County receives much needed rainfall

the Thanksgiving weekend, of the state experienced the first real cold front this season. The "norther" blew in on Wednesday, November 21, and kept temperatures below the 50 degree mark for the most part during the days, with nighttime temperatures dipping into the lower thirties through Monday, November 26. The county experienced its first hard freeze for the year, with temperatures on Saturday and Sunday nights registering around 30 degrees.

With the cold temperatures was some much-welcomed moisture, and even some limited snowfall in the western and northeastern parts of the county. Rain and snowfall amounts totaled from .8 to .9 inches on the west side of the county, with the east side receiving somewhere around an inch of total moisture. Everyone was excited about the good rainfall amounts, for this time of year. Following a wonderful spring and summer, the last measurable rainfall was during the first part of September.

The winds blew cold over hoping it would kill some bugs and put an end to some as Coke County and the rest of our allergy woes. Indian summer is an applicable term for this year's fall, as the first freeze occurred at least two weeks later than normal, with above average temperatures for October and most of November.

The painting shows nine children playing a game in front of the building and the children are in period clothes and most are barefooted - a cotton patch is shown in the foreground. The picture is entitled "Recess at Robert Lee High School.

Mr. Austin also presented a framed page from The Corral, 1955, telling of the demolishing of the old high school, stating in part, "although it is now being cast aside, its spirit will carry over into a new era to help write a better story of life in the community."

Mr. Austin expressed an interest in the Old Jail restoration project and presented the painting to hang there when restoration is complete. For the time being, the picture and framed page from The Corral hang in Robert Lee City Hall.

Mr. Austin's sister, Jane Austin Bruckner, compiled Grandmother Stories from the Heart of Texas, which includes rememberances of Coke County pioneer women told by their family members.

After both Art I and Art II did research on the origins of the holiday, they used the information to create the installation in the display area in Mrs. Millican's room.

Day of the Dead is an ancient ritual with its roots in the Aztec culture over 3000 years ago and was incorporated into the church holiday of All Saints' Day and All Souls' Day on November 1 and 2 during the attempt of the Spaniard invaders to Christianize the Meso-Americans. November 1 is set aside to remember children who died, while November 2 is for adults. The celebration is based around an old belief that life does not end at death, but continues on with death treated not in a morbid fashion, but as a festival. The family recognizes the cycle of life and death is part of the human existence, and with this in mind, family members honor lost ones by visiting the cemetery to clean up and decorate family graves, sharing a meal there, recall stories about their love one, before returning home to construct the ofrenda. The belief is that the departed are around them and share in the meals and the items left on the ofrenda.

Usually the ofrenda or altar is composed of favorite foods, marigolds, sugar skulls, photos, clothing, personal belongings, something for the departed to freshen up with, chocolate, drink, toys, and other items deemed important by the family. A pathway of marigold petals is laid out to guide the spirit to the ofrenda and inviting them into the home.

The ofrenda of the art students had many of these elements including stories from some of the students, photos of the person they wanted to remember, and personal items of the departed brought from home. As seen in ofrenda in Mexico and the United States, a slight modification was allowed for students who did not have a departed one they wanted to remember, but had someone they did not see often and was special to them. The students enjoyed a meal for the Day of the Dead, which was composed of different Mexican foods.



Make Holiday Time A Safe Time

With lots of cooking and entertaining at holiday time, it's easy to get caught up in the excitement and to overlook some basic safety precautions. Even cooks with decades of experience are susceptible to kitchen mishaps.

General Kitchen Safety

The Soap and Detergent Association reminds consumers that a safe kitchen begins with a clean, clutter-free environment. If things are put away in their proper place, there is less chance of accidents. Cuts and burns are just two of the possible injuries. Others include slips, sprains, falls, strains. bruises, electric shock and poisonings.

Fire and hot utensils are the most obvious dangers. The basic rule for stove safety is never leave cooking unattended. Turn pot handles so they do not

hang over the front of the stove where they can be bumped or pulled down by a curious child. When lifting a pot lid tilt it so it directs the steam away from face and hands. Use dry potholders to remove hot dishes from the oven or stove.

Oil and grease present special hazards. Water and hot oil do not mix; instead, they create dangerous splatters. Food should be free of water and ice when it's lowered gently into hot oil. Grease that is smoking is too hot. Smoke indicates that the grease can easily ignite. If a grease fire starts, never try to put it out with water. Extinguish it by turning off the burner and sliding a lid over the pan or using a drychemical fire extinguisher.

When cooking, wear short or rolled-up sleeves, rather than loose, flowing garments. If clothing does catch fire, drop to the floor and roll back and forth to smother the flame. If burns are severe, call for medical help. If minor, rinse with cool water for at least five minutes. Never treat a burn with grease, butter or ointment. They will trap the heat and make the injury worse.

Knives are another kitchen hazard. Knives should be kept sharp, as a dull knife requires extra pressure, which

increases the possibility that the blade, hand or cutting board will slip. Use knives only for cutting and not for tasks like chopping ice or prying open a container. Never soak a dirty knife in the sink-feeling around for a knife in soapy water is courting an accident. Wash, dry and put knives away immediately after use. When not in use, knives should be stored in a special slotted rack or wood block or in a separate drawer with blades pointing to the rear.

Even the general kitchen environment can be hazardous. A cabinet door left open can result in a bumped head. Worn flooring or food spills left on the floor increase the chance of slipping. Frayed extension and appliance cords increase the chance of shock or fire. Poor lighting means poor visibility, which increases the possibility of an accident. Check all these things carefully.

Test smoke detectors regularly. Many people find it easier to remember to do this at the same time they change their clocks. Keep a first aid kit handy. A fire extinguisher that is capable of putting out both grease and electrical fires should be an essential piece of equipment in every kitchen. Store it where it is easily and quickly accessible.

43rd Annual Pecan Show slated

The 43rd Annual Concho Valley Pecan Show will be held on Friday, December 7, from 12 noon until 6 pm at the main entrance to the Tom Green County Library in Judge Edd B. Keyes Building. Any pecan grower in the area may submit entries to the show. This includes Tom Green, Coke, Concho, Irion, McCulloch, Schleicher, and Sterling Counties. No entry limit per exhibitor is made, but participants are limited to one entry of each named variety they grow. The grower may enter as many seedlings, known hybrids or natives as he wishes. The exhibitor must be grower. Entries must be received by 12 noon on Wednesday, December 5, in the Tom Green County Extension Office on the second floor of the Judge Edd B. Keyes Building or any participating County Extension Office.

A minimum of 42 pecans are necessary for each entry. This sample of 42 should represent the variety or individual seedling tree and be uniform in size and shell color. Mixed samples - more than one variety in an entry - are disqualified.

The grower may wish to select the heaviest pecans by weighing individual nuts. This will eliminate poorly filled pecans, but certainly isn't an entry requirement.

A varietal entry may be composed of nuts from more than one tree. For example, if the grower has 10 Choctaw trees, each tree could contribute nuts to the grower's one Choctaw entry.

Nuts should be free of dust, dirt, and shuck remnants. They should not be buffed to the extent that shape or color is altered. Discolored shells and kernels may result from peeling pecans from the shucks too early. Pecans must be from the 2007 crop. Judging is based on the size of the pecans, appearance, and kernel quality which includes color, percent kernel (as relative to shell) and percent edible kernel.

Final judging will begin at 9 am on December 7, 2007. Decisions and placings by the judges will be final. Pecans will be left on display from 11 am to 4 pm, Friday December 7, in the Tom Green County Library foyer in the Judge Edd Keyes Building, 113 W. Beauregard. Winning entries in each class may be considered for entering in the West Texas Regional Pecan Show to be held on December 11 in Taylor County in Abilene.

Children are curious all year long, but at holiday time they are more excited than usual...and the adults around them are more distracted than usual. If there are small children underfoot, it's

particularly important to childproof the kitchen.

Keeps things inaccessible. This means to use door locks on cabinets containing medicines, cleaning supplies, lighter fluid and pesticides; tightly close garbage to keep children out; and install gates at entrances to kitchen with steps. Stove shields, which detach easily for cooking, prevent children's access to burner and oven controls. These control knobs can also be removed when not in use. Install childproof plugs in unused electrical outlets and cover the garbage disposal switch with a dome-type outlet plate. Most important of all; never leave a child unattended in the kitchen.


