At a General Session of the INTERSTATE COMMISSION, held at its office in Washington, D. C. on the 24th day of August 1967.

PERMIAN BASIN RAILROAD CO. CONSTRUCTION BETWEEN ODESSA AND SEAGRAVES, TEXAS

Upon consideration of the record in the above-entitled proceeding, including the joint petition filed May 1, 1967, by The Texas and Pacific Railway Company and The Texas and Pacific Motor Transport Company, protestants, for reconsideration of the report and order of the Commission, decided March 21, 1967, and the reply to said petition filed by the applicant on May 22, 1967; and

It appearing, That the petition for reconsideration sets forth no material facts or arguments in addition to those previously considered in the proceedings; that the findings in the report and order of March 21, 1967, are adequately supported by the record; that there has been presented no error of fact or law with respect to the matters complained of by petitioners; and that no showing has been made warranting reconsideration of said report and order:

It is ordered, That said petition be, and it is hereby, denied; and

It is further ordered, That the order of March 2, 1967, shall be effective 20 days from the date of service of this order.

The Fairview Baptist Church starts her week revival the 17th. We want to welcome everyone and ask everyone to come and bring a neighbor with you.

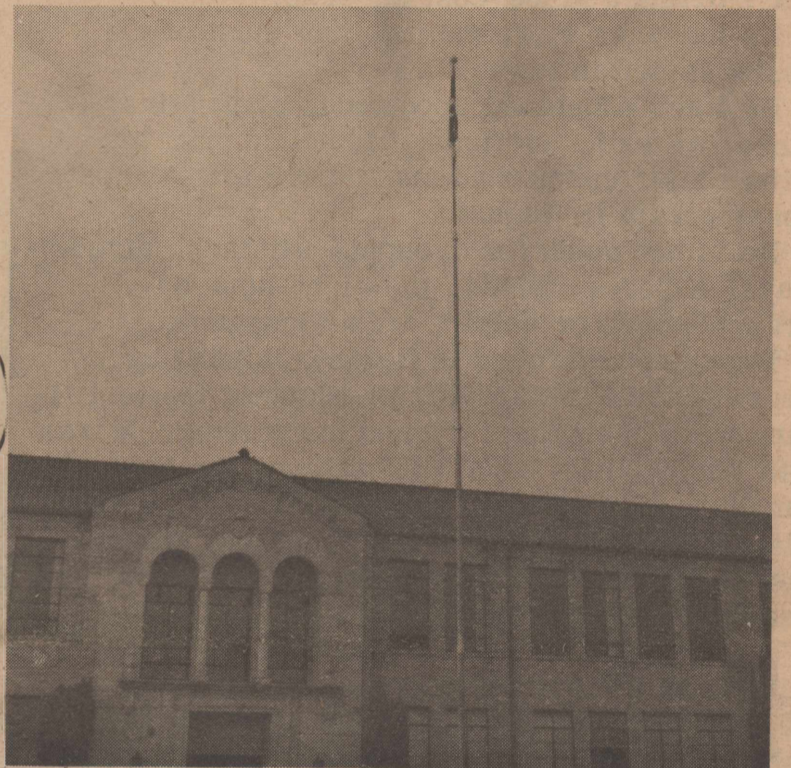
Bessie Brooks and Shirley Archer were in Lamesa Thursday on business—these ladies love to window shop, also.

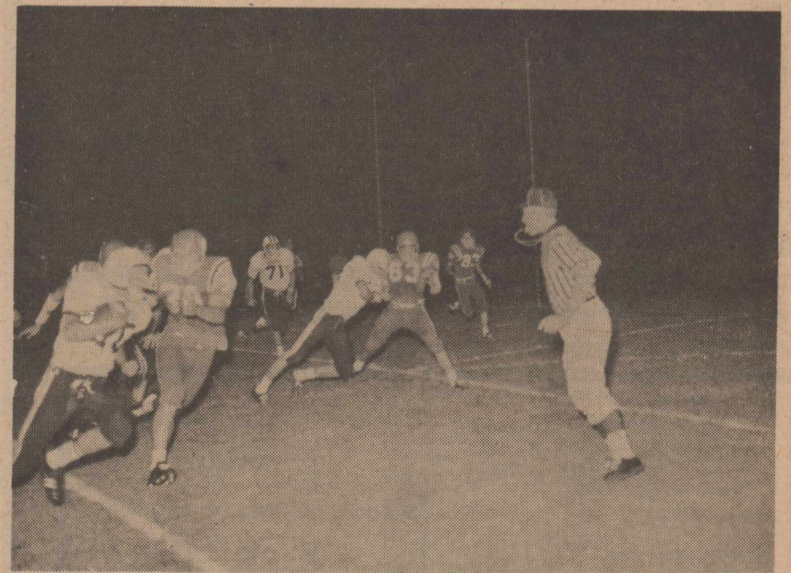

WHAT IS A FARMER?

A farmer is a paradox--he is an overall executive with his home his office: a scientist using fertilizer attachments; a purchasing agent in an old straw hat; a personnel director with grease under his fingernails, a dietitian with a passion for alfalfa, aminos, and antibiotics; a production expert with a surplus, and a manager battling a price-cost squeeze.

He manages more capital than most of the businessmen in town.

He likes sunshine, good food, state fairs, dinner at noon, auctions, his neighbors, his shirt collar unbuttoned and, above all, a good soaking rain in August.

He is not much for droughts, ditches, throughways, experts, weeds, the eight-hour day, grasshoppers or helping with housework.

Farmers are found in fields--plowing up, seeding down, rotating from planting to, fertilizing with, spraying for, and harvesting. Wives help them, little boys follow them, the agriculture department confuses them, city relatives visit them, salesmen detain them and wait for them, weather can delay them, but it takes heaven to stop them.

A farmer is both faith and fatalist--he must have faith to continually meet the challenges of his capacities amid an ever-present possibility that an act of God (a late spring, an early frost, tornado, flood, drought) can bring his business to a standstill. You can reduce his acreage but you can't restrain his ambition.

Might as well put up with him--he is your friend, your competitor, your customer, your source of food, fiber, and self-reliant young citizens to help replenish your cities. He is your countryman--a denim-dressed, business-wise, fast-growing statesman of stature. And when he comes in at noon, having spent the energy of his hopes and dreams, he can be recharged anew with the magic words: "The Market's Up."

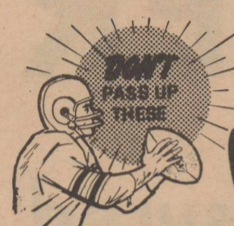

ROTARIANS PLAN ANNUAL PRE-GAME BAR-B-QUE

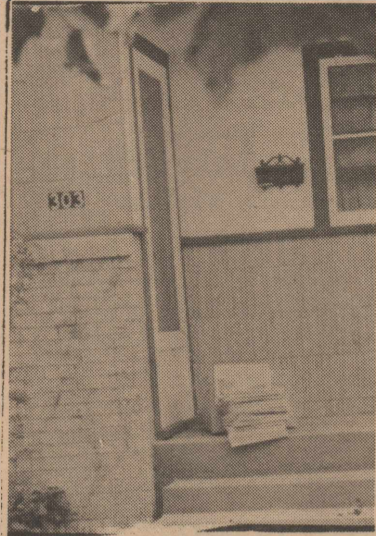
On Friday, September 22, preceding the Seminole-Lamesa football game the Rotary Club will host their Annual Bar-B-Que.
