Swimming Safety Part I
By Jan Yanez
Summer is about to be in full swing and while you are enjoying the pleasures of the warm weather, it is important
to be prepared to keep yourself and your loved ones out of harm's way. The American Red Cross has several simple tips that could save your life if you are swimming at the beach, the lake or a neighborhood pool.

## General Swimming

 Safety Tips- Learn to swim and swim well. One of the best things anyone can do to stay safe in and around the water is learn to swim.
- Never swim alone. Always swim with a buddy,

Always choose a supervised area in which to swim, whether at a pool, the beach, the ocean, a lake or a river. a trained lifeguard is the best safety factor. Even good swimmers can have an unexpected medical emergency in the water.

- Never drink alcohol and swim. Alcohol impairs your judgment, balance and coordination and reduces your body's ability to stay warm.
- Never chew gum or eat while you swim - you could easily choke.

Know your swimming limits and stay within them Don't try to keep up with a stronger swimmer or encourage others to keep up with you. Keep an eye on children and weaker swimmers - if they appear tired, encourage them to rest out of the water.

- Use common sense about swimming after eating. It may not be necessary to wai an entire hour after eating to swim safely. But after

large meal, let digestion get started before doing any strenuous activity such as swimming.

Watch out for the dangerous "too's" - too tired, too cold, too far from safety, too much sun, too much strenuous activity.

- Stay out of the water when overheated - you could easily tire. Let your body cool itself down first Drink lots of liquids before jumping into the water.
- Watch the weather. Stop swimming or boating as soon as you see lightning or hear thunder. Wait at leas 20 minutes after the last sound of thunder and flash of lightening before reentering the water.
- Pack a "safety" bag for a day at the beach or lake. Include water-proof sunscreen SPF 15 or higher, water shoes to keep feet safe from the heat and objects on land and in the water. Pack plenty of water All containers should be plastic to prevent injuries from breaking glass. The properly packed safety bag will help ensure that everyone comes home safe and sound.


## Ocean Swimming Safety

Check surf conditions before you enter the water. See if a warning flag is up or ask a lifeguard about water conditions, beach conditions or any potential
hazards. If there is rough surf, stay out of the water

- Keep within the flags that designate where you can swim. Swim only where there is a lifeguard on duty.

Know local weather conditions and prepare for electrical storms. Water is a conductor of electricity, so stop swimming as soon as you see lightning or hear thunder.

- Know how to handle ocean currents. Be aware of undertows, drift and rip currents. As deadly as rip currents are, its not that hard to survive one - if you stay calm and know exactly what to do.
To get out, just tread water and allow the rip current to carry you out -- they tend to dissipate outside the breaking surf. Then you can wait for help, or swim around the rip current and back to shore. But few people have the calm to do this. Most drown because they swim against it and tire out.
So for most people, it is recommended swimming parallel to the shore (alongside the shore). One doesn't have to be a strong swimmer to do this. Rip currents aren't exactly narrow, but they are concentrated in one place. In a short while, most swimmers should be outside the current and able to make it back to shore.

Sometimes the rip current is diagonal to shore. If you try to swim parallel to shore but aren't making any progress, turn around and swim parallel to shore in the other direction. That will do the trick.

Use caution with surf boards, boogie boards, tubes, etc. When using these items, stay in designated areas and be aware of other swimmers. - Stay away from piers, pilings and diving platforms. - Look out for marine life you may get stung. If you do get stung by a jellyfish or a sea anemone, soak the injured part in salt water and apply a baking soda paste as soon as possible. Do not rub the wound or apply ammonia or fresh water. If an allergic reaction occurs, call 9-1-1 immediately.

- Wear foot protection. Your feet can get burned from the sand or cut from glass in the sand.
- Stay out of the water when overheated - you could easily tire.

A team of Joint Expeditionary Tasking or JET Airmen here work to make sure the vital cycle is not broken, thus contributing to overall mission accomplishment.
"Our job as computersystem administrators is to issue, maintain and get (computer) accounts open," said Staff Sgt. Some products are specially formulated to be put out at higher rates using a standard, push-type fertilizer spreader. Read the label for the product you choose to determine the best type of spreader to use.
Baits do not kill fire ants overnight, so be patient. Products containing indoxacarb, hydramethylnon and spinosas work the fastest. They will control fire ants within 2 to 4 weeks.

* Insecticide dust, which is designed to be sprinkled lightly over the entire mound. Avoid disturbing the mound during the application, as this can disturb and disperse the ants. It's best to keep children and pets away from treated mounds until the dust is gone.
* Baits can be used as direct-mound treatments, although they are generally slow to work. When applying directly to a mound, use one of the fast-acting baits. This type of treatment is especially good for colonies next to side walks or curbs, where the nest often extends under the concrete.
* Naturally derived insecticides, which are available in a number of different formulations and using different natural ingredients. As with other treatments, be sure to apply enough water when using liquids of granules.
* Shoveling, which can be used to move fire ants from gardens, compost piles or other sensitive sites. Wear rubber gloves and liberally dust the gloves, shovel and bucket with talcum powder to keep the ants from scattering and to reduce the risk of stings. Once captured, the colonies can be dispatched by carefully dousing them with soapy water. Do not attempt this method if you are allergic to fire ant stings.

Uncover hidden vacation costs. If you do travel, make sure to budget beyond normal airfare, hotel, rental car and meal expenses. Consider such items as surcharges for extra or overweight luggage, sales and hotel taxes, babysitters, tips, taxis, rail and transit passes, event admission costs and ticket-ordering charges, new luggage, sporting equipment rental, and special clothing or accessory requirements.
Don't have a vacation budget? Visa Inc.'s free personal financial management site, Practical Money Skills for Life (www.practicalmoneyskills.c om/travel), features a summer travel budgeting center filled with tools to help you create a vacation budget, including a webbased calculator that suggests various travel options and then automatically tallies the results.
Double-check prices. You can find great deals on airfares, hotels and rental cars by comparison shopping online. But beware: Before clicking "confirm" to finalize your purchase, make sure the final price matches the initial quote. I've seen fares jump $\$ 50$ or more in just minutes or had the seat I thought I was booking suddenly become unavailable.
Try haggling. With so many people cutting back on travel, many hotels, airlines, restaurants and other touristoriented businesses are hurting. Don't be afraid request incentives like an extra night's lodging, free parking or shuttle service, meal vouchers or spa treatment discounts. At worst they'll just say no or perhaps
