Letter to the Editor

I have to agree with Mr. Gray. I grew up in Robert Lee and I can remember very well when the City Hall had only one person working in it and I can very well remember when Mrs. Havins would have only 1 person that would come in and help her

for a few days a month. Now they have computers and that should make the work easier. Robert Lee hasn't grown since the 1960's. To be honest the city has diminished in size. In fact there were at least six families that left the area when school let out.

Going back several years before, I can remember when one man did all the city maintenance, from digging up water leaks to patching streets to running the water treatment plant. Now all I see is city pickups all over town and from time to time I see a backhoe running up and down the streets. I've been around equipment all my life and I have yet to see them accomplish anything running down the street.

As for the water, if anyone says that they like it, then in my opinion they have lost their sense of taste. I know it would be economically impossible to do reverse osmosis on the water, but I do know that it could be filtered a little better. It's terrible that we have to go buy water to drink because the water that comes out of the tap taste like salt and leaves deposits and stains on everything that it touches. If it

The 44th annual 4-H State Horse Show was held this week at Taylor County Coliseum in Abilene, Texas. Coke County 4-H member, Lance Millican, competed against 300 ropers in the Tie-Down Calf Roping. Millican placed 1st in the first go round and 8th overall in the finals.

Lance, a 2006 graduate of Robert Lee High School, is the son of Waldon and Judy Millican.

Simple steps can control asthma

Air pollution. Pollen. Cold weather. Stress. For those with asthma, any of these factors could be the trigger for the next attack.

Some of the strongest asthma triggers are in the home, such as dust mites, cockroaches, mold and tobacco smoke. Fortunately, taking some simple steps can reduce exposure and the chances of another attack.

"Allergens in the home can trig-

ger allergy and asthma symptoms throughout the year and be the cause of chronic asthma symptoms," said Sandra McMahan, M.D., assistant professor of internal medicine with the Texas A&M Health Science Center College of Medicine. "Some asthmatics have seasonal flares of asthma due to pollen or outdoor molds, which may be intensified by a priming effect from year-round indoor allergy."

Dr. McMahan suggests removing trigger sources as best as possible. For dust mites, keep humidity low; remove wall-to-wall carpeting; encase mattresses, box springs and pillows in airtight, zippered plastic or allergen-proof fabric covers; wash all bedding weekly in hot (at least 130degree Fahrenheit) water and dry in a hot dryer; and vacuum weekly with a HEPA-filter vacuum.

To avoid animal dander, remove pets from inside or at least out of bedrooms; wash pets weekly; remove carpet and use a HEPA-filter vacuum; and use a HEPA air cleaner. Steps against cockroaches, responsible for the greatest increase in asthma morbidity, include blocking areas where they can enter the home; repair leaky faucets; use a professional exterminator; put away pet food bowls; and wash dishes immediately and keep the kitchen clean.

For mold, decrease moisture and humidity; improve ventilation through vent fans; and clean with a solution containing 5 percent bleach and detergent.

Your doctor also can help you figure out what specific asthma triggers may affect your family and proper remedies.

"Avoidance of allergens that are known to trigger asthma in an individual may result in decreased frequency and severity of asthma, decreased dependency on rescue medicines, decreased work and school absence, and decreased longterm complication of chronic asthma," said Dr. McMahan, a physician at Scott & White Hospital in Temple.

Fern Havins Park home to bat habitat

Fern Havins Parks is now the home of a bat habitat. The Bat House is one-of-akind designed for the most common bat to this area, the Mexican Freetail, and will provide an effective and environmentally friendly way to reduce the mosquito population in the park and help prevent the spread of West Nile Virus. This habitat will provide a safe and environmental way to draw the bats out of areas within the City where bats have been found in homes, offices, and buildings in the downtown area.

Bats are a protected species and mosquitoes make up a significant portion of their diet. Bats can capture more than 1,200 mosquitoes in a single hour and can also help control the populations of beetles, mots, leafhoppers and insects that are actually dangerous to humans.

Fern Havins Park is one of five locations of the Caliche Loop designated on the Great Panhandle/Plains Wildlife Trail Map. The bat habitat was built by Noel Gregston and was performed by the City of Robert Lee as part of settle of an enforcement action brought by the Texas Commission Environmental Quality and was a cooperative effort with the Caliche Loop Bird and Wildlife Association.

Registration for ACT exam set

The next ACT test will be administered on September 16. 2006. College-bound high school students who wish to take the exam must register by August 18-the deadline for having the registration postmarked. There is a late registration postmark deadline for August 25, but an extra fee is charged for late registrations. Students can register online at

www.actstudent.org, or registration forms can be picked up at high school guidance counseling offices.

The cost is \$29 for the traditional ACT and \$43 for students who choose to take the optional ACT Writing Test. Some colleges require a writing score but many don't, so students should find out the requirements of prospective colleges before registering for the exam. Virtually all U.S. colleges and universities, including all Ivy League schools accept ACT scores.

REPs also offer balanced billing plans, which allow eligible customers to pay an average amount each month year-round.
