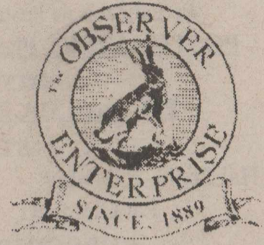

Walker, Spain earn contested county positions in Tuesday's general election voting

Tuesday's general election for Coke County was mostly just an endorsement for those candidates who had won in the Democratic Primary election. However, there were a couple of contested races for Tuesday's general election. In the most closely contested county race, Jackie Walker outpolled Leroy Casey for the Justice of the Peace, Precinct #1 office by a 315 to 292 margin.

Also of interest to local voters was the county treasurer's contest, where Hal Spain defeated Kathi Cox by a 759 to 330 margin. Spain is the first Republican to hold county-wide office in Coke County for as long as anybody can remember.

In other local races, uncontested candidates received the following vote totals: Roy Blair - County Judge, 701 votes; Mary Grim - County/District Clerk, 693; Wendell Lee - County Commissioner, Precinct #2, 156; Bobby Blaylock - County Commissioner, Precinct #4, 144; and Grady Coulter - Justice of the Peace, Precinct #2, 321 votes.

In the statewide races, Republicans swept the voting up and down the ballot, headlined by Governor Rick Perry's victory over former Houston mayor Bill White by a 56 to 41 percent margin. In local balloting, Perry also received a large majority of the votes over White, by a 793 to 260 vote margin.

In other elections of interest to our area, U.S. Congressman Mike Conaway easily defeated his Democratic challenger James

Quillian. The county vote totals in this race were 894 for Conaway and 111 for Quillian. In other action, Drew Darby was returned to office as State Representative for District 72 in an uncontested election.

As to voter turnout, Coke County had 1193 registered voters going to the polls out of a total of approximately 2508 total voters in the county, for a voter turnout of 48 percent, which is higher than normal for a non-presidential year general election.

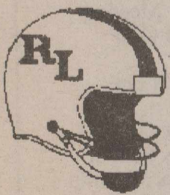

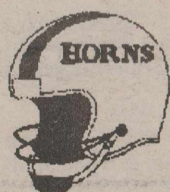

Bivins

Nina Mae Bivins, 90, of Bronte, Texas, passed on from this world into our Lord's Hands after a long, fruitful, and enjoyable life on Wednesday, October 27, 2010. More lovingly known as "Memaw" by her family and friends, she was a beloved mother and grandmother and was famous for her pies and Christmas candy.

Nina was born on September 24, 1920, in Knox County, Texas, to Ida Mae Bosworth and James Lawrence Davis. Nina was the youngest of 8 children - 3 daughters and 5 sons. They grew up on the family farm in Knox County until her father passed away when she was 4 years old. They then moved into Knox City where Nina enjoyed going to the Baptist church and playing high school sports with her friends. She graduated from Knox City High School in 1938.

On June 25, 1940, she married Thomas Mason Bivins. In 1945 their son, Garry was born in Albuquerque while Tom was

in Army Air Corps during WWII. Following the war, they moved to Christoval where Nina worked at the Christoval Drug Store and Tom worked for Ohio Oil Company. The Ohio Oil Company was shipping out to go overseas and Tom did not want to leave his family so he then went to work for Tom Green County. In 1964 (when Garry graduated from high school), they all moved to San Angelo. Tom worked for the Tom Green County Property Appraisal office and Nina worked at Sears Roebuck & Company for almost 20 years. They were faithful members of College Hills Baptist Church.

In 1984, they moved to Bronte to be near Garry's family where she tended to her home, family, and gardening. Memaw loved to cook and enjoyed making lunch for her family, granddaughters and all their friends while they were in school. She was always taking food to others and loved visiting with people. Memaw was an active member of First Baptist Church in Bronte and a strong Christian who loved studying her Sunday School lesson and going to church. She loved gospel music, the Gaithers and baseball - especially the Chicago Cubs! She was devoted to her family and nothing pleased her more than spending time with them - especially her great grandchildren.

Memaw loved being a part of the Foster Grandparents Program where she would read to children at Bronte Elementary School. Memaw also loved fishing at Paradise

Point at Lake Buchanan, where they went almost every year since 1960, although she was terrified of water.

In 2006, Memaw moved to the Bronte Health & Rehab Center where she quickly made friends and made it her home. She enjoyed joking with the residents and staff and thoroughly enjoyed all the activities - especially baking cookies and going to the Bronte ball games - she loved to wear her Longhorn shirt.

Nina is preceded in death by her parents, husband, brothers and sisters. She is survived by her son, Garry and his wife Karen of Brady, Marilyn Bivins of Bronte; four grandchildren, Christy and her husband David Hortenstine of Taylor, Texas, and Melissa and her husband David Jenschke of San Antonio, Emily Fiveash of Lubbock, and Garrett Fiveash of San Angelo; treasured great-grandchildren Lauren, Matthew & Mason Hortenstine, Jacob and Joseph Jenschke of San

Antonio. She is also survived by countless children and friends she considered her family.

The family would like to extend special thanks to the staff of the Bronte Health and Rehab Center for all of their care and kindness, and all of the wonderful people who became like a family to Memaw. In lieu of flowers,

memorials may be made to the First Baptist Church Kitchen Fund or the Bronte Health and Rehab Auxiliary.

A memorial service was held Saturday, October 30, at 1 pm at the First Baptist Church of Bronte. Services were under the direction of Shaffer Funeral Home in Bronte.

Fall hunting season is upon us

The time has come for the old publisher to do some prognosticating for the upcoming hunting season. And, as usual, there are some things I don't have a clue about, namely, what the upcoming quail and turkey seasons are going to look like.

Let's start out with an easy prediction, and that is the upcoming deer season. After a couple of years of good conditions, I am predicting another great season for antler development.

Now I haven't seen any monster bucks where I feed on my place. In fact, I was seeing three different ten point bucks before the 2009 season that were coming in to feed, and I haven't seen but one buck that was anywhere near any of those three from last year's sightings.

However, reports from landowners and helicopter surveys are showing some really good horns (antlers) for the upcoming season. The reason we haven't seen many of them is that we have had such good range conditions for most of this year, they haven't had to venture out where anybody can see them.

Another reason we haven't seen many bucks so far is that we have experienced another Indian summer, and this fall has been pretty warm, with temperatures in the upper 80's for highs. I don't think we've had enough cold weather for the does to come in heat, and that's another reason the bucks haven't had any reason to show themselves.

Early reports from bow hunters are few and far between. I think we've got so much cover, and it's been so hot, that the bow hunters have boxed up their calls, hung up their camouflage, and are just restocking their feeders for the upcoming gun season.

Look for things to change when we start getting some cold weather. I have seen some of the "cull" bucks they are taking off of the MLD properties, and some of these bucks are better than most of what we will be trying to shoot during the regular season.

We are just finishing up a dove season that started out really good, and after opening weekend it pretty well fizzled unless you were lucky enough to be hunting over some grain fields or were in a flyway for whitewings.

We had a lot of collared doves and whitewings around here for the start of the season, but they moved away from heavily hunted locations after the first weekend.

I have gotten some good reports from dove hunters in the San Angelo area around grain fields and etc.; however, the northern doves just didn't show up in Coke County this year. I think they arrived later in the year and went straight to these grain fields south of us.

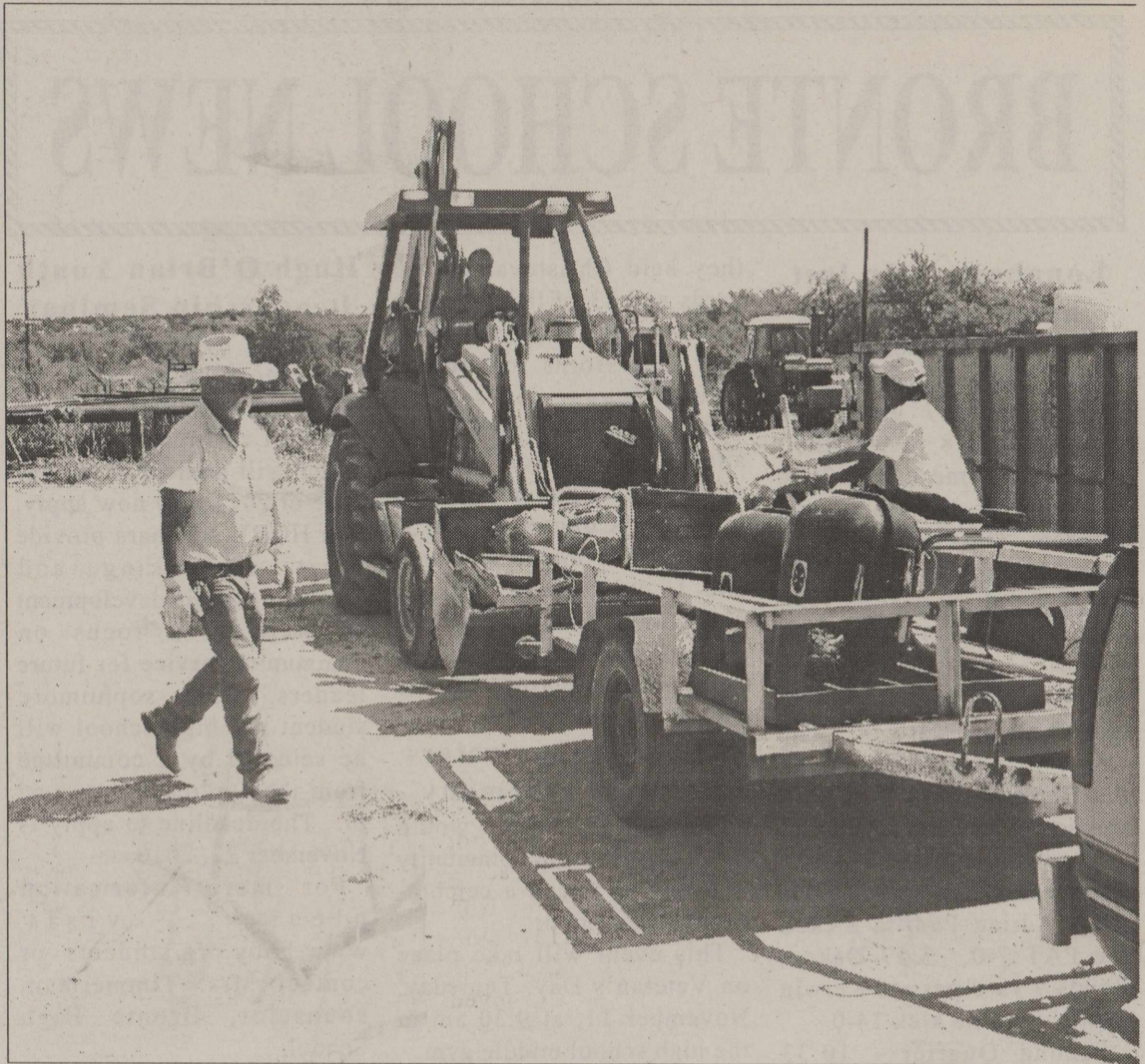
As to our quail forecast, I am hearing some mixed reports from all over the state. Last year's quail season was pretty much a bust, statewide, and in most places we didn't have enough birds to carry over and repopulate for this year.

Having grown up in Haskell County, I know how quickly the quail population can rebound, having gone from not seeing a bird one year to killing our limits the next. However, from listening to reports statewide, I don't think that is going to be the case this year. Most reports I'm getting from the Rolling Plains are not too good. I am hearing that there are some birds southeast of San Angelo, and we have once again raised some birds here. I just don't know whether we'll have enough numbers to hunt in our area. Most of us who hunt quail have to wait until after deer season to start anyway; so I'll let you know next year.

We've had a couple of good years to raise turkey poults; so maybe you'll have something for Thanksgiving and Christmas dinner. I haven't seen many turkeys so far this year, except on CRMWD property, where they are protected.

As to seasons, dove season runs from Sept. 1 through October 24. The winter short season runs from December 25, 2010, through January 9, 2011, with a daily bag limit of 15 in the central zone, which includes Coke County.

Longhorns win last home game 45-7

The Bronte Longhorns rushed for 417 yards and passed for 158 to win their last home game of the 2010 season over the Christoval Cougars. Dakota Rawls went 9 for 9 passing and had 79 yards on 4 carries, Creed Coalson had 149 yards on 5 carries, and Jordan Baumann had 92 yards on 6 carries to lead the Horns attack. The win over Christoval moved the Horns to 6-3 on the season and 4-0 in district play.

First Quarter - 8:26 Jordan Baumann scored on a 39 yard run. Adrian Padilla kicked the PAT 7-0. 3:59 Dakota Rawls 9 yard pass to Kerwin Rawls. Padilla kick 14-0.

Second Quarter - 10:33 Dakota Rawls 21 yard pass to Terron Charles. Padilla kick 21-0. 8:54 Dakota Rawls 62 yard run. Padilla kick 28-7. 1:59 Dakota Rawls 17 yard pass to Kerwin Rawls. Padilla kick 35-7.

Third Quarter - 11:40 Creed Coalson 66 yard run. Padilla kick 42-7.

Fourth Quarter - Adrian Padilla 36 yard field goal. 45-7.

The Longhorns played quite well defensively as

they held Christoval to 200 yards and 83 of that came on one play in the second quarter. The Horns intercepted three Cougar passes as Nathan McGinnis picked one and Creed Coalson had the other two. The Longhorns held the Cougar QB to 4 completions on 11 attempts and 16 yards total. Friday night the Horns travel to Mertzon for the final district game of the season. Game time is set for 7:30.

Prudential Spirit of Community Awards Program

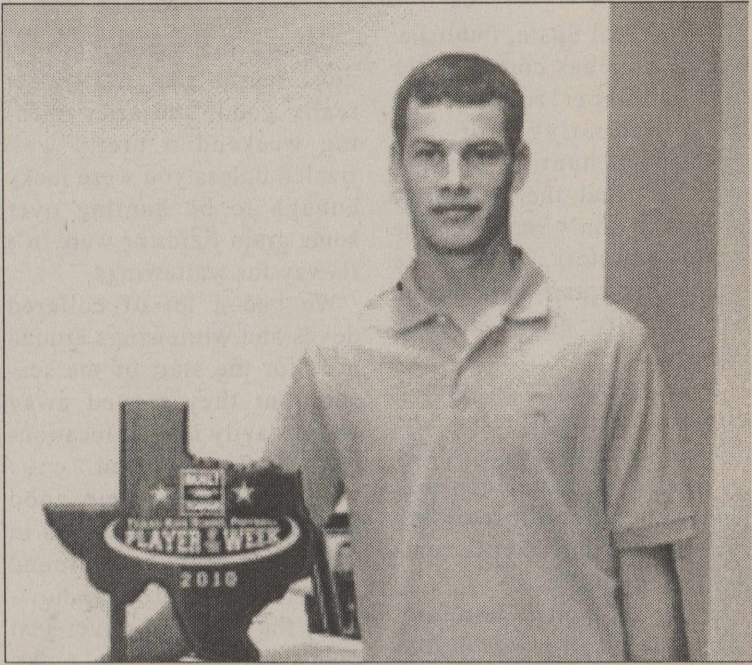

Bulk items such as furniture, appliances, microwaves, dishwashers, and mattresses can be disposed of at the Convenience Center.

Metal and scrap iron can also be disposed of at the Convenience Center. Washers, dryers, stoves, freezers and refrigerators (with compressors removed), and fence wire (must

be rolled up, clean, no posts, weeds, or grass) can be taken to the center.

The Convenience Center will be free to residents of Bronte and East Coke County.

Among items you cannot take to the Convenience Center are:

- no household trash
- no paper
- no tires or oil
- no florescent lightbulbs
- no batteries
- no chemicals or paint
- no hazardous materials
- no solvents
- no commercial construction materials
- no e-waste (tv's, monitors, printers, computers, laptops, fax machines, etc.)

Those who attend will receive a free book with over 30 daily readings providing additional insights and ideas on holiday survival.

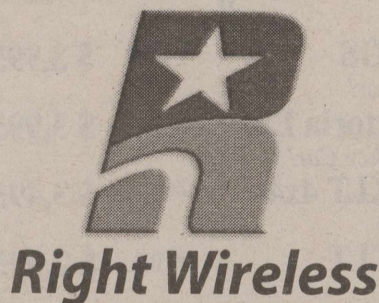

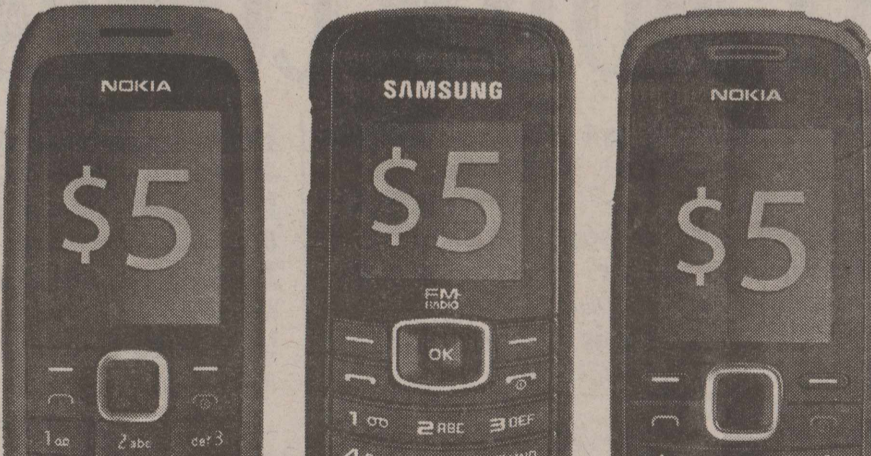
