, asks farmers who want to apply for emergency loans to submit their applications as soon as possible. The deadline for applications is 3/01/2006, but if farmers wait too long, a backlog will develop and cause delays.

Generally, farmers who have lost 30 percent of their production due to designated disaster are eligible for emergency loans. The FSA office is located at 103 W. Florida Avenue in Sweetwater, Texas, (325) 236-6337.



Stories of Coke County Veterans



Coke County native Dean Hallmark executed following raid on Japan

President Franklin Roosevelt had what news correspondent Quentin Reynolds called, "a fierce, consuming hatred for the Japanese." He wanted to strike the Japanese homeland long before Pearl Harbor. Claire Chennault, advisor to Generalissimo Chaing Kai - Shek was commanding the First American Volunteer Group which was defending the Burma Road. Second American Volunteer Group was recruited to fly Lockheed Hudson and Douglas DB - 7 bombers bearing Chinese insignia in raids against Japan's home islands. Sixty - six planes and crews were secretly released from the U.S. Army and Navy and financed by private companies with government approval. They left the United States November 21, 1941, and were at sea when the attack came on Pearl Harbor. Roosevelt pressed his staff

to find a way to take the war to Japan. Industrialists offered large sums of money to the first person to bomb Tokyo. Roosevelt tried to persuade Joseph Stalin to do this for us, but already hardpressed by the Germans, Stalin feared a two front war. We tried to negotiate an American base near the Russian seaport of Vladivostok, 600 miles from Tokyo, but Stalin would not

Capt. Francis Low, an operations officer for Adm. Ernest J. King was in Norfolk on January 10, 1942 to inspect the navy's newest carrier, USS Hornet. A submariner, Low noticed a line painted across a runway marking the length of a carrier that was used by navy pilots to safely practice short - run takeoffs and landings. As he watched two twin engine army bombers practice a bombing run down the simulated deck, an idea began to form. Bombers mastering the short - run takeoff could be moved by a carrier into a strike zone and we could bomb Japan!

March 1, 1942, Jimmy Doolittle was given his command and 140 men had volunteered for what would be the most dangerous undertaking of their lives. They crowded into the operations office at Elgin Field, near Pensacola, Florida. Doolittle got to the point; he made it very clear that if any man decided to drop out, it would not be held against him. Next, he raised what he said was the most important issue, the utmost secrecy. Last of all, he told them they had three weeks to train for the mission.

Naval Lt. "Hank" Miller was given an unusual order, to teach some army pilots how to take off from a carrier in a B - 25 in fifteen days. Miller had never flown a B -25. He had never even seen one! The army fliers remedied that and working together they developed a

standard for the take - off run. They also mastered low level flying, sometimes inches off the ground for long distances. Fifty - five hours of training was scheduled for each crew, and that time was equally divided between day and night navagation.

Despite secrecy, as training progressed, Miller instructed the crews on proper behavior aboard a naval vessel, and everyone knew their mission destination would be Japan. The pilots and crews personalized their planes with names and insignias and in the third week of March took off on a two - thousand mile flight to test navigation skills and their ability to achieve optimal gas mileage. They were trained, willing and eager to go. March 23rd, Doolittle made the announcement, "Today's the day we move out!" Sixteen crews flew across the United States in small groups to McClellan Field, California where the radio equipment was removed from the planes. They were told, "You won't need a radio where you're going.

April second at 10:15 in the morning, in bright sunlight, the USS Hornet sailed out of San Francisco Bay carrying sixteen modified B-25s. Doolittle assembled the men in a wardroom and confirmed that they had been trained for a special mission to bomb Japan. He explained arrangements with the Chinese for the planes, which would be low on gas, to land in eastern China, refuel and proceed to Chungking. Again, he said there were spare crewmen and any volunteer could still change his mind but no one did. Ten planes were given targets in Tokyo, three in Yokama and the remaining three Nogoya, Kobe and

The task force was discovered April 18 by the Japanese who began moving naval units toward them. Halsey could not risk his ships. In high seas, 150 miles short of the planned launch point, Doolittle took off in the lead plane at 8:17 am. The mission, a well planned calculated risk, was now a suicide mission.

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Knowing they didn't have enough fuel to be assured of reaching the China coast, the men were once more given a chance to withdraw. No one did. Number six in the order of take - off of the Raiders was Lt. Dean E. Hallmark of Robert Lee, Texas. His Co-Pilot was Lt. Robert Meder, Navigator was Lt. Chase Nielsen, Bombadier, S/Sgt. William Dieter and his Gunner Sgt. Donald Fitzmaurice. Dean's plane, "Green Hornet", was also the sixth plane to reach Japan, and he successfully bombed his assigned military target, a group of steel mills, under heavy anti - aircraft fire. Four minutes short of the Chinese coast the Green Hornet ran out of gas and Hallmark had to ditch. He calmly gave orders to the crew and held the plane steady and level until the engines quit. The plane bounced off a wave and broke apart. The left wing sheared off, then the fuselage split open and the sea took them. The Bombadier, Bill Dieter, screamed in pain. Hallmark went through the windshield. Navigator, Chas Nielsen was knocked unconscious. He came to with a broken nose and climbed out of the water onto the top of the plane where he found Bob Meder. Despite deep cuts in his legs, Dean Hallmark joined them. Donald Fitzmaurice pulled himself through a side

window. Fifteen foot waves lashed the wreckage and it sank into the icy water. The life raft could not be inflated. It took four hours to swim to shore. Meder pulled Fitzmaurice along with him and discovered he was dead when they got to the beach. The tide brought Dieter's body ashore and he was also dead. Hallmark and Nielsen came ashore separately. The three survivors tried to get off the beach quickly, knowing that the territory was Japanese

occupied. Nielsen climbed to some high ground and raised his head to see a man he thought was Chinese holding a large knife who took him to a village near the shoreline. Dean also wandered into the same village where he was taken to a house and given hot tea by some Chinese soldiers. He tried to communicate. One of the soldiers signaled a warning that someone was coming. Fearing the Japanese, Hallmark searched for something to fight with. He found a club of sorts and moved to the door and raised the club over his head. When the door opened, the man who entered was Nielsen.

They were taken to a Chinese garrison an hour away where they found Bob Meder. In darkness the Chinese took the three back to the dead bodies of Deter and Fitzmaurice which they buried there on the beach. So, the crew of the Green Hornet was at the mercy of puppet Chinese forces in the vicinity of Nanchang. The three were hidden in a tiny compartment below decks in a rotting old sampan. Sick, wounded and scared, they covered themselves with rags and mats in bilge water with floating human waste.

The Chinese were trying to get them to the mainland into free China, but when the sampan reached Wenchow and Captain Ling went ashore, he came back with the news of their air strike and told them the Japanese were searching for them all along the coast. Ling took them into Wenchow that night and turned them over to a Mr. Wong, an elderly Chinese who had been educated in England.

Wong gave them clean, hearty food and warned them of the brutality of the Japanese, then he led them through a maze of alleys trying to get out of the city. Soon, they realized they were

surrounded. They entered a tiny, empty room with no hiding places. Hallmark, called "Jungle Jim" because he was well over six feet and weighed 200 pounds, backed into a corner and tried to cover himself with some sacks. Nielsen and Meder climbed up Hallmark's knees and shoulders to hide in the rafters. Wong sat down cross legged and pretended to be trying to light a small char-coal burner. When the door swung open, the Japanese entered. One soldier stood in the doorway with a machine gun and another kicked at the sacks until he uncovered Dean Hallmark. In perfect English the officer said that if Hallmark didn't stand, he would be shot. When he stood he was asked where the other two were. Hallmark said he didn't know what they were talking about. At that point, the officer began to beat Wong who fell against the wall right below Meder and Nielsen. He looked up and then pointed at the Americans. They climbed down and the three became the prisoners of the Japanese.

Their hands were tied behind their backs and the Japanese led them through Wenchow kicking and beating them sadistically. They arrived in Shanghai on April 24 where they endured brutal interrogations at the hand of the Kemper Tai, the Japanese army's military police, trained in sadistic methods. At first, they were beaten from head to toe, front and back with long bamboo poles. Then they were taken to separate rooms with cuffs on their hands and feet and baskets over their heads. The interrogators doubted that it was possible to have launched the B-25s from a carrier, but they had apparently found something to link the operation to the carrier Hornet. With each evasive answer the sadism escalated. They were tied and stretched

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on their backs while water was forced into their mouths and noses until they passed Then the Japanese forced the water out of them by jumping on their sto-machs. They were stretched on a torture rack. They all endured the "knee spread". Kneeling, hands tied behind their backs, a pole three inches thick was placed behind their knees, then guards jumped on their thighs forcing the knee joints to spread until they lost consciousness. After a series of "treatments", circulation was affected and the legs mercifully went numb. Each torture session on the prisoners

lasted two hours. They were all kept in solitary confinement, given meager rations of tea and rice and deprived of sleep. They were never allowed to bathe or shave. April 25th, they were flown to Tokyo and brought together, but they were not allowed to speak. Each was stunned by the condition of the others. For the next 18 days, they were questioned twenty - four hours a day. Finally, they were shown a set of maps from one of the downed B - 25s. They had endured the torture for nothing, the Japanese had known the answers all the time. After that, the fliers slept at night and were tortured all day. They were weakened by dysentary. There was a hole in the floor for a toilet and no medical aid of any kind.

On May 22, the men were led into an interrogation room, seated at a table and without translators forced to sign confessions to war crimes. The torture ceased. Two weeks later, wrists and ankles cuffed, they were photographed and driven to a railroad station. They spent two days chained to seats on a train to Nagasaki. They had not washed or changed clothing in two months and all suffered from dysentary. At this time, they were given decent food and allowed to talk freely with each other. Next, they boarded a ship and for two days they were well fed and well treated. June 19th, the ship docked in Shanghai and the three were transfered to the Bridge House Jail and crowded into a cell with five other Americans, the crew of the "Bat Out of Hell", the sixth take off plane, pilot Lt. William Farrow and his crew, Capt. Jacob DeShazor, Lt. Robert Hite, Lt. George Barr and Sgt. Harold Spatz and fifteen Chinese prisoners. At this time, Hallmark was too weak to stand. Some of the Chinese were comatose and enough room for everyone to lie down. They took turns standing in overpowering

The eight Americans had barely enough food to live, tea and rice with maggots and worms. Nielsen begged

them all to eat whatever was Amanda Ake and was born at the hole in the floor that served as a toilet and hold him. Eventually, they all became too weak and exhausted to help each other and they all lay in their own waste, covered with bed bugs and bites from rodents, covered in lice.

On August 28th, the Americans were taken from this cell and put on the bed of They were all blindfolded and a truck. Sergeant Harold Spatz, a twenty - one year old from Lebo, Kansas wrote to his father, "I want you to know I died fighting for my country like a soldier." Dean Hallmark of Robert Lee, Texas had become lucid enough to know what was happening. He was the son of Ollie Dean Hallmark and

President Roosevelt knew Hallmark, Spatz and Farrow, but kept the news secret until April 1943, a year after the strike on the Japanese home-land. The American people had never been told that any of the Raiders had been captured and innocently assumed that all the fliers had survived. When the official communique was released cause of a combination of circumstances, our planes were unable to reach their assigned landing fields. All of the planes crashed." We learned that one plane came down in Soviet Russian Territory. Others made forced or crash landings in China, some in Japanese occupied territory or in the water off the Chinese coast. Doolittle,

lined up on the Hornet's deck in heavy seas waiting their turn. Expecting to be Court Martialed for his command of a mission where he lost every plane, Doolittle made his way across China joined by Major John Hilger, pilot of the 14th take - off plane, reaching Chuchow on Sunday, April 12, where they were decorated by Madame Chiang Kai -Sheck. Later, Doolittle was awarded the Congressional Medal of Honor.

Mrs. Hallmark was telegraphed that her son was missing and requested not to disclose or discuss the circumstances due to the grave need for security. In a final act of unreasonable cruelty, the Japanese cremated the bodies of Hallmark, Spatz and Farrow and their ashes were placed in boxes where their names were deliberatly changed to conceal the true identity of each man. Hallmark's were labled J. C. Smith, Lt. William Farrow, the pilot of the last plane to take off, "Bat Out of Hell", had his remains marked H. E. Gande and his bombadier in the sixteenth plane, Sgt. Harold Spatz, remains were labeled E. L. Brister. Records were found after the war which located and identified the mysterious remains on a shelf at the International Funeral Home in Shanghai, China. They are all reverently buried as the heroes they were at Arlington.

At the ensuing War Crimes Trials, Nielsen testified for two days. Lt. George Barr, Lt. Robert Hite and Cpl. Jacob DeShazer, the crew of the last plane, take - off 16 who had bailed out over China and survived as Japanese prisoners of war for three and a half years described the capture, treatment and torture of our men. Others who testified were Teh Ling Chang who was Chinese and two Russians, Alexander



Small financial moves for new parents

If you are a new parent, you're probably enjoying one of the happiest times of your life. And you'll find it's easy to get absorbed in the day - to - day activities of your child. Yet, with the addition of a child, your family has a whole new set of financial needs - so you'll want to plan and prepare for them.

Here are a few ideas to consider.

*Draw up a simple will -By drawing up a simple will, you can designate, within limits, how you want your asssets distributed, and you can identify a guardian for your child, should anything happen to you and your spouse. If you die without a will ("intestate"), the courts may have to make all sorts of decisions regarding your estate and the future of your child - and there's no guarantee that these actions will be what you would have chosen.

your children in increments, rather than all at once, when they reach 18.

*Review your insurance coverage - As soon as you become a parent, you'll need sufficient life insurance to help provide for your child, should anything happen to you. You may want to take out enough insurance to cover both your mortgage and your child's college education. And make sure your beneficiary designations are up to date.

*Open a Section 529 college savings plan - For the past several years, college costs have increased much faster than the general rate of inflation. If you have a newborn, who knows how much he or she will have to pay for college in 18 years? That's why you may want to open a Section 529 college savings plan. Your earnings will have an opportunity to grow tax - free, as long as the money is used to help pay for college, although the money will appear as income on the child's tax return. (Unless the laws change, this tax benefit is scheduled to expire on December 31, 2010.)

*Keep saving for your own retirement - Even if you do open a Section 529 plan or another college - savings vehicle, you'll still need to continue saving for your retirement. Try to "max out" on your IRA and your 401(k) or other type of "employer sponsored retirement plan. If your child has to take out a loan to go to school, he or she has many years to pay it back, but if you run short of retirement income, you won't get a second chance.

*Take advantage of tax breaks for new parents -Once you have a child, you get a dependent exemption and, depending on your income, a child tax credit. But you can get other tax advantages, too, such as potential deductions for child care expenses. See your tax advisor to make sure you're getting all the breaks you're entitled to as a parent.

Enjoy these days when you've got a new child. But at the same time, keep your eye on the future - It will be here before you know it.

Robert Lee Citizens Establish Goals! Approximately 40 Robert Lee residents attended the most recent meeting August 23 to establish a vision and a list of issues and focus areas with which to improve the economic stability of the community.

Community leaders establish measurable goals for RL future

Robert Lee has progressed to Mile Marker 7 on the Texas Midwest Community Network Visioning Chart. That means that the community has established a vision and a list of critical issues, prioritized focus areas, identified desired results for near - term and long - term range (3 year) and set widely supported, measurable goals.

On Tuesday, September 13, Robert Lee will complete outlining attainable objectives and strategies and will move on to Mile Marker 8 in which a clear action plan is set with completion dates and responsibilities assigned to appropriate parties. Mile Markers 9 and 10 include defining a process for sharing progress and plan for adjustments and regular evaluation of the plan.

(Continued from Page 1) In his off duty time, Officer Malone enjoys fishing, cooking, and collecting football and basketball cards. He has a love for catfish but says a steak never hurts. In the evening, Officer Malone enjoys watching his favorite cooking show, Emeril Live. Officer Malone is a Board Member of North Side Boys and Girls Club of San Angelo and the San Angelo Recreation Center. As a mentor at the recreation center, Officer Malone created a Break Dance group named the Electro Breakers. In 1982, Officer Malone performed for a Coke commercial. He also taught basketball at the recreation center. One of the students he taught went on to play college basketball at Texas Tech University. As a member of the board at the Boys and Girls Club, he is instrumental in the program planning. He often works with young members to help them prepare for their future. One of Officer Malone's recent projects is speaking with under-privileged youth in hopes of preventing them from going down the wrong path.

Officer Malone also supports the Good Fellow Air Force Recreation Program, working with members of the US Air Force in their lake program, maintaining the area and working in the base commissary. Prior to joining the CCJJC family, Officer Malone worked for seven years at Church's Chicken as a manager and thirteen years at Wendy's as a manager. Watch for snakes during upcoming dove season

By: Joan Davis The Publisher, aka Hal Spain, did a good job of giving a rundown of the season opener of bird season Sept. 1. He did leave out one important note. The rattlesnake population is heavy; a number of dogs on this side of the county have been bitten. Folks are finding them in storerooms, gardens, and under shrubs. Anytime the rat and mice numbers are up, so are snakes. With heavy weed and grass cover up to our knees, it will be really difficult for me to look to the sky to shoot and watch my feet at the same time!

The only additional thing I have to offer is a few words on the Ringnecked Dove we have noticed the last two years here. They are not considered game birds and do not count in your bag limits. Accurately called Eurasian Collared Doves, the birds are much lighter in color and have a dark collar ring around the neck. They are quite large and look much like a pigeon. I have not personally eaten one but folks say they are dark meat, like any dove. If

hunters do choose to try them, they are a bonus.

Coke County Extension agents will be conducting 4-H meetings in Bronte and Robert Lee to kick off the 4-H year. Any youth who is either 9 years old or 8 years old and in the 3rd grade, and has not reached their 19th birthday by August 31, 2005, is eligible to become a 4-H member.

Meetings in Robert Lee will be held the first Wednesday of the month beginning September 7, 2005. The senior 4-H group, grades 7-12, will meet during the AR period (1:59-2:29 p.m.) in the library and the junior 4-H group, grades 3-6, will meet after school in the cafeteria.

Bronte 4-H meetings will be held the 2nd Wednesday of the month, beginning September 14, 2005. Grades 3-12 will meet after school in the library.

4-H is open to any youth regardless of sex, religion, race, socio-economic level, color, disability, or national origin, who meet the age requirement listed above.

Individuals with disabilities who require an auxiliary aid, service or accommodation in order to participate in these meetings are encouraged to contact the Coke County Extension office at (325) 453-2461 to determine how reasonable accommodations can be made.

Being a member of 4-H offers vast opportunities to gain valuable experience in leadership, learning responsibility, inter-action with others and knowledge in several project areas. Many people have the misconception that 4-H members only learn to cook, sew or have livestock projects, but 4-H is "more than just cooking and cows." Youth can participate in project areas including: gardening, horticulture, electricity,

shooting sports, archery, government, wildlife, dog care and training, poultry and numerous other learning experiences.

Through project work, being on judging teams, public speaking, method demonstrations and other 4-H areas, youth can learn valuable lessons in responsibility, being able to think for themselves, be able to speak in front of groups and other beneficial lessons to help them in their lives later on. Also, 4-H is not just for youth. Adults and parents are encouraged to become involved as volunteer leaders to assist in club meetings and various project groups.
