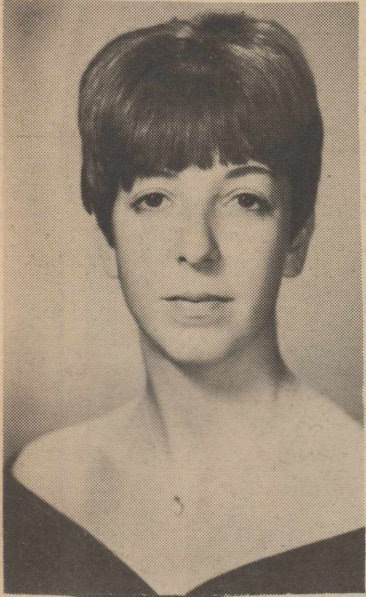

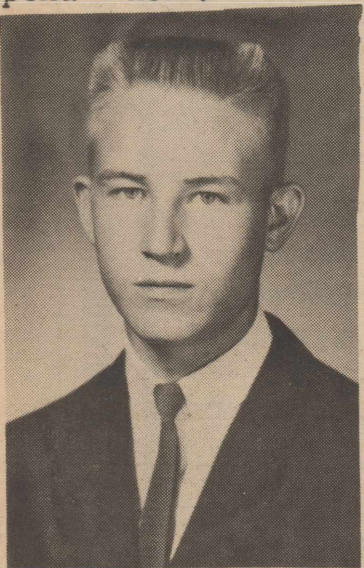

Student Recognition



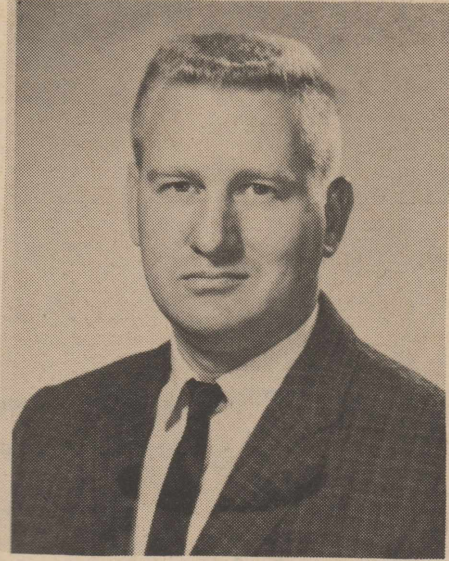

SOIL STEWARDSHIP WEEK

A visitor driving through our own Gaines County during the late summer is usually quite impressed. The irrigated crops are fast approaching their peak growth before maturity. The handiwork of God and man is evident. The miracle of plant growth, combined with man's diligent care has clothed the fields in a rich green cloak. These lush fields hold forth the promise of a bountiful harvest. Here surely is man's obligation of stewardship to the land being fulfilled.

If the same visitor were to drive down the same road during early spring, he may be equally impressed. This impression may be quite different than the first. The turn-of-row which bordered the fruitful field is blown away. Sand has covered up fence rows and the field has hummocked up or blown smooth after all protective cover has been destroyed. Is this the same stewardship of the land that was so evident a short time past? It is this time of the year that true stewardship of the land is perhaps the most evident.

Each year, Soil Stewardship Week is observed by Soil and Water Conservation Districts throughout the nation to remind man of his obligation as a steward of the land. This stewardship of the land should be a year-around obligation. It is not one that should be observed for a few months and left unheeded for the remainder of the year.

The theme of this year's Soil Stewardship Week points out the fact that three-quarters of all the land making up the contiguous forty-eight states is owned by private citizens.

About one-fourth of the mid-continental United States is owned by the Federal Government. Interspersed in the public land are large tracts reserved as National Forests and Parks. In other parts of the country, such Forests and Parks are also found which offer magnificent raw beauty for everyone to enjoy. These are truly the land and resources of all the people -- owned and managed on our behalf by the Federal Government. Virtually all of Alaska is federally owned, but fifty-seven percent of Hawaii's land is in private ownership. Slightly more than thirty-seven percent is owned by the state.

This shows that throughout the United States, individual citizens control most of our natural resources. Here on this private-owned land is where the biggest part of stewardship and conservation is being performed -- and where, by necessity, it will have to be performed in the future. It is in this future where man's stewardship of the land will meet its crucial test. The task of supplying food for an expanding world population will not be a simple one. It is also in this future where man's past use of the land will have its utmost effect.



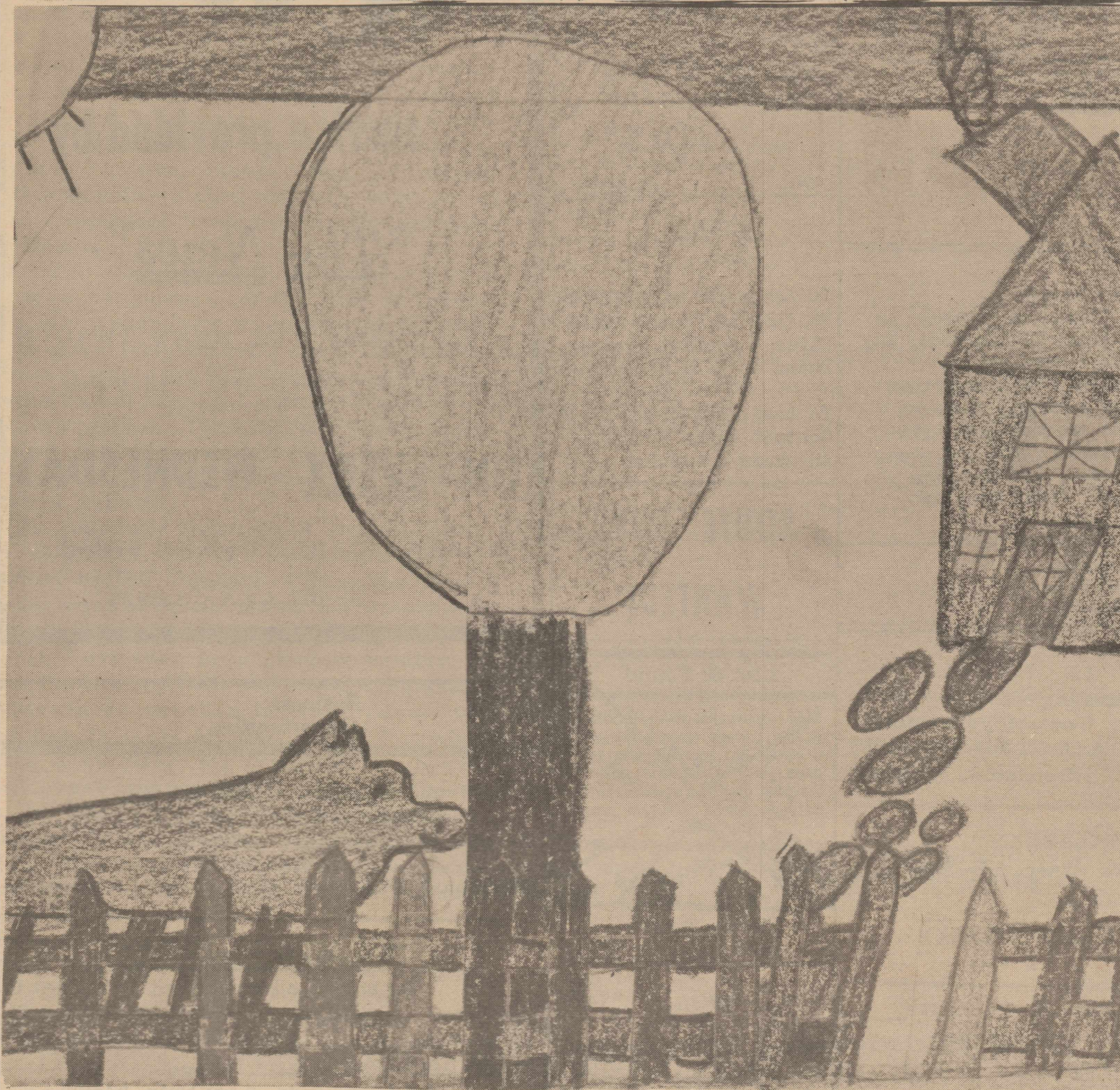
Does it Work?

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A Look At Water

Since the oil industry is being blamed for water scarcity far beyond reality, we believe the use of water for secondary recovery of oil should be put in its proper perspective in relation with other uses of water. The Interstate Oil Compact Commission should be the proper agency for a study of this nature, since it is represented by all producing states and has committees already appointed to assemble the required information.

The following information relates principally to a comparison of the use of fresh water for secondary recovery of oil with that used for irrigation in Texas. It is also confined to water produced from underground reservoirs and does not include water from streams or lakes. Time did not permit us to establish quantities used for other industrial purpose. All of this information is from published reports.

It is generally recognized that the area in West Texas and the Panhandle that is underlain by the Ogallala Formation is the greatest user of fresh water for waterflooding than in any other part of the state. The Ogallala Formation is a shallow aquifer of upper pliocene age and exists in significant quantities in 42 counties in West Texas and 4 counties in New Mexico. This formation is also a supplier for irrigation, other industrial uses and municipal use. Testimony given by Mr. Paul R. Cunningham before the Legislative Committee for Pollution - Multiple Use Study of Texas Waters November 2, 1966, in Corpus Christi showed the following:

The percentages of water us from the Ogallala Formation in 1964 was as Follows:

Irrigation	97.6 percent
Municipal	1.2 percent
Industrial	1.0 percent
Secondary Recovery	0.2 percent

Further regarding irrigation it was also established that the rate for the region in Texas served by the Ogallala Formation was 16 inches per acre in 1964. This would amount to 10,344 barrels per acre per year. A typical waterflood in the same general area uses 1,825 barrels per acre per year. The irrigation then uses 5.7 times as much water per acre.

The above figures regarding rate are somewhat misleading in that irrigation is governed by seasonal demand. The rate required for irrigation in West Texas is 10 gallons per minute per acre, while that required for waterflooding is 0.146 gallons per minute per acre. Therefore, the rate required for irrigation is approximately 68 times that required for waterflooding. Many successful floods are being operated from a water source much too small to even be considered for irrigation purposes.

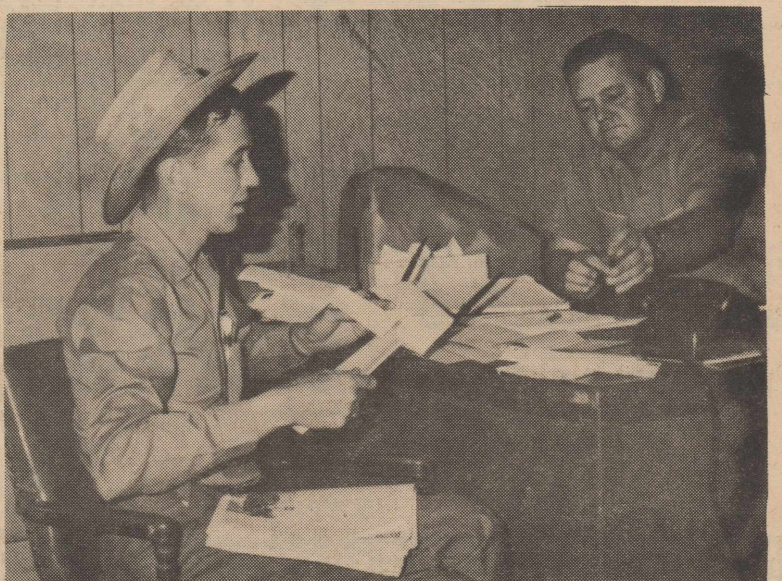

Busy Bee H.D. Club Meets
The Busy Bee Home Demonstration News Club met April 27 for its regular meeting in the Court-house meeting room.

The meeting was called to order by Mrs. J.A. Lammons, vice-president, in the absence of Mrs. N.F. McCullough, president. After the roll was called, the minutes were read and approved, the treasury report was given and business of the club was transacted. Janie Johnson gave the Council report. The Council presented Eva Bennett with a T.H.D.A. pin for her 40 years service as a H.D. Club member. This months club project is to visit and help the shut-ins of Seminole.

On May 11, the Busy Bee Club will go to Post, Texas, for lunch followed by a trip through the Post-Tex Mills.

At the end of the business meeting, Miss E. Harvy presented a program on "Canning and Freezing."

"For best use of your freezer, plan ahead for your family needs - how many times a week do they like a certain vegetable - put that number of packages up for a year plus maybe 10 extra packages for company.

"Freezing foods: Food should be put in moisture-vapor proof packages, to retain highest quality in frozen food. Glass, metal and rigid plastic are examples of moisture-vapor proof packing materials.

"Length of storage time: do not store frozen food too long. Suggested length of storage time for different foods are: fruits and vegetables, 1 year or less; fresh pork and fish, 3 to 6 months; poultry, 6 months; ground meats and sausage, 1 to 3 months; lamb and veal, 6 to 9 months; beef, 6 to 12 months. Cooked foods storage varies greatly for different products.

"Methods of canning - boiling water bath: for our elevation, processing time needs added time, up to 20 minutes, add 4 minutes, over 20 minutes add 8 minutes to boiling bath. Pressure canner: where most things call for 10 lbs. pressure, in our elevation should be 12 lbs. pressure for the stated time."

Last week, the County Agricultural Agent, Calvin D. Holcomb, mailed in some wheat, damaged by what seemed like burns on the end, the following is the answer he received from the plant pathologist. This information may be pertinent to many of our readers.

Brown spots found in some wheat fields of the High Plains have stirred much cause and concern among wheat producers.

But there is no need for alarm, says Dr. Robert W. Berry, area plant pathologist at Texas A&M University's South Plains Research and Extension Center.

Browning occurs primarily on the tips of the leaves and is a result of a greenbug toxicity, an aftermath of greenbug infestation, high temperatures and beneficial insects.

Plants become slightly stunted and less vigorous but there will be very little yield loss, explains Berry. No disease causes these symptoms; however, greenbugs can cause stunting and yellowing of the plants. Only a small percentage in the fields is affected with spots ranging up to 10 to 15 feet across although most are three feet areas.

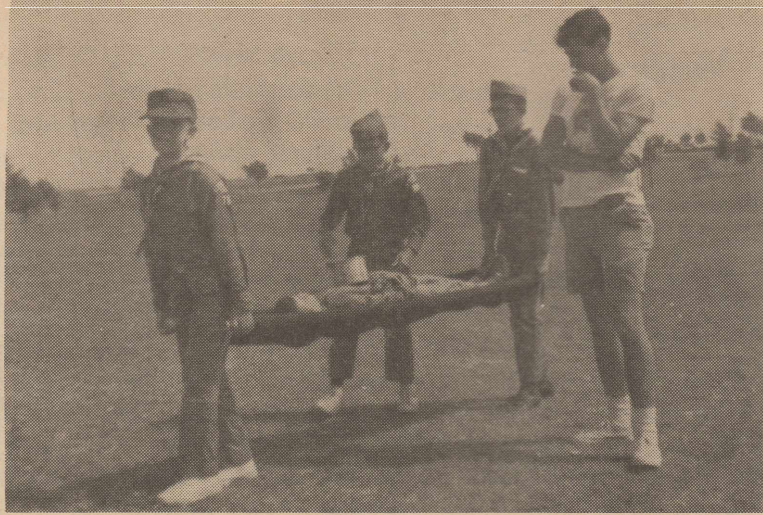

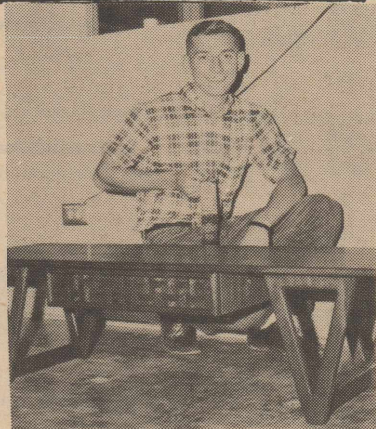
Fun-Tier Convention

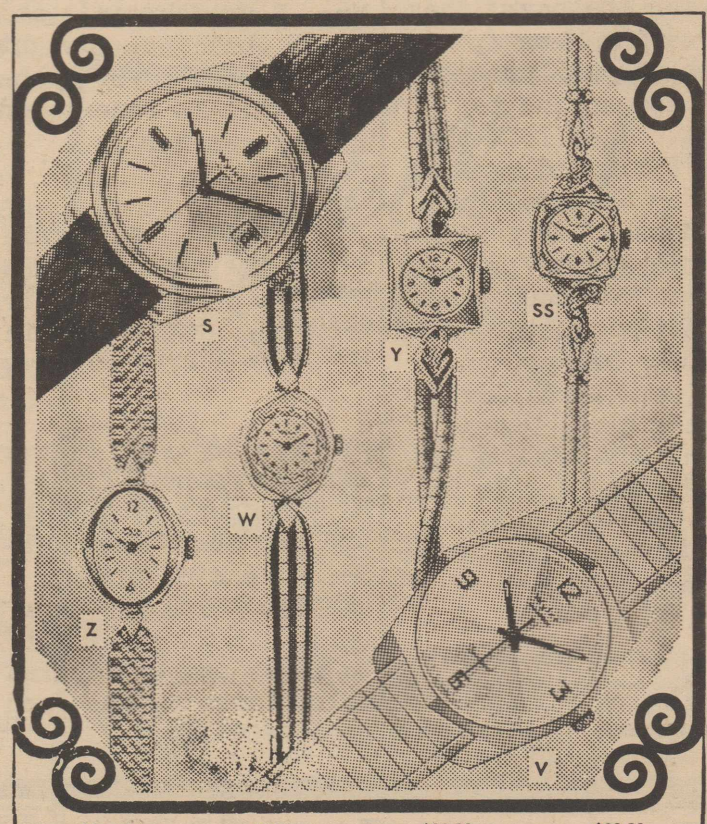

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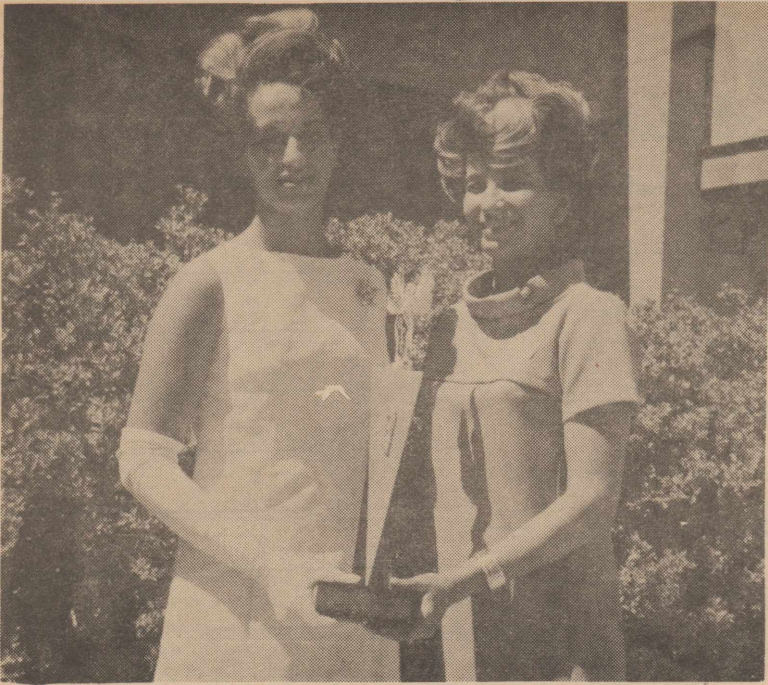

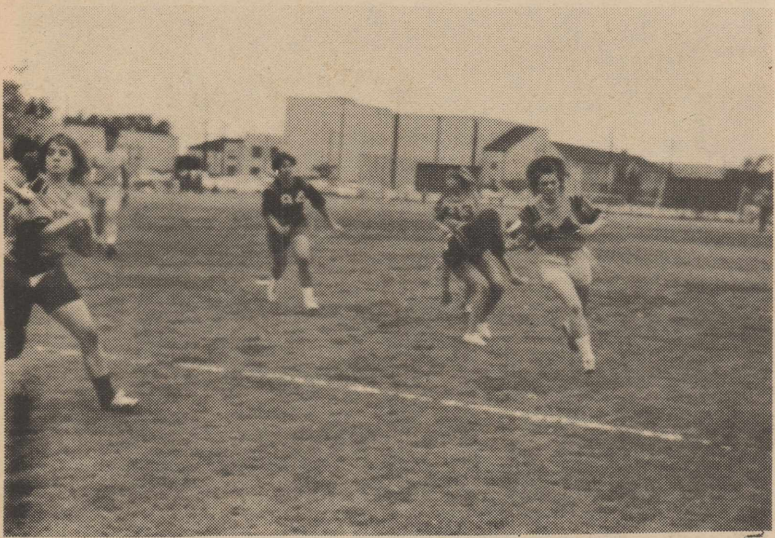
Ector Tops Seminole

The applicant will be asked to state what proportion of his students fall into this category and to describe briefly the cause and source of the dialect prevalent in his school.
3. The applicant must present written assurance of continued employment in such a position, as well as reasonable assurance of his intention to continue teaching in such a school.

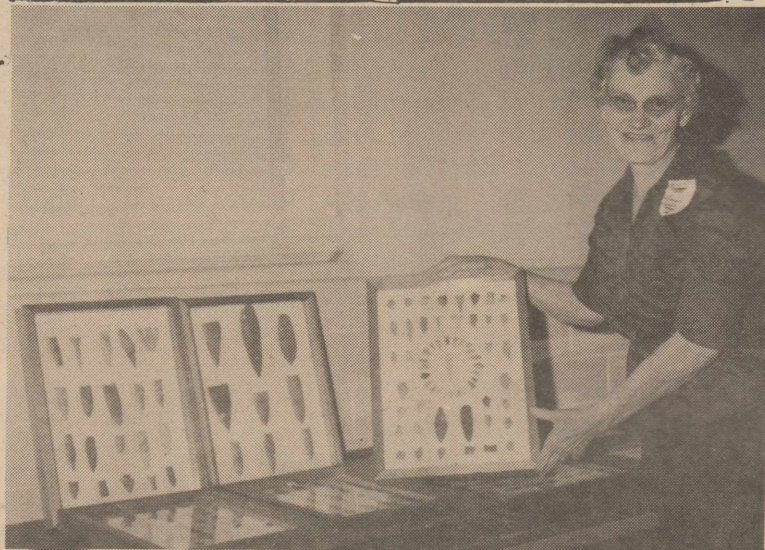

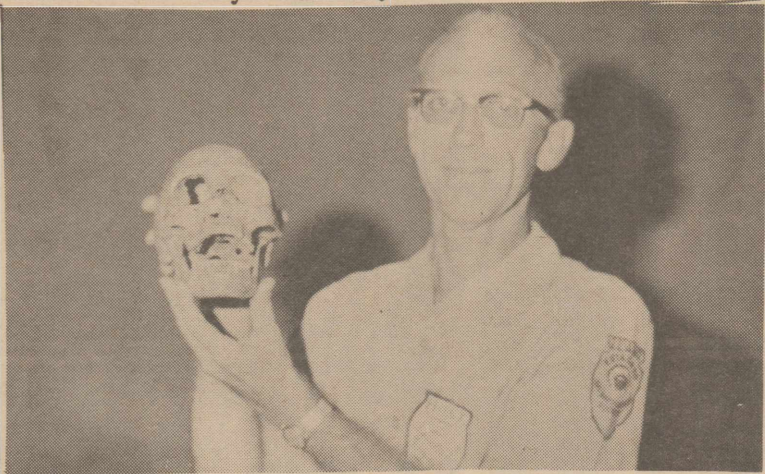

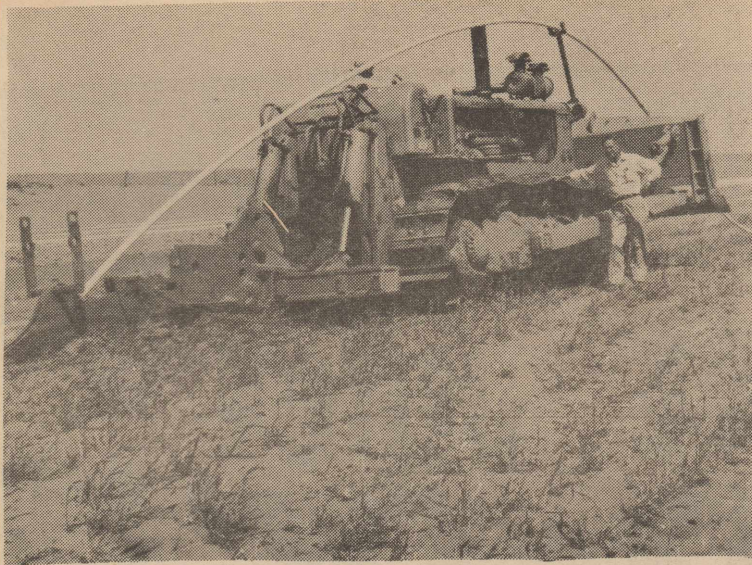
