Wildcats defeat Indians in season opener

Two major plays by the Archer City Wildcats helped to put the demise on the Haskell Indians to the tune of 30 to 19.

Haskell used a seven play drive of 46 yards to score first between these two opponents. Isaiah Llewellyn got the four yard touchdown call and Sterling Bird added the PAT kick to put Haskell out front 7 to 0 at the end of the first quarter.

Archer City scored on its first possession of the second quarter on a one yard run and added the two point conversion to take the lead 8 to 7. Tyrone Neskorik, at the 6:30 mark of the second quarter, scored on a beautiful 77 yard touchdown run to put the Indians ahead 13 to 8. Haskell's extra point try failed.

The Cats would have the final say of the first half on a

15 yard run by their running back; however, the extra point try was stopped by an Indian pass interception, Llewellyn got the 'pick.' Haskell 13, Archer City 14 at the end of the half.

One of the major plays for Archer City came during the third quarter. The Cats only ran three plays during this quarter of play, unfortunately they scored on a 63 yard run and added the two point

conversion.

Haskell's tailback Llewellyn, scored on a four yard run at quarter's end but the PAT kick sailed wide right. The score stood 19 to 22 in favor of Archer City.

The second and final major play for the Cats came on their first possession of the final quarter when they scored again using three plays with one being 63 yards. They also tacked on

the two point conversion to seemingly put the game away.

The Indians still had some fight left in them and drove the football down to the 8 yard line with around a minute and a half to go in the game. Their drive stopped short on a Wildcat pass interception. Final score on the initial game of the 2010 season, Haskell 19, Archer City 30.

Haskell's offensive unit had 52 rushes for 295 yards. The Indians were five of 11 in the passing attack for 52 yards. Fullback Neskorik had 189 yards on 23 rushes and one touchdown. Tailback Llewellyn got 85 yards and two touchdowns on 17 rushes. Quarterback Chris Myers got 17 yards on 11 carries. Myers was five of 11 with one interception on the passing side. Payne Utley had two catches for 11 yards, Neskorik had two catches for 33 yards and Llewellyn had one catch for eight yards.

The Haskell Indians will host the Coleman Bluecats Friday at Indian Field. Kick off is 7:30 p.m.

The JV Indians will play in Coleman at 6 p.m. on Thursday.

a nice place for visitors and patients to go outside and sit.

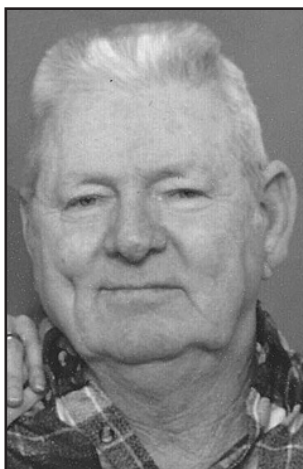

parents, five brothers and four sisters.

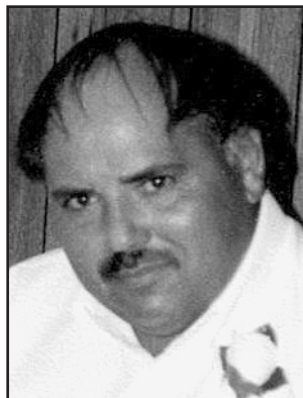

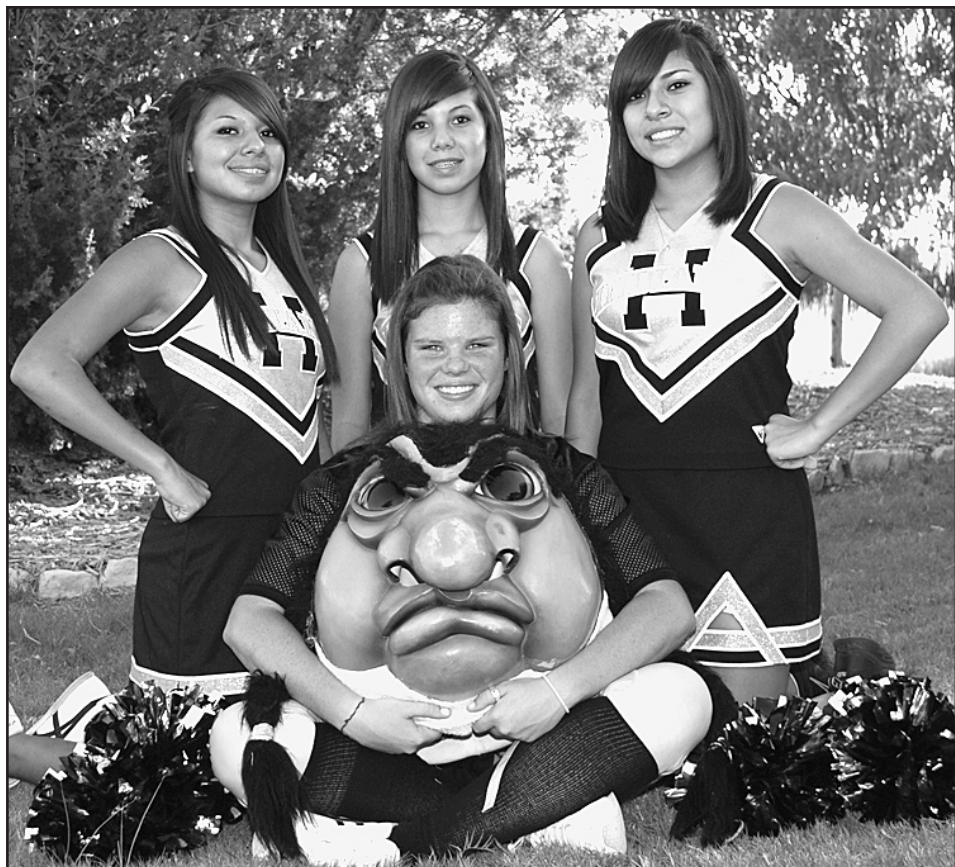

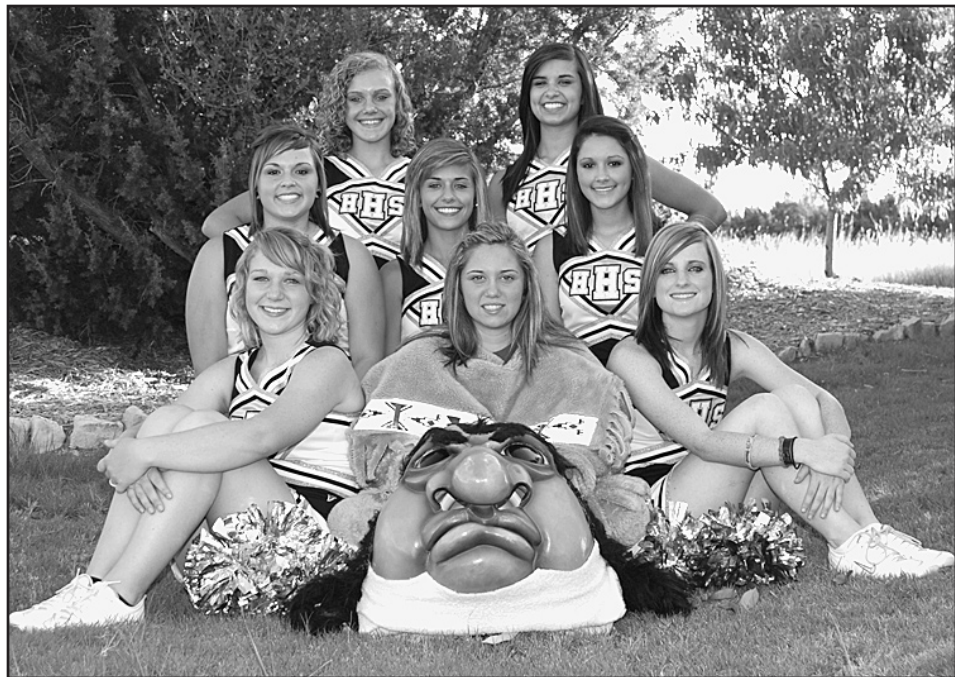

Governor prompts Washington to increase border safety measures
AUSTIN—Bullets from a gun battle in Juarez, Mexico, struck a building on the campus of the University of Texas-El Paso over the weekend of Aug. 21-22.

“For the second time in two months, bullets from a gun battle in the escalating drug war in Juarez have struck a building in El Paso, and I’d like to commend the swift action taken by local and state law enforcement in the area, Gov. Rick Perry commented on Aug. 23.

“We must ensure El Paso and other border communities remain a safe place for people to live, work and raise a family. It’s time for Washington to stop the rhetoric and immediately deploy a significant force of personnel and resources to the border to protect our homeland,” Perry said.

In June, bullets from a gun fight in Juarez struck El Paso City Hall and nine months earlier, a building and a vehicle on the University of Texas-Brownsville campus also were hit by stray bullets from Mexico.

School funding looms as issue

A movement to push school finance as high as possible on the agenda for the coming 82nd session of the Texas Legislature is emanating from Aledo, a city of 1,726 people about 18 miles west of downtown Fort Worth.

The Aledo Independent School District board of trustees on Aug. 26 announced a statewide initiative, “Make Education a Priority.”

Bobby J. Rigues, the school board’s vice president, said he is asking other school districts to adopt a resolution lending their support to the initiative to raise awareness of the growing financial crisis that public school districts are facing and encourage state legislators to work with local school board members and other stakeholders to find a solution.

Denison ISD, Goose Creek Consolidated ISD, Round Rock ISD and Silsbee ISD are on board, and state Sens. Wendy Davis, D-Fort Worth, and Craig Estes, R-Wichita Falls, and state Reps. Phil King, R-Weatherford, and Larry Phillips, R-Sherman, have written letters of support regarding the initiative.

Rigues said 2006 legislation that cut property taxes by one third fell short by not establishing a reliable new stream of revenue and now “more than half of the school districts in Texas are being

forced to use dollars from their fund balances for daily operating expenditures—a practice that is neither financially sound nor sustainable over the long-term. In addition, teaching positions are being eliminated, salaries reduced and local educational programs removed to meet reduced budgets.” In 2007 and 2009, legislators were unsuccessful in addressing school funding shortcomings, Rigues added.

And today, with a budget deficit approaching \$20 billion, legislative leadership must work with the education community to find a creative solution that does not incur significant cost. “Until education becomes a real priority, serious solutions to school finance will never be found,” Rigues said.

AGs call on Craigslist to stop

Texas Attorney General Greg Abbott and 16 other state attorneys general signed a letter to Craigslist, the worldwide classified advertising website, to stop publishing advertisements that solicit prostitution.

“As presiding officer of the Texas Human Trafficking Prevention Task Force,” Abbott said, “I am very concerned that Craigslist refuses to take meaningful measures to prohibit the solicitation of prostitution on its website. Too often, prostitution cases involve children and other victims who are coerced or forced into prostitution by oppressive human traffickers.

One million Texans have now registered with the Glenda P. Dawson Donate Life—Texas Registry, the state’s organ and tissue registry as potential donors, the Texas Department of Public Safety announced Aug. 23.

Texas residents can register at their local DPS office when applying for or renewing a driver’s license or identification card, or they can enroll in the registry online at www.donatelifetexas.org or www.donevidatexas.org. Registrants receive a donor card.
