The original delineation also included portions of Lynn, Dawson, and Andrews Counties, however, in the election creation the Water District, the voters in these counties and cities of Seminole and Denver City voted not to participate in the district Mr. Kendrick, the President of the Board of Directors and spokes man for the District said, "Assuming there is no appeal to the Supreme Court of the State of Texas, this ruling opens the door for the District to begin serving the people in it's intended capacites."

Mr. and Mrs. Woodard said, "We made $50 \%$ more that year on the deep broke ground than we made on any adjoining ground around. People came from Kansas, Oklahoma, and many other places to see this." ## Escape: First Rule of Fire Safety

Exactly what would you do if right now you heard the crackle of fire in your kitchen? Exactly what would you do if in the middle of the night your family was sleeping soundly and you awakened to the smell of smoke?

People who don't have ready answers to these questions are risking their family's and their own lives, dec lares Fire Chief Jimmy Pierson. For these are the people who don't know how to act when fire strikes in the home.

The first rule of safety from fire is escape: get everybody out at the very first signs of fire. But unless you have done some thinking and planning, you may not be able to escape. National Fire Protection Association studies show the great majority of the $6,500 \mathrm{U}$. S. lives taken by home fires last year were needlessly lost because of failure to pre-plan and rehearse escape measures. Here are pointers to help you plan:

1. Carefully figure out at least two routes to the outside from every room in the house, especially bedrooms. Allow for blocking of stairways and halls by fire. 2. Particularly for nighttime fires, remember that closed bedroom door will hold back flame and smoke, allow extra time for escape. 3. For upper floor escape, use any available porch and garage roofs, ladders, or trees as ways down to safety. Be sure exit windows work easily, and that they are low and large enough to get through. 4. Pick an outside assembly point where the family will meet, and be sure everyone understands the rule "once out--stay out." 5. Know how to call the fire department, by street box or neighbor's phone, and do this as quickly as the house is clear of people.
