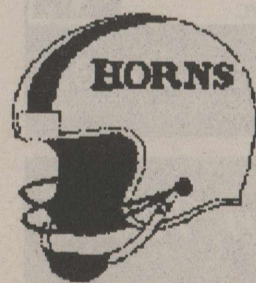

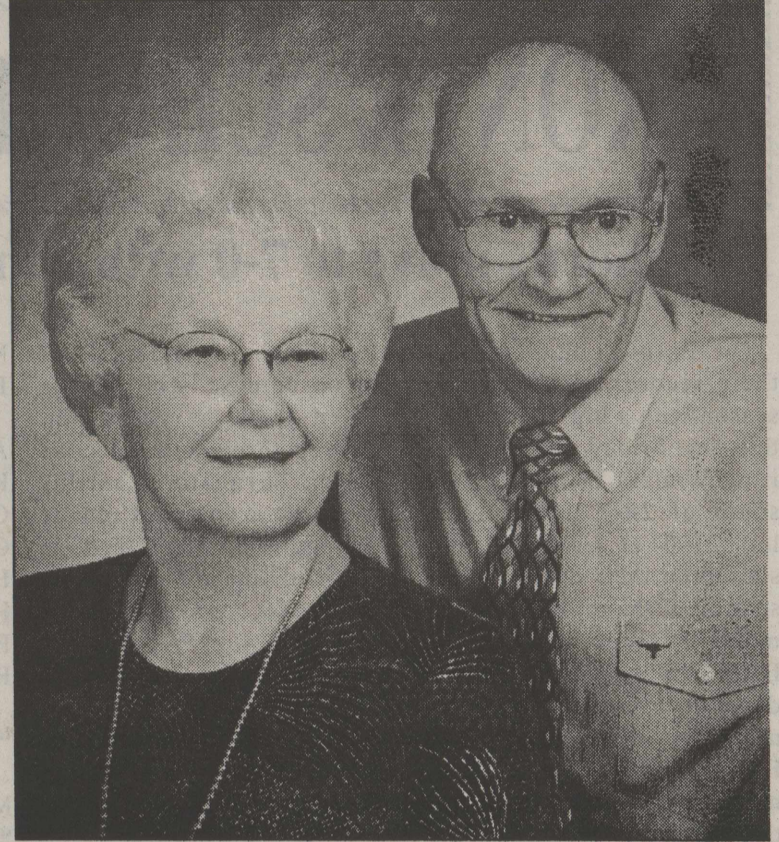
The 50 years of life together have seen dreams fulfilled, joys multiplied and through the trials of life, a love that grows deeper with each passing year.

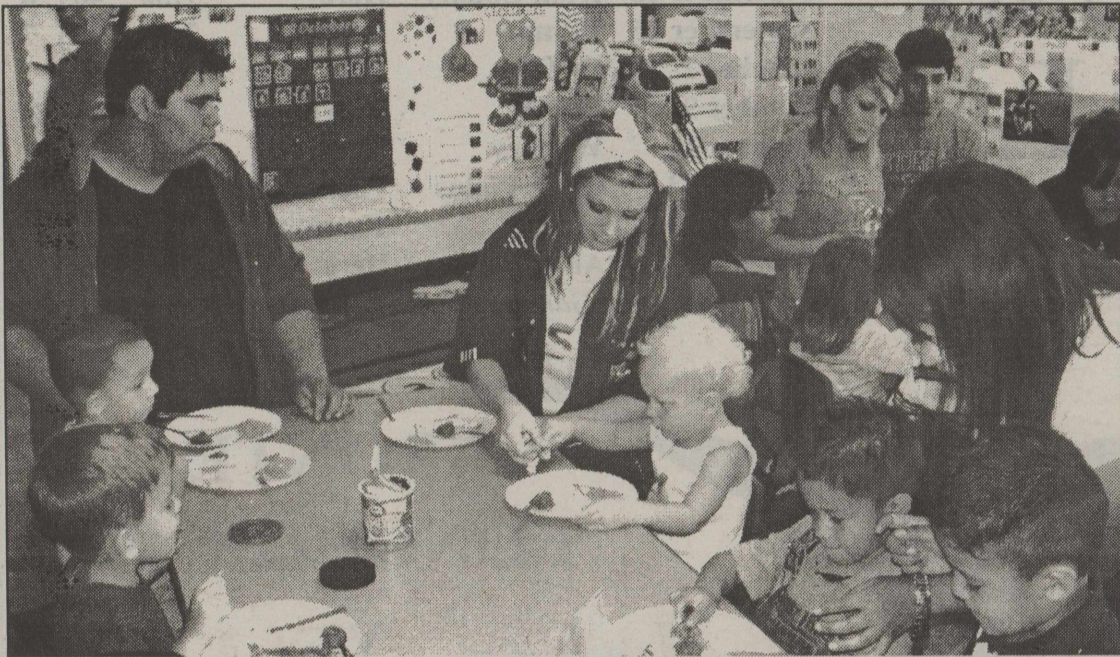

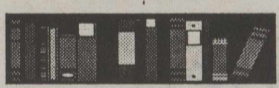

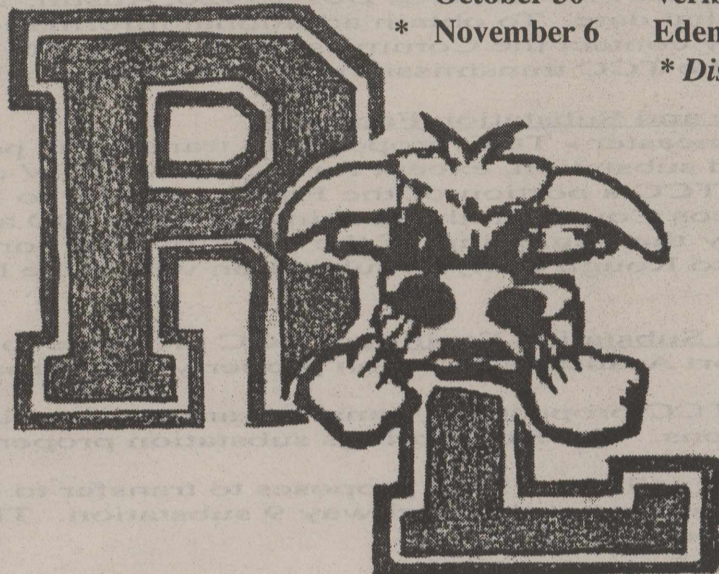

Descriptions of the TCC transmission facilities that are the subject of this request are as follows:

CREZ Default 69 kV Line and Substation Facilities:

Hamilton Road to Fort Lancaster - TCC proposes to transfer its portion of the existing 114 mile Hamilton Road transmission facilities at Hamilton Road substation, except for the 138 / 69 kV autotransformer and associated facilities. TCC also owns real property interests for TCC's portion of the Fort Lancaster to Hamilton Road line. TNC also owns facilities at Hamilton Road substation in southeast Pecos County in the proximity of the I-10 and State Highway 349 interchange the TNC portion of the Hamilton Road 1024 (approximately the beginning of the TCC-owned portion) and State Highway 163 in the vicinity of the Big Bend National Recreation Area to Rough Canyon substation where the line turns southerly generally along U.S. Highway 90.

Papalote Creek Substation Facilities: TCC proposes to transfer to ETT the initial tapped interconnection for the Papalote Creek substation such as the RTU are also proposed to be transferred to ETT. TNC will transfer to ETT real property interests for TNC's portion of the Fort Lancaster to Hamilton Road line as discussed above. From Fort Lancaster substation in southeast Pecos County in the proximity of the I-10 and State Highway 349 interchange, the line crosses the Howard Draw River, and enters Val Verde County where it crosses County Road 1024 and continues southeasterly to Hamilton Road substation.

Oklahoma Substation - TNC proposes to transfer its existing 138 kV and 345 kV transmission assets operated with the Oklahoma tie and certain 138 kV equipment used to provide backup power to the HVDC tie. The Oklahoma substation is located in the proximity of the City of Edinburg in Hidalgo County. The Oklahoma substation will remain with TNC.

Paducah Clare Street Substation Facilities: TNC proposes to transfer the transmission assets, except for the 138 kV bus, to ETT. The substation property will be transferred to ETT. The Paducah Clare Street substation is on the south side of I-35 in the City of Paducah in Taylor County.

Abilene - San Angelo Area Transmission Facilities: TNC proposes to transfer to ETT the property and transmission facilities for the Bradshaw in Taylor County.

Also, TNC proposes to transfer the existing 48 mile Ballinger to South Abilene 69 kV line to ETT, including the Ballinger to South Abilene line in Runnels and Taylor Counties generally follows U.S. Highway 83 and over the 48 miles crosses State Highway 153.

Further, TNC proposes to transfer to ETT the property and transmission facilities for the Yellow Jacket substation in Taylor County.

Childress 69 kV Transmission Line: TNC proposes to transfer to ETT a new 69 kV line being built consistent with the Childress 20th Street substation. The Childress 69 kV line is located in the City of Childress in Childress County.

Rio Pecos / Big Lake Substation Facilities: TNC proposes to transfer to ETT property interests and facilities under the Rio Pecos substation at the McCamey area and installation of a phase shifting transformer (PST) at the Rio Pecos substation in Upton County. Big Lake substation is located in Reagan County.

Langford Power Generation Interconnection: TNC proposes to assign to ETT facilities for interconnection of the Langford Power Generation Interconnection agreement being transferred to ETT. The TNC facilities at the Langford Power generator-owned interconnection are located along and east of U.S. Highway 277 approximately 20 miles south of San Angelo in Tom Green County.

Vernon Area Substation and Line Facilities: TNC proposes to transfer to ETT approximately 5.5 miles of 138 kV transmission facilities between Sand Road substation. Applicable real property interests will be transferred from TNC to ETT. The facilities are located between Vernon Main Street and Vernon Southwest substations.

Also, TNC proposes to transfer approximately one mile, from Vernon Main Street substation to structure 24/4, which will be transferred from TNC to ETT. The one mile segment of the existing 138 kV Lake Pauline to Vernon Main Street substation highway from the northwest into the Vernon Main Street substation on the north side of Vernon.

Matador to Paducah 69 kV Lines and Associated Transmission Facilities: TNC proposes to transfer the Matador to Paducah City to Paducah Clare Street line to ETT. The Matador to Paducah Clare Street line consists of approximately 1.5 miles in length. Real property interests will be transferred to ETT. The subject facilities are located southwest of the intersection of State Highway 70 and U.S. Highway 62 / 70. The Matador to Paducah Clare Street line crosses Bullard Creek. Two additional U.S. Highway 62 / 70 crossings occur within Motley County. The line continues south to the south of U.S. Highway 62 / 70 at County Road 211. At County Road 207 the Paducah Gate City substation crosses the Gate City Electric Co-op substation. The Matador to Paducah Clare Street line continues to the east to the Paducah Clare Street substation on the south side of Paducah. The Paducah City to Paducah Clare Street line crosses the Paducah City substation to the north.

Bluff Creek to Oak Creek 138 kV Line: TNC proposes to transfer to ETT the Bluff Creek to Oak Creek 138 kV line. In addition, the transfer includes a 3,000 foot cut over from Oak Creek substation southwest of Abilene in Taylor County, the 21 mile 138 kV line generally follows U.S. Highway 277 in Taylor County at approximately the County Road 1086 intersection. The line crosses State Highway 153 near the Bluff Creek substation.

For all of the TCC and TNC facilities described above, the transfer will include as applicable certain telecommunication facilities.

Newspaper Project Update

Help share the history of Coke County by taking this opportunity to save information important in the lives of family members.

Back issues of the Coke County newspapers will be available to the public on Friday, October 30, from 1 pm until 5 pm, and on Monday, November 9, from 9 am to 5 pm. The papers are in order by date so searching for births, deaths, graduations, marriages, academic events, sports events, and other significant moments will be relatively easy. The site for the project is Building #191 of the Clendennen storage units on Chadbourne Street in Robert Lee.

The Coke County Historical Commission has set these dates to complete the Newspaper Project which, with the cooperation of the Observer/Enterprise, included putting in chronological order almost 40 years worth of papers to be put on microfilm by the West Texas Collection at Angelo State University. This project will be deemed invaluable to historians and genealogists.

The CCHC was hesitant to throw away the extra copies until citizens of Coke County had an opportunity to share in the keeping of the history of the county. Following the above mentioned dates, all remaining paper copies will be taken to the recycle center.

Constitutional Amendment Election Breakdown

Proposition 1 HJR 132 - "The constitutional amendment authorizing the financing, including through tax increment financing, of the acquisition by municipalities and counties of buffer areas or open spaces adjacent to a military

installation for the prevention of encroachment or for the construction of roadways, utilities, or other infrastructure to protect or promote the mission of the military installation."

Proposition 1 Interpretation HJR 132 would amend the constitution to authorize the legislature to allow a municipality or a county to issue bonds and notes to finance the purchase of buffer areas or open spaces adjacent to military installations. The buffer areas would be used to prevent encroachment or to construct roadways, utilities, or other infrastructure to protect or promote the mission of the military installation. The municipality or county may pledge increases in ad valorem tax revenues for repayment of the bonds or notes.

Proposition 2 HJR 36-1

"The constitutional amendment authorizing the legislature to provide for the ad valorem taxation of a residence homestead solely on the basis of the property's value as a residence homestead."

Proposition 2 Interpretation: HJR 36 would amend the constitution to authorize the legislature to provide for the taxation of a residence homestead solely on the basis of the property's value as a residence homestead, regardless of whether the property may have a higher value if it were used for other purposes.

Proposition 3 HRJ 36-3 "The constitutional amendment providing for uniform standards and procedures for the appraisal of property for ad valorem tax purposes."

Proposition 3 Interpretation: HJR 36 would amend the

constitution to require the legislature to provide for the administration and enforcement of uniform standards and procedures for appraisal of property for ad valorem tax purposes.

Proposition 4 HJR 14-2 "The constitutional amendment establishing the national research university fund to enable emerging research universities in this state to achieve national prominence as major research universities and transferring the balance of the higher education fund to the national research university fund."

Proposition 4 Interpretation: HJR 14 would amend the constitution to establish the national research university fund to provide a source of funding

that will enable emerging research universities in this state to develop into major research universities. The amendment would require the legislature to dedicate state revenue to the fund and to transfer the balance of the existing higher education fund to the national research university fund. This amendment would further require the legislature to establish the criteria by which a state university may become eligible to receive and use distributions from the fund.

Proposition 5 HJR 36-2 "The constitutional amendment authorizing the legislature to authorize a single board of equalization for two or more adjoining appraisal entities that elect to provide for consolidated equalizations."

Proposition 5
Interpretation: HJR 36 would amend the constitution to authorize the legislature to allow for a single appraisal review board for two or more adjoining appraisal entities that elect to provide for consolidated reviews of tax appraisals.

Proposition 6 HJR 116
"The constitutional amendment authorizing the Veterans' Land Board to issue general obligation bonds in amounts equal to or less than amounts previously authorized."

Proposition 6 Interpretation: HJR 116 would amend the constitution to authorize the Veterans' Land Board to issue general obligation bonds, subject to certain constitutional limits, for the purpose of selling land and providing home or land mortgage loans to veterans of the state.

Proposition 7 HJR 127 "The constitutional amendment to allow an officer or enlisted member of the Texas State Guard or other state militia or military force to hold other civil offices."

Proposition 7
Interpretation: HJR 7 would amend the constitution to allow an officer or enlisted member of the Texas State Guard or other state militia or military force to hold other civil offices.

Proposition 8 HJR 7 "The constitutional amendment authorizing the state to contribute money, property, and other resources for the establishment, maintenance, and operation of veterans hospitals in this state."

Proposition 8 Interpretation: HJR 7 would amend the constitution to authorize the state to contribute money, property, and other resources for the establishment, maintenance, and operation of

veterans' hospitals in this state.
Proposition 9 HJR 102
"The constitutional amendment to protect the right of the public, individually and collectively, to access and use the public beaches bordering the seaward shore of the Gulf of Mexico."

Proposition 9
Interpretation: HJR 102 would define what is a state-owned public beach. The public, individually and collectively, would have an unrestricted right to use and a right of ingress to and egress from a public beach. The amendment would authorize the legislature to enact laws to protect these rights.

Proposition 10 HJR 85
"The constitutional amendment to provide that elected members of the governing boards of emergency services districts may serve terms not to exceed four years."

Proposition 10
Interpretation: HJR 85 would amend the constitution to authorize the legislature to provide that members of the governing board of an emergency services district may serve terms not to exceed four years.

Proposition 11 HJR 14-1
"The constitutional amendment to prohibit the taking, damaging, or destroying of private property for public use unless the action is for the ownership, use, and enjoyment of the property by the State, a political subdivision of the State, the public at large, or entities granted the power of eminent domain under law or for the elimination of urban blight on a particular parcel of property, but not for certain economic development or enhancement of tax revenue purposes, and to limit the legislature's authority to grant the power of eminent domain to an entity."

Proposition 11
Interpretation: HJR 14 would amend the constitution to provide that the taking of private property for public use ("eminent domain") is authorized only if it is for the ownership, use, and enjoyment of the property by the State, its political subdivisions, the public at large, or by entities granted the power of eminent domain, or for the removal of urban blight. The amendment would prohibit the taking of private property for transfer to a private entity for the purpose of economic development or to increase tax revenues. The amendment would also limit the legislature's authority to grant the power of eminent domain in the future unless it is approved by a two-thirds vote of all the members elected to each house.

Audience Items - There were no audience items.

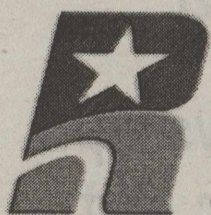
Approval of Minutes - The minutes of the July meeting were read, corrected and accepted. Shane Kelton made

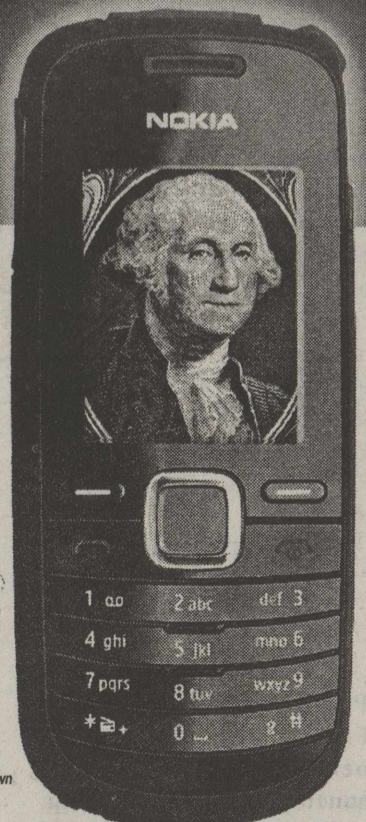

Tax Collections in Runnels County - Alan Richey advised the Board that both the Coke and Runnels County Tax Assessors are in agreement that the proposal of the Runnels County Tax Assessor to collect the taxes for the Bronte ISD taxable property located in Runnels County would be advantageous to all entities involved. Children that are dropped off without supervision from a family member will be charged the gate price. Ericka Knight seconded the motion. Six voted for, 0 voted against.

Change of Agent on Property Insurance - Alan Richey explained to the Board his proposal to change insurance agents because of a deterioration of service from Key/Piskuran of Arlington to Boley/Featherston of Wichita Falls. The insurance company (Texas Association of Public Schools Insurance Cooperation or TAPS) will remain the same. Paul Williams made the motion to change insurance agents as stated above, Doug Tounget seconded. Six voted for, 0 voted against.

Property and Auto Insurance - The only quote for property and automobile insurance received by Alan Richey on behalf of the BISD was from Texas Association of Public Schools Insurance Cooperation or TAPS. The current bid for this year was \$29383; the prior year's premium was \$28377. Shane Kelton made the motion to accept TAPS

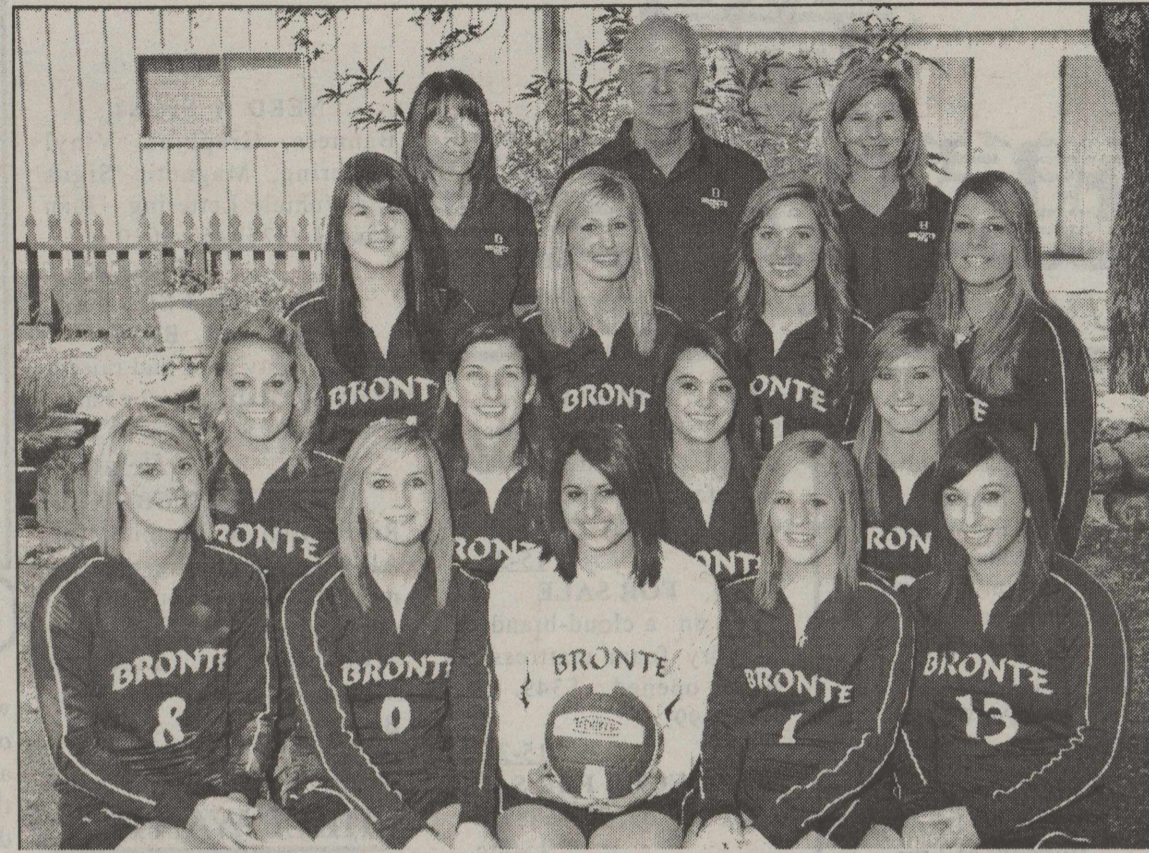
premium proposal for this year, Wayne Coalson seconded. Six voted for, 0 voted against.

Milk Bid - The following bids for 2% milk cartons were presented to the Board by Alan Richey; Gandy's at \$.2043/carton, Borden's at \$.2100/carton. Paul Williams made to motion to accept the Gandy bid, Ericka Knight seconded. Six voted for, 0 voted against.

Stadium Improvement Process - The Board discussed a variety of topics involved in the concept of the stadium improvement process including but not limited to the following; lighting, bleachers, location, public hearing, and advertisement of the public hearing. No action was taken.

Vehicles - The Board discussed the vehicle inventory list and determined that the BISD has several vehicles that need to be replaced because of high or extremely high mileage. It is the Board's intent to continue the process of vehicle replacement into next year's budget. Alan Richey was authorized to use Line Item 51 of the current year's budget to purchase the following low bid vehicles. A Suburban from Caldwell Country at \$30,957 and an Impala from Toliver Brothers at \$18,522 with the intent to use the old Suburban as "Cash for Clunker" trade in. The Taurus will be sold or disposed of. Paul Williams made the motion to purchase the two new vehicles as stated above, David McWright seconded. Six voted for, 0 voted against.

Salary/Incentive Program - Alan Richey has proposed in the 09-10 Budget an \$1100 per year raise for the teachers and a 3% raise for the non-certified staff (administrative staff is not included in either of these numbers). The Board discussed at length an incentive package for the staff of the BISD. David McWright made the following motion, Shane

- The staff living in the district will receive \$1000 annually.

- The certified teachers that do not use their local sick day (all or none) will receive \$750 annually; the non-certified staff that does not use their local sick days will receive \$375 annually. The sick leave pool will be exempted from this policy.

- Longevity incentive pay will be implemented up to \$500 as per the BISD previous policy.

- Performance incentives will be implemented up to \$1000 as per the BISD previous policy. Administrative staff will be included in this policy. Six voted for, 0 voted against.

Proposed Budget for the 09-10 school years - Alan Richey and the Board discussed at length the budget and came up with the following proposal for the 09-10 school year budget in the amount of \$6,642,594. Wayne Coalson made the motion for the budget to be \$6,642,594 for the 09-10

school year for the BISD, Shane Kelton seconded. Six voted for, 0 voted against.

Superintendent's Report - Alan Richey reported forward progress on the renovation of the Old Ag Building being converted into the new Art Building.

Enter Into Closed Session to Consider Personnel Items According to Government Code 551-074: Wayne Coalson made the motion to go into closed session, seconded by Ericka Knight at 10:10 pm.

Reconvene in Regular Session for Action on the Items Discussed in Closed Session: The Board came out of Closed Session at 10:44 pm with the following resolutions and recommendations. Alan Richey gave notice that Zane Stilly was hired as a janitor and Maureen Youngblood was hired as a secondary math teacher. Alan Richey was directed by the Board to find a representative from the Region Service Center to contact the people who turned down the volleyball coach's position this year.

This directive is an effort to review the BISD hiring policy and procedures in dealing with the volleyball program.

Correspondence - The TEA sent a letter accepting the BISD's depository. TASB sent a plaque acknowledging the BISD membership in the TASB.

Motion to Pay Bills - Ericka Knight made the motion to pay the August bills, Doug Tounget seconded. Six voted for, 0 voted against.

Adjournment - Motion to adjourn was made by Doug Tounget, seconded by Paul Williams at 10:59 pm. Six voted for, 0 voted against.

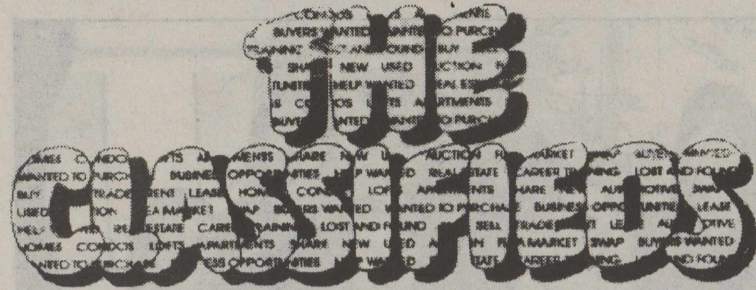

The City of Robert Lee Public Water Supply/ PWS ID0410002 water system collected water samples during July, 2009, that contained coliform bacteria. This water system is required to submit a minimum of three routine water samples each month for bacteriological analysis. Two routine samples were coliform-found and one repeat sample was coliform-found for the month and year indicated above.

The Texas Commission on Environmental Quality (TCEQ) sets drinking water standards in Texas and has determined that the presence of total coliform is a possible health concern. Coliforms are bacteria that are naturally present in the environment and are used as an indicator that other, potentially-harmful, bacteria may be present. Coliforms were found in more samples than allowed and this was a warning of potential problems.

For water systems analyzing at least 40 samples per month, no more than five (5) percent of the monthly samples may be positive for total coliform. For systems analyzing fewer than 40 samples per month, no more than one (1) sample per month may be positive for total coliform

Discuss/Approve Designation of Contact Person to Assist in Review of Hiring Process - After a lengthy discussion of the hiring process involved in the 2009-10 Volleyball Coach position, the Board instructed Alan Richey to hire Roy Dodds as a consultant to (i) review the hiring process, (ii) interview the five candidates who turned down the Volleyball Coach position, and (iii) report back to the Board. Quinda Feil-Duncan made the motion to hire Dodds as a consultant to review the hiring process, and Paul Williams seconded the motion. Six voted for, 0 voted against.

Superintendent's Report -
A. New School Year Enrollment Figures - The current enrollment figures for the Bronte ISD are as follows: Elementary - 179; Junior High - 51; and High School - 98.

B. Update on New Art Facility - Alan Richey reported forward progress on the remodeling of the new Art Facility and indicated that the project should be completed soon. He also informed the Board

that Ron Cooper is currently holding class in the building at this time.

TDA Market Recap Oct. 19, 2009

For the week ending Oct. 17, 2009, feeder cattle prices at Texas auctions were mostly steady to \$3 higher per hundredweight. Lighter offerings for sale at some locations and increasing demand for cattle for fall and winter grazing contributed to the increase. Fed cattle were \$1.50 higher. Cotton prices were higher amid concerns that cool, wet weather would hurt the crop in the Mississippi Delta. Grain prices were higher because of cold weather and possible harvest delays in the Midwest. As for futures markets, feeder cattle, fed cattle, cotton, wheat, corn and lumber ended the week higher. Parts of East Texas received up to six inches of rain during the week with light to moderate amounts recorded elsewhere. On the High Plains, freezing temperatures ended cotton and grain sorghum development, winter wheat planting continued and sunflower harvest was underway. In the Northern Low Plains, cold weather delayed cotton maturity and emerging winter wheat needed warmer temperatures to aid growth. Wet conditions delayed wheat planting in the Cross Timbers region. In South Texas, wheat and oats continued to emerge and cotton made good progress in the Edwards Plateau. Recent rains and cooler temperatures have improved pasture conditions over much of southern Texas. Topsoil moisture was rated mostly short to adequate statewide.

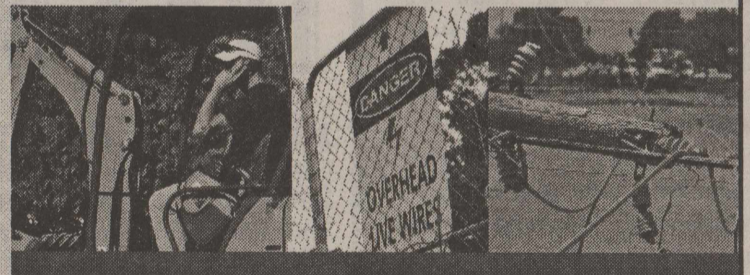
