MUST FOR FIRST GRADERS

Parents of first graders are reminded by school officials that a birth certificate and a record of immunizations are necessary for a child entering the first grade this fall. Immunizations required for beginners by local Board policies include smallpox, diptheria, whooping cough, and polio. Parents should secure a statement from their doctor, or health department, that these immunizations have been completed.

Parents may secure a birth certificate for their child from the county clerk of the county in which the child was born, or from the Bureau of Vital Statistics in the state capitol. Children must be six years old on or before September 1, 1967 to be eligible to attend school this year.

The West Texas Trailriders numbers 312 members and they're always looking for new members. A water tank and a chuck wagon are part of the standard equipment for the group's activities.

The President of the organization is Bob Whitaker of Odessa. There are 12 directors. They call Odessa headquarters.

Each year this group rides 118 miles from Andrews to Pecos. This year the ride took 4 days.

Riders from Seminole on that trip were Ray and Ricky Strickland, Dan Gatewood, and Mike Barrnett.

Five year old Julie Vannatta on Smokey won a trophy for youngest rider, though she had tough competion from Tony Patton who is only five months older. Both of these outstanding young horsemen rode every step of the way.

On Labor Day, a 10 mile ride is planned from Big Spring to Moss Creed Lake. The Trailriders intend to camp there for the night, returning to Big Spring the next day.

PEANUT ACREAGE SALE AND LEASE

Representatives McMillan of South Carolina, O'Neal of Georgia and Hagen from Georgia, introduced bills in the House that if passed would authorize the Secretary of Agriculture to permit at his discretion the owner and operator of any farm to sell or lease any or all of his peanut acreage allotments under the Agriculture Adjustment Act to any other owner or operator of a farm or to transfer such allotments to another farm owned or controlled by him. These Bills also were to give the effect of transferring the acreage history and market quota.

The House Agriculture's Sub-Committee on oilseeds and rice held hearings on HR 6383 and related bills on June 22, 1967. The sub-committee on June 23, 1967, recommended a clean bill to the House. By clean bill, we mean the introduction of a new bill.

The clean bill (HR 11222) was introduced on June 28, 1967 and referred to the Committee on Agriculture. The Committee on Agriculture considered the new bill, HR 11222, on July 18, but took no action at that time. On July 31 the House Agriculture Committee approved lease or sale of peanut acreage allotments within a county.

The Committee also put a limit of 50 acres that could be transferred. The bill would operate for the 68 and 69 crop years. (Not much help for Gaines County. Ed. 's note)

AID TO US?

All over the nation, states are struggling with the problem of bringing their budgets within their income. The alternative is more debt unless higher taxes are to be levied, and the people are emphatically opposing increased taxes. During boom years, tax receipts have been high

and public money has been spent like water. Now, as the boom has been "cooled", it becomes a case of debt, economy or higher taxes.

The federal government is in the same position, but according to official statements, there will be little or no easing of domestic social expenditures in the face of mounting war costs. So, get ready for more debt, higher taxes or both, and more inflation.

Nothing has been said about what will happen when the tax consumers outnumber the tax earners. With economy out the window one wonders if the countries we have aided will have a foreign aid program for us.

Q. -- How should a person set up a palette with oil paint?

A. -- The color can be laid out on the palette in any number of ways convenient for painting. However; once an arrangement is arrived at, you should keep the colors in that order. Having a definite place for each color on the palette establishes the habit of being able to locate the desired color automatically, with a minimum amount of fumbling.

Q. -- Can you use a house painter's brush for oil painting?

A. -- Yes, for covering of large areas, backgrounds and rough toning work at the preliminary stages of a large canvas, the house painter's brush is a time saver. The one inch will be found best for these purposes. A softer hair brush of the same width will be found ideal for applying retouch and final coats of varnish.

THE BIRDFARM

In the vicinity of Kill Devil Hill, near Kitty Hawk, North Carolina, on the 17 of December, 1903 the Wright Brothers made the first powered manned aircraft flight in history. The airplane has proved to be the most modern improvement in weapons in 20th century. It has practically revolutionized warfare, providing combatants with a fast, highly mobil platform from which to launch various types of missils, bombs and gunfire. The most highly developed application of the airplane is the modern attack aircraft carriers.

Early in the history of the airplane, the various navies of the world realized it's advantages as a weapons systems. At first it was thought that the best application of the airplane was the seaplane, which could be carried aboard ship, then launched and retrived in the sea itself. It was soon found, however, that the seaplanes of that era were no match whatsoever for the land planes and an effective means was sought to carry land planes on ship. The answer was the aircraft carrier.

The first "Bird Farm" was a British ship, the HMS Argus. Launched in 1917, she stood alone until the commissioning of the USS Langly, in March 1922.

During the First World War, and the years between many objected to the carriers and subjected them to battleships. They were used primarily to wound and slow enemy ships, which could then be sunk by the capital ships when they arrived on the scene.

Even in World War II, in the Atlantic Theater, the aircraft carriers continued to carry out this role.

In the Pacific, however, the Bird Farms quickly showed what they were capable of as a mobil airfield from which to launch and retrieve aircraft.

At Pearl Harbor, on the 7th of December, 1941; at the Battle of Midway, June 7-8, 1942: and Leyete Gulf, Octover 23-26, 1944, the carriers proved their ability to reach out over the horizon, and strike a crippling blow against the enemy.

The superiority of the Aircraft Carrier lives in its mobility. Capable of remaining at sea for extended periods of time, the Bird Farm provides an airbase that can roam almost 70% of the earth's surface at will, because that much of our world is navagable water. It's aircraft, the hot operational jets of today's Navy, because of their ability to fly high, fast and far, can utilize this base to strike far inland on any continant. They can, in fact, reach any spot in the world. Again, the carrier is valuable as a stratigic weapon in that it can literally lose itself in the world's oceans, becoming at times and at it's commanding officers mere wish, almost impossible to find, giving it advantage over land bases, because you can't destroy a target that you can't find.

Today they still fly from Kitty Hawk, but not Kitty Hawk, North Carolina. Today, flight operations are conducted from the Super-Carrier, USS Kitty Hawk, CVA-63. At 80,000 Tons, 85 aircraft, and 5,000 men, Kitty Hawk represents one of the world's strongest weapons systems and a considerable percentage of our nations tatical and stratigic strength. Off the coast of Vietnam, she and her sister ships, flying an easy schedule far short of their total capabilities, are holding the Viet-Cong down, keeping them pinned and making it impossible for them to attack in full force. By striking and destroying the supply routes that feed his men, by daily attacking his power plants and airfields the Navy's Super carriers, are curtailing the enemy's war potential and making it very difficult for him to continue his aggression.

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

2 teaspoons - vanilla, butter & nut flavor

Cream margarine and sugar thoroughly, then mix soda and salt in buttermilk until foamy, adding alternately with the flour to above, mixing after each addition. TRAVELING FOLK OF SEMINOLE

Dear Gang:

Normally a son in a far away rlace would not write his mother and tell about the hula-dancers. I wish my mother could have been here and seen the Hawaiian girls. Frances received an invitation from one of the ladies she goes to school with. (Her sister helps with the group and sings.)

We boarded the bus (Army) in downtown Hilo, rode 30 to 40 miles away to the crater area where all branches of the service have a retreat for armed personnel. We traveled out with the singers and dancers. The singers sang most of the way out there. I thought they would be pooped out by the time the program came on but that was not the case. The four women singers turned out to be mothers over half of the 8 dancers.

Who puts out all this dope about the grass-skirt dance? The only one we saw was on a five year old. The others, all girls, danced by courses of 3, 4, and seven at a time. They were dressed in such pretty full length muumuus, some red, some yellow, some white, and all were pretty. The four senior girls looked to be 16 or 17 years old. The 3 junior girls looked to be 11 or twelve, and then the little one.

It was such a nice, decent family affair. The singers each played a uke or a guitar. The songs were so pretty, some we could understand and some we could not. The dancers were so slow and graceful. I must have expected some wild, exotic, fast movements but such was not the case.
