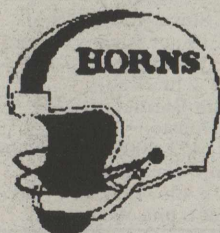

**Henry**

J.T. Henry was born in Vernon, Texas, November 15, 1912, to S.B. and Oma Henry. In 1932, he graduated from Sterling City High School and went on to receive his B.S. in Vocational Agriculture from Texas Tech University in 1936. In the fall of that same year, he began what was to be a thirty-eight year career of teaching vocational agriculture to Bronte students. This time was interrupted when he served with the United States Army Air Corp. from 1942-1945.

In 1937, he met Sybil Ellis, also a Bronte school teacher and they married on June 12, 1938. J.T. and Sybil compiled seventy-one years of teaching in the Bronte schools between the two of them. In October of 2000, the new J.T. Henry Agriculture Building was dedicated. J.T. received a Masters in 1953 from Sul Ross State University in Alpine, Texas. He retired from teaching in 1974. He is still remembered and admired by many former students.

Mr. Henry was a longtime member of the First United Methodist Church and served many years on the church board. He was a sixty-six year member of the Masonic Lodge #962. He served as Worshipful Master, Lodge #962 Secretary and District Deputy. He was also a member of the Eastern Star Chapter #1048.

J.T. enjoyed many hobbies and shared his love of each with his beloved grandson, Benjamin Boyer. He was an avid golfer, helping establish the Singing Winds golf course in Bronte. He was a game hunter, fisherman, and craftsman. Friends and family will remember him through the crafted items he made for them.

He is survived by his wife of sixty-seven years, Sybil Ellis Henry, one daughter, Linda Henry Boyer of Del Rio, one grandson, Benjamin J. Boyer and wife, Angie of San Angelo.

He was preceded in death by his parents, two brothers, and one sister.

Funeral services were at 2:30 pm Saturday, October

22, 2005, at the First United Methodist Church of Bronte, officiated by Larry Tienen. Burial followed in Fairview Cemetery.

Pallbearers were Bobby Clark, Bob Duncan, Bobby Evans, Jack Gentry, Jack Probst, and Bill Thomason. Honorary pallbearers were C.B. Barbee, E.F. Glenn, Harley Hilliard, Macafee Daniel, L.O. Clark, and Jack Asbill.

Administrator, said that he thinks the residents would really enjoy having a popcorn machine. The Auxiliary will try to find one and get a price. We'll report on it next month.

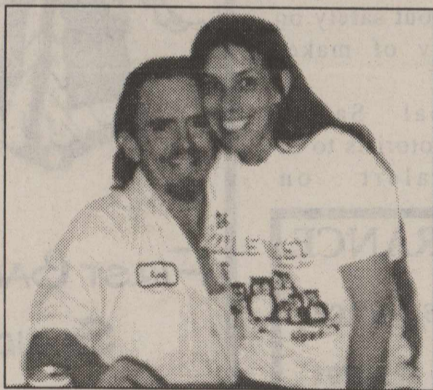

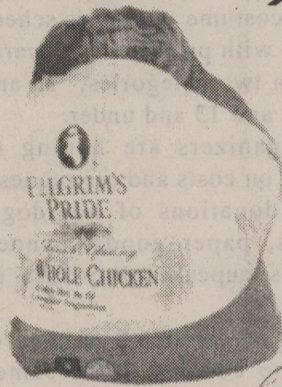

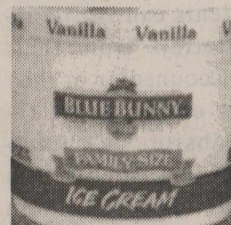

### ACT test registration deadline set Nov. 4

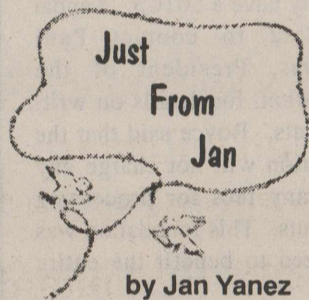
College-bound high school students can take the ACT college admission and placement exam on December 10, 2005, the next national test date. The deadline for postmark or online registration is November 4. The late registration deadline is November 17 (an additional \$18 fee is required for late registration). Students can get registration materials from their high school counselor or they can register online on ACT's student website ([www.act-student.org](http://www.act-student.org)). Students can also find the testing location closest to them on this website.

The ACT is an achievement test that measures what students have learned in school. The basic ACT exam includes four parts: English, reading, mathematics and science. An optional writing test is also available. Some colleges require or recommend a writing score, but many do not. To find out if a writing score is required by

particular colleges, students may visit ACT's website for a searchable list, or they may check with the colleges directly. ACT scores are accepted by virtually all colleges across the nation.

Some students perform better on the ACT than on other college entrance exams because it is based on achievement, not aptitude. The basic exam takes three hours to complete, plus an additional 30 minutes for those who opt to take the writing test.

The basic registration fee for the ACT is \$29. An additional \$14 fee is required for students who choose to take the ACT Writing Test, bringing the total registration fee to \$43 for these students. Free sample tests are available from school counselors and on ACT's website, which also offers additional practice tests for a minimal fee.

Halloween Safety

Halloween is a cherished tradition but the excitement of the night can cause children to forget to be careful. There is no real "trick" to making Halloween a real treat for the entire family. The major dangers are not from witches or spirits but rather from falls and pedestrian/car crashes. Many communities officially designate a "Beggars' Night" and assign specific hours for trick-or-treat activities.

Both children and adults need to think about safety on this annual day of make-believe.

The National Safety Council urges motorists to be especially alert on

Halloween. Watch for children darting out from between parked cars. Watch for children walking on roadways, medians and curbs. Enter and exit driveways and alleys carefully. At twilight and later in the evening, watch for children in dark clothing.

Before children start out on their "trick or treat" rounds, parents should:

- \* Make sure that an adult or an older responsible youth will be supervising the outing for children under age 12.

- \* Plan and discuss the route trick-or-treaters intend to follow.

- \* Know the names of older children's companions.

- \* Instruct your children to travel only in familiar areas and along an established route.

- \* Teach your children to stop only at houses or apartment buildings that are well-lit and never to enter a stranger's home.

- \* Establish a return time.

- \* Tell your youngsters not to eat any treat until they return home.

- \* Review all appropriate trick-or-treat safety precautions, including pedestrian/traffic safety rules.

- \* Pin a slip of paper with the child's name, address and phone number inside a pocket in case the youngster gets separated from the group.

Costume Design Only fire-retardant materials should be used for costumes. Costumes should be loose so warm clothes can be worn underneath. Costumes should not be so long that they are a tripping hazard. (Falls are the leading cause of unintentional injuries on Halloween.) If children are allowed out after dark, outfits should be made with light colored materials. Strips of retroreflective tape should be used to make

children visible.

Face Design Masks can obstruct a child's vision. Use facial make-up instead. When buying special Halloween makeup, check for packages containing ingredients that are labeled "Made with U.S. Approved Color Additives," "Laboratory Tested," Meets Federal Standards for Cosmetics," or "Non-Toxic." Follow manufacturer's instructions for application.

If masks are worn, they should have nose and mouth openings and large eye holes.

Knives, swords and other accessories should be made from cardboard or flexible materials. Do not allow children to carry sharp objects.

Bags or sacks carried by youngsters should be light-colored or trimmed with retro-reflective tape if children are allowed out after dark.

Carrying flashlights will help children see better and be seen more clearly.

On the way children should understand and follow these rules:

- \* Do not enter homes or apartments without adult supervision.

- \* Walk, do not run, from house to house. Do not cross yards and lawns where unseen objects or the uneven terrain can present tripping hazards.

- \* Walk on sidewalks, not in the street.

- \* Walk on the left side of the road, facing traffic if there are no sidewalks.

To ensure a safe trick-or-treat outing, parents are urged to:

- \* Give children an early meal before going out.

- \* Insist that treats be brought home for inspection before anything is eaten.

- \* Wash fruit and slice into small pieces.

- \* When in doubt, throw it out.

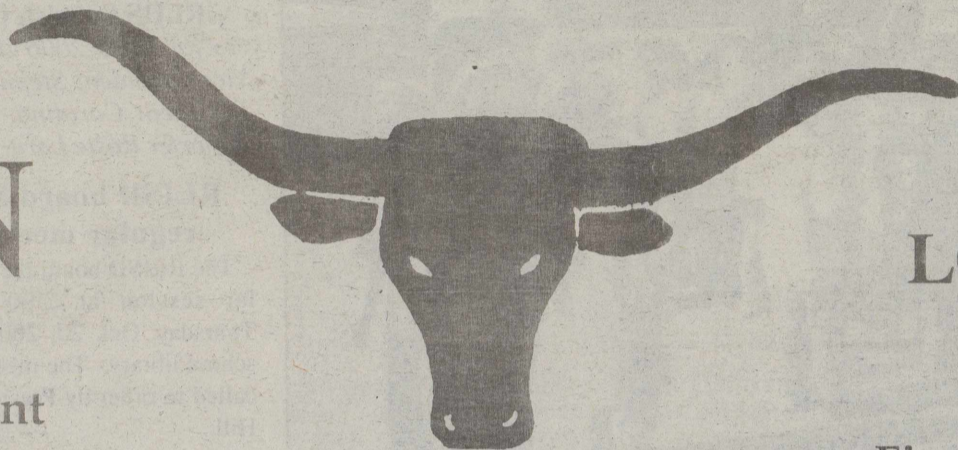

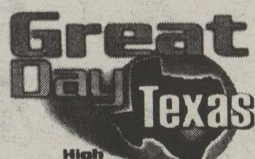

**"Hell's own  
battleground"**

**Prologue**

Richard Collier, war correspondent and feature writer for the London Daily Mail called the war in North Africa and the Mediterranean "Hell's Own Battleground". Here the Army Air Corps proved its worth and made Henry H. "Hap" Arnold a much needed hero. On May 5, 1943, Allied Planes flew 1,958 bombing and support sorties in 24 hours! Fortifications of the Mediterranean Islands began in the 1920s and '30s and they had to be taken before we could land on Axis home soil.

January 1943, after much disagreement President Franklin D. Roosevelt and Prime Minister Winston S. Churchill met with their respective Chiefs of Staff in Casablanca. General George C. Marshall, U.S. Army Chief of Staff saw Germany as the prime enemy and wanted to mount a massive attack from England across the Channel into France and then Germany. Marshall called the Mediterranean "a suction pump", simply a distraction from the main effort. Churchill wanted to blockade Hitler's territory and continue bombing until a deadly strike could be delivered. Marshall so opposed the Italian Campaign that he wanted America to turn their main effort to fighting the Japanese and simply let the European war drift. Roosevelt restrained this viewpoint and a compromise was reached. We were simply not strong enough to invade across the Channel at that time. However, we had battle hardened troops from Africa; by occupying Sicily, we would have a line of seaborne supply from Gibraltar past Sicily to Suez. German attention could be diverted from Russia and war in the Italian Homeland might prompt Italy to withdraw. An American Lieutenant General, Dwight D. Eisenhower was named Supreme Commander of Operation "Husky". The Axis defense was led by Field Marshall Albert Kesselring.

In May 1943, Allied planes began five weeks of bombing on the island Pantellerra, equidistant between Tunisia and Sicily. The island had coastal batteries, airports and underground hangars for 80 planes. Steep cliffs and treacherous ocean currents discouraged amphibious attack. Historically, it was the first time a stronghold had been conquered entirely by air power. On the tenth of June, bombers had to circle and wait a turn to drop their bombs. On June eleventh, Allied troops landed, opposed by 11,000 Italian Troops!

In July of 1943, Allied Forces mounted the greatest amphibious assault in history with the invasion of Sicily. It involved 3,300 ships. There were seven Allied Divisions in the assault, two more than there were in the Normandy Landing almost a year later.

In Coke County, two fine young Texans, born in a climate of isolationism, were being drawn closer and closer to the calamity which was World War II. She graduated from Robert Lee High School in 1941 and he graduated from Bronte High School in 1938. They were both from Christian families and they had plans which were attainable and dreams. He wanted to fly...he just loved speed! She just wanted to be his wife and the mother of his children. He graduated from San Angelo College in 1941. In early December he went into Nathan's Credit Jewelers in San Angelo and bought an engagement ring which he paid for with cash, \$10.00 the first week of each month until fall of 1942.

He successfully completed his Primary Training Course and was certified as a Flying Cadet December 13, 1941, a week after the bombing of Pearl Harbor.

At the Depot in Bronte, families and friends saw her off on a train to California. They had made her a "care package" in a decorated box filled with small items to be opened here and there on the long trip. In her excitement the box was forgotten on the bench in the train station. They were married on the third day of May in the First Baptist Church in San Bernadino. She wore a blue printed sheer dress with linen jacket. Her corsage was of white carnations. She had married a bomber pilot who was stationed at Victorville, CA.

Later he was stationed in New Mexico, Kansas, Louisiana, Georgia and overseas. He was sent to Sardinia. She came home to her family to wait.

Before he left her he worked out an elaborate code to be used in the second paragraph of letters hoping to avoid censorship. North Africa was to be Jean, South Africa, Flora, Russia was to be Clema. Ireland would be Bronte, Hawaii would be 203 College Avenue. She wrote daily to his APO address and she hoped and prayed.

He was awarded the prestigious AIR MEDAL... "For meritorious achievement while participating as pilot in an attack...South Italy on 13 January 1944, which resulted in the destruction of numerous enemy aircraft and heavy damage to hangars and other field installations. In contributing to this outstanding achievement in precision bombing, the personal

courage, professional skill and devotion to duty displayed by this crew member reflect highest credit on the military forces of the United States."

There were seven missions before the crash. He flew from Sardinia on a mission to Manziani, Italy January 29, 1944. His plane was the B-26 "Marauder". It was in jest dubbed the B-26 "Murderer" because it was a twin engine plane and if you lost an engine, you couldn't fly the plane!

First Lieutenant Elbert Stephenson and his crew of six, a fine mix of American men from Texas, Louisiana, Missouri, Pennsylvania, New York, New Hampshire and Maine completed their bombing run, hit the assigned target and sustained damage in an encounter with hostile aircraft. The bomber, ablaze, could not make it back to their base, it crashed in the Tyrrhenian Sea-one mile off the coast at Ladispoli, Italy. It was reported that seven parachutes were seen, that two landed on the beach and five were in the water. No member of his crew has ever been found. Hoping her husband might be fighting with Partisans in the mountains or in a prison camp, Dale Cowley Stephenson continued to write and hope and pray. None of her letters were ever returned. October 5, 1945 the letter came from H. H. Arnold, Commanding General, Army Air Force. "With greatest regret I have learned that an official determination has been

made of the death of your husband, First Lieutenant Elbert Olen Stephenson, who has been missing in action since January 29, 1944, in the Mediterranean Theater of Operations."

Dale turned to work, her career. She bought a small home in Robert Lee and worked at the Farm Security Administration and later at The U.S. Department of Agriculture. December 5, 1947, she married Coke Countian Bob Fields in the Robert Lee Baptist Church.

Their sons graduated from Robert Lee Schools. Albert Dale was born in 1950 and is a graduate of South West State University at San Marcos. James was born 1953, he is a graduate of Abilene Christian University. Both boys married classmates.

Today there is still pain and pride in the sparkling blue eyes of Dale Cowley who was able to live and love again.

With hard work and character she too is a survivor of "Hells Own Battleground".

**NOTICE TO TAXPAYER**

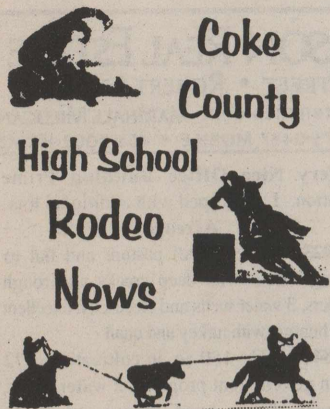

mids, etc) appear to be utilized more efficiently than the grains where moderate to large amounts are needed (0.25-0.75 percent of body weight).

Now comes the question of energy supplementation relative to calving. Is it better to feed a thin cow before calving or following calving? Extensive studies have shown that cows need to be in good body condition (scores of 5.5 to 7) to be able to breed back quickly and maintain a good calving record. Cows in poor body condition ( 3 and 4) are always slow to breed back, if at all, will not milk well and have weaker calves with increased health problems. These body condition scores are a visual appraisal of the cows condition and can be easily determined with a little practice. If you need assistance in determining your cattle body condition score, let me know and we can assist you.

In dry, low quality conditions during the winter, it is extremely important to maintain your livestock's condition before they begin to lose weight. Besides hurting your weaning weights on the present calf crop with lower milking rates, body condition of cattle now can have a tremendous effect on how soon they will breed back, if at all, and how large a calf they will wean next year. Your decision on supplemental feeding this winter can have either positive or devastating affects on your operation for the next 14-18 month. Trying to play catch up after calving or cows begin to lose weight, is next to impossible economically, if not biologically. It's like the old commercial, "You can either pay a little now or pay a lot later."

In supplementing your livestock, it is important to remember that protein can be stored by animals, therefore protein supplements can be fed only two to three times a week. On the other hand, if energy is the limiting factor, livestock cannot store energy, therefore it must be supplemented every day. Also, if available forage is of poor quality, there is a misconception that cattle will just eat more, but in reality, if quality of grass is poor and low in digestibility, it takes longer for the rumen to digest the forage forcing the animal to actually eat less per day, compounding the problem of low nutrient intake.

When buying supplemental feeds, determine the cost by actual pounds of protein found in the feed. Sometimes the so-called "bargain cubes" if figured on pounds of actual protein, are not really a bargain at all. Feeds containing some sort of non-nitrogen protein ( usually urea) are not totally utilized by the animal. If you are buying feed containing non-natural protein source and they only utilize about 75-80% of the protein, your 20% feed is only furnishing about 15-16% protein. To get the needed amounts of protein in the animal you must actually feed more of the this type of feed, increasing the cost.

Remember that figuring cost on actual cost per pound of protein, meeting animals requirements can make a great difference in not only the productivity of your animals this year but also for the next several months and next year's calf crop. Spending a little time to research feed prices and how much to be fed can not only save money, but make money in the long run.

**Tis the season for  
holidays and flu**

Last year's lack of flu vaccine worried the nation. But health experts say taking the preventive approach could save you from the "gift" of the flu. Ron Warner, Ph.D., associate professor in the Texas Tech University Health Sciences Center Department of Family and Community Medicine, says most Americans are going in "a hundred different directions" during the holiday season.

Getting plenty of sleep and rest, eating healthy and reducing the overall stress in your life can lower your risk of the flu. Other preventive measures include washing your hands thoroughly and frequently and always covering your mouth and nose when coughing and sneezing. Warner stresses that taking mega doses of anything such as Vitamin C or other herbal products could be harmful. Instead a person should think of a balanced approach with plenty of fruits and vegetables. Warner said periodically flushing out the nose with salt water has proven to prevent some common cold and flu-like viruses.

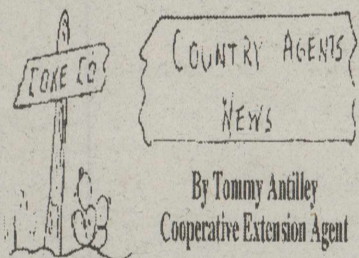

**Timing and What  
Kind of Supplement  
Do We Need**

As cattle producers, we all have known to use protein supplements to improve performance of cattle grazing dormant or frost killed pastures. Protein supplements, by improving digestibility and forage intake, are efficient in maintaining cattle performance on lower quality pasture.

When pastures become short or the quality is very poor, energy supplementation can complement protein supplementation but the efficiency of response is much lower. Grain and molasses (starch supplements) are most efficient when consumed at less than 0.25% of the animals weight, while the fiber supplements (hulls, wheat

# Coke County Sheriff's Dept. CERT Team completes training

Fifteen Coke County residents recently completed CERT training. Participants received training in such topics as basic fire suppression, disaster medical operations, CERT organization, and weapons of mass destruction. The two days of training concluded with a mock disaster operation, in which CERT team members utilized their knowledge and skills to evaluate a situation and rescue and administer aid to victims. The training was conducted on October 8 and October 16, 2005.

The Concho Valley Council of Governments, Criminal Justice Department, is tasked with assisting in the creation of CERT Teams in the COG area. Funds from a Citizen's Core Grant help make this possible. Personal emergency response backpacks are furnished to participants who become team members in CVCOG sponsored CERT Teams. Team equipment is furnished to teams created in this region when those teams are sponsored by the CVCOG.

This program can be very beneficial to the residents of not only Coke County, but to other areas. CERT Teams from our area of the state can be deployed to assist with any type of disaster, whether man made or a result of nature, such as a tornado and the recent hurricanes that have impacted Texas and Louisiana.

CERT, which is an acronym for Community Emergency Response Team, trains volunteers to support Emergency Medical Services, Fire Personnel, and Law Enforcement in times of disaster when those resources may become overwhelmed. The CERT Program is an initiative of the Department of Homeland Security's Emergency Management Institute, as part of the President's Volunteer Program.

This is a very rewarding program for the individuals attending as well as for the community. Some members of area county CERT Teams were deployed to assist FEMA with the hurricanes last year in Florida. Some are currently deployed in the current FEMA effort in Louisiana, Mississippi, Alabama, and Texas. These FEMA deployments are on a volunteer basis. All CERT

I have seen more Bobwhites than Blues on this side of the county.
