Incumbents returned to county offices

A total of 1,112 voters cast State Comptroller's race. In their ballots in Tuesday's general election, making the turnout a whopping 44.18 percent of Coke County's 2517 registered voters. This percentage may easily approach a record county turnout for a non-presidential general election.

County voters were favoring the incumbents on Tuesday, as incumbent county judge Roy Blair had a total of 669 votes over his challenger Hal Spain, with a total of 492. In the only other contested race for county treasurer, incumbent Phelan Wrinkle got the nod over Andra Arrott by a margin of 621 to 511.

Other incumbents who were returned to office in uncontested races were Mary Grim for County/District Clerk; Josie Dean, Tax Assessor/Collector; Robert Feil, County Commissioner, Pct. 2; Bobby Blaylock, County Commissioner Pct. 4; Joan Davis, Justice of the Peace, Pct. 1; Grady Coulter, Justice of the Peace, Pct. 2; and Marshall Millican, Constable, Pct. 1.

County voters agreed with the rest of the state in returning Kay Bailey Hutchison to her Senate seat. Incumbent governor Rick Perry also

the state representative's race for District 72, Drew Darby was expected to win easily over challenger Dennis Higgins. However, due to a large number of voters in the San Angelo area requesting paper ballots, results in this election were not known at presstime.

Matt Caperton passed from this life on Sunday, November 5, 2006 in San Angelo, Texas. Family visitation was from 6 p.m. until 8 p.m. on Tuesday, November 7, at Shaffer Funeral Home in Bronte, Texas. Services were at 2 pm at the First Baptist Church of Bronte on Wednesday, November 8, with burial following at Fairview Cemetery. Services were under direction of Shaffer Funeral Home.

Matthew Goodloe Caperton was born March 4, 1926 in Clyde, Texas to Emmett L. and Lillian (Coleman) Caperton. Shortly after his birth, the family moved to Bronte, Texas where Matt attended school, graduating in May of 1943. He also attended San Angelo Junior College and Texas A & M University.

He entered the Navy in January of 1944 and was sent to San Diego where he served in the Seaman Guard. He was later shipped to Oahu, Hawaii to attend radio school and from there to the Marshall Islands. He served as radioman and teletype operator during the war. Matt and his second grade sweetheart, Armilda Jean Looney, of Robert Lee were married December 26, 1946. Matt and Mil began their married life in Robert Lee and later moved to Bronte where Matt began an occupation that would be the center of his life-the selling, buying and trading of cars and trucks. He entered the car business with his father, E. L. and his brother, R. T. in 1949. They formed Caperton Chevrolet Company and remained in business until June of 1970. Matt and Mil moved to Big Spring in the fall of 1971 as Matt took a position with Pollard Chevrolet and with

the exception of a few years, was there until his retirement in 2003. Many of Matt's family and friends feel that had he regained his health, he would still be selling cars.

Active in community affairs, Matt served in various capacities while living in Bronte. Those activities include Bronte School Board, City Councilman, Housing Board Authority, East Coke County Hospital District and the Bronte Volunteer Fire Department. He was also a member of the American Legion, the Lions Club and the First Baptist Church.

He is preceded in death by his parents; his wife, Armilda; two brothers, R. T. Caperton and Leslie Dean Caperton; one sister, Savannah Ruth Belcher; and his son, Matthew G. Caperton, Jr.





4-H Fundraiser gearing up





> Free Radon Test Kits Available to Texans

> The Texas Department of State Health Services (DSHS) is offering Texans free kits to test for radon levels in their homes.

Radon is an odorless colorless gas that develops with the natural breakdown of uranium in soil and rock. The gas can come up from the soil and into a home or building through pipes, drains, cracks in the foundation or other openings.

If radon is inhaled over a long period of time, it can increase the risk of lung cancer, according to Kay Soper, DSHS environmental specialist.

"Radon isn't a big problem in Texas, but it's important to know if radon is present at harmful levels in your home. That's why we're offering the free kits," Soper said. "It's very easy to test for radon, and if a high level is found, it can be reduced with proper ventilation."

Test kits can be ordered by calling 1-800-293-0753 or by e-mailing radon@dshs.state.tx.us. The radon test kit includes a small charcoal-filled plastic case, detailed instructions and a postage-paid envelope.

The plastic case is placed in the home for two days and then sent to Alpha Energy Laboratories for a free analysis.

According to United States Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) standards, most Texas homes are located in areas of "low potential" for elevated radon levels. But 39 out of Texas' 254 counties have a "moderate potential" rating. Most of these counties are in West and Northwest Texas. No Texas counties fall in the EPA's "highest potential" category.

According to the EPA, radon is estimated to cause about 21,000 lung cancer deaths in the United States each year.

Real heroes deserve being remembered

The name of Frank Tubb is among the 29 names on the Angelo State University memorial to alumni killed in World War II.

Ava Lou Davis said it meant so much, finding that people cared about her brother and his comrades 54 years after their deaths off off the coast. The crew, including Frank, died.

Ava and her family didn't find out what happened to Frank's remains until four years later when he and two crewmates were placed in a group burial in Fort Smith National Cemetery in Arkansas. His parents, Mary and Arthur Tubb, and other family members attended the ceremony.

The story doesn't end there.

Charles Gilmore, Bold Venture's co-pilot, wasn't aboard the plane the day it crashed. He was back at the base, in the sick bay.

Gilmore now lives in a suburb of Denver. Not long ago, he was contacted over the internet by Ian Quinn, an airline pilot based in Hong Kong. Quinn, a member of the Hong Kong Historical Aircraft Association, regularly flies over the area where Bold Venture went down.

Quinn was writing a book that included information on the 345th Bomber Group. He knew the story of Bold Venture, but wasn't sure of the exact crash location. Gilmore sent him a photo of the site.

Using the photo as a guide, Quinn flew over the area in a helicopter and found the spot where Bold Venture went down. He found fragments of the plane still at the location.

On March 15 of this year, exactly 54 years after the crash, Quinn placed a wreath on the site in memory of the crew of Bold Venture.

"I was touched that, after all these 54 years, this man cared enough to put a wreath on the spot," Ava said.

"My mother kept saying there was no cross to mark their grave," Ava said. "She didn't know if they had been buried or left on the side of the mountain. My parents would be proud to know that 54 years later some caring person placed a wreath where their son died."

"After all these years, someone still remembers. Someone cares. And that means so much."

Letter from the **Other Pilot**

Yesterday I received a phone call from Ava Lou Davis. She is from Robert Lee and is the sister of Frank Tubb. During our conversation, she told me about the memorial at the university. She wondered if I might send a short note about Frank, which I am pleased to do, and also with her permission, tell you about a lasting friendship.


When Frank joined the Air Force he had a desire to fly and following his studies in radio communications. He was assigned to Greenville, South Carolina where he was named radio/gunner on a B-25 bomber crew. The crew was made up of six strangers, but Frank's dry wit and ready smile was the catalyst for the strangers becoming a tightly knit crew of best friends.

After further training in the states, we were sent to the Pacific Theatre where we flew many missions against the Japanese. The crew was later split up when the two pilots were assigned their own planes. However, as often as possible, the crew would alternate their flightsflying first with one pilot and then with the other.

On March 15, 1945 while making a bombing run on an enemy freighter, their plane was severely damaged and crashed on land just northwest of Hong Kong. Everyone died in the crash. Their loss was a terrible shock, but after completing my missions I was returned to the U.S.

After the war, the bodies of the crew were returned to the states for burial at Fort Smith National Cemetery in Arkansas. While attending the interment of the crew members, I met some of Frank's family. It was easy

What to know before hiring a home contractor

Pete Thomas, President of The Home Improvement Network, a contractor referral service, offers these useful tips: * Get at least three esti-

mates for your project.

* Ask friends and neighbors for referrals, and avoid choosing blindly from directory services that can include fly-by-night companies or those that change names to dodge legal problems.

* Ask for references and check them.

* Request certificates of insurance. A contractor should have three types of coverage: general liability, workman's compensation, and auto insurance.

* Look for an established contractor who's been in business for years. Chances are he will be there to make good on his warranty.

* Examine the warranty. How long is it in effect and what does it cover specifically?

* Don't decide solely on price. If one bid is much lower, examine the cost of materials as they could be of inferior quality. You usually get what you pay for.

* Look for designations which indicate a higher degree of professionalism. For example, in the remodeling industry, contractors may earn a CR (Certified Remodeler) or CGR (Certified Graduate Remodelers) designation.

* Follow your instincts. Do you like the contractor? Does he listen well? Does he return phone calls promptly?

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Happiness Increases As You Age

Television, movies and popular music may tell us otherwise, but a new study suggests that older people may be happier than younger ones.

Back in 1965, the rock band The Who wailed the line "I hope I die before I get old," but they may have fallen victim to a commonly mistaken belief that the happiest days of people's lives occur when they're young.

In fact, a new study from researchers at the VA Ann Arbor Healthcare System and the University of Michigan indicates that seniors may actually be happier.

Interestingly, however, stereotypes continue to abound among both young and old whereby people think seniors are unhappy. According to the study, older people "mis-remember" how happy they were as youths, just as youths "mis-predict" how unhappy they will be as they age.

The new research involved more than 540 adults who were either between the ages of 21 and 40, or over age 60. All were asked to rate or predict their own individual happiness at their current age, at age 30 and at age 70, and also to judge how happy most people are at those ages.

The older respondents tended to be happier than the younger ones at their current ages. And yet, participants of all ages thought that the average 30-year-old would be happier than the average 70-year-old, and that happiness would decline with age.

"Overall, people got it wrong, believing that most people become less happy as they age, when in fact this study and others have shown that people tend to become happier over time," says the study's lead author Heather Lacey. "Not only do younger people believe that older people are less happy, but older people believe they and others must have been happier 'back then.' Neither belief is accurate."

The findings have implications for understanding young people's decisions about habits -- such as smoking or saving money -- that might affect their health or finances later in life. They also may help explain the fear of aging that drives middle-aged people to "midlife crisis" behavior in a vain attempt to slow their own aging. Stereotypes about aging abound in our society, Lacey says, and affect the way older people are treated as well as the public policies that affect them. That's why research on the beliefs that fuel those one-size-fits-all depictions of older people is important, she explains. "People often believe that happiness is a matter of circumstance, that if something good happens, they will experience long-lasting happiness, or if something bad happens, they will experience long-term misery," says

Peter Ubel, the senior author after handling meat. of the new study. "But results more from their underlying emotional resources -- resources that appear to grow with age. People get better at managing life's ups and downs, and the result is that as they age, they become happier -- even though their objective circumstances, such as their health, decline."

Lacey adds, "It's not that people overestimate their happiness, but rather that they learn how to value life from adversities like being sick. What the sick learn from being sick, the rest of us come to over time."

Safety Tips For

Cooking With Beef Nearly nine out of ten U.S. households - or 251 million

people - will eat beef at home within the next two weeks, according to the National Cattlemen's Beef Association (NCBA). Following a few simple rules when preparing this popular protein should help make for a healthy and enjoyable experience.

The NCBA is advising that most fresh beef be consumed within three to four days of purchase if refrigerated and within six to 12 months if frozen. Ground beef, however, should be consumed sooner, typically within one to two days of purchase if refrigerated and within three to four months if frozen.

Furthermore, you should always defrost your meats in the refrigerator instead of at room temperature, according to the NCBA

The same rule applies when working with marinades always marinate in the refrigerator and never at room temperature. Tender beef cuts such as t-bones, porterhouse, tenderloin and rib-eye steaks need only be marinated 15 minutes to two hours for flavor. Less tender cuts like flank, skirt and top round steaks should be marinated at least six hours. A tenderizing marinade should penetrate about 1/8th inch into the meat.

The NCBA also suggests that if a marinade is to later be used for basting or a sauce, reserve a portion of it before adding the beef. Marinade that has been in contact with uncooked meat

* Keep raw meat and meat instead, people's happiness juices from coming into contact with other foods.

> * Use a clean thermometer to measure the internal temperature of cooked meat to make sure it is thoroughly cooked.

* Refrigerate or freeze prepared meat within two hours of a meal. Also, set your refrigerator to 40 degrees Fahrenheit or lower and your freezer to zero degrees Fahrenheit or lower.

Choosing a Child Safety Seat

Selecting and installing the right child safety seat is important. That's why many local police and fire departments and auto dealers offer free clinics or individualized assistance.

"Cars, child seats and kids come in different shapes and sizes, so make sure the combination of your car and seat work well with your child.

Up to 80 percent of all child restraints are improperly used, so take your time and read your vehicle's owners manual and child seat instructions," says Bob Yakushi, Director Product Regulatory, Safety, Accessory Quality for Nissan North America.

As your child matures he or she will need three different types of seats: a rear-facing seat as an infant, a front-facing seat as a toddler and, later, a booster seat.

Yakushi offers the following tips:

Children should be in child restraints until they are eight years old or 80 pounds.

Seat belts are designed for adults, so booster seats are best for restraining four to eight year olds.

* If your child is too large for a child seat but can't comfortably rest his knees at the edge of the vehicle's seat, use a booster seat.

* Don't let your child put the shoulder belt behind his head or under his arm because it would be less effective in a crash.

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must be brought to a full boil before it can be used as a sauce. And never save and reuse marinade.

When you're ready to cook your beef, there are a few temperature levels you should keep in mind. The NCBA advises that steaks be cooked to an internal temperature of at least 145 degrees Fahrenheit and can have a pink center, while ground beef be cooked to an internal temperature of at least 160 degrees Fahrenheit until the center is no longer pink. You may want to consider using an instant-read thermometer to ensure proper doneness.

Finally, you can help prevent food borne illness by following for easy steps:

* Wash your hands well in hot soapy water before and



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
