## RLVFD to resume

 Hydrant Flushing By Mark Sides, RLVFD Chief The Robert Lee Volunteer Fire Department will resume its fire hydrant flushing and testing program starting Monday June 9 .The main goal of this program is to assure a reliable water supply in the event of a fire. Flushing and testing are required by the Insurance Service Office (ISO) and must be carried out regularly in order to maintain our ISO rating. The ISO rating directly affects your homeowner and business insurance rates.
When hydrants are flowed, mineral and rust sediments are stirred up causing possible discolored water in your home and/or business. This is not a health hazard.
Run your cold water for a short time to ensure that any sediment is cleared from the lines. DO NOT run your hot water, bathe, or do laundry until you are sure your water lines are flushed clear of sediments. In most cases this should not take long, but if you experience more than several hours of discolored water contact the water department.
Hydrants scheduled to be flushed on the 9 th include but are not limited to East of TX 208 and South of TX 158 bordered by Mtn. Creek West of Commerce and South of 10th.
The department apologizes for any inconvenience, but our ultimate goal is to ensure your safety and the safety of the department volunteers.

## Coke County

by Hal Spain, Publisher Monday night (May 26) was a little scary in the western parts of Coke County, as a cold front dumped up to 4.5 inches of rainfall in a short period of time. About 11 pm the bottom fell out, and the rain came in buckets. I recorded a total of 3.6 inches across from Lake Spence on Harmon Lane, and if I had to guess, I would say that nearly three inches of that total came in about twenty minutes, if that is possible. The next morning we examined the erosion damage, and there was a tremendous amount of caliche in our driveway and at the barn that had washed somewhere downstream. The water that ran through the barn lot showed to have been about a foot tall in places as it raced through to get to the creeks that flow into Lake Spence.
We got a few rainfall reports in the area that morning, with Tim Millican recording a whopping 4.5 inches near Pecan Baptist Church. Also in that vicinity, Dub Metcalf had 4.2 inches. A little farther out, Wilbern Millican had 2.8 inches, while Marshall Millican recorded 3.3 inches about two miles out of Robert Lee on Hwy 158.

Other parts of the county recorded substantial moisture without the flooding Blackwell got about 2 inches while Bronte received around 1 inch, depending on where you live on the east side.
I have heard reports of Lake Spence being up over a foot but a look at the USGS
about 1847 feet. By Wednesday the elevation was 1847.4 feet, with the current level as of June 3 being 1847.29 feet. As to volume, the lake was at 66,000 acre feet before the rain. By Wednesday the volume had risen to 67,500 acre feet, a net increase of 1500 acre feet. On June 3 the volume is being reported at somewhere near 67,000 acre feet.
The rain has been a blessing, even when you consider the flooding. Pastures have greened up, and hayfields (that weren't washed out) are growing like a weed. The downside is that with the limited moisture during the winter months, these fields and pastures are going to start burning up quickly with these 100 degree days, unless we get some timely rains over the next few weeks.

Banish summer boredom for

## your kids

By Jason Alderman Summer's almost here and you know what that means: warmer days, longer evenings and endless choruses of 'there's nothing to do.' Before you park your kids in front of the TV or at the mall, consider a few activities you can do together that might help bring you closer while also teaching them valuable lessons about managing their personal finances.
Vacation planning. With fuel at record prices, many families are curtailing their summer travel plans. If you've got computer-savvy teenagers with time on their hands, enlist their help planning possible itineraries that fall within your budget. Discuss expenses they'll need to track such as airfares, lodging, meals, gas, taxes, attraction entrance fees, souvenirs, etc.
They can compare airline, hotel and rental car rates at websites like www.travelzoo.com,
www.kayak.com and www.cheaptickets.com. To calculate gas costs, use MapQuest and Yahoo Maps to estimate mileage between destinations.
Empty the closets, earn cash. If your kids continually ask for money to buy more stuff, try the 'one in, one out' rule: If they want a new toy or sweatshirt, they first must get rid of an old one. Hold a garage sale (maybe in tandem with neighbors), sell things on eBay or donate goods to charity. It's not that they'll earn anywhere near what you originally paid for these items; but they'll learn about moderation, valuing and caring for what they already own and, of course, their packrat tendencies will get nipped in the bud.
Unleash your green thumb. Many younger kids have no idea where their food comes from - maybe they assume carrots come out of the ground already peeled and sliced. Run your family's own mini-science project by carving out a portion of the yard or a sunny windowsill where they can plant a few vegetables and flowers.
Your local nursery can recommend seasonal, easy-to-grow varieties. Weeding and watering are tasks even small children can handle and they'll be amazed to watch fast-growing plants like watermelons or sunflowers develop. The connection they'll form with the food they'll eventually eat teaches patience, responsibility and pride in workmanship.
To market, to market. Grocery shopping with kids in tow can be a real drag unless you can make it interesting for them. Start by getting them involved in menu planning and meal
preparation so they become familiar with fresh and packaged ingredients. In the produce department, show them what the fruits of their gardening labors eventually will look like and point out how much money the family can save by growing your own.
The supermarket is also a good place to learn about comparison shopping and living within a budget. Have your kids clip coupons and make it worth their while by splitting any savings they uncover.
Fun and games. Many family friendly websites provide financial education games you can play with your kids or they can safely play alone. Check out the American Library Association's list of appropriate

The site also features a parent's resource section that can arm you with facts and suggestions on how best to talk to your kids about money.

Child Car Safety Seat Tips
The widespread use of children's car seats has reduced the number of injuries and fatalities on American roads, but experts agree that more needs to be done.
"Every state requires that children under the age of 4 are secured while riding in a car," noted Ray Palermo, director of public information for Teachers' Insurance Plan ${ }^{\text {TM }}$. "Yet despite the laws and warnings, car crashes are still the single largest cause of death among children under the age of fourteen." It is estimated that

half of the approximately 1,500 fatalities each year could be prevented with the proper use of a child car seat.
Although State laws vary and parents should check to ensure they are complying with all local regulations, the insurer offered some general guidelines for parents to follow.
Start Out Right: The best way to get children in the habit of using safety restraints is to learn from their parent's example. The driver, all adult passengers and all infants and children should be safely secured before starting the engine
Infants Up to 20 Pounds: Infants from birth to 1 -year old and under 20 pounds in weight should be secured in an infant car safety seat on the back seat of the vehicle, facing the rear. This avoids injury from an inflated airbag and will be less of a distraction for the driver. If your vehicle does not have a back seat, deactivate the airbag for that trip, but be sure to reactivate it when an adult is the passenger.
Infants $20+$ Pounds: Infants from birth to 1 -year and more than 20 pounds should be either secured in a convertible safety seat or in an infant seat approved for their weight. The seats should be secured on the back seat of the vehicle, facing the rear.
Children 20 to 40 Pounds:

Children older than 1-year who hips and the shoulder belt should weigh 20 to 40 pounds should be not cross the neck or face. secured in a child safety seat on Teachers' Insurance Plan also the back seat of the vehicle, offered these cautions: Be sure to facing forward.
Children $40+$ Pounds: Children who have outgrown their child safety seat, but are still too small (less than $4^{\prime} 9 \prime$ ) to use the standard adult safety belt in the car, should use a booster seat. The lap belt should sit across the
