

Help eliminate mosquito breeding sites

The City of Bronte asks that property owners and residents mow their yards and alleys. Recent rains have brought an abundance of tall weeds, grasses and mosquitoes. Eliminating over-grown vegetation will help with the control of mosquitoes.

The following tips will help eliminate mosquito breeding sites:

*Keep yards and alleys mowed

*Clean out eaves, troughs and gutters.

*Remove old tires, or drill holes in those used for playground equipment.

*Turn over or remove empty plastic pots.

*Pick up broken, unused or discarded toys.

*Pick up all beverage containers and cups.

*Check boats or other unused items stored outside for collected water.

*Replace water in birdbaths or pet bowls at least once a week.

*Change water in bottom of plant containers at least once a week.

*Fix dripping faucets that create pools of water.

Tailgating Safety Tips

With the arrival of fall comes football season. What's more fun than gathering with friends for a tailgating party?

However, don't let cooler weather fool you into thinking you don't need to consider the possibility of food-borne bacteria spoiling your party. Be proactive and follow a few simple procedures for safe food handling - then you'll be sure to go home healthy from a fun day with friends.

Before, during and after preparing your food, be sure you wash your hands, lathering them with warm soap and water for a full 20 seconds. Set up a large drink container with a spigot as your water source.

Include moist towelettes or hand sanitizer for guests to use.

Keep two separate insulated coolers: one for drinks and one for food. This will keep your food well chilled since the drink cooler is likely to be opened more frequently. Place coolers in the shade and cover them with blankets to help hold in the cold temperature.

Place cold and frozen foods into coolers. Don't assume your cooler can chill foods adequately if the food is at room temperature prior to packing.

Pack foods in reverse order so that the last ones packed will be the first ones used, allowing food at the bottom to stay chilled longer.

Meat and other similar raw foods should be packed in sealed plastic bags or containers in a chilled, insulated cooler. This will prevent contamination of other foods from leaking juices. Store raw foods separately from ready-to-eat foods.

Take meat out of the cooler just in time to place on the grill. Never place cooked meat, fish or poultry back in the container that the raw meat, fish or poultry was in. Use a clean pair of tongs and a clean plastic plate or platter when removing the cooked items from the grill. When marinating meat, fish or poultry, discard the leftover marinade after you place the items on the grill. Never use this marinade on the cooked item.

Use a meat thermometer to judge the safe internal temperature of meat and poultry over 2 inches thick (160F or higher for meat,

180F or higher for poultry). For meat or poultry less than 2 inches thick, look for clear juices as signs of being done.

Use separate cutting boards prevent cross contamination of raw and cooked foods. Wipe them clean with paper towels at the barbecue and toss them in your dishwasher to sanitize when you return home.

Perishable foods such as meat, poultry, fish, eggs, dairy products, sandwiches with mayonnaise and salads should not be kept at temperatures above 40F for more than two hours. When the outside temperature is 90F or higher, food should be left out for no longer than one hour.

If deli or takeout foods such as fried chicken, potato salad or coleslaw are on the menu, make sure they are eaten within two hours of

Hot food should be kept at 140F or hotter until served. wrapping your hot

casserole or other item in several layers of aluminum wrap, followed newspapers and a towel.

Cover all food with plastic wrap, aluminum foil or lids, or keep foods and supplies in their original packaging to prevent contamination.

If you're not sure if food is still safe to eat, resort to the golden rule, "When in doubt, throw it out."

Protect your vision with appropriate safety eyewear. Particularly safeguard your eyes with safety glasses, goggles and face shields when applying pesticides, fertilizers, working in the shop, or in heavy dust conditions.

Wear a wide-brimmed hat with neck protection to assist in prevention of skin cancer. Protect your skin by applying sufficient sun block and be sure to wear sunglasses with UV protection when working outdoors even if on a cloudy day or during winter months.

Protect your lungs by wearing correct respiratory equipment such as dust masks, gas masks, cartridge respirators and air pacts when working in dusty or moldy storage, painting, applying chemicals, working in sure gloves are appropriate size.

Bluebonnets, weeds and fire ants: the Good, Bad, and the Ugly

A couple or three topics come to mind as a result of the bountiful showers we have received over the past month. Let's talk about the good first, then we'll get to the bad and the ugly.

About three weeks ago retired RLISD Superintendent Jimmy Bickley related to me that his bluebonnets were coming up some in his yard. I made a mental note to check on this and got busy and forgot about it for a couple of weeks. Yesterday I did some checking at some of our favorite bluebonnet spots, and sure enough, we have little bluebonnets coming up in pretty good numbers.

Some of you may not know that before you can see the pretty flowers in the spring, the bluebonnet goes through some trying times before it can flower. If you were a preacher, you could probably use the trials and tribulations of the bluebonnet and compare it to the undying spirit of the human being, and you'd probably have you a good sermon.

To start off with, the bluebonnet's got just about the hardest seed in Mother Nature's kingdom of flowers. Most of 'em are round and somewhat smaller than a regular BB, if you can remember back to your Daisy airgun days. That seed coat is so hard that it takes Mother Nature sometimes years of temperature extremes and moisture to break that seed coat and get the bluebonnet to flower. Research tells us that bluebonnet seed will remain viable for up to ten years and still germinate. That is a good thing, because the bluebonnet seed summer months.

can wait out the dry spells and pick a good wet year to reproduce.

Anyway, that bluebonnet, when it comes up in the fall, just hunkers down and waits through the rest of the fall and all the cold weather that winter brings. In the spring, if moisture is available, we have an explosion of color in the barrow ditches and all the visitors flock to Coke County on buses and in their cars.

Also, another thing we've learned about bluebonnets over the years is that they prefer the poorer soils. If you'll think back to where you have the most bluebonnets on your place or your neighbor's, it will be some rocky hill or steep bank, or some of the shallowest soil around. How's that for the triumph of the spirit over some very trying circumstances?

I guess the bad part about the recent moisture is that we have grown a crop of weeds and grasses that will test the resolve of any lawnmower and most homeowners who take care of the yard. It is amazing how fast a weed can grow if it has the right moisture and fertility.

I can think of several teenage boys throughout the county who count this rain as a blessing, especially if they are mowing yards for the public. I can remember back in the late 50's and early 60's when my brother was mowing yards. He still brags about making up to and over \$100 per week mowing during the summer. I don't know what he was making per yard back then, but I'll wager it wasn't much. It seemed like he was mowing yards all day long during the

Before we put this to bed, we'd better talk about the ugly, and that, is the imported red fire ant. I can remember when I was a county agent in training in Jefferson County back during the 70's, headquartered in Beaumont, Texas. The fire ant was just getting a foothold in the coastal counties, and we were trying to fight them with one hand tied behind our backs. That was when they found out that DDT was reducing the eggshell thickness of the bald eagles. and chlordane had some unsavory side effects. So Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) was feeling its oats, and in their zeal to protect the public from some of these other chemicals, they wouldn't let us use anything that would kill a fire ant.

You know that rest of the story. The imported red fire ant has spread from the coastal areas up through the Hill Country and is knocking on our front door. Let me rephrase that. They have broken down our front door.

Last year I treated two or three fairly large fire ant mounds around my barn across from Lake Spence. The last time I mowed about a week ago, I mowed over at least fifty to sixty mounds at the barn. Now that is a population growth level


that's pretty hard to deal with.
