
# Saluting the Robert Lee High School Class of 2007



The Cancer Prevention Study-3 will pave the way for the next generation of cancer research. The San Angelo Relay for Life has been selected as one of a limited number of events nationwide where interested and eligible participants can enroll into this lifesaving study.


If you're between ages 30 and 65 and never had a diagnosis of cancer, you may qualify. You can enroll at the San Angelo Relay for Life on Friday, May 18, 2007 between 5:30 pm and 9:30 pm at the ASU Multi Purpose Stadium at Jackson and University Streets. It will only take 20-30 minutes. You will complete a brief survey, give a small amount of blood (similar to a doctor's visit) collected by a professional, trained phlebotomist, and Forrest Guthrie. There will have a waist measurement. Within four months after the Relay, you will be mailed a more extensive survey to complete with questions related to medical history, lifestyle and behaviors. Every two years, you will receive a survey to update information. Confidentiality is of the utmost importance and every effort will be made to protect privacy of the participants.





### **AP Students** "Significantly" **Outperform**" Peers

The benefits of Advanced Placement (AP) courses and exams have been confirmed in the largest-ever study of the effects of AP on college success. The University of Texas at Austin's College of Education and the Texas Higher Education Coordinating Board conducted the study of 222,289 students at several Texas universities.

"Advanced Placement" are classes and tests that cover the kinds of material offered in a college introductory course, and they are available to high school students who hope to get a head start in college. If a student earns a qualifying grade on one of the three-hour AP tests - and there are AP exams in more than 30 different subjects the student is able to earn college credits and/or skip the introductory class corresponding to the AP subject.

Department of Educational Psychology faculty members Barbara Dodd and Linda Hargrove, along with Texas Higher Education Coordinating Board researcher Donn Godin, found that students who successfully participated in one or more AP tests and courses "significantly outperformed" their non-AP peers. These comparisons were made among peers with similar levels of academic ability and family economic status. Students who took one or more AP tests and courses had higher college GPAs, earned more credit hours and in four years or fewer.

"The findings indicate,"

courses or who skip the AP exam. The data also suggest that AP students perform better in college than similar students who take dual enrollment college classes while still in high school."

A separate University of Texas at Austin study of 24,941 students conducted by Dodd and Department of Educational Psychology graduate student Leslie Keng showed that students who placed out of introductory college courses and used their AP credits to take more advanced courses did better in those courses than non-AP students. The study accounted for differences in ability levels of the AP and non-AP students by matching high school rank and college admission test scores.

The studies were released as part of the College Board's Advanced Placement Report to the Nation and represent the most comprehensive, data-rich examination of AP in the past decade.



### Factors Contributing to Major Problems in St. Augustine grass Lawns

Loss of St. Augustine grass in lawns throughout Texas was observed during the summer and fall months of 2006, with the problems continuing into the spring months of 2007. While other turfgrasses growing in home lawns have also been affected during this same time period, the St. Augustine grass lawns appear to have been hit the hardest.

Listed below are some of the major problems we are currently observing in the St. Augustine grass lawns (spring 2007).

1. Dead areas of St. Augustine grass. These areas can be anywhere from small, irregular dead spots to the entire lawn area.

2. Yellow St. Augustine grass. Application of iron in most cases does not correct the problem of chlorosis (yellowing) in the lawn.

Brown patch. 3. Normally this disease is a problem in the fall months. However, this disease has been reported in St. Augustine grass lawns throughout Texas this spring.

4. Slow spring transition. Due to cooler than normal temperatures (especially nighttime temperatures) and cloudy days, the warm season turfgrasses have been

very slow to transition from dormant state (brown) to green, actively growing turfgrass. Once the weather warms up and we get more sunshine, many of these affected areas in the lawn should start growing and form a dense stand of

turfgrass. 5. Heavy infestation of winter weeds. Due to the drought conditions of 2006, many of the lawns, including St. Augustine grass, were thinned out going into the winter months. Then, the above average rainfall throughout fall, winter and spring months encouraged the germination and growth of many winter annual weeds. Weeds such as rescuegrass, poa annua and winter annual thistle have especially been a problem.

Below is a list of potential problems that could have contributed to the loss of St. Augustine grass during the 2006 season and continuing into spring of 2007. In some cases, loss of the St. Augustine grass could have been from more than one factor.

A. Major contributors to loss of St. Augustine grass in 2006 through spring of 2007: 1. Extended drought conditions in 2006, followed by several days of freezing temperatures during the winter months of 2006? 2007.

### Uninsured in America

Americans are constantly reminded of the importance of proactive participation in their health care. Public health awareness campaigns tell us that vigilantly observing changes in our bodies, staying current with preventive health screenings, and regularly visiting our doctors are key to preventing or lowering the risk of chronic disease and managing current medical conditions. It's good advice, but keeping up with routine screenings and doctor visits is easier said than done for the more than 46 million Americans living without health insurance.

Studies show that uninsured women are less likely to receive preventive health care and screening tests, such as clinical breast exams and Pap tests, than those who have insurance. They are also more likely to receive diagnoses at more advanced disease stages and tend to receive less medical intervention once diagnosed. An estimated 18,000 Americans between the ages of 25 and 64 die prematurely every year solely because they do not have health coverage. In 2005, nearly 22 million uninsured were women. Most uninsured women are in families with at least one full-time worker, but their employers do not offer health coverage or the family cannot afford it. Women are more likely to be dependents, making them susceptible to losing health insurance due to divorce, becoming widowed, or because their spouse's company increases premiums or drops

Overall, 13% of pregnant women are uninsured, and older women between ages 55 and 65 are 20% more likely to be uninsured than men. While some women are insured through programs like Medicaid -- the statefederal health program for the poor -- typically only very lowincome mothers, pregnant women, and certain women with disabilities qualify.

For many families, affordable options for health coverage can be hard to come by. There are several online resources that help uninsured Americans find health care, even if they have little or no money to pay for services:

The Bureau of Primary Health Care website (http://ask.hrsa.gov/pc) allows you to search for free or low-cost health care clinics by state and city.

On borrowed time

"Where does the day go?" many workers lament, which might explain why those polled for a recent survey said they spend an average of 36 minutes per day, or the equivalent of three hours a week, attending to personal tasks at the office. Executives were asked the same question, and they estimated their staff members spend an average of 43 minutes each day on non-work activities.

The two surveys were developed by Office Team, a leading staffing service specializing in the placement of highly skilled administrative professionals. They were conducted by an independent research firm and

include responses from 559 full- or part-time workers 18 years of age or older and employed in office environments, and 150 senior executives at the nation's 1,000 largest companies.

Workers were asked, "How much time each day do you think you spend attending to personal tasks during work hours?" Their response was 36 minutes.

Executives were asked, "How much time each day do you think the average employee spends attending to personal tasks during work hours?" Their response was 43 minutes.

"There are only so many hours in the day to meet job requirements and personal obligations, and employers are aware that not all of the work day is spent on business," said Diane Domeyer, executive director of Office Team. "In fact, some businesses have responded by providing staff with on-site daycare or concierge-type services such as dry cleaning and personal shopping."

But Domeyer pointed out that misuse of company time can lead to significant losses in productivity. "The best employers take steps to accommodate the need by staff for work-life balance," she said. "Unfortunately, employees who abuse these

benefits undermine the success Younger employees also were of the programs."

In the survey of workers, differences by gender and age emerged: Women said they take an average of 29 minutes daily to attend to personal tasks during office hours, while men admitted to spending 44 minutes each day on non-work related activities. workers age 65 years or older.

more apt to take personal time during business hours. Survey respondents between the ages of 18 and 34 estimated spending an average of 45 minutes each day on personal pursuits at work, compared to 32 minutes for those between the ages of 35 and 64, and 17 minutes for
