





CONTROL OF HOUSEHOLD FLIES

Warm sunny weather in enjoyable. Unfortunately, it is also the time when most of out six-legged enemies thrive, points out Calvin Holcomb, County Agricultural Agent.

Houseflies constitute the most common insect problem of all. Besides being annoying to man and animals, houseflies may serve as carried of such dreaded diseases as polio, typhoid fever, tuberculosis, dysentery and others.

Holcomb adds that other species of flies occur around the farm but houseflies are the chief species that invade buildings and homes. They breed in decaying organic matter and feed indiscriminately on manure, garbage and even the food on our tables.

Indeed, they contaminate everything they touch, states Holcomb. It is little wonder they are called the filthiest of all insect pests. A fly-free premise is not easy to achieve because constant attention is required, and several methods of control must be utilized, the agent says.

Sanitation is always the first step in control, emphasizes Holcomb. Accumulations of garbage or manure or droppings of pets and certain kinds of food should be avoided since all serve as breeding areas for flies. Fly breeding is almost sure to occur or DDVP), naled (Dibrom), ronnel (Korlan) and if the media is damp or moist, he explains.

Screens can keep flies outside the home. should be checked regularly to make sure they are properly fitted and in good repair.

Insecticides have a place in fly control, but the results will not be satisfactory unless the sanitary and for this purpose. Be sure the label says this spray mechanical measures are carried out, Holcomb explains.

Residual sprays of 1 percent dimethoate (Cygon), siazinon, ronnel (Korlan) or malathion may be used on the walls of farm buildings. When properly applied, the sprays will kill the flies that rest on the surface of the walls.

Baits containing sugar plus an insecide is a convient way to supplement housefly control. Baits often give spectacular initial kill, but poor kill later, adds

Space sprays may be used for fly control in the home Use only synergized pyrethrums or dichlorvos (DDVP) is for flying insects, Holcomb adds.

For additional information, check with our office and pick up a copy of the Texas Guide for Controlling Household Insects, suggests Holcomb.

Q & A

(Q) I have noticed several dull spots here and there on my paintings that I have finished. What can I do about these spots?

(A) The reason that you have spots in your paintings is because you are using too much turpentine. They will disappear when you put on a final coat of varnish.

(Q) I use the colors just as they come from the tube, without anything mixed with them. I have been told that they would crack with age. Is this true?

(A) Most mediums are mixed in tubes of oil (such as Resins, oils, and turpentine). The pictures will not crack with age, unless you have the pictures painted in thick continuous layers like cake icing.

EDMUND W. ROBB TO BE IN CITY WIDE REVIVA

The Reverend Edmund W. Robb has been a Methodist minister for more than 20 years. Following a very successful pastorate in Midland, Texas, he was appointed a full-time evangelist in June, 1966. He has organized the Ed Robb Evangelistic Association with headquarters in Abilene, Texas.

The corporation has a 32-member board of directors headed by Methodist lay leader and oilman, C.W. Brown of McCamey. Other officials are, Dr. Luther Kirk, Pampa District, Superintendent of the Methodist Church, vice-chairman—Bill Huffman, president of Univeral Systems Inc., of Midland, secretary—and W.T. Johnson, vice-president of the Farmers and Merchants National Bank of Hamlin, treasurer.

Joining the evangelistic team are Gene Moore, Methodist minister and singer, and his wife, Bobbie, a vocalist and pianist.

Before coming to Midland in 1962, Mr. Robb held pastorates in Marshall, Hamlin and Amarillo. In addition he has conducted more than 100 revivals and preaching missions in the last 15 years while serving as a pastor.

During his four years at St. Paul Methodist in Midland, the church grew from a membership of 616 to 1170, making it one of the fastest growing churches in the Northwest Texas Conference. During that period, 830 persons were received into the membership of St. Paul.





Today, twenty-six years ago, we changed the name of Frances Marie Smith to Mrs. Walter L. Woods and it has been a wonderful arrangement. We promised one-another that nothing would come between us but something did. A little girl came to live at our house just one year later, less four days. As the years passed, we got further apart at the table and closer together at heart. As the four fledgings begin to leave the nest, this time of the year becomes dearer and dearer. ROCKS & STONES

Dr. Sood, in whose house we live, said as he was boarding the plane. "I could not get a yard man". I said, "Forget it, I will take care of the yard, I will water it, and I will mow it". He said "Nature will take care of the water; you can not mow because of the stones, you know, the stones. The stones are bad." With that he bid us goodbye.


After a few days of seeing rock fences, rock buildings, black pumice blocks, highways out of stones, rock gardens, trinkets out of rock, rock mountains, and trying to mow the back yard — the Good Doctor's words have a much greater meaning. THIS WHOLE ISLAND IS ROCK OR LAVA STONE. When someone on the island of Hawaii tells you their house is built upon a rock, you just better believe them.

I will never understand amidst all these rocks how everything grows, how green everything is, how good the fruit, and how beautiful the flowers. My Hawaiian Map shows a lot of the flows of the Lava rock; the flow of 1959, 1955, 1750, 1881, 1935, 1843, 1919, 1950, 1926, 1851, 1907, and 1840. We did not visit the prison system because I though of all that pile of rock they had to work on. Mauna Kea has built a mountain of 13,796 feet, and Mauna Loa one of 13,680. Add to that the depth of the sea and you can see some STONE. Joe Mckinney once said of our home county of Gaines, "There are not enough rocks, in most of the county, to get mad at a cow". Joe, you could have a big herd here. This rock we're on is 93 miles long and 76 miles wide at its longest points. From the ocean floor to the top of the mountains of rock is 31,000 feet. In one of the flows, 500 acres of land was added to this island. Just as surely as God can add one acre or 500 of them just as surely He can remove them. WW

Lava flow into the sea--cliffs are 40-50 feet high. All rocks are black.




The crater still smokes and steams in places. The depth is 400 feet.

Peach Story

The peach story is still and we hope will continue to be 'news' in Gaines County for years to come. We hope the story gets bigger and better! The boost to the economy and the publicity received statewide because of our 'peachy' crop of girls and two state queens in two years, is wonderful.

The largest producing peach orchard in Gaines county is the Oliver Orchard in far west Gaines. It was formerly the Boyd Orchard. June, 1966, it was purchased by Floyd and Layton Oliver, from Wright G. Boyd. There are 8,000 trees on 225 acres. As in other orchards in the county there are several varities, including, Dixie Reds (cling), and Rangers. The Red Globes are ready now and the Red Skins will be ready around the first of August.

The processing at the Oliver Orchard is done by customers, who wish to select their own fruit. They also have peaches that are already gathered for those who prefer this service. Out-of-town consumers have come from Plainview, Midland, Lubbock, Clovis, Abilene, Big Spring, Lamesa, etc. Mr. Clyde Cowan is at the orchard each day.

Handling the sales of the Oliver orchard is Richard Jones of 406 S.W. 17th. Richard is the opeartor of the Wolfe Nursery. The Wolfe Nursery has 855 acres and 41,040) trees. These trees will begin producing next year and will be in full production in five years. The Wolfe orchard is in west Gaines, as are the Moore-Freeman, the George Norman, and other orchards.

The abundant water helps in making western Gaines County an ideal location for quality, and quanity production of peaches.

Floyd and Layton Oliver are brothers, and both reside in Dawson County. The Oliver orchard is located 20 miles, west, on the Hobbs Highway, five north (on pavement) and two west.



WINDJAMMERS TO APPEAR JULY 18, AT TOWER THEATER

Abilene's most famous musical export, the Windjammers of Mc Murry College, make their Seminole debut in a concert at 8 p.m. July 18, in the Tower Theatre. The Seminole concert is being sponsored by the Methodist Youth Fellowship.

Well over a million persons have seen the Windjammers in scores of personal appearances and concerts in Texas, New Mexico and Oklahoma since the formation of the group on the McMurry campus about three and a half years ago. Hundreds of thousands more were introduced to the talented threesome by way of the state-wide telecast of "Talent '65," shown in 1966, and "Talent '66," which was first telecast in January of this year and repeated in the spring due to popular demand.

Although the Windjammers have been building a solid reputation in Texas for a long while, only recently have they begun to attract the attention and interest of the national music business people. Two semisuccessful records probably provoked some initial interest, but their heavy schedule of campus concerts this past year has probably done most to stimulate national interest in the Windjammers.

As important as anything else so far in the Windjammers infant career were the two consecutive summer stints at Six Flags Over Texas where they sang for about half a million fun-seekers.

Attempts to categorize the Windjammers are usually doomed to failure. The Windjammer concert program is a lesson in musical variety and good humor. Their repertoire includes a sampling from most every area of popular music.

By name, the Windjammers are Clark Walter of Roswell, New Mexico, bassist and tenor; Pat Hamilton, bariton and one-man-orchestra; and Jerrel Elliott of Brownwood, guitarist, woodwinds section and electronics technician.

Tim is hoping to receive a leave in August

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
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EDDIE ETHRIDGE




