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## HOW A COTTON PLANT GROWS

Continued from last week.
Fast growth--Cotton plants should be healthy, about 8 inches tall, and have eight normal leaves 30 days after they are up to a stand. They should have taproots at least 20 inches long with well developed feeder roots. The top number of plants in a stand depends on amount of water normally available. To keep plants on schedule, minimum temperature should remain above $6^{n}$ degrees $F$.
Plants must be healthy, have adequate moisture, sufficient plant food, and receive needed protection from thrips, armyworms, cutworms, and other earlyseason pests that delay growth or reduce stands during this period. In areas where thrips are a problem, protection is a must if plants are to develop on schedule. Weeds and grass should be controlled without "plow damage" to roots. Heavy rains, cloudy days, hail, and high winds or drouth can seriously damage a crop during this period.

Fast squaring--The one-third-grownsquare stage is the "make or break" period insofar as the economical production of quality cotton is concerned. A bale-per-acre bottom crop should be set during the first 10 days after squaring starts and before squares reach the one-third-grown stage. When temperatures are favorable ( 70 to 100 degrees $F$.), moisture and plant food adequate, well developed plants should set over 18 squares per foot of row. If only $70 \%$ of the squares mature bolls, crop should produce a bale per acre. A boll per inch, or 150,000 to 160,000 bolls per acre, is required to produce a bale-peracre crop. (Generally, 100 normal bolls will make a pound of seed cotton.)

Number of squares that mature as bolls is determined by the health, vigor, plant food, moisture, and protection from insects the crop receives. In most sections, protection must be provided to prevent damage from fleahoppers, lygus bugs, and overwintered boll weevils before they cause damage or lay eggs. Failure to set a bottom crop encourages vegetative growth and delays maturity. Growers should never forget: There is no sure way to make profit-

able dryland cotton after the bottom crop is lost to insects.

Fast blooms--Fields with clean, healthy, well fed plants and adequate protection from insects begin to "strut their stuff' during the bloom period. Under dryland conditions, bale-per-acre or better crops should be produced from blooms ( 300,000 blooms-$50 \%$ of them maturing normal bolls) put on during the first 21 days.

If irrigation is available and a 2 -bale crop is desir ed, it can be produced during a 30 day bloom ( 500,00 $--60 \%$ maturing normal bolls) period. Three-bale crops should be produced during a six-weeks bloom ( $800,000--60 \%$ maturing normal bolls) period. Bolls held on plants 10 days after blooms fall usually mature if protected from insects. A crop of uniformly good quality, matured during a short bloom period, can be harvested mechanically early in the season with little loss in grade.

Early blooms usually produce more and larger bolls than do later blooms on dryland farms. A study showed $94.1 \%$ of the first week's blooms made bolls, while only $13.3 \%$ of the fifth week's blooms matured bolls. It required 87 bolls to make a pound of seed cotton from bolls matured from "first week" blooms; 146, from bolls matured the fifth week.

During the bloom-to-maturity period, failure to provide enough plant food and moisture (see chart) or to prevent damage from diseases, weeds, and insects shows up in lost yield and income. When plants do no get a balanced supply of each essential plant food nutrient, bolis shed, usually within 10 days after a bloon drops.

About 70\% of total seasonal requirements for water and plant food must be available to the crop during this period to prevent excessive shedding. Unfavorab weather, or failure to protect plants from insects and diseases will also reduce yield and quality to a great extent. Temperatures above 100 degrees F., accompained by hot winds (over 10 miles per hour), often play havoc with an excellent crop prospect. When water is limited, transportation of plant food is slowed, bolls are smaller, and the fiber shorter.

The payoff comes from harvesting maximum yields of uniformly good cotton early in the season. This can be done when the crop matures during a short period. In the southern part of the Southwest, harves should be completed during a 150 -day period; planting through harvest.
In northern sections, harvest usually starts after the end of a 150 -day period. The time required from bloom to maturity varies from 40 to 60 days, influenced largely by temperatures. For example, at Lubbock it required 48 days (open bloom to open boll) when the mean temperature averaged 80 degrees F., and 68 days when the mean temperature averaged 71 degrees $F$. It is highly desirable for harvest to fall during dry weather so crops can be harvested soon after maturity--dry ( $8 \%$ or less moisture), loose, and clean. Harvest-aid chemicals should be applied just as soon as the crop is fully matured-$80 \%$ or more open bolls--not before. When chemicals are applied to cotton before the crop is fully matured, yields and quality are reduced.

## FARM INCOME

USDA reports the 1967 total net farm income, based on second quarter estimates at $\$ 14.5$ billion The Department's second quarter estimates of $\$ 14.5$ billion is $10.5 \%$ below the 1966 annual figure of $\$ 16.2$ billion.
Cash receipts from farm marketings based on second quarter estimates of $\$ 42.4$ billion is $1.85 \%$ below the $\$ 43.2$ billion reported for 1966 .
The President's Joint Economic Committee reports the net income per farm (whick includes net inventory changes) for 1967 based on second quarter figures and 1966 prices at $\$ 4,490.00$ compared to $\$ 4,988.00$ for the year 1966. These figures reveal that the perfarm income estimated for 1967 is $9.98 \%$ below what it was for 1966 expressed in 1966 prices.

"Salute to Sandy" by Dale Evans Rogers
The story of Sandy, the third child of the Rogers household to die. It is a story-of his struggle to find his place in the sun, his tragic death on military duty in Germany, and of what his famed father and mother did about it. Not in frustrated mourning at home, but in a tour of Vietnam to entertain other young soldiers far from home.
"The Senator's Lady" by Shirley Seifert

## Letter from the Ft. Worth Kinnery

Living in the country, we recall that we didn't have an ice-box or refrigerator, but our milk and butter were kept cool by hanging them in our cistern that was filled with rainwater caught by troughs affixed to the eaves of the house and it was especially desirable, might say almost a necessity, to catch thís water from snows or Winter rains, otherwise the water eventually had "Wiggle-Tails" in it. Later our Father bought a newfangled thing they called a "Coolerator", consisting of a number of shelves, usually 4 to 6 , made of galvanized iron, held together and properly spaced by galvanized brackets that hung from an arm extending out from the wall of the porch, around which we wrapped a cheese-cloth curtain that was kept wet by water constantly dripping from an overhead bucket which, with the wind blowing on it kept the produce cool, not cold, but cool enough to keep it from spoiling. Our folks bought, sugar, flour, salt, and apples, the latter of course available only in the Fall, all by the barrel. Most of the rest of the things we ate were produced on the farm. We dug our Irish potatoes and spread them out in the loft of our barn, the onions were tied in bunches and hung from the barn rafters; the sweet potatoes, we called them "Punkin Yams" were in the fall and piled in a hill in. the corner of our garden, corn stalks were placed around them in the form of an Indian Tee Pee, then dirt banked around them to keep them from freezing in the Winter. The smaller potatoes we kept for seed to be planted the following year. Our Mothers preserved a lot of fruit, dried peaches and apples in the Sun on the top of the porch and although we never had much money, we do. not recall ever being hungry. Our clothes, as long as they were useable, were handed down from the older to the younger children as the older children outgrew them and the younger ones grew large enough to wear them. Few people were any better off than we were and we were never in a big race to outdo the "Jones". The Jones were in the same boat. Big events in our lives were taffy pullings in the Winter and ice-cream parties and the 4 th of July picnics in the Summer. These parties were held on Friday and Saturday nights so that they didn't interfer with our school or fárm work. We never asked our parents, "What can we do now to pass the time away?" We knew before hand what the answer would be, as ther was never a time when there wasn't some chore to be done around the place and our parents appeared to just be waiting for us to get caught up with one chore, before assigning us another.
