## USDA announces disaster program sign-up deadline

Livestock producers have until July 18, 2008, to enroll in the 2005-2007 Livestock Compensation Program (LCP) and Livestock Indemnity Program (LIP). Signup began on September 10, 2007, for the two programs that provide aid to livestock producers who suffered eligible livestock or livestock feed losses between January 1, 2005, and December 30, 2007, because of a natural disaster.

The LIP provides payments to eligible livestock owners and contract growers who incurred the death of livestock because of a natural disaster. The LCP provides payments to eligible livestock owners and cash lessees who suffered feed losses or increased feed costs because of a natural disaster.

## FSA accepting applications

The Farm Service Agency (FSA) is now accepting application for Emergency Farm Loans resulting from damages and losses caused by fires and high winds on January 1, 2008 and continuing.

Coke County has been named a primary county where eligible family farmers may qualify for FSA EM loan assistance. Farm Loan Manager, Justin B. Holland, asks farmers who want to

apply for emergency loans to submit their applications as soon as possible. The deadline for applications is January 15, 2009, but if farmers wait too long, a backlog will develop and cause delays.

Generally, farmers who have lost 30 percent of their production due to designated disaster are eligible for emergency loans. The FSA office is located at 103 W. Florida Avenue in Sweetwater, Texas.

Host Families**

Foreign high school students are scheduled to arrive soon for academic semester homestay programs, and the sponsoring organization needs a few more local host families. The students are anxiously awaiting news of their new families. These young ambassadors are looking forward to fulfilling their life-long dreams.

According to Pacific Intercultural Exchange (P.I.E.) President, John Doty, the students are all between the ages of 15 and 18 years, are English-speaking, have their own spending money, carry accident and health insurance, and are anxious to share their cultural experiences with their new American families. P.I.E. currently has programs to match almost every family's needs, ranging in length from a semester to a full academic year, where the students attend local high schools.

P.I.E. area representatives match students with host families by finding common interests and lifestyles through an informal in-home meeting. Prospective host families are able to review student applications and select the perfect match. As there are no "typical" host families, P.I.E. can fit a student into just about any situation, whether it is a single parent, a childless couple, a retired couple or a large family.

Families who host for P.I.E. are also eligible to claim a \$50.00 per month charitable contribution deduction on their itemized tax returns for each month they host a sponsored student.

For the upcoming programs, P.I.E. has students from Germany, the Former Soviet Union, Venezuela, Argentina, Brazil, Japan, Hungary, Korea, Mexico, Australia, Yugoslavia, China, and many other countries. P.I.E. is also participating in two special government-funded programs to bring scholarship students from the Newly Independent States of the former Soviet Union as well as predominantly Islamic countries such as Yemen, Syria, Jordan, Morocco, Kuwait, Iraq and Qatar to the United States. P.I.E. is a non-profit educational organization that has sponsored more than 25,000 students from 45 countries since its founding in 1975. The organization is designated by the United States Department of State and is listed by the Council on Standards for International Educational Travel (CSIET), certifying that the organization complies with the standards

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### Supporting Healthy Lifestyles for Texas' Youth

Summer in Texas is now in full bloom. Unfortunately, many children will spend their free time not on swings at playgrounds but in front of televisions at home, consuming hours of programming full of advertisements for unhealthy foods. Others will spend time on the Internet instead of playing outside with their friends. This lack of physical activity among our youth is contributing to an American healthcare crisis: childhood obesity. We must work together to reduce the harmful influence that inactivity can have on our kids, and promote healthy living that is vital to their long-term well-being.

Texas ranks sixth nationally in the percentage of obese youth (ages 10 - 17), and many of these children are at risk of significant health problems, including Type 2 Diabetes. Since 1990, the number of children diagnosed with Type 2 diabetes in our country has jumped 15-fold. This is extremely troubling because diabetic children face lifelong medical problems.

Fortunately, a number of broadcasters and corporations are taking steps to foster healthy and active lifestyles. They are demonstrating that they are willing to be part of the solution.

The Walt Disney Company is phasing out the use of its characters in promotions that market unhealthy products, and it is developing shows that demonstrate the benefits of exercising and eating well. Nickelodeon, one of the national networks for youth, has an initiative called "Let's Just Play," which inspires young viewers to be more active. On the network's annual "Worldwide Day of Play," it suspends programming for a block of time so kids can go outside and run around. I hope that Texas parents will help me support the continuation and expansion of these efforts.

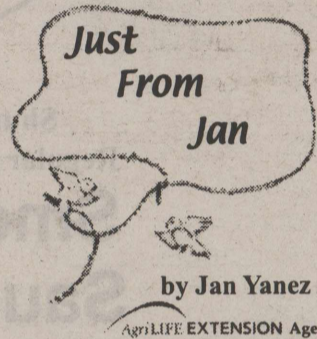
Broadcasters in our state are also creating initiatives that nurture wholesome living. Many of these endeavors are community-based and address physical, nutritional, and mental health.

This is a good start, but there is much more that can be done to curb the epidemic of childhood obesity. We can help shape the content of the shows our children listen to and watch by encouraging media companies, broadcasters, and marketers to air responsible programs and advertisements.

Finally, a foundation for healthy habits must be

reinforced at home. In the 2008 Farm Bill, I created an elementary school pilot program that invites parents to become involved in nutritional education along with their children. This initiative is modeled after the very successful Coordinated Approach to Child Health (CATCH) Program which helped significantly reduce the number of overweight fifth graders in El Paso.

By using the major influences in a child's life -- from parents, to teachers, to their favorite television characters -- we can help reverse childhood obesity. We can all be part of a national movement to cultivate positive lifestyles and good health that young Americans can carry into adulthood.



#### Summer Safety Driving Tips

With the arrival of hot weather, motorists should be reminded to ensure their vehicle is well-maintained and working properly to ensure safe travel during the summer months.

Vehicle breakdowns are never convenient, but they can be especially problematic during hot weather. By taking the time to have your vehicle checked by a mechanic now, you may be able to prevent a future problem and better enjoy your summer travels. Engine hoses and drive belts should be inspected by a mechanic for wear, and the cooling system should be checked to be certain that it is functioning properly to help avoid over-heating. Also, have the battery checked because battery failure is a common problem during hot weather.

In addition, motorists should regularly check fluid levels and tire tread depth. It also is important to have tires properly inflated for maximum fuel efficiency. In times of very hot weather, air pressure inside the tire can expand, causing a blowout if

the tire is in poor condition.

Hot weather also can contribute to problems on roadway surfaces. Extreme heat causes oils deposited from vehicles to be absorbed into the road. Rain forces these oils to the surface, creating slick spots. Motorists should use extra caution while driving during a rainstorm, particularly after an extended period without rain.

Remember the following tips for safe summer driving:

- \* Never leave children or pets unattended in a vehicle, which can heat up quickly during hot weather.
- \* When traveling a long distance, try to plan your trip for early in the day or later in the evening when the weather is cooler.
- \* Carry a cell phone and charger in case of emergency.
- \* Carry extra water and non-perishable food.
- \* State law requires headlights to be turned on any time the wipers are in use due to rain, fog or other conditions.
- \* Remember to always buckle up and never drink and drive.

Track what you spend. For the next few months, write down every penny you spend on rent or mortgage, utilities, groceries, meals out, parking meters, allowances, gas - the works. Don't forget to add in monthly amounts for periodic bills like your car and homeowner's insurance.

Review your list for non-essentials you can trim. A \$5-a-day coffee habit costs \$1,800 a year; buying a \$10 lunch every day will run about \$2,500. You could save

a fortune by brewing your own coffee and packing lunch a few days a week. Put those savings toward paying off credit cards and you'll save even more, since you'll reduce the amount of interest accrued on those loans.

A few other money-saving ideas:

- \* Consolidate errands to save gas
- \* Try generic brand groceries
- \* Investigate using generic drugs and ask if there's a discount for ordering multiple-month prescriptions by mail
- \* Raise insurance deductibles
- \* Pay down higher-interest credit cards first
- \* Balance your checking account regularly to avoid overdraft charges
- \* Avoid using out-of-network ATMs; take cash back on debit card purchases to avoid foreign ATM fees
- \* Quit smoking - a pack a day habit costs over \$1,500 a year

## Grace Or Wrath?

The Bible teaches that God is perfectly Holy. Because of this attribute of His character, He cannot tolerate sin (*Numbers 14:18*). The Bible says that God must deal with sin, and He does so in one of two ways - either grace or wrath.

Every person on the face of this earth is at this moment under either the grace of God or the wrath of God. John the Baptist made this point in one of his sermons when he said: "He who believes in the Son has eternal life; but he who does not obey the Son shall not see life, but the wrath of God abides on him." (*John 3:36*).

It's amazing how all Christians seem to know John 3:16. But almost none seem to be aware of John 3:36. It shows how little preaching has been done on the wrath of God.

Like John the Baptist, the Apostle Paul emphasized God's wrath in his preaching and teaching. In Ephesians 5 he warned against immorality, covetousness, and idolatry, and then he added this observation: "Let no one deceive you with empty words, for because of these things, the wrath of God comes upon the sons of disobedience." (*Ephesians 5:6*).

We come under God's grace by placing our faith in Jesus and appropriating His atoning sacrifice for our lives (*1 John 1:7*). There is no salvation apart from Jesus (*Acts 4:10-12*). Those who have rejected God's gift of grace in Jesus are under God's wrath (*John 3:36*), and they have no one to blame but themselves.

If a 401(k) plan isn't available, try a Roth IRA. Although initial contributions are taxed, you'll never pay taxes on the earnings. The earlier you contribute to a Roth, the bigger your tax savings. Consult a financial professional regarding your personal situation.

**Headaches on the Job Prevalent, Painful and Costly**

Experiencing headaches at work is not only painful for employees, but can be costly to employers, according to the National Headache Foundation (NHF). In a recent survey of headache sufferers, the NHF found that 99% of respondents experience headaches while on the job. Respondents say headaches lead to missed days of work, decreased productivity, inability to

concentrate, and changes in mood or behavior.

While half of all survey respondents reported missing anywhere from 1-3 days of work per month because of their headaches, 66% of them do not report their headaches to their supervisors. When asked why, most respondents said they feel their supervisor wouldn't be sympathetic or accommodating or they don't want to be labeled as "needy" or "whiny." Additionally, 86% of respondents said the issue of work-related headaches has never been addressed at their place of employment. Ninety-three percent said that information on work-related headache treatment or prevention is not available through their employer.

"Many who suffer from headaches at work feel their employers or co-workers won't understand the severity of their condition," said Dr. Nabih Ramadan, Board member, National Headache Foundation. "If you experience headaches on the job, talk with your healthcare provider about what triggers your pain to determine the best treatment options. You can also encourage your employer to learn more about headaches and their profound negative impact on workplace performance."

When asked what triggers headaches at work, nearly 70% of the respondents attributed their pain to work-related stress. A larger majority also associated bright or florescent lighting, computer glare or eye strain with their headaches.

Additional NHF survey results:

- \* 92% of respondents said they work outside their home
- \* 90% of respondents said headaches have affected their performance at work
- \* 73% of respondents said

they take an over-the-counter product when experiencing a headache at the workplace

NHF's Tips to dealing with headaches at the workplace:

\* Get help. Discuss the connection between your headaches and work with your healthcare provider. He or she can help you determine your treatment options.

\* Track your headaches. Using a headache diary, track your headaches for three months. Download a free headache diary at [www.headaches.org](http://www.headaches.org) and bring your results to your healthcare professional to review and determine whether your headaches are associated with workplace triggers.

\* Eliminate florescent lighting

\* Use a non-glare computer screen

\* Use loose telephone head set instead of phone receiver

\* Take frequent breaks

\* Utilize ergonomically designed work spaces

same time is the record rainfall we received during the second quarter of last year, with the exception of the Edith area. Maybe they are just now catching up.

We have been pretty lucky so far with some of these showers. Our underground moisture (carried over from the winter) is next to nothing; so every one of these showers is money in the bank, whether or not you raise cows or farm.

Even if you live in Bronte or Robert Lee, and don't own anything except the lot your house is on, you still have a large stake in the weather. If you like to fish or boat on area lakes, you are concerned with rainfall totals. If you like to see wildlife, now is a critical time in the life of quail, turkey, and deer and their reproduction cycle. Or if you just like to see a beautiful stand of bluebonnets by the roadside. We are all affected by the

weather, and its importance can never be overstated.

Thanks again to our cooperators for turning in their rainfall totals. I think it gives us a good look at the rainfall situation throughout the county. We'll keep our fingers crossed for some more of the wet stuff as we get into the critical third quarter of the year.
