Blue Agave Chili Cook-off set for Blackwell



Washday 101 Laundry Basics For The College Bound And Other First Timers

Doing your laundry for the first time? What gets washed with what? Too late to call home? You're the only one in the laundry room?

Hang on, help is here. You can take care of your clothes and save money by practicing good clothing management in your home, dorm or neighborhood laundry. Although the latest in washer, dryer and laundry products make cleaning easier, for good results, follow these basic procedures:

* Remove stains as soon as possible. Spots and stains are easier to remove if they are treated quickly. To remove a stain, use a blotting motion, do not rub the stain. Retreat stains that are not completely gone. Do not dry stained clothes in the dryer, or the stains may become permanent. Bleach also helps to remove stains and improve cleaning power. Follow garment care instructions and bleach label directions for proper use. If there is any doubt, test the garment for colorfastness in an inconspicuous

* Read the care labels and

follow instructions. Following the manufacturer's recommended instructions can mean the difference between a garment that lasts and one that can be ruined easily. Read the care labels on your garments. They contain care procedures recommended by the clothing manufacturer.

Sort clothes before washing. Separate whites from colors and light colors from dark. Separate sturdy cottons from delicate and permanent press items. Separate lint-givers, such as sweatshirts, from lint-grabbers, such as corduroy and permanent press items. Finally, separate heavily soiled items from lightly soiled ones. As you separate clothes into loads, empty pockets and shake out cuffs. Close zippers and hooks. Repair any holes or tears so they don't grow in the wash. Pretreat stains, collars and cuffs.

* Follow the instructions on laundry products. Many choices of laundry products are available today. Follow the manufacturer's instructions for amounts to use. Soaps are designed for light, gentle washing. Detergents work to remove a variety of soil amounts. Granular detergents work well on mud and clay soils. Liquid detergents are usually effective in removing grease and oil stains. Fabric softener reduces static cling, minimizes wrinkling and softens clothes. Rinse-added softener goes into the final rinse. Dryer-added softener sheets go in

the dryer at the beginning of the cycle.

* Avoid overloading. The wash may get finished faster, but it

won't be nearly as clean. For best



Poly cart Collection Guidelines and Information

Republic Waste Services d/b/a Duncan Disposal is proud to announce that beginning October 1, 2010; your trash service will be converting to poly cart containers. This change will allow Duncan Disposal to service Bronte more efficiently, while providing a more sanitary way to dispose of household waste.

As a resident or commercial hand-load customer, receiving city utilities, you are being provided with one (1) 96 gallon poly cart at no-charge. If an additional poly cart is required, the City of Bronte will be happy to provide one to you for a nominal fee. A metal container is available for customers requiring greater capacity.

The following provides you with the information you need to best utilize this new service.

IMPORTANT DATES:

- Initial deliveries of poly carts and commercial metal containers begin Monday, Sept 20th.
- · Collection services utilizing the new commercial containers will begin Friday, October 1st and residential poly carts will begin Tuesday, Oct 5th.
- · Requests for additional poly carts can be made to City Hall, beginning the week of Sept 20th.

Effective in October residential and commercial poly cart trash collection days will change to Tuesday collection. Commercial metal containers will be serviced on Fridays.

NEW PLACEMENT REQUIREMENTS:

- On collection day (Tuesday), place the poly cart in front of your property, curbside or at the edge of the street by 6:00 a.m. You may remove it after the garbage has been collected and should remove it by 7:00 p.m. Place the poly cart with the handle away from the curb.
- Place your poly cart at least 3 feet away from a mailbox or other obstacles, 12 feet from a parked car, and avoid placing directly underneath low hanging branches or power lines.
- Your poly cart cannot be emptied if it is not easily accessed by the grabber arm of the collection truck!
- All food waste must be bagged.
- Poly carts are designed for household trash only. Do not fill with gravel, dirt or construction debris.
- Only what fits inside the container will be collected (ie. nothing placed beside or stacked on top of container). Please do not overfill poly cart, as lids should close properly.

USEFUL INFORMATION:

- The following items **CANNOT** be collected in the poly carts:
- Batteries, Concrete, Flammable Liquids, Florescent Light Bulbs, Hazardous Materials, Hot Ashes, Metal, E-Waste (monitors, TV's, fax machines etc.), Motor Oil, Paints, Poly Chemicals, Solvents, Tires or Construction Debris.
- Residential and Commercial customers requiring large temporary rolloff containers for construction or clean-up may contact Duncan Disposal directly at 325-481-7700 for pricing.
- Special accommodations will be made for residents physically unable to handle the poly cart. Please contact City Hall for details.

PLEASE NOTE:

If your cart is damaged or lost, call City Hall to have it replaced. If lost or damaged by homeowner (i.e.: hot coals or ashes placed in the cart), a \$60.00 replacement fee will be assessed. If the damage is not the fault of the homeowner, the replacement will be at no cost.

... Laundry (Continued from Page 8) results, items must circulate freely.

* Water temperature is an important factor in cleaning performance. For best results, use warm water (90-110 degrees F), for most loads, use hot water (130 degrees F and above) for whites and heavily soiled items, and cold water (80 degrees F or colder) for lightly soiled or brightly colored items.

* Choose a drying cycle that fits the care label instructions. Generally if clothes can be washed together they can be dried together. Shake the damp items to loosen them before putting them in the dryer. Set controls for "regular" if most of the load is made up of all-cotton fabric or "permanent press" if the load contains man-made fibers or permanent press fabrics. To avoid unnecessary wrinkling, remove items from the dryer as soon as it shuts off. Do not overload the dryer. Keep lint filter clean. Air drying is recommended for some garments.

If you expect your clothes to last, you must take care of them. The appearance of clothing can be ruined during any of the steps outlined above. However, if you take time to care for and clean your clothes properly, you will save money.




