The Hambys have stayed connected to the community through former students and the Observer/Enterprise.

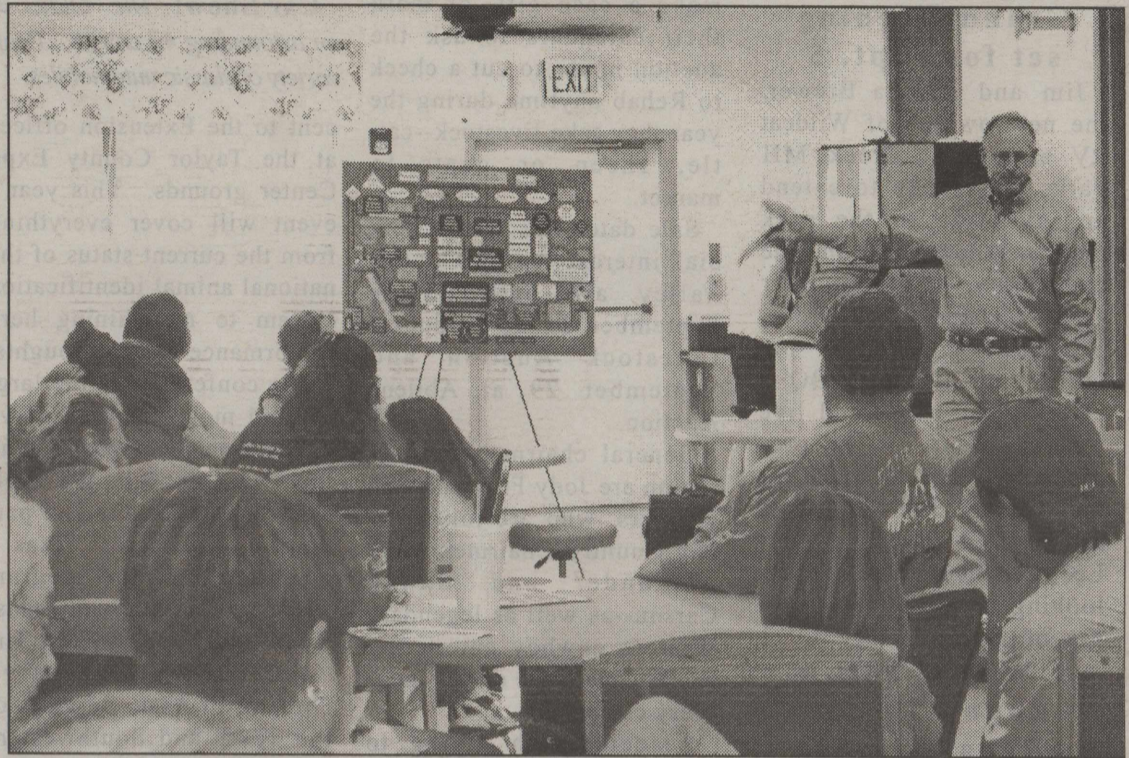
Mr. Hamby will receive a \$50 EE Savings Bond from the Robert Lee State Bank.

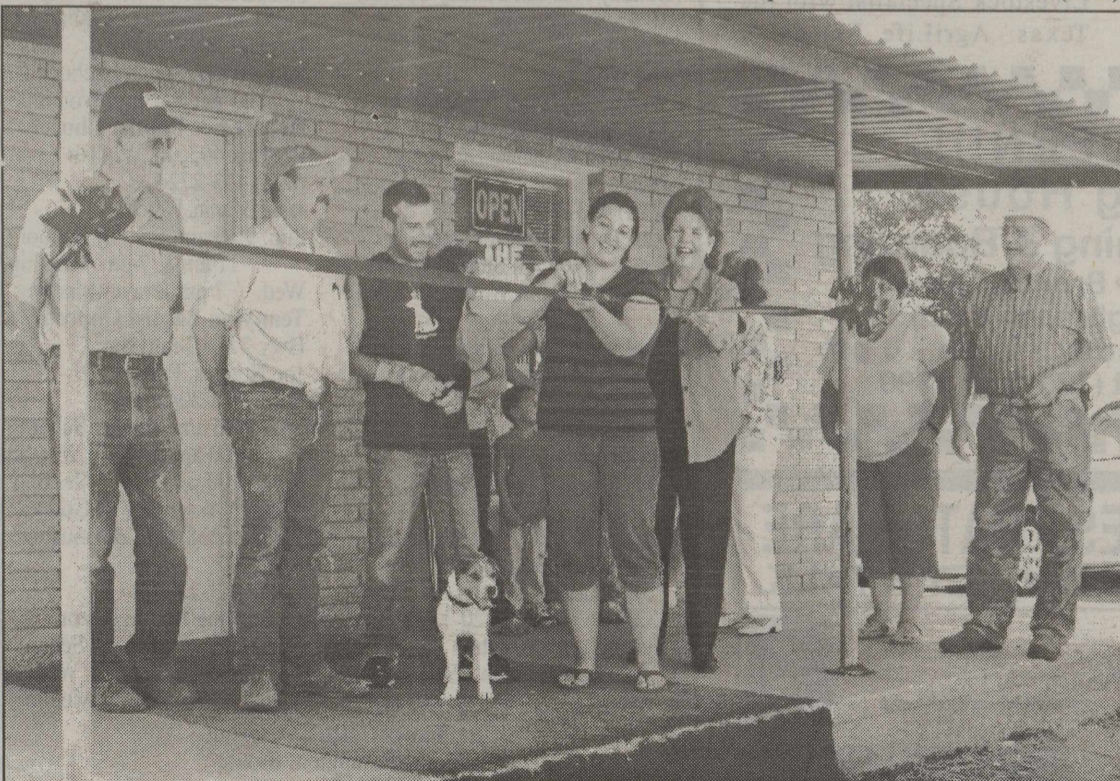

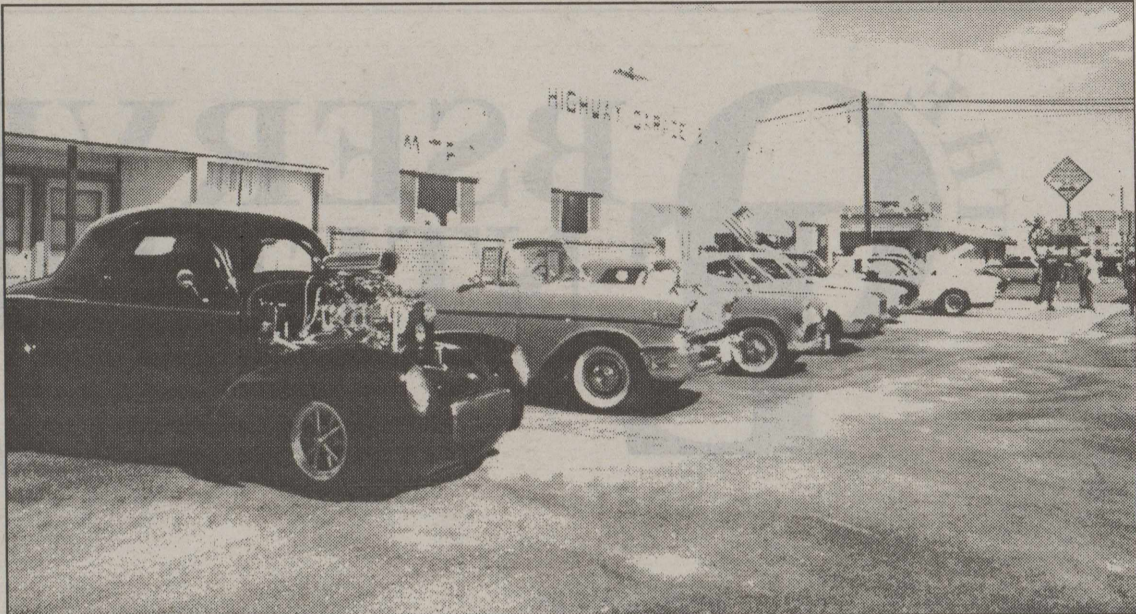
Grand Opening! The Dog House, a grooming and boarding facility in Bronte, celebrated their grand opening on Tuesday, August 18.

**Big Country
 Beef Conference
 set for August 27
 in Abilene**

Texas AgriLife Extension Service's Big Country Beef Conference has been set for Thursday, August 27. The biennial conference starts with registration at 8 a.m. in the Big Country Hall adja-

cent to the Extension offices at the Taylor County Expo Center grounds. This year's event will cover everything from the current status of the national animal identification system to maintaining herd performance during droughts.

The conference is the largest and most comprehensive educational beef program in the Big Country. We typically draw speakers and participants from across Texas.

Session 1 of the program will begin with a beef industry outlook given by Mr. Tim Niedecken, Executive Director of Assn. Services of the Texas and Southwestern Cattle Raisers Association. Dr. David Anderson, Extension Economist from College Station, will then discuss current market trends in the cattle markets.

Session 2 will begin with Bruce Voyles with Global Animal Management, Inc. discussing age and source verification program and the technology available to producers. Mike McCravey, industry relations manager for the Texas Beef Council will then highlight activities of the beef checkoff, a producer-funded marketing and research program designed to increase domestic and/or international demand for beef.

Session 3 will begin after lunch with Dr. Ron Gill, Livestock Specialist with the Texas AgriLife Extension

Service from College Station will be covering how to maintain herd performance during drought. John Regmund with the ADM Alliance Nutrition, Inc will then discuss mineral programs and how they help pay for themselves. In our fourth and final session, Mac Devin DVM with Fort Dodge Animal Health will discuss understanding and managing bovine trichomoniasis. The primary production and economic impact of trich is that it causes infertility and abortions and often extends the breeding and calving season. Mike Edington D.V.M., with the Coleman Vet Clinic will

conclude our conference with a special look at stocker health management.

The conference will be conducted by all the Extension offices in the Big Country.

Individual registration is \$5 if you pre-register by August 21, and \$15 thereafter. Registration includes entire program and noon meal. The West Texas Association of Soil and Water Conservation Districts (WTASWCDS) will meet August 25, beginning at 9:30 a.m. at the Reagan County 4-H Center located in Big Lake.

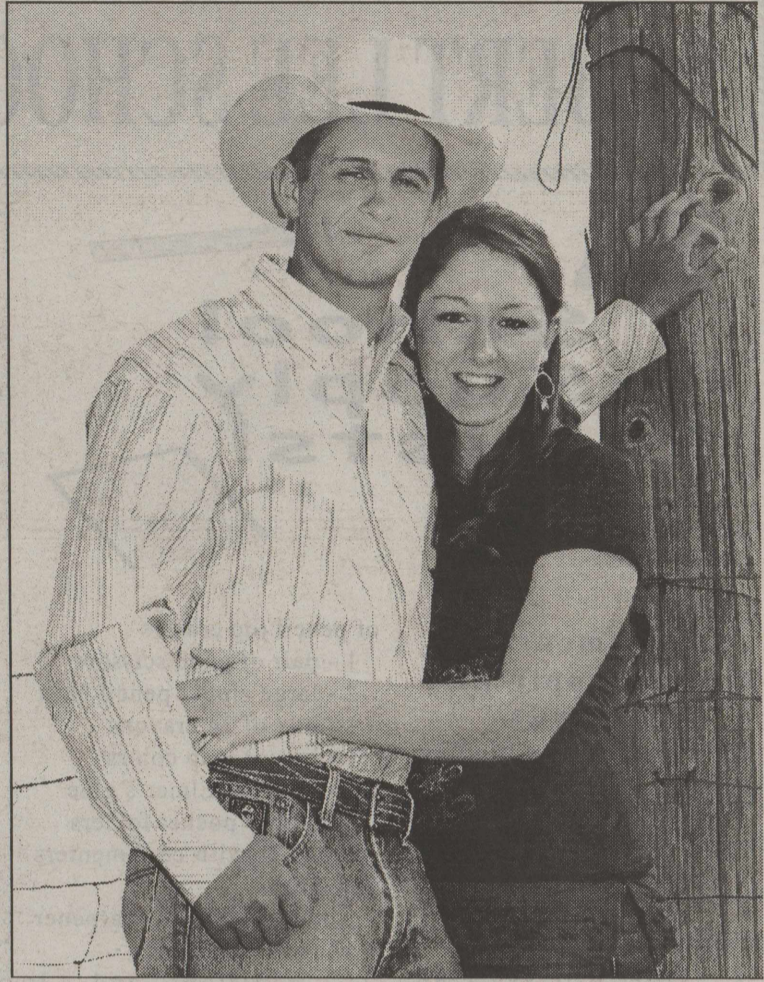
The program speakers include Steve Hartmann, Executive Director, University of Texas System Lands, West Texas Operations; Guy Bell, Range and Pasture Market

Development Specialist for Dow Chemical; Joe Franklin, Rangeland Management Specialist, USDA Natural Resources Conservation Service (NRCS), and Rafe Hargrove, Hargrove Agency.

Hartmann, who oversees approximately 2.1 million acres of the UT Lands System, will present a program on the history and operations of the system. The system reaches over 19 counties in the western region of Texas.

Bell will update the conservation district directors attending the meeting on current chemical treatments available for brush management.

Franklin and Hargrove will share information on carbon sequestration. The topic has garnered recent interest because increasing levels of carbon dioxide in the atmosphere have led to growing interest in national and international forums for implementing measures to slow and reverse the buildup of such atmospheric constituents. Under a movement towards a federal cap and trade system, agricultural landowners are in a unique position to develop a pro-

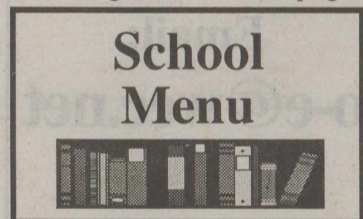

Mr. Carwile contacted every schoolmate, classmate and sportsmate of his. The book is dedicated to Coach



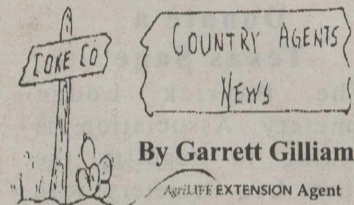

6 Common-Sense Dove Tactics

Too often hunters show up at a dove field and simply sit in the first patch of shade they find. If they paid attention to these factors, they might do more shooting than waiting!

It's happened to most dove hunters at one time or another. There you are, through poor choice or luck of the draw, at the wrong place on the field. Frustrated, you watch fellow shooters enjoy fast-and-furious shotgun action as you sit there, lamenting your fate and praying that one or two birds may unwittingly blunder close enough to afford a shot before the end of feeding time or legal shooting hours.

Often hunters accept invitations to a first-

come/first-served shoot on the field. In such instances, the trick is to be prepared to recognize certain strategic setups on the dove field that can work to your advantage. Let's look at a few of these "ideals."

Scout the Field

First, it pays great dividends if you have done your "homework" and familiarized yourself with the specific nuances of the field. This is the only reliable tactic that can tell you such vital things as where the birds are coming from, when they start arriving, and where they concentrate their on-the-field activities.

If it's permissible, get there early. It is much better to sit and wait an hour or so gazing at a birdless sky than to arrive and find the best spots are already taken and the little feathered "rockets" are already pitching in.

Manage the Light

When picking a set-up spot on a dove field, take several factors into consideration. Let the sun and its relationship to where you are setting up be high on your list. Keep the sun to your back whenever possible. Doves are tough enough to hit under ideal circumstances. Don't handicap yourself by having to stare into the glare of blinding morning or afternoon sunbeams.

Know the Structure

"The average dove hunter seldom pays enough attention to good dove 'structure'" said a self-proclaimed dove addict who hunts almost daily during the season, as well as organizing and staging numerous shoots.

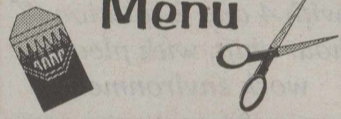

"There are always certain things, other than what they're feeding on, that draw birds once they've arrived over the field," he explained. "Maybe it's a grove of 'loafing' trees, a power line cutting across the field, or even a contour change in the lay of the land itself. Like fish-holding structure in a lake or river, every dove field contains certain things in certain specific locations that will draw and hold birds. If you've got an option, set up within shooting range of these sites or in a location where you can catch them as they approach."

"These areas can be ideal," Jester agreed. "Food on the ground all over the field will obviously scatter and disperse the doves. A hunter sitting near a visible patch of grit will often get a concentration of birds headed for one place that offers more than one of the things they need."

Don't Be Seen

When it comes to proper camouflage as a major dove-hunting consideration, Jester downplays its importance. "Notice it sometimes," he said, "a hunter has himself set up in what looks like the ideal location. He's got the sun angle all figured out, he's surrounded by good dove structure, and he's camouflaged in the latest trendy pattern the outdoor catalogs are pushing that season. Yet, the guy has birds pitching in and flaring off well before they come into range. Look again and see what he's doing. Chances are, he's fidgeting, getting up and stretching every few minutes, and generally exhibiting motion that is very suspect to incoming doves with very good eyesight."

"Sit still while you're on the field and also carry all the supplies you need when you first leave your vehicle. Don't be running back and forth to the truck a dozen times during a

hunt," he concluded.

Control Fido

Not only should a dove hunter practice keeping still, he should also insist on the same behavior from his retriever.

"You can own the smartest, dead-on-marking retrieving dog in the world and he'll prove completely worthless if he won't sit quietly there beside you until you send him after a fall," he added. "I know there are some who say doves don't pay any attention to a dog, moving or otherwise, but I've seen one uncontrollable dog ruin an entire hunt for his handler and everyone else on the field."

"When thinking about successful dove tactics, make a well-behaved retriever one of them, or leave your dog at home."

Water Holes?

Asked about watering areas, Jester said setting up near one could be a good tactic if hunting

alone or in a small group. That's especially true if you know for certain that birds are using a particular water hole.

"But I don't put much stock in water holes near a field where a big shoot is going on," he said. "In my experience, doves normally go to water sometime after they feed. When they pitch into a field, they're after something to eat, not water. Water close to a certain area on a field certainly doesn't hurt, but it's pretty far down on the list of considerations, way behind things like sun angle, line of sight, and dove structure."

Don't Stand Out in This Field

Finally, when considering your set-up opportunities, don't neglect the relative elevation of the terrain around the perimeter of the dove field. Ridges, hills, even the smallest rise can give away your location to incoming birds. If you must shoot from an elevated position, pay close

attention to what is at your back. There should be some type of "screen" to help break up your outline. From a raised position with no silhouette-break, you stand out like the proverbial sore thumb.

Dove hunting, much like golf, is a very easy sport to foul up. But unlike golf, these foul-ups have little to do with missing shots. Many dove hunts go awry long before the first shot is ever fired.

You find most successful dove hunters are not necessarily the greatest shooters in the world. Rather, they are the folks who show up the day of the shoot having done enough studying beforehand. They have learned - often the hard way - that the right tactics and preparation go a long way toward compensating for those occasional missed shots. Shooting inaccuracy notwithstanding, these are the hunters who still leave a field with a respectable number of birds in their game bags.

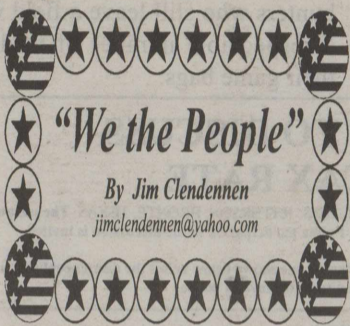
