Letter to the Editor

Dear Hal Spain,

I read with great interest Paul A. Anthony's article in Tuesday, November 28, San Angelo newspaper about a project checking status on unmarked graves in Fairmount Cemetery.

This was a reminder of something I had been thinking about following up on.

In 1993, I was president of the Hayrick Cemetery Association. Mr. Gerald Allen, president of Robert Lee Bank called me to suggest the cemetery association have a large project and use some of the money that was rusting on shelves. Mr. Allen suggested several things.

Vice-president Mrs. Bonita Copeland and I had been working on a book called Coke County Cemeteries, Epitaphs and Dates and we found many, many unmarked graves and other things that would improve our town's burial grounds.

We contacted our best friend, the Birk Monument Company and their employee, Mr. Marvin Lawrence. Mr. Lawrence

was from a family of old Coke County settlers and he knew our cemetery well.

Our cemetery was founded in 1891, so the oldest tombstones were falling off their bases and the top knobs were on the ground.

With the help of Mr. Lawrence and Birk Monument Company, all parts were cemented back together. Mr. Birk sold us scrap marble and we collected the names and dates to place at unmarked graves. We were able to identify 178 graves that would have been otherwise lost forever.

When graves are left with only funeral home markers that lawn mowers love to devour or the wind blows them away, then that grave is in jeopardy of being lost.

Robert Lee has one of the prettiest cemeteries in Texas and we are lucky. We do not have 600 unmarked graves. I appreciate the cemetery association and what they have done. Go visit the cemetery and observe our neat burial ground.

STATE OF TEXAS COUNTY OF COKE ORDER RESTRICTING **OUTDOOR BURNING**

WHEREAS, the Commissioners Court finds that circumstances present in all or part of the unincorporated area of the county create a public safety hazard that would be exacerbated by outdoor burning.

IT IS HEREBY ORDERED by the Commissioners Court of Coke County that outdoor burning is restricted in the unincorporated area of the county for 90 days from the date of adoption of this Order, unless the restrictions are terminated earlier based on a determination made by the Texas Forest Service or this Court. This Order is adopted pursuant to Local Government Code 352.081, and other applicable statutes. This Order does not prohibit outdoor burning activities related to public health and safety that are authorized by the Texas Natural Resources Commission

for: (1) firefighter training: (2) public utility, natural gas pipeline or mining operations; (3) planting or harvesting of agricultural crops; or, (4) burns that are conducted by a prescribed burn manager certified under Section 153.048. Natural Resources Code, and meet the standards of Section 153.047, Natural Resources Code.

BE IT ALSO ORDERED THAT the purpose of this order is the mitigation of the hazard posed by wildfires by curtailing the practice of outdoor burning, with the exception of barbecuing in an enclosed fire box with water hose or fire retardant accessible at all time and someone attending the fire at all times, and materials used outdoors in activities such as welding and any other activity that could result in a fire. The purpose is to be taken into account in any enforcement action based upon this order.

1. Outdoor welding shall be allowed under the following circumstances:

Welding and cutting and grinding associated with welding activities shall not take place when the wind is over 15 miles per hour;

B. The welder must notify the Coke County Sheriff's Department before any welding, cutting or grinding begins;

C. All grass, leaves, brush and other easily combustible materials must be cleared within a fifty (50) feet radius surrounding the area where the activity is to take place before any welding, cutting or grinding begins; and

D. A spotter with water and a ready pressurized delivery system must be on hand before any welding, cutting or grinding begins and remain on hand until the activity is completed.

In accordance with Local Government 352.081 (h), a violation of this Order is a class C. misdemeanor, punishable by a fine not to exceed \$500.00.

National ID is Dead

USDA effectively and quietly knocked the National Animal Identification System (NAIS) in the head last Wednesday. It did so with the unheralded publication of the "NAIS User Guide," which replaces all former NAIS draft documents. This document, for the first time, emphasizes NAIS as a voluntary program rather than as a steppingstone to a mandatory one.

In fact, at the very beginning, the guide explains, "USDA is not requiring participation in the program. NAIS can help producers protect the health and marketability of their animals -- but the choice to participate is theirs."

Late last month at a community outreach event in Kansas City, Chuck Conner, USDA Deputy Secretary, and Bruce Knight, USDA Under Secretary for Marketing and Regulatory Programs, paved the way for the agency's back-pedaling.

"Since we've had some confusion on this, we need to be as clear as we can be. This is 'voluntary' with a capital V. Not a currently voluntary, then maybe a mandatory system. This is a permanently voluntary system at the federal level," Conner said.

"We're making it crystal clear that NAIS is voluntary -- no ifs, ands or buts," explained Knight.



traditional Thanksgiving luncheon.

"Farmers can choose to register their premises. They can choose to participate in individual animal or group identification. And they can opt to be part of tracking. Or not."

The guide goes on to explain, "Participation in NAIS is voluntary at the federal level. Under our current authorities, USDA could make the NAIS mandatory, but we are choosing not to do so -- again, participation in every component of NAIS is voluntary at the federal level. The NAIS does not need to be mandatory to be effective; we believe the goals of the system can be achieved with a voluntary program. As producers become increasingly aware of the benefits of the NAIS and the level of voluntary participation grows, there will only be less need to make the program mandatory."

Absent from the "NAIS User Guide" are the suggested timelines and benchmarks for achieving an effective level of producer participation. Instead, USDA emphasizes its belief that market demands will provide the necessary incentive for participation.

That's possible, though it hasn't been the case, thus far. It's hard to imagine, too, the need commerce will see for a system cohesive and coordinated enough to provide the industrywide, 48-hour trace-back NAIS was designed to provide. Consequently, the only real incentive for animal ID remains to be the value individual producers see in it for management purposes.

So, it seems NAIS is over, at least for the tenure of the current administration.

County saves taxpayers money with insurance credits

Coke County saved its property taxpayers \$5,163 in liability insurance costs through a renewal credit program of the Texas Association of Counties (TAC) risk management pool.

TAC's County Government Risk Management Pool is part of several self-insurance programs owned and operated by counties that save tax dollars by allowing Texas counties to band together to obtain better rates for insurance coverage. The risk management pool provides automobile, general liability, public officials errors and omissions and professional law enforcement coverage to Texas counties and countyrelated governmental entities.

In April, the board of directors of the risk management pool voted to return a total of \$6 million in the form of renewal credits to longtime county members that have participated in the pool for a full year and successfully controlled their claims losses. The program affects 173 counties and 84 other county-related entities that are pool members.

Coke County has received a total of \$5,163 in credit for renewing their public officials' liability, automobile liability, general liability and law enforcement liability with the pool.

"Coke County has worked hard to shield its taxpayers from escalating insurance costs," said Sam D. Seale, TAC executive director. "By being a member of the TAC pool and being pro-active in controlling claims, county leaders have made sure that protecting their taxpayers' pocketbooks is a priority."

The Texas Association of Counties is a non-profit organization that provides custom-tailored services to Texas counties and county officials, much of which is not available anywhere else.


